## PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR.

### Report of the Public Administrator for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1902.

Bureau of the Public Administrator of the County of New York,  
No. 119 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, New York City.

The Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor:

Sir—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 230 of the Laws of 1898, I beg to submit the following report of the proceedings of my Bureau for the three months ending June 30, 1902:

Number of estates reported to and investigated by the Bureau..... 128  
Number of estates upon which letters of administration were granted to the Public Administrator upon the application of creditors or next of kin..... 56  
Number of estates upon which letters were granted upon application of the Public Administrator..... 23

Total number of estates upon which letters of administration have been granted..... 79

Three hundred and eighty-one estates are at present under administration. The accounts of proceedings of the Public Administrator have been judicially settled and allowed by the Surrogate in thirty-two estates and the estates distributed pursuant to the decree of the Surrogate.

Fourteen hundred and forty-one estates of little value have been received from the Coroner's Office, the Department of Health, and Bellevue Hospital and the Department of Public Charities.

Three hundred and seventy-two estates, heretofore received from the Coroner's Office, the House of Relief, Public Charities and the Board of Health, have been paid directly into the City Treasury.

In fifteen cases citations were served on the Public Administrator to attend the probate of a last will and testament and his appearance noted.

All reports and returns to the Comptroller, Municipal Assembly and to the Supervisor of the City Record have been rendered.

## BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Board of Examiners, July 1, 1902.

Present—Francis C. Moore, William J. Fryer, Warren A. Conover, William C. Smith, Cornelius O'Reilly, Chief Edward F. Croker and A. F. D'Oench, Chairman.

Meeting called to order at 2 p. m.

Minutes of meeting of the 24th ultimo read, and on motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 177 of 1902, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 14 of 1902, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report at previous meeting. On presentation of report and on motion duly made and seconded, appeal was granted.

Appeal No. 189, Brooklyn Alteration, premises Nos. 9 and 11 Elm place, Francis H. Kimball, Esq., architect and appellant. Laid over June 24.

Mr. Francis H. Kimball appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that all interior iron columns be made fireproof. Mr. D'Oench voting no.

Appeal No. 191 of 1902, Alteration No. 854 of 1902, premises Nos. 24 to 30 Broadway, and Nos. 73 to 79 New street, G. K. Thompson, Esq., architect and appellant.

This application was disapproved by the Superintendent of Buildings with a single objection, viz.:

"Walls of so-called pent house are of unlawful construction: Sections 27 and 32 of the Building Code." I respectfully ask to be allowed to construct the said walls as shown on the drawings with a steel frame filled in with four-inch thick burnt clay blocks laid in cement, plastered on the inside and covered on the outside with galvanized corrugated iron.

The entire pent house will be constructed fireproof, the floor being laid with tile, roof of tile; doors and trim metal covered; sash and frames metal.

Mr. George Thompson appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 190 of 1902, New Building No. 299 of 1902, premises No. 33 West Forty-fourth street, Messrs. Warren & Wetmore, architects and appellants.

1st. That Objection 13 be removed, as bearing required by Bureau of Buildings as per instructions, viz.:

15-inch bearings for all 18-inch beams; 12-inch bearings for all 15-inch beams; 8-inch bearings for all 12-inch beams are unnecessary in this case; and as the templates of beams in question are approved and are 12 inches by 12 inches by 5 inches

we ask to be permitted to make bearings of 18-inch and 15-inch beams 12-inch, and 8-inch for all smaller beams.

2d. That Objection 15 be removed, as 12-inch I, 40 pound foot is heavy enough for loads calculated for dwelling house floors for which this floor is used, and objection is made calculating loads for stable floors; because building is primarily a stable.

This appeal was withdrawn by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Appeal No. 192 of 1902, New Building No. 375 of 1902, premises No. 102 Rivington street, A. E. Badt, Esq., appellant.

It is respectfully requested that the provision of the Building Code be modified so far as to allow the omission of the brick partition walls where the distance between the outer walls is in excess of 20 feet, and in lieu thereof to allow the use of fireproof partitions constructed of 3-inch thick porous terra cotta blocks.

This modification is desired for the reason that brick partition walls, by their additional thickness and weight, as well as causing a loss in available room space, will add considerably to the cost of construction, owing to additional iron on first floor, and the construction above desired is unquestionably equally as good and more desirable.

Mr. M. Cleary appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, laid over.

Appeal No. 193 of 1902, New Building No. 411 of 1902, premises No. 129 Rivington street, A. E. Badt, Esq., appellant.

Appeal No. 192 repeated verbatim.

Appeal withdrawn by the Superintendent of Buildings, as the plans and papers have not yet been examined.

Appeal No. 194 of 1902, New Building No. 324 of 1902, premises Nos. 147 and 149 West Fifty-fifth street, George Hill, Esq., architect and appellant.

As to the permissibility of erecting a pent house enclosing elevators, stairs, thirteen bedrooms for servants' use above the Twelfth story, making this pent house entirely of fireproof construction, with metal covered wooden doors and windows, granolithic floors and bases, metal covered wooden trim; living rooms occupying less than 50 per cent of the area of the building; also to execute the side walls as shown on drawings.

Mr. George Hill appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the grill work of the elevators, on all floors, be backed by wire glass in metal frames.

Appeal No. 195 of 1902, New Building No. 213 of 1902, premises No. 123 East Seventieth street, Trowbridge & Livingston, architects and appellants.

The present wall, up to a point 3 feet above the third floor level, is 12 inches, the thickness required by law for the height of wall. The wall from thence to fourth floor level is 8 inches, or 4 inches less in thickness than that required by law. It is proposed to line the 12-inch section of wall with 4-inch, and the 8-inch portion above, which is the objective point of reinforcement, with 8-inch lining. This lining will be bonded by cutting in headers every six courses in height, and laid in cement mortar, making the wall from the second story to the fourth story 16 inches in thickness, or 4 inches more than required by law.

Mr. Trowbridge appeared in explanation, and amended his appeal as follows: It is proposed to line the walls of the first story 8 inches, and the second story walls and three feet of the third story walls with 4 inches, and the balance with 8 inches. All work to be thoroughly bonded and anchored, and laid in cement mortar with close joints.

The appellant is of the opinion that in the employment of this method the wall will so solidify as to be to all practical purposes the same as if originally built the thickness gained by lining. Sketch showing walls submitted.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 196 of 1902, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 15 of 1902, premises Nos. 50 and 52 Pine street; Caledonian Insurance Company, of Scotland, owner and appellant.

On presentation of report by Mr. F. C. Moore, and on motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 197 of 1902, Alteration (no number) Brooklyn premises west side of Wythe avenue, southwest corner of North Ninth street, Ephraim Johnson, Esq., architect and appellant.

On December 9, 1901, Permit No. 1699 was issued for the addition of two stories to building located as above stated by the then Commissioner of Buildings, and nine weeks after the permit was revoked by new (the present) Superintendent.

During that time materials had been ordered and delivered and, of course, had to be paid for.

Though the new Superintendent revoked the permit on account of the percentage of openings being larger than the law allows, the old Commissioner was acquainted with all the facts and issued a permit accordingly.

The present piers and walls, though not complying with section 32 of the Code, will safely sustain the present load and the additional stories asked for; the building will be used for light manufacturing.

Mr. Johnson appeared before the Board and withdrew the appeal.

Appeal No. 198 of 1902, New Building No. 991 of 1902, premises whole block between Grand and Metropolitan avenues, at Morgan avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, Wilhelms Realty Company, per Harold Bunker, Esq., Secretary, appellant.

A ruling is asked on section 68 of the Building Code, which is entitled, "Hot Air Flues, Pipes and Vent Ducts." (See also section 65). Brief filed.

Mr. Harold Bunker appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, the application for the construction of the hot air flues was approved as shown on plans.

Appeal No. 199 of 1902, New Building No. 936 of 1902, premises south side of Dean street, 100 feet west of Carlton avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, Axel S. Hedman, Esq., architect and appellant.

That permission be granted to modify section 31 as relating to partition walls in buildings exceeding 33 feet 10 inches in width, as follows:

To substitute two eight-inch brick walls seven feet eight inches apart being equally spaced on a distance of 40 feet between party lines, instead of one twelve-inch wall as required by section 31. The two eight-inch walls being connected at both ends form a stronger brace for beams and building than one twelve-inch free standing wall would do.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 200 of 1902, New Building No. 362 of 1902, premises north side of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, about 135 feet from the northeast corner of Madison avenue, Neville & Bagge, architects and appellants.

To allow the use of girders to support floor and roof beams as shown on plans, instead of brick walls, and to allow the span of beams to exceed twenty-six feet as shown on front and rear, it being agreed that partitions dividing apartments on all floors will be filled in between studs with brick or fireproof blocks as denoted by blue color on typical floor plan filed.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

## BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

Monday, 2 p. m., June 2, 1902.

A meeting of the Board of City Record was held this day.

Present—Hons. Seth Low, Mayor; George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, and Edward M. Grout, Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting of May 26, 1902, were approved as submitted.

The following resolution was offered:

WHEREAS, In preparing the revised salary schedules of this office, pursuant to the resolution relating thereto adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 7, 1902, the name of Robert J. Luckey, bookbinder, then and until now employed in the office of the City Record, was by a clerical or mechanical error, inadvertently omitted from said revised schedules submitted to and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 30, 1902; therefore,

Resolved, That the name of said Robert J. Luckey, bookbinder in the office of the City Record, with compensation at the rate of ten hundred and eighty dollars per annum, to date on and from May 1st, 1902, be and hereby is restored to said revised schedules, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 30th, 1902, and that a payroll in favor of said Robert J. Luckey, for his services since May 1st, be prepared by the Supervisor of the City Record, who is hereby authorized and directed to transmit said payroll to the Comptroller for payment subject to the provisions of Sections ten and fifty-six of The Greater New York Charter as amended.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel the resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Supervisor was requested to present at the next meeting a statement showing the proper division of the bookbinders and the appropriations for such bookbinders among the other departments where the binders are employed.

A letter was submitted from the Department of Bridges requesting the Board to designate the *Flushing Times* in which to insert advertisement for proposals for operating draw-bridge over Flushing Creek, from Jackson avenue to Broadway, in the Borough of Queens.

The *Flushing Times* was so designated by the unanimous vote of the Board.

A letter was submitted from Hon. J. H. J. Ronner, Register, concerning the rebinding of books by a new process. The Supervisor was directed to request of Mr. Ronner a fuller statement of his suggestions concerning the same.

The Comptroller submitted the following report concerning advertising in the Corporation newspapers in excess of the \$100,000 provided by the Charter:

## REPORT ON EXTRA ADVERTISING CHARGES BY THE CORPORATION NEWSPAPERS.

To the Board of City Record, New York City.

GENTLEMEN—I have examined the various claims of the Brooklyn Corporation newspapers for the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901 for the amounts exceeding their contracts. These claims aggregate for four years the following sums (including some duplicate charges):

The Corporation Counsel has rendered me an opinion which, while it only covers a part of the amount of these claims, covers the substance of all. I attach hereto the opinion, dated February 28, 1902, together with memoranda in relation to the claims which accompanied said opinion.

Under the contracts of the said newspapers they are entitled to receive not exceeding \$20,000 each per annum for all advertising required of them by the Greater New York Charter. The charter limits such advertising to two classes; first, such as respects matters occurring within the Borough of Brooklyn, and second, such as respects matters relating to the Borough of Brooklyn, exclusively. In addition to the contract prices, these papers have during the past four years been paid extra for certain classes of advertising which may be described as follows:

Primary Election Notice.  
Assignment of Justices.  
Opening of Evening Schools.  
List of Polling and Registration Places.  
List of Nominations.  
Exemption from Jury Duty.  
Proposals Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School.

Hearings by Mayor.  
Water Rates Notices.  
Sales for Unpaid Assessments.  
General Election Notices and Canvass.  
Notice of Admissions to High School.  
Notice Teachers Wanted.  
Cornell University Scholarship Examination.  
Sale of Corporate Stock.  
Proposals, Department of Bridges.  
Notice Department of Taxes and Assessments.  
Opening of Assessment Books.  
Notice to Taxpayers. (Collection of Taxes.)  
Canvass, Vote of City of New York.

I do not undertake to say whether or not all of such extra advertising was properly extra or not, not having examined the same with that special purpose in view.

Of the claims now made for extra work I believe that the papers are entitled to compensation for the publication of Session Laws, which is done under the authority of independent legislation and not of the Charter, the compensation for the Armory Board advertisements which were published under the authority of the Military Code and not of the Charter, and I believe that the notices published for the Borough President ought to be allowed. These latter notices do not seem to have been required by the Charter, nor to have been authorized by the last Board of City Record. It is my impression that I, then President of the Borough of Brooklyn, published the same under the authority of the Law Department of the City, and I was surprised to learn of the question concerning the same. This Board has authorized such publications for the present Borough President and it will be only right that the notices published in good faith during the past four years should now be paid for. The other claims made by the newspapers, I think clearly are not payable. The following is a statement of the amounts which I recommend should be approved and forwarded to the Department of Finance for payment:

In this connection I desire to recommend that contracts should now be made with these newspapers. The counsel for the newspapers prefers that no contract should be made and that the matter should be left to adjustment under the terms of the Charter. I do not think this is proper inasmuch as the Charter provision simply fixes the maximum aggregate amount and not the minimum, and leaves the rate to be passed upon. The counsel for the newspapers thereupon proposed to me a form of contract which differs from the last contracts made, by providing for maximum aggregate payments in each year of \$25,000 instead of \$20,000. I do not see that this Board would be justified in making such a contract.

I submit the accompanying forms of contract and resolution, which are the same as those last made except that the last paragraph of the sub-division marked second is new.

On motion of the Comptroller the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the claims of the Brooklyn Corporation papers, as stated in the report for the publication of session laws, Borough President's notices and Armory Board notices, be approved and vouchers therefor made out and forwarded to the Department of Finance.

The Comptroller offered five resolutions authorizing the Board of City Record to enter into contracts with the five Corporation newspapers for advertising for the year 1902, and submitted therewith a form of contract. They were unanimously adopted. One of them read as follows:

WHEREAS, It is provided by law that notices and advertisements shall be printed in certain newspapers known as "Corporation newspapers" and the Brooklyn Eagle is one of such papers.

Resolved, That a contract be entered into by the Board of City Record with the Brooklyn Eagle Publishing Co. for the publication in the newspaper called Brooklyn Eagle of all notices and advertisements required by the Greater New York Charter to be published by it as a "Corporation newspaper." Such contract to commence January 1st, 1902, and to terminate December 31st, 1902; such notices and advertisements to be inserted in all regular editions of said newspaper, and to measure not more than fourteen lines to the inch; the payments for such publications to be made monthly at the end of each month; the price to be paid therefor to be five dollars per thousand ems, for each day's publication, in monthly payments not exceeding an average of \$1,666.66 per month, nor shall the aggregate payments in any year exceed \$20,000, nor shall the aggregate of the payments which have been made or are to be made at any one time exceed the product of \$1,666.66 multiplied by the number of months in the year which have passed at the time of such payment.

Further Resolved, That the Comptroller be empowered and directed to execute the contract hereto annexed for and on behalf of the Board of City Record.

The other four resolutions adopted as above were in the same form but related to the newspapers called the Brooklyn Standard-Union, the Brooklyn Citizen, the Brooklyn Times and the Freie Presse.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel it was unanimously resolved to approve the following form of contract, submitted by the Comptroller:

## CONTRACT FOR THE PUBLICATION IN THE BROOKLYN ..... OF NOTICES AND ADVERTISEMENTS.

This agreement made and entered into this ..... day of ..... 1902, by and between ..... party of the first part, and The City of New York, by the Board of City Record, party of the second part, Witnesseth, as follows:—

FIRST: That for and in consideration of the payments hereinafter mentioned to be made by said party of the second part, the party of the first part hereto doth hereby promise and agree to publish in the newspaper called ..... all notices and advertisements required by the Greater New York Charter, to be published by it as a "Corporation newspaper." Said notices and advertisements to be inserted in all regular editions of said newspaper and to measure not more than fourteen lines to the inch.

SECOND: That the party of the second part hereby agrees and promises to pay to the party of the first part, for and in consideration of the publication of all such notices and advertisements, the sum of five dollars per thousand ems for each day's publications, provided that the monthly payments shall not exceed an average of \$1,666.66 per month, nor shall the aggregate payments in any year exceed twenty thousand dollars. If the aggregate amount in any one month under the price specified be greater than \$1,666.66, it shall be paid to the extent that there was earned some previous month or months a less sum than \$1,666.66, but the aggregate of all the payments which have been or which are to be made, shall never, at any time, exceed the product of \$1,666.66, multiplied by the number of months in the year which have passed at the time such payment is made, and it is further covenanted and agreed that the payment of the sum of twenty thousand dollars shall be in full payment for all such publications in said newspaper made under this contract.

NOTICES and advertisements not required by the Greater New York Charter, but arising from the action, authority or designation of the Board of City Record shall in addition be paid for at the rate of sixteen cents per agate line.

THIRD: The party of the second part hereby agrees to make the payments herein provided for at the end of each month during the year 1902 upon bills duly rendered, showing the said publication and the amounts due therefor, after said bills have been duly audited.

FOURTH: The party of the second part is to furnish copy to the party of the first part.

FIFTH: This contract or agreement shall terminate on the 31st day of December, 1902, and shall commence on the 1st day of January, 1903.

#### BOARD OF CITY RECORD

Monday, 2 p. m., June 9, 1902.

The regular meeting of the Board of City Record was held this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the old Council Chamber, City Hall, New York City.

Present—Hon. Seth Low, Mayor; Hon. George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel; Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting of June 2 were approved after a correction suggested by the Corporation Counsel in relation to the contract with the Brooklyn Corporation papers. On motion of the Mayor, it was unanimously carried that the prices fixed were acceptable to the Board and were to govern the printing of the work referred to during the year.

The communication was referred back to the Superintendent of School Buildings with a request that the recommendation be put in more explicit shape, together with a statement of facts and reasons in behalf thereof.

A bill for \$35.50 from the Collins' Staten Island and New York Express Company, in full for expressage from January 4 to May 28, inclusive, was submitted, and payment thereof ordered after approval by the Supervisor.

The Supervisor may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as he may deem necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for "City Record" supplies and contingencies during the year 1902, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Supervisor of the City Record, covering the expenditure of money paid thereon.

O'Grady, Bookbinder, whose services were dispensed with after his three months' term of probation had expired, but who had taken legal action compelling the Board of City Record to restore him to the payroll, the Corporation Counsel reported that an appeal had been taken by his office from an unfavorable decision.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.
