

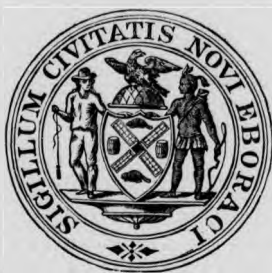

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending October 11, 1884, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending October 4, 1884.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 621 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 11, 1884, which is an increase of 12, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 75 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending October 4, 1884, was 633, which is 40.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.07 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,367,587.
