The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that it is in receipt of the follow-
ing communication from the Secretary of the Board of Education, under date of
October 18, 1917:

"The Committee on Buildings and Sites has had under consideration the
matter of improving the property adjoining Public School 74, Manhattan, acquired
on August 7, 1917, for playground purposes.

"It is estimated that it will cost approximately \$1,100 to clear the site and
to level off and lay a twelve-inch-thick cinder fill, remove the present brick wall
between the east yard of the school and the site and construct a brick wall along
the street line of the site, with two doorways in it. There are no funds directly
applicable thereto.

"At its meeting held on the 15th inst., the principal called attention to the
fact that the site is urgently needed for playground activities, especially in view
of the new Welsh law requirements.

"Under the circumstances, I was instructed to ask the Committee on Finance
to transfer, if possible, funds for the improvement of the site in question, and to
state that it is the desire of the first-mentioned Committee, if there is no available
balance, that a resolution be presented to the Board of Education asking the
Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of Special Revenue Bonds for the pur-
pose."

Report of the Committee on Departments in Favor of Adopting Resolution Requesting the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to Increase Shower Baths and Tubs in Public Baths Located on Montrose Avenue, Between Union Avenue and Lorimer Street, Brooklyn.

The Committee on Departments, to which was referred on July 3, 1917 (Minutes, page 32), the annexed preamble and resolution requesting the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to increase shower baths and tubs in public baths located on Montrose Avenue, between Union Avenue and Lorimer Street, Borough of Brooklyn, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it believes the proposed improvement to be necessary, as many residents of the section mentioned are prevented from using said baths owing to the inadequate facilities.

It therefore recommends that the said resolution be adopted.

Whereas, The People of the 62d Aldermanic District are bitterly complaining of the lack of shower baths and tubs in the public bath located on Montrose Avenue, between Union Avenue and Lorimer Street, Borough of Brooklyn, and that over 5,000 people daily use said bath and many are prevented from doing so, owing to inadequate facilities to accommodate them; and

Whereas, Said district is the most congested district for its size in the City, having a population of over 300,000; and

Whereas, All the civic, business, fraternal and other organizations in the said district are in favor of the object of this resolution; therefore, be it

Dear Sir—Request is hereby made that the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, recom- mend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an issue of special revenue bonds

to the amount of \$13,000—\$10,000 for labor at \$3.00 per day and \$3,000 for horses and carts at \$3.50 per day—in order to provide funds to continue the forces at present engaged in the work of cleaning sewer basins for the remainder of the year. On September 1, 1917, there was an indicated deficit of \$12,000 in our line for laborers and of \$3,660 in the line for horses and carts, if the present force is continued for the remaining four months of this year.

During the year 1916 our forces removed 24,000 cubic yards of material from sewer basins in the Borough of Manhattan, as compared with 18,000 cubic yards in previous years. During the present year, up to September 1st, we have removed 19,771 cubic yards, and if this rate continues until the end of the year, we will have removed a total of about 36,000 cubic yards.

It is extremely important that the forces be not reduced and that there be no let-up in this particular branch of the work. It requires all our efforts to keep abreast of the work as it develops, and if the force is reduced, it is only a question of days until serious complaints of stopped basins will be made.

The latter part of the year 1916 we were granted an allowance of \$6,000 of special revenue bonds for this identical purpose. In our budget for the year 1917 an amount sufficient to carry on the work in a proper manner was requested, but the budget examiners and the budget sub-committee ruled that our budgetary allowance could not be made on the basis of the revenue bond issue of 1916, but that if the increased amount of work continued, revenue bonds could be obtained for this purpose.

The additional work is due to the increased amount of flushing of streets done by the Department of Street Cleaning. We are required to remove from the basins material which in former years was swept up and carted away by the Street Cleaning Department's carts.

Sir—I am in receipt of a communication from you dated October 5th, 1917, transmitting for my consideration and advice a copy of a proposed ordinance amending subdivision 1, of section 80, of article 8, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to hacks, cabs and taxicabs. The ordinance reads:

"Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

"Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 80 of article 8 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to 'Hacks, Cabs and Taxicabs,' and particularly to 'Definitions,' is hereby amended to read as follows:

"1. Public hack, a vehicle plying for hire, for which public patronage is solicited upon the streets; any vehicle carrying passengers for hire, operating from or in a railroad station or steamship landing.

"Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately."

The provisions of the Greater New York Charter (No. 51), vest the Board of Aldermen with power to provide for the regulation and licensing of public hacks and hackmen. I therefore advise you that it is within the power of the Board of Aldermen to adopt the ordinance referred to. Respectfully yours,

Public Service Commissions Law—

Section 2. Definitions: sub-division 9. The term "common carrier" when used in this chapter includes all railroad corporations, express companies * * * baggage companies and transfer companies * * * but the said term "common carrier" when used in this chapter shall not include an express company, baggage company, or transfer companies unless the same is operated wholly or in part upon or in connection with a railroad or street railroad.

(Amended Law 1913, Chapter 344.)

Sub-division 9a. The term "baggage company" shall apply to those companies engaged under contract or agreement with a railroad company or street railroad company in the checking of baggage or in the collection and delivery of baggage between railroad stations or between railroad stations and hotels, residences, business places or steamer docks; and the term "transfer company" shall apply to companies engaged under contract or agreement with a railroad company or street railroad company in the transfer of passengers or property between railroad stations or between railroad stations and hotels, residences, business places or steamer docks.

(Added by Law 1913, Chapter 344.)

Section 28. Tariff Schedules; publication. Every common carrier shall file with the commission having jurisdiction and shall print and keep open to public inspection schedules showing the rates, fares, and charges for the transportation of passengers and property within the state between each point upon its route and all other points thereon, etc.

Section 29. Changes in Schedule; notice required. Unless the commission otherwise orders no change shall be made in any rate, fare or charge or joint rate, fare or charge which shall have been filed and published by a common carrier in compliance with the requirements of this chapter except after thirty days' notice to the commission and publication for thirty days as required by section 28 of this chapter, etc.

Section 33. Transportation prohibited until publication of schedules. No common carrier subject to the provisions of this chapter shall after the first day of November, 1907, engage or participate in the transportation of passengers or property between points within the state until its schedule of rates, fares and charges shall have been filed and published in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, etc.

Section 49. Rates and service to be fixed by the commission. Whenever either commission shall be of opinion, after a hearing had upon its own motion or upon a complaint, that the rates, fares or charges demanded, exacted, charged or collected by any common carrier, railroad corporation or street railroad corporation subject to its jurisdiction for the transportation of persons or property within the state, or that the regulations or practices of such common carrier, railroad corporation or street railroad corporation affecting such rates are injurious, unreasonable, unjustly discriminatory or unduly preferential, or in anywise in violation of any provision of law, or that the maximum rates, fares or charges chargeable by any such common carrier are insufficient to yield reasonable compensation for the service rendered and are unreasonable and unjust the commission shall * * * determine the just and reasonable rates, fares and charges to be thereafter observed and in force as the maximum to be charged for the service to be performed * * * and shall fix the same by order to be served upon all common carriers by whom such rates, fares and charges are thereafter to be observed.

Gentlemen—Request is hereby made for an authorization of special revenue bond funds in the sum of \$12,000 to meet an anticipated deficiency in the account Code 1989, Donations to Spanish War Veterans.

It was estimated early in the year that we would need \$46,000 in addition to our original appropriation of \$20,000 to enable us to take care of the requests for relief of Spanish War veterans and their families.

On March 26 we requested an authorization of \$20,000. This was granted by you early in April.

Again on June 14 it was necessary for us to request an additional \$26,000. An authorization was made in the sum of \$16,000 in July.

We are basing our request upon our experience for the present year. At the present time there is a balance of \$8,573.50 in this account, and at the present rate of the requests for relief this amount will last only until the first of November.

In view of the above, may I request that this matter be given early consideration.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which you referred this request on October 18, 1917, reports thereon as follows:

The budget of the Department of Charities for the year 1917 included an appropriation of \$20,000 under "Code 1989, Donations to Spanish War Veterans." Additional appropriations of special revenue bonds of \$20,000 and \$16,000 on May 4, 1917, and August 14, 1917, respectively, make the total of appropriations for this code up to the present time \$56,000.

On October 19, 1917, there had been expended \$54,515.50 of this amount, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,484.50. The rate of expenditure averages approximately \$5,800 per month. For the balance of the year it is estimated that \$12,000 will be necessary to provide for the care of Spanish War Veterans.





TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, or the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.
