DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, GAS AND ELECTRICITY.

Report for the Year Ending December 31, 1901.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, City of New York, July 18, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, City of New York:

Dear Sir—By section 457 of the Greater New York Charter of 1897, and of the Revised Charter of 1901, the head of each department is required to make an annual report of the business and transactions of his department to the Mayor. The late Commissioner of Water Supply having made no report for his department for 1901, the duty of so doing devolves upon me as his successor.

I, therefore, have the honor to present the following report of the transactions of the Department of Water Supply for 1901, confining it to information and statistics presented in reports of Deputy Commissioners of the several boroughs and the heads of bureaus, and compiled from other records:

BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

Croton Water Supply.

The rainfall in the Croton watershed for the year, as recorded by rain-gauges kept by the Department at Boyd's Corner reservoir, Middle Branch reservoir, and the Croton Dam was 62.09 inches. This is about ten inches greater than the average for forty-eight preceding years, but owing to unequal distribution over the several seasons—first quarter, 9.37 inches; second quarter, 16.63 inches; third quarter, 21.73 inches; fourth quarter, 14.06 inches—there were 157 days in the first four and last two months of the year when the natural flow of the river at the Croton Dam had to be supplemented by drafts on the reserve supply in the storage reservoirs, amounting in the aggregate to 16,430,000,000 gallons. At the close of the year all the reservoirs had been refilled.

The sanitary measures of patrolling the streams, reservoirs and ponds, and disinfection and disposal of sewage at Brewster's and at Mount Kisco, were continued throughout the year.

The new and old aqueducts and their appurtenances, embankments and grounds have been kept in good condition. The following are the principal items of work done by the maintenance and repair force:

1,537 cubic yards dry masonry placed in retaining walls.

450 cubic yards stone quarried.

3,864 cubic yards filling placed in embankments.

14,831 linear feet of fences built.

22,958 linear feet of fences repaired.

18,221 linear feet of fences painted.

536 linear feet of sewer built.

The old Croton Aqueduct is still shut off at a point a short distance above the site of the new Jerome Park reservoir, awaiting completion of that reservoir under the direction of the Aqueduct Commissioners. It has furnished, however, the water supply to Sing Sing prison, and since June 10, 1901, from 7,000,000 to 10,000,000 gallons per day through the temporary pumping plant near Gun Hill road, for auxiliary supply in the Borough of The Bronx. Including this, the daily supply from the Croton watershed for the past year has averaged 264,000,000 gallons.

Bronx and Byram River Supply.

The rainfall for the year in the Bronx River watershed, recorded by a rain-gauge at the Kensico reservoir, was 52.52 inches, which is 9.47 inches less than in the Croton watershed. At the close of 1900 the Kensico, Rye Ponds and Byram reservoirs were practically depleted, and two-thirds of the supply in the receiving and distributing reservoir at Williamsbridge had been drawn off. For the first three months of 1901 the supply through the Bronx conduit averaged only 12,500,000 gallons per day, instead of the normal supply of 20,000,000 gallons. Slight relief was afforded through two small pumping plants which had been installed in December, 1900, to pump about 2,000,000 gallons per day from the Croton Aqueduct. In January, 1901, authority and funds were obtained for the installation and operation of a larger temporary plant, to pump from five to ten million gallons daily. The contract was made March 30, and pumping commenced June 10, thus furnishing the first effective relief from the distressing and dangerous deficiency of water supply in the Borough of The Bronx.

In the latter part of summer and in the fall the supply from the Bronx and Byram was increased to 20,000,000 gallons per day, until, on November 27, the drafts on the Byram river, about 7,000,000 gallons per day, had to be discontinued in obedience to an injunction issued by the United States Circuit Court.

Distributing System, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

In extending and improving the water service there were laid during the year:

13,060 linear feet of 48-inch mains.

3,682 linear feet of 36-inch mains.

8,517 linear feet of 20-inch mains.

2,100 linear feet of 16-inch mains.

28,651 linear feet of 12-inch mains.

66,879 linear feet of 6-inch mains.

Total, 122,829 linear feet of mains, or 23.26 miles.

In connection with these new mains eighty additional stopcocks and 215 fire hydrants were placed.

The following is a summary of the work done in the maintenance and repairs of the distributing system by the repair force, consisting of six district repair companies and two repair companies at large:

832 new fire hydrants placed.

9,823 fire hydrants repaired.

69 new stopcocks placed.

1,369 stopcocks repaired.

949 linear feet additional water mains laid.

2,374 linear feet water mains laid in repairs.

7 new drinking hydrants placed.

113 drinking hydrants repaired.

1,130 taps in mains shut off on account of leaks.

2,366 new taps placed for house service pipes.

On December 31, 1901, the distributing system included 826.28 miles of water mains, with 9,420 stopcocks and 12,044 fire hydrants.

The new high service pumping station in course of erection at Jerome avenue and Two Hundred and Fourth street, and the several lines of 48-inch water mains, which are also under way, and will connect the station with the distributing mains in the Borough of The Bronx, will form a most important part of the system. Contracts for the foundations, for the engine, boiler and coal house, for a tank and standpipe, and for engines and boilers were let in the summer and fall of 1901, but the work had to await the completion of a sewer under the direction of the Aqueduct Commissioners, to drain the site of the Jerome Park reservoir, so that nothing was done last year except to commence the laying of the foundations. One of the lines of 48-inch mains has been under contract since December, 1900, and will be completed and connected with the Croton Aqueduct by September next, in advance of the completion of the high service station with which it will ultimately be connected. It will convey an additional supply of about 20,000,000 gallons per day into the distributing mains in several parts of the borough.

Two serious accidents to water mains occurred in the latter part of the year. On October 17 the six-inch main under the East river, which supplies the hospitals for contagious diseases on North Brother Island, was broken by the dragging anchor or apparatus of a wrecking boat. The emergency required prompt action, without the loss of time involved in making a contract by advertisement and public letting. When the repairs were nearly finished a collision of a large Sound steamer with the floating derrick destroyed most of the work theretofore done. The repairs were finally completed and the water supply to the hospitals restored on November 25.

On the night of December 10, the 48-inch main on Madison avenue, laid in 1874, broke at the intersection of Fifty-fifth street, flooding the street and basements east to Park avenue. The water was shut off one hour after the accident, and repairs were promptly made.

The capacity of the three high service pumping stations in Manhattan was at times overtaxed by excessive consumption and waste of water in very warm and very cold weather. On June 24, 1901, a contract was made for two fifteen-million-gallon engines for the Washington Bridge station, but the work has been much delayed by strikes at the machine shops. One of the engines will probably be installed by September and the other by December next.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The rainfall recorded by the rain-gauge at the Hempstead reservoir, which is about the centre of the Long Island watershed, was 44.73 inches. In January and February it was only 2.08 inches, compelling the complete exhaustion of the reserve supply in the Hempstead and Ridgewood, Mt. Prospect and New Lots reservoirs, and the temporary closing of the 48-inch main in East New York and Hamilton avenue. The loss of supply through the main was partially made good by increased pumping from the wells at the Gravesend and New Utrecht pumping stations, and directing a large part of this supply into the mains in southwest Brooklyn, and by obtaining a temporary small supply from the Blythebourne Water Company at \$40 per million gallons. By March 20 the rainfall had sufficiently increased to permit the resumption of service through the 48-inch main.

The following table, giving the average daily supply and consumption of water for each quarter, and the reserve supply in the reservoirs at the close of each quarter, illustrates the effects of variations in rainfall in respect to the supply from the Long Island watershed (Ridgewood system):

Pumping Stations.

On March 7, 1901, a contract was made for two new boilers for the Mt. Prospect station. The work has been unreasonably delayed by the contractors, and was only partially completed at the close of the year. For several months the operation of one of the reservoir pumps had to be suspended, awaiting a favorable opportunity to repair a broken beam. The repairs were made in July, and the deficiency of supply during suspension of the engine was partially made up by increased pumping for the tower service and larger draft on the Ridgewood service.

At the Ridgewood station extensive repairs were made to four Worthington engines, compelling the temporary operation of a Davidson engine and the use of soft coal as fuel.

At the Millburn station the engines had always been under severe strain to pump the average daily supply of 40,000,000 gallons from the easterly watershed, until the connections for one of the double line of 48-inch pipes between the engine house and the efflux chamber of the Millburn reservoir were completed, which occurred on December 18. Since that time the engines have proven capable of pumping 55,000,000 gallons per day without strain.

At the New Lots station a third new boiler has been installed, and all the old defective boilers have been removed.

Minor repairs were made at several other stations.

Driven Wells.

A large number of the wells at Spring Creek, Baisleys, Jameco, Agawam, Matowah, Merrick and Massapequa have been pulled up, cleaned and redriven. From March to October the pumping from the wells east of Millburn was suspended, as the gravity supply from the streams and ponds of the easterly watershed was more than equal to the conduit capacity.

New Conduit.

On December 31 the Commissioner of Water Supply extended the contract time for the completion of this work for three months. On December 15 the double pipe line between the Millburn engine house and the efflux chamber of the Millburn reservoir was completed, and on the three days following the connections at both ends were made. In testing the line, one of the special castings for the southerly pipe cracked under the pressure, and has since been replaced. The operation of this section of the new conduit increases by several million gallons the daily supply which can be drawn from the easterly watershed and delivered into the conduit west of Millburn.

At the close of the year the laying of pipes had progressed to about two-fifths of the distance from Millburn reservoir to Spring creek.

Millburn Reservoir.

On October 17 the grouting of the masonry on the inner slopes, preparatory to the letting of a contract for the complete relining of the reservoir, was begun by a working force employed for the purpose. On December 15 severe cold weather compelled suspension of the work.

Filter Plants.

On March 1 a contract was made, at a cost of \$164,250 for the construction, installation and operation of mechanical filter plants to purify the water supply from Baisleys and Springfield (about 8,000,000 gallons per day), which had to be abandoned several years ago, in consequence of pollution by drainage from surrounding villages and smaller aggregations of houses. At the close of the year the plant at Springfield was near completion and two-thirds of the work on the plant at Baisleys had been finished.

Distributing System.

The bond issue of \$250,000 for additional mains to extend the water service into new streets and districts did not receive the authorization of the Municipal Assembly until April 2, and subsequent authorization of actual work, with preparation, advertisement and letting of a contract, required nearly three months more. Under the contract of June 25 there were laid to December 31, 10,135 linear feet 12-inch mains, 20,658 linear feet 8-inch mains, and 17,553 linear feet 6-inch mains, with 100 stopcocks and 115 fire hydrants.

The following are the principal items of work done by the force employed in the maintenance and repairs of the distributing system:

- 325 leaks in water mains repaired.
- 2,177 fire hydrants repaired.
- 12 new fire hydrants placed.
- 196 stopcocks repaired.
- 5 new stopcocks placed.
- 34 drinking hydrants repaired.
- 1,906 taps placed in mains, for house connections.
- 79 taps shut off on account of leaks.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

By resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of February 19, followed by resolution of the Municipal Assembly, May 14, a bond issue of \$100,000 was authorized for the construction of additional wells and for improvement and enlargement of the pumping plants in the First and Third wards, but inasmuch as the Assembly failed to pass the necessary ordinance for authorization of the work, the department could not avail itself of the money appropriated.

An appropriation of \$75,000 in the final estimate and tax levy for 1901, and \$70,000 by issue of revenue bonds, could be used only in small parts, because the Municipal Assembly failed to act on a number of resolutions providing for the laying of additional mains to extend and improve the water service. One contract was made June 27, 1901, for 2,200 linear feet of 12-inch mains and 18,000 linear feet of 6-inch mains, with 45 stopcocks and 70 fire hydrants. At the close of the year it was about one-half completed.

Minor repairs to the dilapidated buildings at the three pumping stations in the First Ward (Long Island City) were made under the very limited appropriation for maintenance, but much remains to be done to place them in decent condition.

The following are the average daily quantities of water pumped at the six stations, and the water furnished under the contract with the Citizens' Water Supply Company in 1900 and 1901, for distribution through the City's mains:

- 1,550 linear feet water pipes relaid on account of new grades.
- 257 taps placed in mains for house connections.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

The average daily supply of water pumped at the small pumping station at Totten-ville, owned by the City, and distributed through six and one-tenth miles of mains, was 103,000 gallons for the first quarter, 107,000 gallons for the second quarter, 128,000 gallons for the third quarter, and 116,000 gallons for the fourth quarter—average for the year 113,300 gallons; increase over daily supply for 1900, 24,000 gallons.

On September 17, 1901, a contract was made for the construction of four additional ten-inch wells, with pumps and connections to deliver water into the small reservoir at the station. Two of the wells were completed in December.

Toward the close of the year an appropriation of \$10,000 by issue of revenue bonds was obtained for laying additional water mains to extend the water service from the Totten-ville station. The contract for furnishing and laying 8,000 linear feet of 6-inch mains, with ten stopcocks and twenty fire hydrants was advertised, let and awarded in December, and signed January 17, 1902.

The existing contracts made by former village and town authorities with the two private water companies for water supply to fire hydrants and drinking hydrants, viz.: The Staten Island Water Supply Company, 581 hydrants, and the Crystal Water Company, 425 hydrants, expire this year. Surveys of lands, pipes and plants owned by these companies have been commenced to guide the City authorities in deciding questions of renewals of contracts or acquisition of the companies' plants and property.
