SANITARY BUREAU.

The following Communications were Received from the Sanitary Superintendent:

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, February 9, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The matter of the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Pier 36, East river, and the removal of the extension to said pier, was again tabled for two weeks.

The communication from the Pacific Mail Steamship Company agreeing to surrender its lease of Pier, new 34, North river, with the adjoining bulkheads, provided that a new lease of the premises be granted the Cromwell Steamship Company, was taken from the table. Commissioner Meyer moved that the application be granted, but the motion not being seconded, the communication was placed on file.

The communication from the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company stating that it will consent to the extension of Pier, old 41, North river, out to the existing pierhead-line by this Department, in accordance with the offer of the Board of October 27, 1899, provided the existing lease of the premises be canceled and that new leases be granted for a term of ten years, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each, was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer.

Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, to repair the roof of the shed on Pier, new 41, North river.

William Ziegler, to construct a small dock on his property at Raritan Bay Park, Tottenville, S. I., the structures to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and to be erected in accordance with plans submitted.

Transmitting approved amended form of agreement for the purchase of the wharfage rights of William Muhlenberg, appurtenant to the 72 feet of bulkhead between Jefferson and Clinton streets, East river. Commissioners authorized to execute same and the Secretary directed to transmit the agreement to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval as soon as the same shall have been executed.

2d. Transmitting bills of cost in proceedings for the acquisition of wharf property between Watts and Canal streets, North river; at the southerly half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets, North river; between West Forty-second and West Forty-third streets, North river, in front of Riverside Park, and at Pier, old 39, East river and adjoining bulkhead. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor.

3d. Requesting information in relation to the claims made by certain employees of this Department for additional compensation under chapter 622 of the Laws of 1894. Secretary directed to furnish the desired information.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting an additional extension of ten days' time in which to consider the offer of this Department for the purchase of its property between Clinton and Montgomery streets, East river. Action of the President in granting same approved.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office—Transmitting notice of application of Louis Quien and Charles H. Moore for a grant of lands under water of Newark bay, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

George Morton, to berth the steamers "Fanny Woodall" and "Peekskill" on the northerly side, outer end, of Pier, old 42, North river, commencing March 1, 1900, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

George Shields, to erect and maintain two jetties at the foot of Bay Twenty-second street, Bath Beach, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief :

Fay estate, to repair crib-bulkhead and pile platform between Fourth and Fifth streets, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines, and to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Lowell M. Palmer, to rebuild the fender rack on the south side of the transfer bridge between North Fifth and North Sixth streets, the work to be kept within existing lines, and to be done in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief; and to make necessary repairs to the Piers between North Fifth and North Tenth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting approved form of lease of the bulkhead platform between Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, East river, in accordance with resolution adopted July 19, 1899. Commissioners authorized to execute same.

2d. Transmitting approved form of agreement to be executed by the Chrome Steel Works in relation to the erection of a shed on their property southerly of Keap street, Wallabout canal, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to have same executed.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office—Transmitting copies of applications made by the Midland Railroad Terminal Company and Charles A. Miller, for grants of land under water.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted :

From Lester W. Clark—Transmitting notice of application to be made by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company for a grant of land under water easterly of Jay street, in the First Ward of the Borough of Richmond.

From William T. Croak, attorney—Transmitting notice of application to be made by Sarah F. Croak for a grant of land under water northerly of the Shore road, at Newark Bay, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond.

From Theobald Engelhardt and Joseph Wagner—Transmitting notice of application to be made by them for a grant of land under water westerly of Bayside place, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

From the Great Kills Oyster Company—Transmitting notice of application to be made by said company for a grant of land under water at the Great Kills, in the Borough of Richmond.

From the Kings County Electric Light and Power Company—Protesting against the granting of any further dumping privileges to the Department of Street Cleaning at the foot of Gold street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the protest to the Department of Street Cleaning, and to state that in the opinion of this Board another site should be secured by said department in the vicinity for the location of its dumping-board.

From James Shewan & Sons—Requesting that dredging be ordered in the slip between Piers 61 and 62, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

From Henry S. Bergman and William C. Turner, sureties—In relation to the cancellation of Contract No. 643, for furnishing granite stone. Secretary directed to state that no further action can be taken in the matter.

From L. S. Lake—Protesting against charging to the oyster dealers the cost of driving piles for the protection of the oyster boats in the basin in front of West Washington market.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting a lease of the piers and bulkheads to be built on the East river at premises now occupied by said company, with the privilege of erecting sheds thereon.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That the Board of Docks agrees to lease to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company the right to collect wharfage, crackage, etc., of the proposed two new most northerly piers to be hereafter built on lines of the plan approved by the Commissioners of the

Sinking Fund. Also right to collect wharfage from the bulkheads extending from the southerly side of Montgomery street to a point about ninety feet southerly of the southerly side of Clinton street. Also the right to erect in front of this extent of bulkhead, except where occupied by the piers, a platform, extending to a line fifty feet from and parallel to the bulkhead line, the privilege to be granted by the Board of Docks to the above-named railroad company to erect on the above piers and the bulkhead platform to be built hereafter, suitable sheds, plans for which are to be approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks.

It is understood and agreed that this leasing of the piers above mentioned is to be in the event of a sale to be made by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, and the Board of Docks, representing The City of New York, for the purchase of the property now owned by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, in the vicinity above described, the purchase price of the property and the rental of the piers to be hereafter fixed by Commissioners Meyer and Murphy of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

From the American Linseed Company—Requesting permission to extend the shed on the crib-bulkhead on the north side of Richmond terrace, near the foot of John street, Port Richmond, Staten Island.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the American Linseed Company to extend a one-story shed over the crib-bulkhead of said company in the vicinity of John street, Port Richmond, Staten Island, in accordance with plans submitted, as amended, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; it being understood and agreed that no work shall be done under this permit unless the said American Linseed Company shall file in this Department an agreement, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, that in the event that the Board of Docks shall decide that the said crib-bulkhead and shed, or the lands covered thereby, are needed for the improvement of the water front, that then and in such case no item of value beyond the actual value of said crib-bulkhead and said shed erected thereon under this permit shall be claimed by or allowed to the American Linseed Company by reason of the erection of said shed, in any proceeding for the acquisition of said property by the Board of Docks either by purchase or condemnation, and that the said agreement shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of the American Linseed Company.

From the President—

1st. Recommending that Dockmaster's District No. 13 be subdivided into two districts, one district to include all the property on the south side of the Harlem river with the office as at present, and the other district to include all the territory north and east of the Harlem river, with the office on or near the Mott Haven canal. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted the Consolidated Gas Company to lay gas-mains through the bulkhead at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, Harlem river, at the north side of Madison Avenue Bridge, in accordance with plans submitted, on condition that said company will not interfere with the improvements to be made by this Department between Twentieth and Twenty-second streets, East river.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, permission was granted said company to lay said gas-mains, the same to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that a five-years' lease be granted H. L. Herbert & Co. of the southerly half of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street, together with 100 feet of bulkhead running southerly thereof, to commence March 1, 1900, the lessees to have the privilege of running a track along said pier and across the marginal street thereat; the compensation under the lease to be hereafter fixed by the Treasurer.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-let to H. L. Herbert & Co., all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupancy of the following-described wharf property, to wit :

1st. The southerly half of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street, for a term of five years from March 1, 1900, with the privilege of maintaining a track along said pier, and of running said track across the marginal street, wharf or place, the said tracks to be laid in accordance with the plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and all the work in connection therewith to be done under his direction and supervision.

2d. The northerly half of the new bulkhead-wall to be built between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, beginning at the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street, and running southerly a distance of about 120 feet, commencing from the time said bulkhead-wall is completed and ready for occupancy, for a period coterminous with the lease hereby granted of the southerly half of said pier, namely, March 1, 1905.

It is understood that the above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said H. L. Herbert & Co. shall, within ten days from receipt thereof, file in this Department their written acceptance of the terms and conditions thereof, and agree to pay as rental a rate to be hereafter determined by the Treasurer of this Department, and shall also agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the Chief Clerk—Requesting authority to apply on the rental of the easterly half of Pier 4, East river, the amount overpaid by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for Pier 6, and bulkhead between Piers, old 5 and 6, East river. Authority granted.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending February 10, 1900.

2d. Recommending that the permit granted Matthew Foster & Co. to maintain their oyster boat in the basin in front of West Washington Market be revoked, the permittees having removed said boat on February 5, 1900. Permit revoked, to take effect on the date named.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the work of paving the new-made land in the vicinity of Watts street, North river, and that all the work pertaining thereto be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, and that it be done by the force of this Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all materials, tools and implements necessary for the above-mentioned work not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

5th. Recommending that the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique be directed to make necessary repairs to the water-pipe at Pier, new 42, North river, where broken, and that in the event of said repairs not being commenced within ten days, that the work be done by the force of this Department, at the cost and expense of said company. The Chief of the Bureau prepared the following statement relating to the First Annual Report of the Statistical Commission, which has been completed and is now being bound:

The volume of Municipal Statistics for the year 1898 contains the results attending the work of the various departments of the City Government, and other official statistical facts relating to the City for the year 1898, as far as he has been able to obtain.

This is a full compliance with section 137, Laws of 1897, which relates to the publication of Municipal Statistics.

Notwithstanding the delay of some of the departments and offices of the City in furnishing their annual reports to this Bureau, the report compares favorably in promptness and material with the bureaus of Municipal Statistics of foreign cities. I am indebted to the chiefs of these bureaus, however, for their reports, as they have been valuable guides in the compilation of the statistics of this City, and their forms have been followed as closely as the form of government and the material furnished this Bureau would permit.

The publications of the statistical bureaus of foreign cities are necessarily slow, as great care and accuracy are necessary in their work.

The eighteenth and last annual report of the City of Paris was for the year 1897, and this report was not received by this Bureau until February 28, 1900; the twenty-fourth annual and last report of the City of Berlin for the year 1897 was received by this Bureau March 12, 1900; the annual reports of London or Vienna for the year 1897 have not yet been received. The annual report of the City of Munich for the year 1898 was received on March 7, 1900; the sixteenth and seventeenth annual reports of St. Petersburg, Russia, for 1896 and 1897, were not received until March 19, 1900.

I desire to express my thanks to the heads of the departments and other officials of the City, who have furnished me with the material contained in the report for 1898, and to their kind co-operation I am indebted for its early completion.
