WEDNESDAY, January 14, 1882-REGULAR MEETING, 9.30 A. M.

On motion of Commissioner Lane, Commissioner Olliffe was called to the chair.
Samuel E. Lyon, counsel for the Suburban Rapid Transit Company ; Joseph Pool, counsel for the Second Avenue Railroad Company ; and H. P. DeGraaf and D. E. Sickles, Rapid Transit Commissioners, appeared and were heard in relation to the application now before the Board for permission to erect a railroad bridge across the Harlem river, at or near Second avenue.
Mr. Pool presented a communication, signed by Wm. S. Thorn, President of the Second Avenue Railroad Company, in relation to the rights of said company under chapter 373 of the Laws of 1865, to construct bridges over the Harlem and Bronx rivers.
Resolved, That when this Board adjourns, it do adjourn to meet on Wednesday next, 10th instant, at 9.30 A. M., at which time a final hearing will be given to all parties concerned and interested in the application now before this Board for the construction of a railway bridge across the Harlem river, at Second avenue, and that notice be given in the CITY RECORD requesting all such parties to appear. parties to appear.

All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated tor the same period as inter-est at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now reper annum, to be calculated for the same period as inter-est at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now re-quired by law to be calculated thereon.
