

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET, | New York, July 23, 1884.

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 22d of July, 1884, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same ishereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 208. In the sale of, or keeping for sale, any beverage or drink, no person shall keep or use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or vessel, or any pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed of, or made with brass, lead, copper or other metal or metalic substances that are or will be affected by liquids so that dangerous, unwholesome or deleterious compounds are formed therein or thereby, or such that beer, soda-water, syrups, or other liquids, or any beverage, drink or flavoring material, drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.

APPROVED PAPERS
