The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,364, as follows, viz.: 8 public buildings, 890 tenement houses, 158 private dwellings, 389 other dwellings, 40 manufactories and workshops, 28 stores and warehouses, 118 stables, 12 slaughter houses, 5 fat rendering establishments, 2 markets, 3 gut-cleaning establishments, 1 brewery, 3 public sewers and drains, 45 sunken and vacant lots, 55 yards, courts and areas, 221 cellars and basements, 51 waste pipes and drains, 116 privies and water closets, 183 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 4 cisterns and cesspools, 17 other nuisances, 1 piggery, and 8 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors

was 633.

During the past week 54 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for inves-

tary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 68 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 64 houses, 64 privies, sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

64 permits have been granted to consignees of vessels for the discharge of cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

98 permits have been granted to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

During the week ending October 18, 1873, there were issued from this Bureau 543 burial permits for city deaths—55 for bodies in transit, and 47 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 543 deaths, 182 marriages, 432 births, 47 still-births, 55 applications for transit permits, and 48 returns from coroners. There were 18 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of death were referred to coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

Six—In the week that ended on Saturday, the 18th inst., there were 543 deaths reported in this city. There was an increase of mortality by measles, scarlatina, diphtheria, croup, pneumonia, bronchitis and phthisis pulmonalis, amounting to 54 deaths more than were caused by the same diseases the preceding week. Last week ing to 54 deaths more than were caused by the same diseases the preceding week. Last week was remarkably clear and pleasant; the mean temperature was 56.9 deg. Fair., with a range of only 26.5 deg., and a degree of humidity that averaged only 61, total saturation being 100. The mean barometric pressure was at 30.119 inches last week, and at 29.798 the previous

week.

The death rate last week was equivalent to 28.18 yearly in the 1,000 inhabitants. The death rate reported for London in the week ending on the 4th inst. was equal to 22 per 1,000; in Edinburgh, 19; in Bristol, 17; in Portsmouth and Norwich, 17; Liverpool, 22; Dublin, 21; in Glasgow, 23, and in the 21 chief cities of Great Britain the average rate was equal to 23 per 1,000 yearly. The rate in Paris was reported 28 25 per 1,000, 50 deaths being from cholera; in Berlin, the last week in September, 33 per 1,000, 41 deaths being from cholera; in Vienna, 31 per 1,000, the fatal cases of cholera amounting to 112. Rome, in the same week, reported 29.9 per 1,000, yearly rate.

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The subsidence of two most dreaded kinds of pestilence in the Southwestern States, without extending their ravages very fatally to cities larger than Memphis and Shreveport, is mentioned with gratitude by sanitary officers in numerous other cities and large towns. But the last note from Memphis states that "the fatality of the epidemic there is terrible."

It will be noticed that after more than two

It will be noticed that after more than two months cessation of small-pox two fatal cases are now reported. They occurred in adult Germans, who had neglected to be properly protected. The following note from the authorities in charge of the Small-pox Hospital mention the present remarkable exemption from this malady:
