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Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, September 8, 1886, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present-Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway, and Fish; also Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall, of the Department of Public Works.

of the Department of Public Works. The meeting was opened for public hearing, pursuant to the public notice : Mr. Miller, District Attorney of Putnam County, on behalf of the people of the town of South East, was heard in relation to a proposed change in the highway through that town, and his remarks were recorded by the Stenographer of the Commission. No one else desiring to be heard, the public hearing was then ordered closed, and the subject-matter thereof ordered to be considered in executive session, and the regular order of business taken up.

taken up. The minutes of the Stated Meeting of September I were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers 1,990 to 2,005, inclusive, and on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the action of the Com-mittee was approved, and the vouchers ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment. The Secretary submitted a communication from Messrs. O'Brien & Clark, contractors, netify-ing the Commissioners that they had purchased the land for the site of a shaft granted them between State and the work

Shafts 16 and 17 on their work. On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the same was referred to the Committee on Construction. The Secretary then submitted a communication received from the Comptroller, under date of the 4th instant, showing the drawing of warrants for the payment of vouchers in favor of Spencer G. McNary, for \$217.61, Henry Hilton, for \$300, chargeable to the Westchester County Section, and not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same was received and ordered placed upon file, and entered upon the books of the Commission. The Chief Engineer submitted a communication received from Messrs. O'Brien & Clark,

stating that they had arranged for a site of an extra shaft between Shafts 16 and 17 on Section 8, and had obtained the land for that purpose. In connection therewith the Chief Engineer submitted a communication recommending that O'Brien & Clark be allowed to construct the said shaft between Stations 990 and 1025, at a cost not

to exceed \$5,000. Commissioner Ridgway moved that the recommendation be approved. Commissioner Baldwin moved, as an amendment, that the matter be referred to the Committee

on Construction; and the same was unanimously adopted. The Chief Engineer next submitted a communication recommending that Charles E. Taft,

Inspector of Masonry, be granted an indefinite leave of absence without pay; and on motion of Commissioner Barnes, the same was granted. The Chief Engineer next submitted the resignation of Rodman Roland G. Rood, to take effect

on September 15. Commissioner Ridgway moved that the same be referred to the Committee on Construction ;

Commissioner Ridgway moved that the same be referred to the Committee on Construction; and it was unanimously adopted. Commissioner Dowd then presented a letter received from Royal Chapm, referring to back pay which he claims to be due him. On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the matter was referred to the Committee on Construction. Commissioner Dowd next offered the following resolution : Whereas, By a majority vote of the Commissioners, authority was heretofore given for the pay-ment for keep of horses belonging to some of the Division Engineers, and by them used more or less in the performance of their official duties ; and Whereas, Experience has shown that such allowances are open to objections of greater or less weight ; therefore Resolved. That from and after this date no allowance be made or bills paid for the keep of

Resolved, That from and after this date no allowance be made or bills paid for the keep of horses belonging to members of the Engineer Corps. Commissioner Barnes moved that the resolution be referred to the Committee on Construction; and the same was lost.

Commissioner Baldwin moved that the resolution be adopted as read ; and the same was unanimously adopted. Commissioner Dowd then offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the minutes of the Committee on Construction be read at the regular meetings of this Board for their information.

Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, September 8, 1886, at 4 o' clock P. M.

Present-Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway, and Fish. The Chief Engineer submitted the following report :

NEW YORK, September 8, 1886.

To the Hon. the Aqueduct Commissioners : GENTLEMEN-I herewith respectfully report the following progress in the lighting and ventila-

GENTLEMEN-1 herewith respectually report the following progress in the lighting and ventua-tion of the aqueduct tunnels. On Brown, Howard & Co.'s contracts some preparation of foundations for electric dynamos have been made at Shafts 4 and 5, and I learn that electric apparatus has been ordered and is nearly ready. At Shaft 9, South Portal, from four to five electric lights have been in use for some months. One ten-light power dynamo with engine is being erected at Shaft IO to give three electric lights in each tunnel, which is hardly sufficient. The some conditions have avided at Shaft 11 for some months.

lights in each tunnel, which is hardly sufficient. The same conditions have existed at Shaft II B for some months. At Shafts I, 2, 3, 6 and 7, no preparations have yet been made to improve the light and ven-tilation on Brown, Howard & Co.'s work. On O'Brien & Clark's and Heman Clark's contracts good light and ventilation have been

secured in all the tunnels.

On John Brunton & Co.'s contracts no preparations have been made as yet for electric lights and ventilation. Their headings will soon be sufficiently advanced to require it. The light and ventilation on Brown, Howard & Co.'s tunnels is still vitiated by the use of gasoline and numerous miners' lamps.

In connection therewith Commissioner Barnes offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted :

unanimously adopted : Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to advertise in three newspapers, published in the City of New York, for proposals for the necessary apparatus to provide electric lights and ventilation for all the shafts and headings where proper lighting and ven-tilation has not been provided by the contractors, said advertisement to be published ten days ; and the proposals which may be received shall be reported at the next ensuing stated meeting of the Commissioners, provided the Chief Engineer shall first ascertain that the contractors have not com-pleted arrangements for lighting and ventilating the shafts and headings which he has this day reported as not being properly lighted and ventilated, and report his action at the next stated meet-ing of the Commissioners.
