Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 10, 1891.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 569 of the Laws of 1887, the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to repave, with granite-block pavement, on concrete foundation, the following streets, viz.:

Bowery, from Chatham Square to Sixth street;
Third avenue, from Sixth to Twenty-third street;
North Moore street, from West Broadway to Greenwich street;
Beach street, from West Broadway to Greenwich street;
Hubert street, from Hudson to Greenwich street;
And with granite-block pavement, on the present Telford foundation:
Seventy-second street, from Third to Fourth avenue;
First avenue, from One Hundred and Ninth to One Hundred and Sixteenth street;
Crosswalks of bridge-stone of North river blue stone to be laid, relaid or renewed at the several street intersections where necessary, and the curb-stones along said streets to be reset to the proper grade, and new curb-stones of North river blue stone to be furnished and set where required, and the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized, in his discretion, to provide in the advertisements for proposals for these repavements, and in the contracts and specifications for the same, either that the old paving-blocks be taken up from said streets shall become the property of the contractors to whom the contract shall be awarded, as provided by law, or that the said contractors shall deliver said paving at convenient places of storage to be designated by him; the work to be done by contract, publicly let to the lowest bidder.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891.
Approved by the Acting Mayor, February 13, 1891.

Resolved, That the flagging and the curb now on the sidewalk in front of vacant lots Nos. 10, 12 and 14 West Fifty-sixth street be relaid and reset where necessary, and that new flagging and curb be furnished where the present flagging and curb are defective, as provided by section 321 of

chapter 410, Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 569 of the Laws of 1887, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Sanitary Bureau.

There were 10,318 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 27 permits.

William H. Spencer, Chief Clerk, in charge of vouchers for all estimates of work done, also of all bills for supplies and requisitions for the same, also of all pay-rolls, weekly and monthly, and of miscellaneous clerical work.

Robert A. McKim, Assistant Engineer, in charge of all the engineering records and partly assisting Chief Clerk Spencer.

George B. Bosworth, Clerk.

William B. Swan, Assistant Engineer, Louis P. DeLuze, Assistant Engineer, A. S. Nye, Jr., Computer. These three persons have been almost exclusively employed in the Central Office or in the field in checking in detail for the Chief Engineer all the final estimates prepared by the Division Engineers; they are now on that duty.

F. S. Cook is the head of the Draughting Bureau. He develops the original plans of the Chief Engineer, designs architectural and detail work and assists in preparing the contracts and specifications. The Draughtsmen under him are now mostly engaged in executing the work above mentioned for the Aqueduct, and all the final detailed drawings for the dams.

The duties of those employed on the Aqueduct proper are explained in the schedule.

It shows that twenty-two persons are employed in various capacities for the maintenance and service of the Aqueduct from Croton Dam to Central Park.

The remaining sixteen, besides attending to the engineering work, are employed in completing the final estimates and also for a large part of their time in preparing the records and the evidence necessary for the coming litigation.

The engineering force employed on the storage system, as shown by the schedule, includes:

One Division Engineer at Brewsters and under him eleven persons for Sodom Dam, nine persons for Bog Brook Dams, three persons for both dams.

One Division Engineer at Purdy's Station in charge of Titicus Dam and eight persons under him.

One Division Engineer at the Carmel Dams and six persons under him.

The number of persons employed at each dam varies with the condition of progress of each.

The topographical work is in charge of one Assistant Engineer with an engineering party of seven persons and two Topographical Draughtsmen.

They have been employed in surveying the Croton Valley, the various dam sites and the details of the flowage of the reservoirs, including the investigations for a high dam at the main branch of Croton river.

In connection with this party sixteen men are employed under the direction of Walter J. Sager on the three diamond drill outfits, which have been used for the study of the geological formation of the valley; also seven laborers are employed in excavating trenches and doing other superficial work wherever the rock is expected to be reached without the aid of the drills.

The work at the New York end of the Aqueduct and of making final estimates along the line is drawing to a close and will not require as much engineering force, but the coming construction of the high dam just ordered will require more engineering work, which will cause modifications in the detail of the employees.

The engineering force on the line of the Aqueduct is large, but with my understanding of the directions of counsel, I am unable without it to prepare the evidence for the coming litigation.

I trust that the explanations just given will be found sufficient to justify the retention of the present employees.

I must add that, as the work advances on the dams just begun, additional Superintendents of Dam Construction will be needed.

PUBLIC NOTICE CALLING FOR BIDS OR
proposals for the privileges or licenses to sprinkle the public streets in the City of New York with water drawn from the public fire hydrants, the bids to be received and opened at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works on Thursday, February 26, 1891, at 12 o'clock noon.

A SEPARATE BID must be made for each of the sprinkling routes hereinafter described.
The bidder must state the amount which he proposes and agrees to pay for the license, over and above the amount which will be charged for the water consumed in sprinkling. The amount of each bid must be paid in advance at the time when the license is issued, and the charges for water, as established by the Commissioner of Public Works, must be paid monthly in advance.

The season for sprinkling the streets shall begin not earlier than March 15, 1891, and terminate not later than November 15, 1891, and the Commissioner of Public Works reserves the right to diminish the length of the season and to suspend sprinkling during the season whenever he deems it in the interest of the City so to do. The Commissioner of Public Works also reserves the right to reject any or all of the bids or proposals.

In the sprinkling of the streets the following rules and regulations must be observed:

1st. The tin sprinkler attached to each cart shall conform in every respect to a pattern approved by the Department of Public Works, the holes to be in parallel rows, at least one-half inch apart, and of a size not to exceed No. 14 wire.

2d. The name and residence of each person licensed to sprinkle the streets shall be painted on both sides of the cart in black letters of not less than two inches in length on a white ground.

3d. Permits for sprinkling carts, if driven by boys, will be immediately revoked.

4th. No license will be granted to any person not a resident of the City and County of New York.

5th. Each sprinkling cart shall be provided with a sound and proper piece of hose to conduct the water from the fire-hydrant to the cart, and such hose shall always be kept in order and free from leaks.

6th. Each person obtaining a permit for sprinkling shall keep the hydrants allotted to his use closed, except when obtaining water for use, and shall be responsible for any damage that may result from the use or abuse of them while in their charge; provided such damage shall not have been occasioned by others than those in the employ of said persons.

7th. Any person who shall thus obtain a permit shall pay to the Department of Public Works such sum or price as may be fixed by the Department for the water used during the season for sprinkling; the payments to be made monthly in advance and within the first week of each month.

8th. Each person obtaining a permit will be required to sprinkle the streets with sufficient water only to lay the dust; drenching the streets with an excessive quantity of water will be sufficient cause to revoke any permit or license.

9th. Every person who shall obtain a sprinkling permit will be required to confine himself strictly to his route; encroaching on other routes will not be permitted.

10th. No double-nozzle hydrants shall be used.

11th. Any licensee violating any of the above rules and regulations will, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works, have his license revoked, and will forfeit all moneys paid by him on account of the same.

No bid will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Commissioner of Public Works, or money to the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) as security for compliance with the conditions of the license. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the bid, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no bid can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same, within three days after the license is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after the license has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the license within the time aforesaid, the amount of the deposit will be returned him.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
