

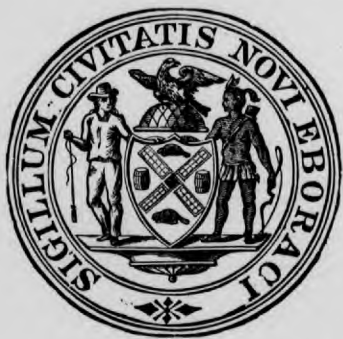

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, March 8, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.
Present—President Cram and Commissioner Meyer.
Absent—Commissioner Murphy.

The minutes of the meeting held March 1, 1901, were approved.

R. L. Scott appeared in relation to the application of H. W. De Forest for permission to extend the dock at the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river. He was informed that before the application would be considered a stipulation, the form of which must be approved by the Corporation Counsel, would first have to be signed by the alleged owners of the property that the rights of the dock would not be affected in the event of the granting of a permit by the Board of Docks for the improvement of the water-front thereat.

The following communications were tabled:

From T. G. Patterson—In relation to the offer of the Board for the purchase of his interest in and to the property between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, Eleventh avenue and the easterly line of the marginal way.

From Augustus Meyers—Declining the offer of the Board for the purchase of his interest in and to the property between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, Eleventh avenue and the easterly line of the marginal way.

The communication from John W. Sullivan, requesting a lease of the easterly half of Pier, old 53, East river, was referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from William Ruth, requesting permission to erect and maintain a boat-house for his own use south of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Central Hudson Steamboat Company, to erect a small shed on the inner end of the northerly side of Pier, new 24, North river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Citizens' Steamboat Company, to use and occupy a berth for the steamer "Holmdel" at the outer end of the southerly side of Pier, old 42, foot of Canal street, North river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company, to use and occupy the inner one-third of the southerly side of Pier, old 43, North river, commencing March 22, 1901, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Benjamin Griggs, to use and occupy a berth for the steamer "William V. Wilson" at Pier, old 58½, North river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Brown & Fleming, to dredge under the dumping-boards at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, North river, and foot of Fortieth street, East river.

J. M. Ceballos & Co., to repair Pier 10, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Company, to replace bearing and fender piles at the bulkhead, between Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to construct an extension to the rack of the transfer bridges at its Oak Point freight yard in the Borough of The Bronx, and to dredge thereat, the work of construction to be done in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

E. J. McKeever, to construct two platforms about 25 feet wide within the bulkhead lines, between Lake street and Meeker avenue, Newtown creek, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

Brighton Pier and Navigation Company, to repair its Pier at Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines, and to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 701, for furnishing coal.

2d. In relation to the bill of George E. Plunkitt for paving the newly made land between Piers, new 46 and 47, North river. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of said communication to George E. Plunkitt.

3d. Stating that a complaint has been received by him from James Daly alleging non-compliance by the contractor with the plans and specifications for the construction of Pier, new 31, East river. Secretary directed to state that Pier, new 31, East river, was constructed in accordance with the plans prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief therefor.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Advising that the title to the property between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-eighth streets, North river, is now vested in the City, the report of the Commissioners appointed for the purpose of condemning said premises having been confirmed by the court.

On motion, the communication from the Comptroller requesting that requisitions be drawn for the amounts of the awards made in said proceedings, was placed on file, and the Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor, the matter of fixing the compensation for such portions of said property as are now occupied by private persons referred to the treasurer for determination, and the Dock Master directed to collect wharfage elsewhere along said bulkhead where not so occupied.

2d. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of the bulkheads between East Twentieth and Twenty-first streets and between East Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, including the Pier foot of East Nineteenth street, and of Pier, old 15, East river. Chief Clerk directed to draw requisitions therefor.

3d. Approving forms of Contracts Nos. 699, 700 and 702.

4th. Requesting that he be informed as to whether the Board approves or disapproves bills pending from time to time before the Legislature affecting the use of the water front.

5th. In relation to proceedings instituted or to be commenced for the condemnation of water front property.

6th. Advising that no action should be taken by this Department in the matter of the charge of wharfage on tugboats drawing water from the hydrant on Pier, old 28, East river.

From the Department of Public Charities—Requesting that the landing platform near the foot of East Fifty-second street be extended northerly for a distance of about 25 feet. Engineer in Chief directed to extend said platform as requested.

From the State Factory Inspector—Reporting the employment of alien labor by Bernard Rolf in the work of constructing Pier, new 31, East river, under Contract No. 686.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify said Rolf to appear before the Board at the meeting to be held Friday, March 15, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., to answer to said charge.

From the Maine Steamship Company—Consenting to the change of time for the commencement of the lease of Pier, new 32, East river.

From Bernard Rolf—Transmitting consent of sureties to the extension of time to March 1, 1901, granted for the completion of the work of constructing a freight shed on Pier 4, East river, under Contract No. 688.

From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey—Requesting that a later date than April 1, 1901, be fixed for the cancellation of the lease and permits for the water front occupied by said company at the foot of Fifteenth street, North river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify said company that the lease of said premises will not be cancelled prior to May 1, 1901.

From Seth B. Robinson, attorney for Jesse Gillender—Protesting against the granting of any permit for the maintenance of a boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, North river. Action of the Secretary, in replying that the said premises are within the lines of City ownership and that the placing of a boat-house thereat would not interfere with the rights of private owners, approved.

From the Estate of William Beard—Requesting permission to erect a shed on the breakwater forming the western boundary of the Erie Basin, in the Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to state that before permit can be granted an agreement must be filed that no additional item of value shall be claimed by reason of the construction of such shed in the event of the City requiring the premises for the improvement of the water-front.

From the Pure Oil Company—Requesting permission for the maintenance of the oil-boat "J. W. Lee" in front of the bulkhead between Piers, old 58 and old 58½, North river.

On motion, said application was denied, any and all permits for the maintenance of any structures by the Pure Oil Company at said bulkhead revoked, and the Secretary directed to state that such structures and oil-boat must be removed from the premises not later than March 15, 1901.

From the Charles C. Larrabee Ice Company—Requesting a lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 21 and 22, North river. Application denied, said bulkhead being already occupied under permit heretofore granted.

From the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company—Requesting a lease of the new-made land adjoining the southern end of the shed on the bulkhead at the foot of Christopher street, North river. Application denied and the Secretary directed to state that the leasing of said land would interfere with the approach to the recreation pier at the foot of Barrow street, North river.

From the Central Crosstown Railroad Company—Requesting permission to extend its tracks at the foot of East Twenty-third street easterly to the ferry-house. Secretary directed to state that the granting of such permit at the present time would interfere with the construction of the sewer thereat.

From William Hastorf—Requesting permission to load cellar dirt on scows at the Pier foot of East Sixtieth or East Sixty-first street. Application denied.

From the W. H. Beard Dredging Company—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of Contract No. 695.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, under Contract No. 695, W. H. Beard Dredging Company, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including June 30, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting permission to erect a steel-covered shed on Pier, new 31, East river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Old Colony Steamboat Company, lessee, to erect a shed on Pier, new 31, East river, in accordance with plans to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, all the work to be done under his direction and supervision, said shed to revert to and become the property of The City of New York upon the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said pier, free from all incumbrances of every kind whatsoever; provided that said company shall file in this Department a written agreement, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, to pay as compensation for the privilege of erecting and maintaining said shed on said pier an additional rental of five thousand dollars per annum for each and every year during the term of the lease of said pier or any renewal thereof, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing June 1, 1901; and shall also agree to keep the said shed well and sufficiently painted to the satisfaction of the Board of Docks.

From the Standard Oil Company of New York—Transmitting agreement executed by said company that no additional value beyond the actual cost of construction will be claimed in the event of the City granting permission for the extension of the platform between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, Harlem river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Standard Oil Company of New York to construct a twelve-foot extension to the platform between East One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, Harlem river, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him, said company having filed an agreement that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual value of the extension in the event of this Department requiring the premises for the improvement of the water front.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that the application of Richard J. Foster for permission to occupy the bulkhead on Washington avenue, between Piers 3 and 4, at Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

From the Secretary—Reporting that the sale of old material on March 4, 1901, netted the sum of \$643.50.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending March 2, 1901.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted the Bouker Construction Company to occupy a berth between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, North river, during the pleasure of the Board. Recommendation adopted, the compensation for the privilege to be hereafter fixed by the Treasurer.

3d. Recommending that the permit granted Frederick Geggus May 18, 1900, to place a boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, North river, be revoked, the permittee having failed to take advantage of the privilege. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting that the oil-boat "John Ryan" is now berthed in front of the bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river, without permit and in violation of Rule 18 of the Rules and Regulations of the Department. Secretary directed to notify the owners of the boat that same must be removed therefrom immediately.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending March 2, 1901.

2d. Reporting the completion of the work of furnishing manila rope under Contract No. 696, March 15, 1901.

3d. Recommending that the abandoned scow "Brisbin" be removed from the mouth of the Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn, by the force of the Department, the cost of the work to be repaid for collection from the owner of said scow if he can be hereafter found. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting that John D. Crimmins has placed all the filling contemplated under the permit granted April 29, 1897, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, Harlem river, and recommending that the permittee be notified that no further filling will be permitted thereat. Recommendation adopted.

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT FROM the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held Tuesday, February 19, 1901:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 15, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:
GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and fifty thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,850,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the

City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII, of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1917,

JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and one-tenth (3 1/10) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposals first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, when the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. WE, THE UNDERSIGNED COMMISSIONERS of Estimate in the above-entitled matter, appointed pursuant to the provisions of chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887, hereby give notice to the owner or owners, lessee or lessees, parties and persons respectively entitled to or interested in the lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises, title to which is sought to be acquired in this proceeding, and to all others whom it may concern to wit:

First—That we have completed our estimate and assessment in the above-entitled matter and have filed a true report or transcript of such estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, in the office of the Department of Public Parks for the inspection of whomever it may concern.

Second—That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, under and in pursuance of the provisions of said chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887, has heretofore determined that seventy-five per cent. (75%) of the expense to be incurred in acquiring the land for such park, should be assessed upon the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York (now The City of New York) and that the balance of such expense should be assessed upon the property, persons and estates to be benefited by the acquisition of such park, and that the area within which said part or balance of the said expense should be assessed should be as follows, namely:

On the north by Fifty-sixth street, on the south by Forty-eighth street, on the east by Ninth avenue, and on the west by Twelfth avenue.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all lots, pieces or parcels of land situate, lying and being in the area last described.

Fourth—That all parties or persons whose rights may be affected by the said estimate and assessment and who may object to the same or any part thereof, may within thirty days after the first publication of this notice file their objections to such estimate in writing with us at our office, Room No. 2 on the fourth floor of the Staats-Zeitung Building, No. 2 Tryon row, in the Borough of Manhattan, as provided by section 4 of chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting at the place last above-mentioned on the 9th day of April, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., and upon such subsequent days as may be found necessary.

Fifth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York at a Special Term thereof, to be held at Part III., in the County Court-house in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, on the 16th day of April, 1901, at the opening of the court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
