On the recommendation of the President, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, the request of Michael F. Osberry, No. 41 West One Hundred and Seventeenth street, that his name be removed from the "black list" and that he be restored to eligibility for appointment in the civil service of The City of New York, was granted.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary proceed with the establishing of a promotion bureau to deal solely with promotion examinations; such bureau to be in charge of Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Examiner, under the direction of the Chief Examiner so far as the preparation of examination papers is concerned.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the list for promotion to Clerk (Assistant Labor Clerk), old seventh grade in the office of the Commission, promulgated October 30, 1905, be and the same hereby is changed to a list for promotion to the new fifth grade as of May 13, 1908, it appearing that the scope of the examination was sufficiently broad to cover the latter grade; that there are no other persons in the office performing the same duties, and that the duties of the persons whose names appear on the said list have in no manner changed.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to a letter from John J. McNeill, Clerk in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears of the Finance Department, dated June 5, waiving his right "for the time being to promotion to the fourth grade in favor of Oscar Dryer, Clerk in said Bureau," in order that the salary of the latter might be increased under the provisions of paragraph 12 of Rule XV.

After careful consideration of the matter, on motion, it was

Resolved, That, in making promotions, the eligible lists for promotion from grade to grade established as a result of the annual examinations shall be first considered; that, if there be less than three names on any such list, then any person in a Bureau may be increased without examination under the provisions of paragraph 12 of Rule XV., but no "waivers" of right to compete for promotion shall be accepted, except that a candidate may withdraw entirely from a promotion list, or waive his right to enter the annual promotion examinations by refraining from making application for admission to same.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to a peremptory writ of mandamus issued by Mr. Justice Kelly, of the Supreme Court, Kings County, on the 22d day of June, directing the Commission to certify and approve the payroll of Charles Kinkel for the months of October, November and December, 1907, and January, February, March and April, 1908, for the services rendered by the said Charles Kinkel to the City of New York as Bookkeeper in the Department of Finance at the rate of \$2,800 per annum. The Secretary stated that the payroll described in the writ had not been forwarded by the Comptroller to the office of the Commission. The Secretary was directed to certify the payroll when presented.

The emergency appointment was approved and the Secretary was directed to proceed with a non-competitive examination at an early date.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated June 16, requesting an amendment of the classification by including in the Competitive Class, Part IV., the position of Deputy Chief of Department in charge of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. A public hearing on the proposed amendment was ordered in accordance with the provisions of Rule III.

A report was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, dated June 19, in relation to the complaint of the Gardeners' and Florists' Union against an alleged violation of the Civil Service Law in that Department in the assignment of Laborers to perform the duties of Gardeners, and also to oversee the work of Gardeners. The explanation being satisfactory to the Commission, the report was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the Chief Clerk of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated June 17, requesting, in the absence of an eligible list for the position of Dockmaster, that the provisional appointments of Thomas F. Woods and Thomas F. Barry (which would terminate on June 18 and June 23 respectively) be extended. The Secretary was directed to attach a special certificate to the payrolls of the said persons setting forth the facts in the case.

A letter was presented from the Police Commissioner, dated June 23, stating that an investigation made by him had disclosed the fact that Dennis J. Byron, a probationary Patrolman, was over thirty years of age; that he had been born in Ireland and never had been naturalized. The Secretary was directed to place the name on the "black list."

The Secretary presented for consideration a supplementary payroll of the Police Department for the salary of Joseph Lang and Joseph Mulvey, Patrolmen, amounting



to \$3,401.62 and \$702.54, respectively, for time from July 9, 1907, to June 8, 1908, during which they had been under suspension. The payroll was approved.

A communication was presented from the Police Commissioner, dated June 17, stating that, pursuant to an order of the Supreme Court, Appellate Division, Second Judicial Department, dated April 24, 1908, and an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated June 12, 1908, Henry E. Syperreck, who had been dismissed from the position of Patrolman on the second day of March, 1905, had been reinstated in his position as Patrolman of the first grade. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the City Clerk transmitting resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the heads of the various Departments of the City "to agree upon and fix a uniform period of vacation according to grades, so far as possible, for every employee of The City of New York who shall have been in the service of the said City for more than one year; such vacation to be at least two weeks' duration, with the same compensation as if actually employed." The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the City Clerk transmitting a resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted May 12, 1908, allowing all exempt veteran firemen in the employ of the City three days with pay from August 19 to August 21, 1908, inclusive, provided that in each case satisfactory proof were given to the head of the Department that such employee had attended the thirty-sixth annual convention of the Firemen's Association, to be held at Oswego, N. Y., during the week beginning August 19, 1908. The communication was ordered filed.

On motion of the President, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, it was:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to hold a special examination for the position of Inspector, Board of Water Supply, under the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule VI, it appearing that the duties required in such position are of a peculiar and unusual character, to which no classified title is applicable.

On motion, it was:

Resolved, That under the authority of Rule XII, subdivision 6, of the Municipal Civil Service Rules, this Commission exempts from competitive examination Philip P. Gardiner, of No. 24 Stone street, New York City, an attorney and counselor-at-law, to be employed from time to time by the Corporation Counsel to act as his Deputy in the taxing of the bills of Commissioners of Appraisal and other persons, in the matter of the condemnation of real estate for the improvement of the water supply of the City of New York, and especially in proceedings instituted under the authority of chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905 and acts amendatory thereof, said taxation to be before a Justice of the Supreme Court in the Judicial District in which the lands condemned are situated, and said attorney to be employed only in connection with proceedings for the condemnation of real estate outside The City of New York.

A communication was presented from the Corporation Counsel, dated June 17, requesting that examinations for promotion to Junior Assistant and Deputy Assistant in his Department be held. The request was granted, and the Secretary was directed to proceed with the examinations at an early date.

In view of the difficulty which had been previously experienced in securing an adequate number of applicants for the position of Chemist in the Department of Health, the Secretary was directed to inquire what compensation was to be paid before proceeding with an examination.
