#### TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

##### MINUTES.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-second District, met at 2 P. M. at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Third avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.

Present—President Haffen and Alderman Gass.

*Eighth Street, Extension to Avenue B, Unionport.*

Petition of Thomas Dunne in the above matter was read, and, on motion of Alderman Gass, the matter was laid over.

*White Plains Road, from Morris Park Avenue to the City Line.*

Alderman Gass presented the following, which was adopted:

Whereas, The continuation or extension of White Plains road, from Morris Park avenue to the city line has been adopted by the Board of Public Improvements, with dimensions and grades; and Whereas, The continuation of White Plains road to West Farms road, is shown on the general design for a system of streets and avenues and public parks in the part of the Borough of The Bronx east of the Bronx river, as authorized by chapter 10, title 2, section 433 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897; and

Whereas, The design of the street system of the Borough of The Bronx east of the Bronx river does not show any dimensions or grades of said continuation or extension of White Plains road, from Morris Park avenue to West Farms road; and

Whereas, West Farms road is the proper terminus of said White Plains road, in consequence of the fact that the Van Nest station is located at the intersection of said White Plains road and West Farms road, and the fact that West Farms road is a great highway connecting Tremont avenue and Boston road on the west with Westchester avenue, Bear Swamp road, Fort Schuyler road, and Pelham avenue on the east; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-second District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that a final map of said continuation or extension of White Plains road, from Morris Park avenue to West Farms road, be made and filed, so that application for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to condemn the lands needed for said street can be made in connection with the proceeding now pending for the opening of White Plains road, and title thereto can vest in The City of New York as soon as possible.

*East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street (Tremont Avenue), from Bronx River to Sixth Street or Eastern Boulevard at Avenue A.*

Alderman Gass presented the following, which was adopted:

Whereas, A tentative street system or lay-out on a rectangular system has been adopted for the section of The Bronx Borough lying east of the Bronx river; and

Whereas, East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, or Tremont avenue, is one of the principal streets of this rectangular plan; and

Whereas, It is essential that this rectangular plan be practically and definitely shown on the final maps, as suggested in the tentative plan, and its lines be finally fixed and determined; and

Whereas, The cost of acquiring title to said street will be increased by the cost of whatever improvements are erected along said Tremont avenue or East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, in consequence of the fact that the final lines of said street have not been fixed, and title thereto has not vested in the City; and

Whereas, Said section of The Bronx Borough east of the Bronx river is retarded in its growth and progress in consequence of this delay; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-second District, Borough of The Bronx, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements the preparation and filing of a final map showing said avenue or street as proposed to be laid out, and the grades of said street, East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street or Tremont avenue, from Bronx river to Sixth street, or Eastern Boulevard, at Avenue "A", so that application for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in connection therewith can be made without unnecessary delay.
