### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING DECEMBER 13, 1913.

#### TYPHOID FEVER DURING 1913.

The typhoid fever figures for the first eleven months of the year 1913, after the elimination of the duplicates and reported cases proving not to be typhoid fever, amount to a total of 2,487 cases. This compares favorably with the figures of previous years. During 1912 there were 2,881 cases, and the average for the past five years was 3,096. The showing of 1913 is the more remarkable on account of the sharp outbreak which occurred in the lower eastern section of Manhattan. There were fewer cases reported in the city as a whole than during any corresponding period since the organization of the greater city.

All of the boroughs except Manhattan have participated in this showing. Manhattan exceeded the five-year average by 65 cases. Up to the week ending September 6 the number of cases reported for this borough was considerably less than during the previous year and much below the average of the past five years. From this time up to the week ending October 11 the number of cases reported was in excess of all figures for corresponding periods, but declined thereafter from week to week until on November 22 it reached the average of the previous years. There were fewer cases reported in the week ending December 6 than during the same period of 1912, and a smaller number than the average for the last five years. But for the decisive action taken early in September in excluding a suspected milk supply, the sharp outbreak might have reached epidemic proportions. Unless something unforeseen occurs, we shall close the year with an unprecedentedly low figure for the city as a whole.

#### TUBERCULOUS INFECTION OF CHILDREN.

It has long been known that children are very susceptible to tuberculous infection, but there has been considerable difference of opinion as to how and when this infection is acquired. Through a combination of favorable circumstances, Dr. Alfred Hess was recently able to study this question in the case of some children left for six weeks in the charge of an attendant who was suffering with tuberculosis of the lungs. (Transactions National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, Washington, 1913.)

Thanks to the skin test devised by von Pirquet, we now have a simple means of determining the presence of tuberculous infection, and in many institutions for children routine skin tests are now made on all children admitted. The children studied by Dr. Hess were part of the population of a large infant asylum in this city, where for some time past routine skin tests were made on all children every six months. The results were found to be remarkably constant—a negative reaction on admission meaning almost always a negative reaction later on. In the case of the children studied by Dr. Hess, seven out of ten were free from tuberculosis (as shown by the von Pirquet test) prior to their being in charge of the tuberculous attendant. Three months later all of the children gave a positive reaction, and since all other sources of infection could be excluded, there was no doubt of the role played by the tuberculous attendant.

Dr. Hess's report emphasizes the importance of safeguarding young children exposed to tuberculous infection in their homes, and also furnishes a strong argument for the need of tuberculous preventoria conducted along the lines of the institution now successfully operated at Farmingdale, N. J.

RESOLUTION AFFECTING THE SALE OF BICHLORIDE OF MERCURY.  
On account of the numerous cases of poisoning from bichloride of mercury (corrosive sublimate) which have recently occurred, the Department of Health has had under consideration for some time the advisability of adding a section to the Sanitary Code controlling its sale. At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, held in the said city on the ninth day of December, 1913, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, Bichloride of mercury, otherwise corrosive sublimate, a poison, has frequently been taken by mistake and loss of life has resulted therefrom, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended by the adoption of an additional section to be known as section sixty-seven (a), to take effect March 1, 1914, and to read as follows:

##### BUREAU OF HIGHWAYS.

The total mileage of pavements in the Borough of Brooklyn on June 30, 1913, was 783.29. It is divided among the various kinds of pavements as follows:

Asphalt, 476.126; asphalt block, 30.802; granite, 134.001; medina, 7.286; Belgian, 15.998; trap block, 0.364; cobbles, 5.194; brick, 1.494; wood, 7.345; iron slag, 3.123; macadam, 101.565; total, 783.298.

The total amount of pavement laid during the second quarter was 10.805 miles; amount removed, 3.118 miles; net increase, 7.687 miles.

Of the total number of contracts let, 110 were charged to S. A.—5 (Street Improvement Fund) at a total cost of \$694,329.88. Fifty of these were asphalt paving contracts, totaling \$309,787.85; 4 were granite, costing \$150,486; 50 for regulating, grading, curbing and sidewalks, at a cost of \$225,982.96. The remainder were for grading lots, fencing and cement walks.

Thirty-five (35) contracts were chargeable to C. P. B.—32, and were repaving jobs; total cost, \$854,806.15. Of this number twenty-two (22) were for asphalt and eight (8) for granite.

Six (6) contracts, totaling \$25,332.83, were for paving pitch, sand, gravel, etc., chargeable to No. 3034, Care of Highways, Supplies.

Assessment lists numbering 92 were prepared in duplicate, involving a total amount of \$461,472.28.

Eighty-three (83) were for regulating, grading, curbing, and the balance for cement walks, grading lots, and fencing.

In addition, 104 lists were partially completed.

Seventy-eight (78) plans for new work completed, of which sixty (60) were paving plans.

Total estimates made, also surveys: Final estimates, 120; grade and pave estimates, 55; track grades, 26; repaving contracts, 35; grading lots, 5; law surveys, 43; miscellaneous, 7.

Of preliminary authorizations (estimated costs) for Local Board consideration, 182 (18, no cost given) were made, at a total of \$1,019,881.

##### House Numbers.

Numbers assigned, 850; inspections, 75; notices served, 52; complaints of duplicate numbers, 10; changes of numbers sent Tenement House Department, 23.

##### Connection Gangs.

The work done by these gangs, in restoring cuts made by corporations, plumbers, etc., consisted in repairing 6,418 square yards granite on concrete; 6,971 square yards granite on sand; 723 square yards Belgian block; 137 square yards medina; 1,119 square yards asphalt block; 12,049 square yards macadam, and several other kinds of pavement.

Six (6) inch concrete foundation, 9,460 square yards.

Street Repair Gangs—The work done by these gangs in repairs to defective pavements: 12,116 square yards of granite concrete, 72,791 square yards of granite on sand, 17,641 square yards of Belgian block, 1,129 square yards of cobble, 1,928 square yards of asphalt block, 194 square yards of brick, 3,604 square yards of concrete foundation.

Sidewalk Gangs—272,667 square feet of bluestone walk, 19,242 square feet of cement walk, 981 square feet of brick walk, 3,658 linear feet of bluestone curb, 1,629 square feet of cement curb, 746 square feet of concrete foundation, 3,532 square feet of bridging; 2,460 dangerous holes repaired and made safe by the emergency gangs.

Country Gangs—These gangs perform work of shaping up and repairing dirt and unimproved roadways: Macadam repairs, 30,188 square yards; macadam cleaned, 48,864 square yards; miscellaneous gutters paved, 4,172 square yards; paved gutters cleaned, 21,302 square yards; dirt roadways repaired (hand), 566,435 square yards; dirt roadways repaired (machine), 587,648 square yards; ash sidewalks, 1,932 square yards; dirt sidewalks, 4,145 square yards; streets sprinkled (oil), 813,461 square yards; streets sprinkled (water), 3,537 miles; stone crushed, 611 square yards.

Miscellaneous Work—Bridge repairs, drainage, miscellaneous trucking, repair tools, etc., cleaning miscellaneous streets, sanding miscellaneous streets. Loads of material hauled: To work, 15,972 loads; to dump, 5,616 loads.

Complaints to the number of 2,584 were received, and 2,244 satisfied. These were from various sources, i. e., Police Department, Fire Department, Street Cleaning Department, citizens and by our inspectors.

The Chief Engineer in his report, sent herewith, sets forth statement of the operations of the Asphalt Repair Plant Force, employed both at plant and on street repairs, wages and salaries, plant product and repairs done.

Cement Walks—Number of permits issued, 268; carried over from last quarter, 30; total, 298. Disposition of same: Completed, 254; not completed, 35; cancelled, 9; total, 298; 226,550 square feet of walk laid.

Laboratory—Hydraulic cements, 758; asphalt pavement mixtures, 345; miscellaneous samples, 852.

The contract work completed during the quarter is shown more specifically on the table (blue print) attached to the report of the Chief Engineer, which I am submitting.

The Bureau of Highways received, on special security deposits, \$5,650, with refunds over receipts of \$300 (refunds \$5,950). On July 1, 1913, there was a credit balance of \$38,350.

For permits to open pavements for water, gas, sewer, electric light, telephone, etc., the sum of \$65,664.05 was received, as follows: Restoring and repaving over



cuts, \$55,817.52; vault privileges (Sinking Fund), \$3,576.36; redemption of incumbrances (General Fund), \$63.01; Street Improvement Fund, S. A.—5, \$5,567.74; repaving streets, C. P. B.—32, \$639.42.

#### Division of Incumbrances.

Complaints, numbering 728, were received as follows: Street Cleaning Department, 2; Bureau of Complaints, 25; mail, 192; office, 142; Inspectors, 308; Police, 59.

The Division removed a considerable amount of material from the streets of this borough, among which were the following: Boulders, 198; trees, etc., 157; posts and poles, 26; miscellaneous, 299; signs, 7; materials, 44 hours.

Corporation permits: Gas, 2,173; electric, 1,243; railroad, 273; sewers, 21; cold air ducts, 3; Water Department, 225. Sixteen (16) incumbrances were seized and 14 redeemed.

A total number of 4,024 permits were issued to the various corporations for street openings. Of these, 826 were to the Edison Electric Light Company, and 1,422 to the Brooklyn Union Gas Company. The balance was apportioned among the New York Telephone Company, the Flatbush Gas Company, the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, the Coney Island & Brooklyn Railroad Company, the Manhattan Bridge 3-cent line, etc.

About the same number of permits were issued for overhead work not requiring the opening of streets, such as stringing wires, drawing cables, and putting lights in signs.

These permits are recorded in our Highway Bureau, to be signed by the Superintendent of that Bureau and myself.

#### DIVISION OF SUBSTRUCTURES.

The duties of this Division are:

Accumulation of information obtainable by surveys and investigations as to size, location and character of the structures under the streets and avenues of the borough, and making records of same on maps.

Assigning definite locations for new substructures, thereby reducing pavement mutilations to a minimum.

Relative to the work of this Division during the quarter ending June 30, 1913, surveys and investigations have been conducted in the Williamsburg section of the borough, in response to a request from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for definite locations throughout this section for the extension of the high pressure fire service. The area in which this work has been confined, during the quarter, is bounded by Driggs ave., Manhattan ave., Noble st. and the East River and Metropolitan ave. Excellent progress has been made relative to the preparation of record maps in the area bounded by Cumberland st., Flushing, Washington and Willoughby aves., and along Atlantic ave., from Flatbush ave. to Carlton ave. The preparation of the Atlantic ave. record maps includes the most complicated section of the so-called Atlantic Avenue Improvement of the Long Island Railroad. Important information furnished includes a definite location of 3½ miles of new high pressure fire service in the Borough Hall section of the borough, where our record maps have been completed, complete information to the Public Service Commission relative to the Clark st. and Montague st. subway routes, and general information relative to substructures; also the New York Municipal Railway Company in connection with the reconstruction of the Sea Beach Line, between 4th ave. and 86th st.

About 4,000 permit applications presented by public service corporations, to open street surfaces for the purpose of installing new lines, etc., have been referred to this Bureau for criticism. This work includes various reports, based upon requests for revocable privileges and other matters referred to the Division of Substructures.

Supplies ordered amounted to \$15.33.

#### BUREAU OF SEWERS.

I submit to you detailed report of the operations of our Sewer Bureau in the maintenance and repairs of existing sewers, and the construction of new sewers. From same it will be observed that: 66,057 linear feet of sewers of all sizes were laid, or an equivalent of 12.511 miles. This, added to the mileage of the sewerage system on March 31, 1913, viz., 930,437 miles, makes the mileage on June 30, 1913, 942,948.

The total amount of sewers built divided among the various sizes, is as follows:

There were 54,667.23 linear feet (10.354 miles) of 6-inch house connection drains, and 3,501.87 linear feet of 8-inch drain (0.663 mile). This is a considerable increase over amount laid during the first quarter, when 38,358.30 linear feet of 6-inch, and 991 linear feet of 8-inch drain were laid.

At the close of the second quarter, there was a total of 136,945 miles of house drains since this system was inaugurated.

The number of basins built has been 180. These, added to the basins previously connected with the sewerage system, viz., 11,810, makes the total 11,994 on June 30, 1913. The net increase during the quarter was 174 basins, 5 having been reconstructed, and one abandoned.

On April 1, there remained on hand 22 resolutions for sewer improvements, for which the Board of Estimate had, prior to that date, authorized the preparation of contract plans and specifications, and had further directed the resubmission of the matters when the preliminary work was done. The estimated cost of same was \$1,174,800.

The Board of Estimate authorized the preparation of plans and specifications for fifty-one (51) improvements, amounting to \$432,500, under preliminary authorization. Of this number, plans were prepared and submitted for twelve (12) of these improvements, amounting to \$135,300 in cost.

During the quarter there were received five (5) petitions to construct private sewers, under section 395 of the Charter. Of this number plans were submitted for three (3) of them.

During the quarter, forty-two (42) sewer improvements were authorized, at a cost of \$484,800, under final authorization.

One hundred and twenty-four (124) reports were made for sewer improvements to precede work of paving, and in response to petitions for sewers. Of these, fifty-five (55) were to precede paving at an estimated cost of \$14,750.

Sixty-seven (67) were for sewers and basins petitioned for at an estimated cost of \$212,000. The total mileage of sewers called for in these reports was 12,332.

Blueprints are attached to the report of the Chief Engineer showing contracts in course of execution during the quarter; also list of completed contracts for which assessment maps and lists have been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors; also list of completed contracts which have been completed but for which assessment maps and lists have not been submitted to the Board of Assessors.

#### TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

The work of this bureau consists of preparing surveys by the field force for profiles in connection with improvements and work performed by the office division and the preparation of necessary maps, reports, etc.

The activities of this bureau are broad and general in scope, the bureau performing work and compiling data for the use of other departments of the City government as well as for the bureaus under the jurisdiction of the Borough President.

Summing up the duties of the Topographical Bureau are as follows:

1. To make topographical surveys and computations, and to prepare maps, plans and profiles, sketches, etc., for altering the map or plan of the City, and for acquiring title to streets, avenues, parks, etc.

2. To mark on the ground by means of monumented stones, etc., the lines of streets, and to protect the monuments when street improvements are being made.

3. To prepare maps and technical descriptions for the Local Boards, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Corporation Counsel's office and the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of altering the map of the City, and of acquiring title to streets, avenues, etc.

4. To prepare certificates of dedication for streets in which the City has an easement for the use of the public; also statements of facts for submission to the Corporation Counsel in order that he can determine upon the facts presented whether improvements may be made without instituting condemnation proceedings in the streets for which the statement of facts are submitted.

5. To furnish, when requested, reports on the legal status of streets, not only for the bureaus of the borough government, but for the following: Street Cleaning Department, Department of Taxes and Assessments, Department of Bridges, Department of Water Supply, and for the public generally.

6. A great deal of the routine work of the office, which took considerable time, such as the care and preservation of the monument stones, the keeping of the detailed records of the office, the numerous investigations necessary to make reports on the legal status of streets, the many replies, both oral and written, to inquiries as to the legal status of streets, etc., are not and cannot well be included in the report which I have received from this bureau.

The field work which was required for and which is included in the maps and reports under the head "Office Work," consists of chaining, line work, angular measurements, levelling and damage survey work, and the amount of this work, which was done as required, is as follows: 1,173,800 feet approximate chaining, 23,800 feet precise chaining, 7,800 feet precise line work, 250 precise angles measured, 79,292 feet for profile for regulating, grading, etc., on 60 streets, 126,657 feet line and grade stakes (107 streets), 37,363 feet damage surveys for 14 sheets.

Monument points set, 20; monuments referenced, 44; monuments reset, 43.

Several maps were forwarded for adoption for change line streets, closing and discontinuing, locating and laying out, etc.

Miscellaneous maps or general sketches for special reports and copies of maps previously prepared and forwarded were made, the most important of which was the map in the proceeding to acquire title to park at Coney Island bounded by Surf ave., W. 5th st., the Atlantic Ocean and W. 8th st.

A number of maps were made showing encroachments on streets prepared for the Incumbrance Bureau, also a number of statements of facts for the Corporation Counsel which includes all obtainable information, documentary and physical, that tends to prove a dedication of each street to public use was prepared.

Rule maps in quadruplicate showing land to be taken in street opening proceedings (total, 14 streets) covering 36,227 feet, or 6.861 miles, were forwarded.

Draft damage maps, used by the Street Opening Commissioners, to determine the amount of award for lands and buildings taken, were submitted. Total, 14 streets, 21 maps covering 725 plots, 1,308,117 square feet, or 696,532 city lots.

Draft benefit maps, show limits of assessments and give block numbers and dimensions. Total, 19 streets, 15 maps and 5,186 plots. One of the principal proceedings was the Flatbush Avenue Extension, from Concord to Nassau sts., 417 plots. Final damage maps, in duplicate; final benefit maps, in triplicate. These are the last maps for street opening proceedings, and are copies of draft damage and benefit maps with the additions of any changes and modifications that may have been decided upon by the report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, which is placed on file at the confirmation of each street opening proceeding. Total, 16 maps, comprising 427 sheets.

During the quarter 769 reports and letters were sent, as follows:

#### BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

For Six Months Ending June 30, 1913.

The Superintendent reports on the work of his Bureau for the first half of the year, therefore the data here compiled include the first three months ending March 31.

Number of Violations—Defective plastering, 32; defective plumbing and drainage, 588; defective elevators, 85; defective construction and materials, 1,275; erecting and altering without permit, 450; unsafe buildings, 89.

Notices Issued—To remove violations, 2,345; to remove unsafe buildings, 89; to repair passenger elevators, 85.

Complaints regarding buildings, numbering 102, were received and upon investigation were remedied. Of this number, 60 complaints were unfounded.

Passenger elevators to the number of 2,417 were inspected, and of this number 85 were found not in compliance with the law.

Elevators—Disposition of cases not in compliance with the law: No grating under overhead machinery: Pending, 109; received since, 85; total, 194; law complied with, 88.

Inspections of iron and steel numbered 2,220; total number of construction inspections, 90,167.

Applications were filed affecting 288 one-family brick buildings, at a total cost of \$1,316,500, each costing not less than \$20,000; for two-family dwellings, brick, estimated cost less than \$20,000 each, 269 buildings; total cost, \$1,169,150.

Tenements, estimated cost more than \$20,000; brick, 166 buildings; total cost, \$5,735,600.

Tenements (brick) estimated cost less than \$20,000, 113 buildings; total cost, \$1,154,500.

There were 21 applications, for 21 buildings, stores, each costing less than \$15,000, at a total cost of \$101,850.

Fifty-six (56) applications were filed, for 91 buildings (stores and two-family houses); total cost, \$550,400.

Five (5) were for brick office buildings at a total of \$1,005,500; forty-eight (48) were for factories and workshops at a total cost of \$1,126,800.

One-family frame dwellings, 381 buildings, at a total cost of \$1,042,000.

Fifty-two (52) were frame tenements, at a total cost of \$335,000.

In addition there were a number of public buildings, places of amusement, hotels, lodging houses, warehouses and brick loft buildings.

#### BUREAU OF SEWERS.

Office of Chief Engineer, Room 1013-1014 Mechanics Bank Building, September 12, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. TAYLOR, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith report of the operations of the Engineering Division of this bureau for the second quarter of the year, ending June 30, 1913.

As you will note from the tabulated statement next attached 66,057.30 linear feet of sewers of all sizes were laid during the quarter, or an equivalent of 12.511 miles, which, added to the mileage of the sewerage system on March 31, 1913, 930,437 miles, makes the mileage on June 30, 1913, 942,948 miles. The total amount of sewers built during the quarter, divided among the various sizes, is as follows:

There were 54,667.23 linear feet (10.354 miles) of 6-inch house connection drain and 3,501.87 linear feet (0.663 mile) of 8-inch house connection drain built during the quarter, making a total of 135,554 of 6-inch and 1,391 miles of 8-inch house connection.



tion drain built under the jurisdiction of the bureau since this system was inaugurated, making a grand total of 136.945 miles of house connection drains on June 30, 1913.

The number of sewer basins built during the quarter has been 180, of which number 5 were reconstructed; one basin was abandoned during the quarter, making the net increase 174, which, added to the basins previously connected with the sewerage system, 11,810, makes the total 11,984 on July 30, 1913.

On April 1, 1913, there remained on hand 22 resolutions for sewer improvements, amounting in estimated cost to \$1,174,800, for which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had prior to that date authorized the preparation of contract plans and specifications and had further directed the resubmission of the matters when the preliminary work was done. Contract plans and specifications for 11 of these improvement matters, amounting in estimated cost to \$281,900, were completed and submitted during the quarter. Plans for five improvements, amounting in estimated cost to \$34,600, are held because of grading and other changes. One improvement, estimated cost \$4,900, is held pending the rescission of the resolution by the Board of Estimate, the course of the sewer and its outlets having been changed by a change of plan.

The resolution for one improvement, estimated cost, \$22,000, was amended on April 17, 1913. The amended resolution will be reported upon hereafter. Plans for three improvements, estimated cost, \$826,900, are in course of preparation.

There also remained on hand on June 30, the resolution of January 9, 1913, authorizing the preparation of plans, specifications and contract forms for the relief sewers of Division I, which resolution covered sewers, the estimated cost of which was \$2,497,500. As reported in the first quarterly report, final authorization was given for three sections amounting in estimated cost to \$1,125,000. Plans for several sections of the remaining sewers are in preparation and will shortly be submitted.

During the quarter the Board of Estimate authorized the preparation of plans and specifications for 51 sewer improvements amounting in estimated cost to \$432,500.

Plans were prepared and submitted for 12 of these improvements, amounting in estimated cost to \$135,300.

Plans are in preparation or will be undertaken as soon as it is possible to do so for the remaining 39, amounting in estimated cost to \$297,200.

During the quarter there were received 11 resolutions of local boards authorizing the construction of sewer basins, aggregating in estimated cost, \$3,860. Plans, specifications and contract forms were submitted for 6 of these improvements amounting in estimated cost to \$1,260. Plans for the remaining 5 will be submitted shortly.

During the quarter there were received five petitions for the construction of sewer improvements by private contract. Plans were submitted for three of these improvements and plans for the remaining two improvements will shortly be submitted.

During the second quarter the Board of Estimate authorized the construction of 42 sewer improvements, amounting in estimated cost to \$484,800.

There were made during the quarter 124 reports upon sewer improvements to precede paving, and in response to petitions for sewers; 55 of these were to precede paving, the estimated cost of sewer improvements required before paving being \$14,750; 67 were for sewers and basins petitioned for, the estimated cost of the sewer improvements being \$212,200; 2 were upon miscellaneous subjects connected with the sewerage system. The total mileage of sewers called for by the reports is 12,332 miles.

I append hereto a list of 16 contracts for sewer improvements amounting to \$186,678.25, for which assessment lists have been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors during the quarter, and also a list of 99 contracts for sewer improvements amounting to \$597,143.76, which have been completed and accepted up to and including June 30, 1913, but which have not been forwarded to the Board of Assessors at the close of the quarter.

Statements are attached hereto showing contracts entered into during the quarter, contracts completed during the quarter, and contracts in progress during the quarter which were uncompleted on June 30, 1913, with a summary showing the magnitude of the work carried on under the jurisdiction of the Bureau. Whereas, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Desbrosses, Vestry, Washington, Greenwich and Canal streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, and across the Manhattan Bridge, and upon and along Flatbush Avenue Extension and other streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, from the Desbrosses Street Ferry, Borough of Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Depot, Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, was amended by extending the times for commencement and completion of construction; and

Whereas, The Company has by a petition dated September 25, 1913, applied to the Board for certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated July 10, 1912, to wit:

First—By substituting for that portion of the route authorized by said contract of July 10, 1912, upon and along Rockwell place, Flatbush ave. from Rockwell place to 4th ave., 4th, Atlantic and 3d aves., in the Borough of Brooklyn, the following routes:

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR THE First District (hereinafter called the "Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 6 of Routes 4 and 33, a part of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within The City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

Section No. 6—Beginning at a point under 7th ave., in the Borough of Manhattan, about seventy-five (75) feet north of the northerly building line of W. 30th st., and extending thence northerly under 7th ave. to a point about one hundred (100) feet south of the southerly building line of W. 43d st.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having four and five tracks. The details of the construction of the railroad and appurtenances are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

The Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company for the equipment, maintenance and operation of additional rapid transit rail roads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract for which bids are now invited will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five (95) per centum of the aggregate sum arrived at by multiplying the estimated approximate quantities by the unit prices, as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. No proposal, after it shall have been deposited with the Commission, will be allowed to be withdrawn for any reason whatever.

The award of the contract will be made by the Commission as soon as practicable after the opening of the proposals.

Bidders whose proposals are otherwise satisfactory, in case the sureties or securities named by them are not approved by the Commission, may substitute in their proposals the names of other sureties or securities approved by the Commission, but such substitution must be made within five (5) days after notice of disapproval, unless such period is extended by the Commission.

### **Amendment to Sanitary Code.**

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held December 9, 1913, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended to take effect January 1, 1914, so as to read as follows:

Section 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

And it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee or agent of any such building or place of business to cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles all such materials and substances, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

And such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure in front of any building and not upon the sidewalk, and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured.

Any receptacle containing garbage or liquid substances, which shall be placed outside of a building in the area or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure shall be covered and kept covered until such removal, as aforesaid.

The foregoing provisions are applicable throughout The City of New York, except that in the Borough of Richmond ashes from house furnaces shall be kept in a receptacle separate and apart from the remainder of the household waste, and no material other than furnace ashes shall be placed in said receptacle. Other household waste materials, including garbage, kitchen ashes, sweepings, soiled paper or rubbish shall be placed in a separate metal or metal lined receptacle, which when placed outside of a building for removal shall be covered and kept covered with a tight fitting cover.

No receptacle shall when filled contain more than two cubic feet of material nor weigh more than one hundred pounds, and a sufficient number of receptacles shall be provided by the owner, lessee or occupant of a building to hold whatever ashes or other waste materials may accumulate thereat during sixty hours next preceding the removal thereof.

Newspapers, wrapping paper and other light rubbish likely to be blown or scattered about the street shall be securely bundled, tied or packed before placed for removal. Yard sweepings, hedge cuttings, grass, leaves, earth, stone bricks or trade waste shall not be mixed with household waste.

Accumulations of household refuse resulting from failure to take advantage of the regular collection service shall be removed at the expense of the person or persons concerned.

Whereas, Bichloride of mercury, otherwise corrosive sublimate, a poison, has frequently been taken by mistake and loss of life has resulted therefrom, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended by the adoption of an additional section to be known as section sixty-seven (a), to take effect March 1, 1914, and to read as follows:

Section 67a. Bichloride of mercury, otherwise known as corrosive sublimate, shall not be held, kept, sold or offered for sale at retail in the dry form except in colored tablets individually wrapped, the wrapper to have the word "Poison" in plain letters conspicuously placed, and dispensed in sealed containers of glass conspicuously labeled with the word "Poison" in red letters.

This section does not apply to tablets containing one-tenth of a grain or less of bichloride of mercury.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. #### PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

##### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
