



DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of proceedings for the week ending January 7, 1882.

WEDNESDAY, January 14, 1882—REGULAR MEETING, 9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe.

On motion of Commissioner Lane, Commissioner Olliffe was called to the chair.

Samuel E. Lyon, counsel for the Suburban Rapid Transit Company; Joseph Pool, counsel for the Second Avenue Railroad Company; and H. P. DeGraaf and D. E. Sickles, Rapid Transit Commissioners, appeared and were heard in relation to the application now before the Board for permission to erect a railroad bridge across the Harlem river, at or near Second avenue.

Mr. Pool presented a communication, signed by Wm. S. Thorn, President of the Second Avenue Railroad Company, in relation to the rights of said company under chapter 373 of the Laws of 1865, to construct bridges over the Harlem and Bronx rivers.

Resolved, That when this Board adjourns, it do adjourn to meet on Wednesday next, 10th instant, at 9.30 A. M., at which time a final hearing will be given to all parties concerned and interested in the application now before this Board for the construction of a railway bridge across the Harlem river, at Second avenue, and that notice be given in the CITY RECORD requesting all such parties to appear.

The regular order of business was then resumed.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following communications were received:

From the Comptroller, desiring information in relation to the claim of George F. Fielding for damages for injuries received at the Third Avenue Bridge over Harlem river.

The desired information having been furnished, said communication was ordered filed.

From M. K. Jesup, R. L. Stuart, Robert Colgate, and others, Trustees of American Museum of Natural History, expressing their approval of the progress made with the work of improving Manhattan Square.

Ordered filed.

From F. K. Hain, General Manager, Manhattan Railway Co., desiring permission to place four wooden horses or trestles on the Battery Park, and the privilege of rolling iron plates from the street to the various iron girders of their structures during repairs to the same.

Ordered filed.

From James Everard, contractor, for constructing two roadways in the Central Park, in relation to the commencement of work on said contract.

Ordered filed.

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting a copy of a preamble and resolution, adopted by said Board, and approved by the Mayor, relative to the improvement of Vanderbilt avenue.

Referred to the Acting Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to examine and report upon.

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution transferring the sum of \$1,600 from the appropriation for police uniforms, etc., for 1881, to the appropriation for police salaries, 1881.

Ordered filed.

From L. P. di Cesnola, in relation to opening the Metropolitan Museum of Art to the public on Christmas day, and desiring that four policemen be detailed thereto.

Ordered filed.

From F. X. Diller, director of Grafulla's band, offering to furnish music to the Department for the coming season.

Resolved, That George W. Gaffney, Inspector on the work of regulating, etc., One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, be and he is hereby discharged from the employ of the Department.

Resolved, That the plans and specifications for flagging and setting curb and gutter in Elton avenue, from Third avenue to Washington avenue, as this day submitted by the Acting Engineer of Construction, be approved and ordered printed, and when so printed and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation, that the Secretary be directed to insert advertisement in the CITY RECORD inviting proposals for doing said work.

From the Acting Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

Reporting the suspension of Ed. Kelly, mason.

Reporting the suspension of the force working on the Southern Boulevard.

Reporting the suspension of Geo. J. Hill, John Prentice, Robert Campbell, James Prior, and Owen Trainor, laborers.

Reporting the restoration of James Glynn, double team, on Sedgwick avenue.

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting upon the condition of the parks, the planting and works necessary to be done.

Said report was laid over and ordered printed as a document of the Board.

From Bagley & Thain, attorneys for James W. O'Grady, in relation to the order of the Supreme Court.

Whereas, By three several orders of the Supreme Court, dated December 12, 1881, this Department is directed to transmit to the Comptroller of the city the necessary papers, to enable the Comptroller to take action upon the sufficiency of the sureties presented by James W. O'Grady for the construction of three several sewers; therefore be it

Resolved, That the contracts for constructing sewers and appurtenances in One Hundred and Forty-fifth, One Hundred and Forty-fourth and One Hundred and Forty-third streets, between Third and Brook avenues, and in One Hundred and Forty-third street, between Alexander and Brook avenues, with branches in Willis avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-sixth and One Hundred and Forty-second streets, and in Alexander avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-third and One Hundred and Forty-second streets, amounting to \$14,823.94; constructing sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, between Third and Brook avenues, with branches in Willis avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-sixth and One Hundred and Forty-seventh streets, and in Courtland avenue, between Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-first street, amounting to \$6,424; and for constructing sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from Third avenue to the summit between Alexander and Willis avenues, with branches in Alexander avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets, amounting to \$2,286.25, be awarded to James W. O'Grady, he being the lowest bidder for said several works; that the proposals be sent to the Comptroller for his approval of sureties, and when so approved, that contracts be entered into with said James W. O'Grady for doing said several works, and that Commissioner Smith E. Lane be and he is hereby authorized to sign said contracts for and on behalf of the Department of Public Parks.

Commissioner Lane was authorized to revise, amend, and correct the skating rules.

Resolved, That permission is hereby granted to August Braun to hire skates on the ice at Central Park, he to pay five per cent. upon his gross receipts as a license fee.

Resolved, That the Acting Engineer of Construction be directed to prepare plans, contracts, and specifications for grading, relaying flagging, and doing the necessary work on the intersections of the streets on the line of Third avenue, between the points where the said avenue was regraded, and submit the same to this Board for approval.

Resolved, That no person shall be appointed, hereafter, to the police force of this Department without the presentation by the applicant of a certificate that he has passed, successfully, the final examination of the fourth grade of a grammar school in the City of New York, or a certificate from a principal of a grammar school in this city, that the applicant has successfully passed an equivalent examination before such principal and such public school teachers as he may have associated with himself.

Resolved, That Bryant Godwin be and he is hereby appointed Assistant Engineer, under the Acting Engineer of Construction, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum.

Bills amounting to \$10,090.77, pay-rolls amounting to \$16,374.70, were audited and sent to the Finance Department for payment.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional ordinance of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

§ 206. That no privy vault or cess-pool shall be allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of a greater depth than two feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper end with the Croton-water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The sides and bottom of every privy-vault, cess-pool, or school sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.
