#### Sanitary Bureau.

There were 14,331 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 910 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 537 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 66 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 1 permit.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 44 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 25 permits.

The 689 deaths represent a death-rate of 91.50, against 21.07 for the previous week, and 22.70 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The decrease of 55 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 9 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 6 from typhoid fever, of 6 from malarial fevers, of 5 from whooping cough, of 6 from phthisis, of 14 from bronchitis, of 14 from croup, and of 5 from violence, partially offset by an increase of 8 in the deaths from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Twenty-second Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1890), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.
