SIR—There were 747 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 6, 1886, which is an increase of 50, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 29 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending February 27, 1886, was 722, which is 12.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.35 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,424,903.

GENTLEMEN-I wish to place the Gansevoort Market matter now before you in a new light and

Gentlemen—I wish to place the Gansevoort Market matter now before you in a new light and in a way that has not been presented.

The act for acquiring the ground and for building a market up-town became a necessity. The increased business in the lower part of the City and the overcrowded streets made it obligatory on the part of our officials to give some relief; in no way can this be done except by the removal of West Washington Market. In order to do this, a place had to be provided; the land acquired at Gansevoort street was the most available and the best calculated for market purposes. West street may be widened from Canal to Barclay street, and from Liberty to the Battery, but no relief would be had so long as West Washington Market remained.

It is incumbent on you as guardians of the City's interest to carry out the requirements of this lact. It is not necessary to make a detailed statement of the obstructed streets and want of more room for the accommodation of business in the lower part of the City, but it is necessary to provide a place for this fast accumulating business.

The building of this market would be financially a success, the rents in five years would repay the outlay, and instead of being a tax, would be a source of revenue. The present site of West Washington Market is required for docks, and would bring as much rental as now.

As soon as the market at Gansevoort street would be constructed, the Department of Docks would have funds to improve the same.

In order to keep pace with the rapid improvement of the City, all business has been obliged to seek larger and more convenient quarters, with the exception of West Washington Market.

Many reasons might be urged, but you are sufficiently acquainted with the best interests of the City to devise some plan to meet the requirements of this needed improvement.

Any elevated steam railway or railways now in actual operation in the city of New York may connect over, through or across the streets, avenues, places or lands thereof, with other steam railways, or the depots thereof, or with steam ferries, except over, through or across such streets, avenues, places or lands as are occupied by buildings belonging to such city, or to this state, or to the United States, and may construct and operate such connections with all rights and with like effect as though the same had been a part of the original route of such railway, upon fulfillment by such elevated stean railway company, so far as it relates to such connections, of such of the requirements and conditions as are necessary to be filled in such cases, under section eighteen of article three of the constitution of this state, and as were imposed upon said elevated steam railway company, by commissioners appointed under the provisions of chapter six hundred and six of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, with respect to the construction and operation of its railways. railways.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
