DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Report for Week Ending March 15, 1913.

COUNTRY MILK INSPECTION SUSTAINED BY COURT OF APPEALS.

On February 25, 1913, another decision in favor of the Department of Health of far-reaching importance in upholding the legality of the present methods of dairy inspection, was handed down by the Court of Appeals. A dairyman outside The City of New York had sued the Chief of the Division of Food Inspection for damages sustained through his official action in notifying a creamery company not to include the plaintiff's milk in its shipments to the City, the officer in question having acted on the report to his department by its inspectors that the conditions of the plaintiff's dairy

were insanitary. This complaint was dismissed in the Supreme Court of Delaware County about two years ago. The plaintiff then appealed. The decision of the Court of Appeals, which follows, was written by Justice Gray, all the other justices concurring. It sustains the right of the Department of Health to prevent shipments from the country into the City of milk produced under insanitary conditions at the dairy, and also points out that an action for injuries resulting from proceedings by the Department of Health or its officers in the proper performance of their duties must be brought against the City. The full decision follows:

Decision.

The plaintiff claims damages from the defendant for having, as he alleges, trespassed upon "his property rights." The plaintiff, being engaged in dairy farming and being a member of a creamery company, complains that in the year 1909 the defendant, through his agents and employees, wrongfully and unlawfully entered upon his premises and interfered with his business. More particularly he alleges that on December 6, 1909, "the said defendant, assuming to be a public officer and chief of the division of sanitary inspection of public health, and assuming to have the power and authority to prevent the sale of milk supplies in The City of New York * * * unlawfully and wrongfully * * * stopped the delivery of plaintiff's milk product to the creamery, * * * ordered and directed said creamery company not to receive the milk of said plaintiff; and, further, directed that if said creamery company did receive the same, the right to dispose of said product in The City of New York would be stopped and the permit, or license, to sell the same would be revoked, and that * * * because of such directions and threats, so made by said defendant assuming to act as said chief of division of sanitary inspection, said plaintiff was obliged to and did discontinue the delivery of his dairy product to said creamery." The answer of the defendant, not admitting all that was alleged against him, in substance, justified what action he may have taken in the premises, as having been done "as a health officer of The City and State of New York, in good faith and on behalf of and under the Department of Health, pursuant to its regulations, ordinances and health laws." When the case came to be tried, it appeared by the plaintiff's evidence that in October, 1909, he had received a letter, purporting to come from the Department of Health of The City of New York and signed by the defendant as "Chief of the Division of General Sanitary Inspection," in which he was informed, in substance, that, as the result of an inspection of his dairy farm, certain insanitary conditions were found to exist, which, if not improved within a certain time, would require notice to be given to the vendors of his milk in The City of New York that it was produced in violation of the terms of their permit. This was followed by a letter from the defendant addressed to the creamery company dated December 6 and signed as in the previous letter. It informed the company that "the rules of the department for the production of clean and wholesome milk were still being violated" by the plaintiff and gave notice not to include his milk in future shipments. Recognizing this communication as one from the Department of Health of The City of New York, the plaintiff addressed a reply to the department on December 9, referring to the letter of December 6 and stating that he had been making improvements to his premises: that he was willing to comply with any reasonable demands, if informed as to the changes desired, and that he was interested with all the patrons of the creamery in the effort "to produce a wholesome milk product." On December 11 specifications concerning plaintiff's stable, dairy and herd were sent him by the department. On January 14, 1910, the plaintiff, being notified by the manager of the creamery to that effect, recommenced his delivery of milk and the damage, alleged to have been sustained by him was for the interruption of his sales between December 8, 1909, and January 14, 1910.

The evidence showed that the defendant was never upon the plaintiff's premises and that those who went there as inspectors for the Department of Health were received without objection by the plaintiff and conducted by him over his farm and through his buildings. It showed that all communications from the defendant to the plaintiff were official in their form and character. At the conclusion of the plaintiff's case his complaint was dismissed, and the judgment thereupon entered in favor of the defendant was affirmed at the Appellate Division.

I think that the plaintiff was properly nonsuited, for upon this state of facts what cause of action against the defendant was apparent? If the plaintiff's complaint was in trespass, the evidence failed to show an unauthorized entry upon his premises, either by the defendant or by any agent. If, however, the alleged "trespass upon the property rights of the plaintiff" consisted in causing the interruption in the sale of his milk product, then no cause of action was made out. It will be observed that the complaint charged the defendant with doing the acts complained of, while "assuming to be a public officer and chief of the division of sanitary inspection of the Department of Health." It is clear, if the defendant was not an officer of the Health Department, that no act of his could have prevented the shipment by the creamery of plaintiff's milk to New York City. If, as is probably true, what the plaintiff intended was to charge an illegal exercise by the defendant of official power, or of the powers conferred upon the Board of Health, then I find no cause of action established. The complaint does not allege that the defendant acted in excess of his authority as an officer of the Department of Health, nor that he acted in bad faith, or without due care, or maliciously, and, therefore, in what he did as such officer he was protected by the statute against the consequences. Section 1196 of the Greater New York Charter provides in substance, that no member, officer or agent of the Department of Health shall be sued or held to liability for any act done in good faith and with ordinary discretion on behalf of the department or pursuant to its regulations, ordinances or health laws. "And any person whose property may have been * * * injured, pursuant to any * * * action of said Department of Health or its officers, for which no personal liability may exist," is remitted by the statute to "an action against the City for the recovery of the proper compensation or damage." Acting as an officer of the Department of Health, in good faith, if the defendant's acts caused any loss to the plaintiff the latter's exclusive remedy, upon the ground of an illegal exercise of power, was by an action against the City. The case shows that the defendant did nothing except as an officer of the department, taking action upon the reports made by agents as to the insanitary conditions under which the plaintiff's milk was produced.

The argument that the Department of Health of The City of New York exceeded its lawful powers "in assuming to regulate the method of the production of milk by the plaintiff and in prohibiting the creamery company from including plaintiff's milk in its shipments" is unsound, as is the argument that the statute, if conferring such an authority, was invalid, as delegating to the officers of the municipality jurisdiction over the affairs of another locality. The Department of Health of The City of New York is charged by law with the responsibility of preventing pestilence and disease in The City of New York. Its duty is to enforce all laws applicable to the preservation of human life and the promotion of health and such as relate to the use or sale of unwholesome, deleterious or adulterated food. In the faithful and efficient performance of that duty, the whole State, as well as the City, is concerned, and the department must be deemed to possess whatever power is needed to make effective the express powers conferred. So broad is the responsibility with which the Department of Health is charged, that it is to give all information in its possession relating to the existence and cause of disease to the local health authorities of any city, village or town which may request the same, and to "add thereto such useful suggestions" as experience may supply. Of the food supplies introduced into The City of New York, milk is one of the most important. It is now a matter of common knowledge that, if infected, it carries with it the germs or bacilli of dangerous and epidemic diseases. It is the food of the infant and it is an important element of the food of the adult. It may be infected as it comes from the cow or it may be contaminated by reason of the insanitary conditions of the dairy. Whatever, therefore, the Department of Health may do towards preventing the introduction of milk into The City of New York, which its officers have reason to believe to be unwholesome and deleterious, is in the performance of a statutory duty. It is unreasonable to say that the Department of Health, in exercising such a power, renders itself amenable to the charge of exercising an extraterritorial jurisdiction. In notifying the creamery company not to include the plaintiff's milk in its shipments to the City, it was acting for the protection of the inhabitants of The City of New York, and, therefore, for local interests. There was no interference with the plaintiff's conduct of his farm or business except as he proposed to supply milk to The City of New York; there was simply an embargo laid upon the introduction within The City of New York of any milk not produced by him under conditions specified by the department. It had the right to exact from all shippers of milk a com-

ppliance with such conditions as would reasonably tend to a pure product for the use of the citizens, as a condition of permitting its sale in The City of New York. In exercising the supervision and in taking the preventive measures, which appear in the evidence, the Department of Health was properly and reasonably executing the duty imposed upon it by the statute of conserving the public health; in which, as I have already observed, the State at large is equally interested with the City.

For these reasons I advise that the judgment appealed from be affirmed.

INCREASE IN DEATHS FROM INFLUENZA.

A dispatch from Vienna to the "New York Times," dated March 14, states that the worst epidemic of influenza on record is afflicting the Austrian capital. Half a million cases have been reported during the past three months, and the epidemic is still raging so severely as to tax the capacity of the doctors, public hospitals and nursing institutions. Whole families appear to be attacked simultaneously and persons of all ages are equally affected. The disease appears to be of a peculiarly virulent type with serious after effects, such as inflammation of the lungs, bronchitis, indigestion and general debility. Recent reports also state that the disease is very prevalent in Boston, Rochester, and other cities in the eastern part of the United States.

In New York City, an increase in the number of cases of influenza has unquestionably occurred during the past five weeks accompanied by a decided increase in the number of deaths from those diseases with which influenza is so often complicated, bronchitis, lobar pneumonia and broncho pneumonia. Influenza is especially fatal at the extremes of life, and we find, during the past five weeks, a marked increase in the number of deaths occurring under five years of age and at sixty-five years and over. These features are shown in the following mortality tables, which cannot fail to be of interest to physicians and sanitarians:

Since the great pandemic of 1890 and 1891, influenza has been mildly endemic in New York City, manifesting every now and then exacerbations in severity. A fatal result, except in the very young or very old, is almost always occasioned by complications, usually those involving the respiratory apparatus. It is very evident from the mortality statistics cited above that New York has recently experienced one of the periodic increases of the diseases both in severity and extent. With the approaching advent of warmer weather, accompanied by the free ventilation of dwellings, it is not likely that any further increase in the extent and severity of the disease will take place, and a severe epidemic resembling that of 1890 is certainly not to be apprehended.

MORTALITY OF THE WEEK.

There were 1,848 deaths and a rate of 17.94 per 1,000 reported during the week ending March 15, 1913, as against 1,602 deaths and a rate of 16.15, an increase of 246 deaths and 1.79 points. This increased mortality prevailed at all ages. Among children it was caused by an increase of 13 deaths from measles, 9 from diphtheria and croup and 7 from whooping cough. The most prominent factor in the increased mortality was due to the presence of influenza as shown by the increased mortality from pneumonia (93), organic heart diseases (41), Bright's disease and nephritis (21), digestive diseases (18), and all other causes (64). There were 19 more deaths reported among children under 5, 143 more deaths between the ages of 5 and 65, and 84 more deaths at the ages of 65 and over.

The death rate for the first 11 weeks of 1913 was 15.79, as against 15.68 in the corresponding period of 1912, an increase of .11 of a point.

I herewith submit a report of the operations of the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Richmond, for the week ending March 1, 1913: Plans filed for new buildings (estimated cost \$4,625), 6; plans filed for alterations (estimated cost \$75), 3; plans filed for plumbing (estimated cost, \$2,225), 9; construction inspections made, 343; iron and steel inspections made, 325; plumbing and drainage inspections made, 113; violation of law reported, 1; violation notice issued, 1; unsafe buildings reported, 2; demolition permit granted, 1; moving permit granted, 1; modification of the law allowed as regards concrete footings under foundations, 1.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, February 4, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Drummond and Robbins.

Bids were received for the following supplies for 1913, as per advertisement in the City Record:

Specification No. 5—Hospital supplies, etc.

Specification No. 1B—X-ray plates.

All bids received on lines 704 and 705 (absorbent gauze) were rejected and a re-advertisement authorized for a quantity sufficient to last until June 30, 1913; action was deferred on the bids received on line 707 (potassium iodide), and the lowest bids received on all other line numbers were accepted.

The minutes of the meeting of January 21 were approved.

Bills amounting to \$142,861.18 were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

A request has been received from Dr. M. S. Gregory, Resident Alienist, for the appointment of Dr. Albert C. Shannon as Intern on the alcoholic service for a period of six months, beginning on January 1, 1913. Dr. Gregory also recommends for appointment as Assistant Resident Physician on March 1 Dr. Edmund Connely.

The approval of the Board is requested to readvertise for meats, provisions and coal for the last nine months of the year.

Action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

Dr. Albert C. Shannon was appointed Voluntary Assistant Resident Physician on the alcoholic service for six months, and Dr. Edmund Connely was appointed Assistant Resident Physician on the alcoholic service of Bellevue Hospital.

The matter of the readjustment of the salary schedules, with a view to overcoming the feeling of unrest prevalent among the clerical staff, was referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees for recommendation, and the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Comptroller, calling his attention to the situation in this department.

An advertisement was authorized for the supply of meats, provisions and coal for the last nine months of the year 1913.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported progress on the question of flooring; the selection of flooring for the new hospitals of the department was referred to the President and Mr. Farley, with power.

The Building Committee reported on the communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity referred to them at last meeting, and submitted a letter which had been received from the architects enclosing a report in this department. These were referred

from Albert L. Webster, Consulting Engineer, stating that the subcontractor for plumbing in pavilions L and M is preparing plans of the gas piping for submission to that department. This report was approved.

The Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital reported upon the nomination of Dr. Ransom S. Hooker, and it was

Resolved, To promote Dr. Ransom S. Hooker to the place of Assistant Visiting Surgeon to that division.

The Conference Committee of the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Fenwick Beekman as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients. This report was approved and Dr. Beekman appointed accordingly.

The Conference Committee of the Third Division of Bellevue Hospital reported on the nominations referred to them on January 7, and in accordance with their recommendation Dr. Julius A. Becker was promoted to the place of Assistant Visiting Surgeon, Dr. Robert P. Wadham and Dr. Arthur M. Wright were promoted to Surgeons to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeons, Dr. A. R. Stevens was promoted to the place of Assistant Visiting Genito-Urinary Surgeon, Dr. William E. Bailey was appointed Genito-Urinary Surgeon to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Genito-Urinary Surgeon, and Dr. Horace E. Robinson was appointed Assistant Physician to Out-Patients (children's service).

The Conference Committee of the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Anthony C. Freeman as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients on the tuberculosis service. This report was approved and Dr. Freeman appointed accordingly.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Henry Friedland as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients. This report was approved.

The President and General Medical Superintendent reported on the request of Dr. Wheeler for chairs for the dental department at Bellevue Hospital. This report was approved.

Mr. Paulding, Chairman of the Committee on Supplies, recommended the purchase of a pool table for the men's dormitory at Bellevue Hospital at a cost not to exceed \$200. This recommendation was approved.

Communications.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Department of Parks of Brooklyn showing that there were unencumbered balances in the appropriations of that department for 1912 to the amount of \$5,933.89, which could be transferred to meet the deficit in this department. A communication was also presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond showing unencumbered balances to the amount of \$3,650.68. It was reported that, inasmuch as revenue bonds had been authorized by the Board of Aldermen to the amount of \$42,960.51, the sum required to meet the deficit was \$8,800.10.

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer \$5,300 from the appropriations of the Department of Parks of Brooklyn and \$3,500.10 from the appropriations of the Borough President of Richmond to the appropriations of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the year 1912.

A communication was presented from the director of the welfare department of the American Bank Note Co. requesting permission to endow a bed in Fordham Hospital or some arrangement whereby they can send patients to that hospital. This communication was referred to the President for report.

Six communications dated February 1 were presented from Louis C. Frees, General Inspector of Construction, reporting on the progress of the construction work in this department. These were referred

to the Building Committee for their information.

Communications were presented from Dr. J. H. Huddleston, Dr. George E. Brewer and others relative to the establishment of a service of neurological surgery at Gouverneur Hospital. These were referred to the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for consideration.

A communication was presented from A. L. Geilich enclosing assignment of \$450 by the Century Gas & Electric Fixture Co. to Dora Pine. Consent was granted to this assignment.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting certified copy of a resolution adopted on January 29 authorizing a renewal of the lease of the premises at 113 W. 136th st. for one year from April 1, 1913, at an annual rental of \$1,000, for use as a dormitory for the nurses of Harlem Hospital. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting certified copies of two resolutions adopted on January 16, (1) amending the issue of corporate stock for the erection of pavilions I and K of the new Bellevue Hospital to make the amount authorized \$1,700,000, and (2) authorizing the issue of \$46,000 corporate stock to provide for the purchase of a site near Gouverneur Hospital for a new dispensary, power house and nurses' home. This communication was ordered placed on file, and in view of the greatly overcrowded condition of the present out-patient department at Gouverneur Hospital, the Secretary was directed to request the Comptroller to expedite the proceedings in connection with the acquisition of this site in every way possible.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted on January 23 transferring \$1,785 within the appropriations for salaries for the year 1912. This communication was ordered placed on file.

Two resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on January 6 were presented, authorizing the issue of special revenue bonds to the amounts of \$25,000 and \$17,960.51, respectively, for the purpose of meeting deficiencies in 1912 accounts. These resolutions were ordered placed on file.

An assignment by Louis V. Spinapont & Co. of \$450 to C. W. Anderson was presented. Consent was granted to this assignment.

Communications dated February 3 were presented from the P. Prybil Machine Co. and the Belding & Franklin Machine Co. Consent was granted to the assignment of \$311 by the Belding & Franklin Machine Co. to the P. Prybil Machine Co.

Communications were presented from McKim, Mead & White, together with a letter from A. L. Webster, Consulting Engineer, requesting that permission be granted to make certain changes in the plumbing of pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital. The Building Committee reported that these changes would involve no additional cost and recommended that they be authorized. This request was approved.

A communication from McKim, Mead & White was presented, wherein they recommended, owing to the large percentage of stormy days in the time allotted for the completion of the contract of J. M. Knopp for the construction of additional balconies on pavilions A and B, an extension of time of thirty-one calendar days to enable the contractor to complete his work. A letter from J. M. Knopp was also presented.

Resolved, Upon the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee, to grant J. M. Knopp an extension of time on his contract of thirty-one calendar days from the date set for the completion thereof.

Unfinished Business.

Consideration was given to the bids received on January 15 for photographic printing paper.

Resolved, To reject all bids received and to authorize the purchase of this paper in the open market.

New Business.

Reference was made to the fact that the City authorities had not authorized the issue of any corporate stock for this department during the year 1912. It was resolved to communicate with the Comptroller, urging that favorable action be taken on the corporate stock budget submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by this department under date of January 25, 1912.

It was reported that the Mayor of the City of New York on January 21 had re-appointed Mr. James K. Paulding as Trustee for seven years from February 1, 1913, in accordance with the rules adopted on May 8, 1906, the election of a President and Secretary was declared ir. order. Dr. John W. Brannan was re-elected President and Mr. James K. Paulding re-elected Secretary.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, February 18, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Drummond and Sachs.

The minutes of the meeting of February 4 were approved.

Bills amounting to \$148,993.78 were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Funds for two additional motor ambulances were provided in the Budget for 1913, and revenue bonds have just been granted for an additional ambulance for the psychopathic service. In view of the delay and difficulty in securing these by advertising, it would seem advisable to request the privilege of purchasing them without public letting.

The contract with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Co. expires at the close of this month.

Dr. Carney, who served as Resident Dental Interne, completed his service on December 31, 1912, and it is recommended that a diploma be granted him.

Approval is asked for changing the rooms now occupied by the Payroll Bureau for use as a ward, as may be determined. It will be necessary to expend two or three hundred dollars to change the plumbing, etc., and an additional expense for ward equipment, nursing, etc. Authority for this expenditure is requested.

Dr. Parounagian, Consulting Dermatologist to Gouverneur Hospital, and also in charge of the skin clinic in the out-patient department, desires a definite ruling as to his treating patients, referred in from the dispensary, with salvarsan.

Consideration should be given to the transfer of sufficient corporate stock for the equipment of pavilions I, K, L and M. The exact amount of equipment required is now being ascertained.

There is a provision in chapter 432, Laws of 1912, making it possible to cause deductions to be made from the salaries, compensation or wages of officers or employees of a department, as a fine for delinquency or misconduct, not exceeding thirty days' pay. The occasions when such a fine would be imposed in this department are exceedingly infrequent. However, authority is requested for imposing such a fine should the occasion arise.

A special meeting of the Hospital Conference is to be held to-night at 8:30 at the Hospital for Ruptured and Crippled to consider the amendment to the public health law relative to the practicing of nursing as proposed by the State Nurses' Association. The interest of the hospitals in this matter is a vital one, and it is requested that each hospital be represented at this meeting by two or more delegates, one of whom should be a member of the Board of Trustees.

On separate motion in each instance action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to request the permission of the Board of Aldermen to purchase in the open market, without public letting, two motor ambulances for this department at a cost not exceeding \$7,000, and one motor ambulance for use of the psychopathic department of Bellevue Hospital at a cost not exceeding \$4,000.

To renew the contract with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Co. for an additional period of six months.

The award of a diploma to Dr. Matthew Carney covering his service as Dental Interne in Bellevue Hospital.

The General Medical Superintendent

was authorized to make the changes necessary to convert the Payroll Bureau at Bellevue Hospital into a ward.

The request of Dr. Parounagian for a ruling as to his treatment of patients referred to Gouverneur Hospital from the dispensary was referred to the Conference Committee.

To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer unexpended balances of corporate stock to a fund for the equipment of pavilions I, K, L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital as soon as the exact amount required has been ascertained.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized, where there is just cause, to have deductions made from the salaries of the employees as a fine for delinquency or misconduct, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 432 of the Laws of 1912.

The President and General Medical Superintendent were authorized to represent the Board of Trustees at the meeting of the Hospital Conference.

Reports of Committees.

The Committee on Officers and Employees reported progress in the matter of the readjustment of the salary schedules, and submitted a copy of a letter which had been sent to the Comptroller on February 7, together with his reply under date of February 10. These communications were placed on file, and the question of readjusting the schedules was continued with the Committee.

The President reported on the request of the American Bank Note Co. for the endowment of a bed or an arrangement whereby they could send patients to Fordham Hospital.

Resolved, To accept patients from that company who are in need of hospital treatment when there is room for them on the payment of the usual rate for maintenance.

Communications.

The President submitted a communication from Dr. M. S. Gregory requesting to be permitted to do consultation work at his home in the evenings after the hospital duties of the day are completed. This request was granted on the understanding that Dr. Gregory will continue to be on call in the evenings should his presence in the hospital be deemed necessary.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White recommending that the John H. Parker Co. be allowed to use one boatload of gravel, instead of broken stone, in the construction of pavilions I and K of the new Bellevue Hospital. The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had considered this matter and had authorized the architects to grant this request. The action of the Chairman of the Building Committee was approved.

The minutes of the meeting of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board held on February 1 were presented. The nomination of Dr. A. A. Greenberg and the report of the special committee appointed to consider the communication from the State Charities Aid Association in regard to the children's service at Gouverneur Hospital were referred to the Conference Committee; the Secretary was directed to inform the State Charities Aid Association that it is the opinion of the Trustees that such communications should be presented to them for consideration; the question of making provision for the care of tonsil and adenoid cases at Gouverneur Hospital was referred to the President, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to submit a report on the method of handling these cases in all the hospitals of the department.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on January 28 were presented. The recommendation for the establishment of a clinic for tuberculosis cases one night a week was approved, provided some arrangement can be made to do so with the present staff; the nominations of Drs. Albee, Marton, Sherman, Spiegel and Reid were referred to the Conference Committee; the appointment of Dr. A. S. Unger as Assistant Radiographer was approved; the report of the overcrowded condition and inadequate nursing staff of the male medical ward was referred to the General Medical Superintendent; the resignation of Dr. H. G. Hill from the house staff was accepted; the report that at least two nurses should be on night duty in the surgical wards and that the lighting facilities in the operating room are inadequate was referred to the General Medical Superintendent; reappointments for the year 1913 were approved as follows:

A communication was presented from the Assistant Corporation Counsel at Albany requesting an opinion on Assembly bill No. 713 in relation to a hospital pension fund.

Resolved, To order a referendum vote of the employees of Bellevue Hospital on the proposed bill in order to ascertain whether it would be of practicable value to them.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Corporation Counsel at Albany requesting an opinion on Assembly bill No. 1037, regulating the hours of labor of nurses in city hospitals. The Secretary was directed to inform the Assistant Corporation Counsel that the Trustees wholly approve of this bill in principle, but consider that it would be useless to adopt such a measure at the present time, as it would be quite impracticable to put it into effect, on account of the existing scarcity of nurses and the difficulty of securing even the number now required.

A communication was received from the Appengold Co. requesting permission to substitute Forbes X-ray plates for the Ilford X-ray plates called for in contract awarded to them on February 4. This request was denied.

A communication was presented from Joseph Di Benedetto, contractor for the construction of a roof ward at Fordham Hospital, requesting permission to make a temporary connection with the electrical switchboard at that hospital in order to use an automatic drill. Reports from the architect and the Supervising Engineer in regard thereto were also presented.

Resolved, To refer this communication to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with the request that a meter be installed, in order that the current used may be ascertained and charged for.

A communication was presented from Dr. S. S. Goldwater, together with a letter from Dr. C. Z. Garside, in regard to the plans for the pathological department in the proposed northerly extension of Fordham Hospital. These communications were referred to the Building Committee.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts calling attention to the non-assessment of liquidated damages on the contract of the P. J. Carlin Construction Co. for the erection of the boiler house and coaling station of the new Bellevue Hospital, and requesting further information in connection with this contract. The Secretary was directed to comply with this request and to furnish the Commissioners of Accounts with all the information possible.

A communication was presented from Dr. H. L. Wheeler recommending Dr. J. Evedon and Dr. J. E. Berger for appointment as Assistant Visiting Dentists to Gouverneur Hospital. This recommendation was approved and Dr. Evedon and Dr. Berger appointed accordingly.

A communication was presented from the Corporation Counsel, in reply to a request for an opinion as to the legality of holding the bids received for the extension of Harlem Hospital pending the receipt of additional funds, stating that the bids should be rejected and the work re-advertised. These bids had been rejected on January 7. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting copy of resolution adopted by that Board amending the standard form of contract for the purchase of supplies. This communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for adoption.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on January 16 requesting City departments to co-operate with the Industrial Bureau of the Merchants' Association in supplying information required by that bureau in an investigation into industrial conditions. The General Medical Super-

intendent was directed to comply with this request.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting copies of three resolutions adopted on January 30 transferring funds within the salary appropriations and revising the schedules for the year 1913. This communication was placed on file.

A communication dated February 11 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment enclosing copy of resolution adopted on February 6 amending the rules governing modifications of salary and wage schedules. This communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his information and guidance.

Unfinished Business.

The President referred to the crowded condition of the nurses' residence of Gouverneur Hospital and to the fact that the rooms in the hospital proper occupied by nurses are needed for the care of patients.

Resolved, To request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the lease of the premises at 197 Monroe st., which, together with the buildings at 199 and 201 Monroe st., is to be used as a dormitory for the nurses of Gouverneur Hospital.

The President also referred to the increased demand for training facilities for midwives, due to the enforcement of the recent law passed upon this subject, and stated that at present there is only accommodation for about twenty students and patients and that it would be necessary to acquire an additional house to meet the increased demands upon the School for Midwives.

Resolved, To request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the lease of the premises at 225 E. 26th st., to be used by the School for Midwives, which, in conjunction with the building at 223 E. 26th st., will provide accommodations for about fifty students and patients.

Consideration was given to the bids received on February 4 for potassium iodide. Inasmuch as there were four tie bidders, the contract was divided equally among these bidders, they having consented to accept this amount. This was approved.

New Business.

The President reported that he had been served with a notice of a claim by one Margaret Smith for \$20,000 damages alleged to have been received while recovering treatment at the dispensary of Bellevue Hospital.

Resolved, To refer this notice of claim, together with such information on this case as the General Medical Superintendent can supply, to the Corporation Counsel for his attention, in order to protect the interests of this department and the City of New York.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.



Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following sums of money:

1. The sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

2. The further sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash for use and occupation of the streets of the City since October 4, 1911, to be paid within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

3. During the first term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, exclusive of rentals from its building or buildings, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500).

4. During the second term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than six thousand dollars (\$6,000), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, exclusive of said rentals, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000).

5. During the remaining term of this original contract, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, exclusive of said rentals, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500).

6. Such further sum or sums as may be imposed by the Bridge Commissioner for the use of such bridge or bridges under his jurisdiction as he may permit.

The annual charges shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the moneys due when this contract is signed by the Mayor shall be paid into the Treasury of the City within thirty (30) days immediately following such date, and provided further that the first annual payment thereafter shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever he percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose, unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or, if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force, of service may be required.

or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electrical system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued, such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon completion of any work or construction the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract, and the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work; the depth below the street surface of the new structures and of the substructures encountered must be shown, also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb line intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be installed by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues, in any department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto, shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions or improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract, may construct such subways as are necessary for the accommodation of its cables and wires and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company or similar companies, in any or all of the Boroughs, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall, in the future, be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The use of any bridge under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges shall be at the discretion of the Bridge Commissioner and in accordance with such terms and conditions and upon such reasonable charges as he may prescribe.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the underground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care of and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, by this contract, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish news or other service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on or before the tenth day of each month, a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided:

(a) For ordinary news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15) a month, or one hundred and eighty dollars (\$180) a year.

(b) For general news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of twenty dollars (\$20) a month, or two hundred and forty dollars (\$240) a year.

(c) For financial news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of forty dollars (\$40) a month or four hundred and eighty dollars (\$480) a year.

(d) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and subject to be determined by the Board.

The Company agrees upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City government, to furnish service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau, at one-half the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force, of service may be required.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Board shall have the power, by resolution, to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require or receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twenty—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the rights of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any deficiency on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice to the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which may be deducted from the fund hereinabove provided for.

Twenty—If for a period of twelve consecutive months, the system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of eighteen months out of any consecutive twenty-four months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company in the City, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.

2. The amount paid in as by last report.

3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.

4. The funded debt by last report.

5. The total amount of funded debt.

6. The floating debt as by last report.

7. The total amount of floating debt.

8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. The total amount expended for same.

12. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.

13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.

14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number and location of premises served by the Company in the City.

16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business in the City.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation in the City.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, in the City.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the service.
