Notice is hereby given that the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, in the City of New York, will, at their office, Nos. 49 and 51 Chambers street, in the Emigrants' Savings Bank Building, in said city, on Wednesday, November 26, 1890, at 11 o'clock A. M., hear and consider all statements, objections and evidence that may then and there be offered in reference to the contemplated revision of the street system, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, viz.:

1st. In that part of the "Hunt's Point District," Twenty-third Ward, bounded by Southern Boulevard, Dongan street, Bronx river and Long Island Sound.

2d. In that part of the "Spuytien Duyvil District," Twenty-fourth Ward, between Johnson avenue, the Spuytten Duyvil Parkway, Riverdale avenue and the street along the northern line of the former Wetmore estate.

3d. Change of location and width of Cammann street, from Fordham road to Harlem River Terrace, Twenty-fourth Ward.

4th. Change of lines and location of Osborne place, Twenty-fourth Ward.

5th. Closing of Anthony avenue, between Fordham road and Primrose street, and Valentine avenue, from Fordham road to Kingsbridge road, and laying out a new avenue to take their places.

The general character and extent of the contemplated change consist in changing the location, width, course, windings, lines, class and grades of, and discontinuing and closing, in whole or in part, certain avenues, streets and roads, extending and laying out others to take their places, and fixing the grades of the several streets within the above-described limits.

Maps showing the contemplated changes are now on exhibition in said office.

Hon. H. R. Beekman, representing the estate of Samuel E. Lyon, was heard in opposition to the proposed changes in the "Hunt's Point District." Messrs. C. D. Faile, T. H. Faile and Louis L. Samuels were heard in favor of the map, with certain modifications.

On motion, The matter was laid over for two weeks and the map, showing the desired modifications, was ordered readvertised.

There being no objections to the proposed changes in the "Spuytien Duyvil District," Commissioner Gallup offered the following:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, this Board does hereby alter, amend and revise the maps or plans heretofore adopted by it by authority of law, and lay out a street from Johnson to Riverdale avenue, along the lane dividing the lands of W. A. Butler and S. W. Richards, and discontinue and close Butler avenue, from the proposed new street to Riverdale avenue, as shown on a map or plan entitled "Map or plan showing Revision of Street System in that part of the Spuytten Duyvil District lying between Johnson avenue, Spuytten Duyvil Parkway, Riverdale avenue and the northern line of the former Wetmore estate, in the Twenty-fourth

Ward of the City of New York," dated New York, November 3, 1890, and signed S. F. Chalfin, Topographical Engineer, D. P. P., and does hereby approve and adopt said map or plan, the same being deemed of the proper extent in order to show such alteration, amendment and revision; and that the President of this Board be and he is hereby designated and directed to cause three similar maps or plans to be made, to be certified to by him, and to cause the same to be filed as provided by chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

On motion, the matter of the proposed change in Cammann street, was laid over.

There being no objection to the proposed change in Osborne place, Commissioner Gallup offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Parks in the City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, does hereby alter, amend and revise the map or plan heretofore adopted by said Board by authority of law, and discontinue and close that part of Osborne place, and change the location, course and line, and extend said Osborne place from Loring place to Burnside avenue in the Twenty-fourth Ward of said city, as shown on a map, entitled "Map showing alterations in the line of Osborne place, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York," dated New York, October 20, 1890, and signed S. F. Chalfin, Topographical Engineer, D. P. P., that this Board does hereby approve and adopt said map, the same being deemed of the proper extent in order to show such alteration, amendment and revision; and that the President of this Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause three similar maps to be prepared, to certify to the same, and to cause them to be filed in the manner provided by chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882.

A protest of John B. Haskin against the proposed closing of portions of Anthony and Valentine avenues, was submitted.

W. D. Ellison and A. L. Washburn were heard in favor of the proposed changes.

On motion, the matter was laid over.

A communication was received from George C. Goeller and John Rofkar, executor of the estate of John Bond, favoring the proposing laying out of Gerard street between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Bergen avenue.

Commissioner Gallup offered the following:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 495 of the Laws of 1890, this Board does hereby alter and amend the map or plan of that portion of the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, lying between the northeasterly line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, the southeasterly line of Bergen avenue, the southeasterly line of Westchester avenue, and the westerly line of Brook avenue, and lay out a portion of "Gerard street," between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Bergen avenue, heretofore laid down on the map of "East Melrose," but discontinued and closed by the Commissioners appointed under the authority of chapter 841 of the Laws of 1868, and now used as a street, as shown on a map entitled "Map or plan showing the alteration of the map or plan of that portion of the Twenty-third Ward lying between the northeasterly line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, the southeasterly line of Bergen avenue, the southeasterly line of Westchester avenue and the westerly line of Brook avenue, in accordance with chapter 495 of the Laws of 1890," dated New York, October 20, 1890, and signed S. F. Chalfin, Topographical Engineer, D. P. P., and does hereby approve and adopt said map; and that the President of this Board be and he is hereby designated and directed to cause three similar maps or plans to be prepared, to certify to the same, and to cause them to be filed in the manner prescribed by chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Hon. A. B. Tappan, Charles Crawford and others, a committee of property-owners, appeared and were heard in relation to a fence proposed to be erected by the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, along the line of their depressed tracks, and submitted petitions asking that a fence of a different character be built.

Mr. Frank Loomis was heard in behalf of the railroad company.

From John H. Keller, asking permission to cut and remove ice from the Bronx river in Bronx Park during the coming winter season. Referred to the President, with power.

From Frank Bourne, asking payment of bill for services as electrical expert in connection with the contract of the Edison Electric Light Company for putting a lighting plant in the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Mr. Boller having requested the assistance of the Department in the running of lines and making borings in the bed of the river, in order that his plans and specifications might be prepared, the Department Engineers have been directed to furnish him such surveys as he required, and this part of the work has been finished. The Department not having a boring machine, the Department of Docks has agreed to cause the borings to be made, to pay for which a requisition will be made upon the Comptroller in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel. The letter from the President of the Department of Docks, dated October 23, 1890, upon the subject is laid before the Board.

The Central Gas-light Company of New York City has made application for permission to deposit a lump sum as security for the replacement of pavements disturbed by it while making connections, and upon the statement by the company as to the average number of excavations to be made by it in each month, the sum of \$250 has been fixed to pay for any imperfect work performed by that company, and a general permit issued for the making of such connections.

A communication was received from Colonel Gillespie concerning a bridge across Dyckman street, enclosing correspondence with the Commissioner of Public Works on the subject, and the papers were referred to the Engineer of Construction.

It having appeared from a communication to this Department that the Contractor engaged in the construction of the viaduct at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street was about to encroach upon the roadway of the McComb's Dam Bridge, which would result in its closing, a communication was addressed to the Commissioner of Public Works, requesting him to arrange to have the bridge kept open.

### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
