

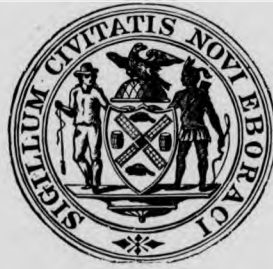

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending March 6, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending February 27, 1886.

SIR—There were 747 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 6, 1886, which is an increase of 50, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 29 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending February 27, 1886, was 722, which is 12.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.35 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,424,903.

Witnesseth, that the said party of the first part has agreed to demise and lease and hereby does demise and lease to the said party of the second part, all and singular, the right, title and interest, which he has, or may have, by virtue of a lease to him granted by the Department of Docks of the City of New York, bearing date of May 1, 1885, in and to that certain part and parcel of the pier at foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, extending from the bulkhead along the southerly portion of said pier, embracing a superficial area twenty-five (25) feet in width and one hundred and fifteen (115) feet in length, including the wharfage arising therefrom, for a term of two years and two months, commencing from the first day of March, 1886, and ending on the thirtieth day of April, 1888.

And that the said party of the second part hereby covenants and agrees to pay to the said party of the first part for said demised premises the yearly rental, or sum, of four hundred (400) dollars, payable quarterly, in equal installments of one hundred (100) dollars each, but the last installment (for two months, \$66.66) shall become due and payable immediately on the expiration of this lease.

This outrage upon private rights by that officer should be corrected by a notice from your Board that if he continues to occupy said pier he must ask for permission to renew his lease from May 1, 1885, in the manner suggested by the preamble and resolution submitted by me to your Board, December 28, 1885, which was printed in the CITY RECORD, January 2, 1886.

In considering the new contracts for cleaning the streets south of Canal street, I am directed to protest against the continued use of this pier for purposes of a dump without paying rent same as heretofore authorized by your Board.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented the following :

NEW YORK, March 8, 1886.

GENTLEMEN—I wish to place the Gansevoort Market matter now before you in a new light and in a way that has not been presented.

The act for acquiring the ground and for building a market up-town became a necessity. The increased business in the lower part of the City and the overcrowded streets made it obligatory on the part of our officials to give some relief; in no way can this be done except by the removal of West Washington Market. In order to do this, a place had to be provided; the land acquired at Gansevoort street was the most available and the best calculated for market purposes. West street may be widened from Canal to Barclay street, and from Liberty to the Battery, but no relief would be had so long as West Washington Market remained.

It is incumbent on you as guardians of the City's interest to carry out the requirements of this act. It is not necessary to make a detailed statement of the obstructed streets and want of more room for the accommodation of business in the lower part of the City, but it is necessary to provide a place for this fast accumulating business.

The building of this market would be financially a success, the rents in five years would repay the outlay, and instead of being a tax, would be a source of revenue. The present site of West Washington Market is required for docks, and would bring as much rental as now.

As soon as the market at Gansevoort street would be constructed, the Department of Docks would have funds to improve the same.

In order to keep pace with the rapid improvement of the City, all business has been obliged to seek larger and more convenient quarters, with the exception of West Washington Market.

Many reasons might be urged, but you are sufficiently acquainted with the best interests of the City to devise some plan to meet the requirements of this needed improvement.

G. O. 223. No. 288. Int. 542.
IN ASSEMBLY, February 17, 1886.

Introduced by Mr. POWER—read twice and referred to the Committee on Railroads—reported from said committee for the consideration of the House and committed to the Committee of the Whole—ordered, when printed, to be recommitted to the Committee on Railroads.

AN ACT to permit elevated railroads in the City of New York to connect with other steam railroads, depots and steam ferries.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section 1. Any elevated steam railway or railways now in actual operation in the city of New York may connect over, through or across the streets, avenues, places or lands thereof, with other steam railways, or the depots thereof, or with steam ferries, except over, through or across such streets, avenues, places or lands as are occupied by buildings belonging to such city, or to this state, or to the United States, and may construct and operate such connections with all rights and with like effect as though the same had been a part of the original route of such connections, of such of the requirements and conditions as are necessary to be filled in such cases, under section eighteen of article three of the constitution of this state, and as were imposed upon said elevated steam railway company, by commissioners appointed under the provisions of chapter six hundred and six of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, with respect to the construction and operation of its railways.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

The Chairman moved that the Counsel to the Corporation be instructed to prepare a protest to the Legislature against the passage of the said bill, and that the same be presented to each member of this Board for his signature.

The work to be performed will consist of a bridge and approaches extending from the Tenth avenue to Aqueduct avenue, or thereabouts, near those avenues, a distance of about 2,375 feet, of which there will be two spans of metallic arches, each span of 535 feet clear width and 90 feet rise, and two abutments of 237 and 240 feet length respectively.

The grade of the bridge will be at least 145 feet above mean high water, and its clear passage width 80 feet. The grades at the ends will correspond with those of the Tenth Avenue and Aqueduct Avenue, and the roadway and the walks of the approaches will be graded and paved as on the bridge proper, viz.: With granite blocks for the roadway and blue stone for the sidewalks.

The plans and specifications will be ready for examination at this office by the 22d day of March next, at which time blank forms of proposals will be furnished.

The offers may be made for a gross sum for the metal work erected complete, including the metal beams above the arches and abutments, and the roadway and the walks of the foundations, masonry, grading, roadway and foot-walks, etc., including all except the above metal work; or, those offering, may propose for constructing the whole work in one gross sum.

Each bid must be signed by all the persons interested therein, and must be accompanied by the written consent (on the printed form furnished), of two or more householders or freeholders of the City of New York, agreeing to become sureties for the faithful performance of the work, and also a certified check on one of the incorporated banks of the City of New York, payable to the order of the Commissioners, to the amount of five per cent. of the security specified. All checks, except that of the successful bidder, will be promptly returned as soon as the awards are made. When the contract and bond have been executed and accepted, the check of the successful bidder will be returned.

The amount of security required from the contractor for the metal work, etc., will be \$200,000, and for the masonry a like amount, and for the entire work \$400,000. Bidders for the masonry alone must, with their bid, present a certified check for \$100,000 to the order of the Commissioners. Those bidding for the iron work alone must present a like check, and those bidding for the whole work must present check for \$200,000.

The abutment piers and the middle pier must be ready to permit the contractors to begin the work at once, to commence and prosecute the erection thereof not later than the first day of July, 1887, and the whole masonry work must be completed by the first day of January, 1888. The arches and other metal work must be completed by the first day of February, 1888, and the whole bridge, including the roadways, foot walks, etc., must be entirely complete by the first day of June, 1888.

THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON Aqueduct reports to me to-day that during the past twenty days the water in the city reservoirs has gone down three feet three inches, equal to 98,000,000 gallons, showing that this amount of water was used and wasted over and above the supply received through the Croton Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit. The Department has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing, the services, and can only make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify them that unless it is stopped the pressures in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.
