The 689 deaths represent a death-rate of 91.50, against 21.07 for the previous week, and 22.70

The 659 deaths represent a death rate of 91.50, against 21.67 for the previous week, and 22.76 for the corresponding week of 1891. The decrease of 55 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 9 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 6 from typhoid fever, of 6 from malarial fevers, of 5 from whooping cough, of 6 from phthisis, of 14 from bronchitis, of 14 from croup, and of 5 from violence, partially offset by an increase of 8 in the deaths from Bright's disease. The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the

Twenty-second Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards.



The 738 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.86, against 18.64 for the previous week and 22.98 for the corresponding week of 1891. Contagious and infectious diseases varied little during the week, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 59, 26, 64, 32 and 9, against 58, 31, 52, 44 and 6 for the previous week, a total of 190 against 191. Diphtheria increased slightly in the Fourth, Thirteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second and Twenty-fourth Wards, decreasing elsewhere. Measles showed a slight increase in the Seventh, Tweffth, Fitteenth, Sixteenth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth Wards, decreas-ing elsewhere. Scarlet fever increased in the Sixth, Eighth, Ninth, Eleventh, Tweffth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards, the increase being most marked in the Twelfth and Twenty-second : 16 of the 32 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and 9 of the remaining 16 were above Fortieth street; 5 of the 9 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street, and 3 of the remaining 4 were in the annexed district.
