Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held Dec. 28, 1917, at 4 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Robbins, O'Keeffe, Farley and Stern, Trustees. Excused, Mr. Sachs and Mr. Paulding, Trustees, and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Geraldine Watson, Inspector in Anesthesia on the Second Division, makes application for the position of Admitting Physician about to be vacated by Dr. Rutledge. Dr. Watson has completed an internship in the hospital, and is in every way qualified for the position.

The new Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital was opened yesterday. There is still much confusion, although it is working out fairly well.

In regard to the cardiac clinic at Harlem Hospital, for which a worker was requested in the budget and denied, I find the average attendance at this clinic, per month, is 80 adults, and 58 children, involving about 65 home visits each month. Until such time as funds for the worker can be procured, I believe the more urgent of these cases can be cared for with our present staff at Harlem Hospital.

The Christmas festivities passed very pleasantly at all of the hospitals of the department, Christmas trees being provided in the various children's wards, with generous remembrances to practically all of the patients in the hospital.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

The appointment of Dr. Geraldine Watson as Admitting Physician to Bellevue Hospital was approved.

The continuance of the work of the cardiac clinic at Harlem Hospital with their present staff of Nurses was approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Consideration was given to the bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Dec. 10, for meats and poultry, milk and cream, eggs, flour, and potatoes, and on Dec. 13, for butter, cheese, bread and rolls; fresh fish, oysters and clams and coffee, action on which was deferred at the last meeting. On the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, awards were made to the low formal bidders on all lines except on eggs, which were rejected at the last meeting. As no bids were received for milk and cream for Harlem, Fordham and Neponset Beach Hospitals, readvertisement for these items was authorized. The bids on flour were also rejected as the terms of the bid conflict with the regulations adopted by the United States, and as the amount involved is less than \$1,000, the purchase in the open market was authorized.

The Board also considered the bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Dec. 27 for lumber, paints, oils and varnishes; canned goods and groceries; oils (lubricating and illuminating), greases and all lubricants; gasoline and kerosene; clothing, dry goods, notions, etc.; stock fruits and vegetables; cleaning materials and compounds. On the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, awards were made to the low formal bidders in all cases except as follows: On canned goods and groceries, line 20 was rejected, as there were tie bids; on line 28, as there was only one bid; on lines 31, 37 and 65, on account of the high prices and lack of competition; on line 68, on account of the

fact that the low bidder will not supply what is required by this Department. For the best interests of the City, the bids on lines 3, 4, 35, 42, 53, 54, 61, 63, 64, 68, 70, 71, 75, 77, 82, 83 and 84, for stock fruits and vegetables were rejected and ordered readvertised; on cleaning materials and compounds, bids on line 1 were rejected on account of the high prices; on line 71, bids were rejected as the wrong sizes were specified in the proposals. The purchase in the open market was authorized on those items on which no bids were received, and which can be purchased for less than \$1,000.

Reference was made to the desirability of obtaining an Assistant Superintendent to fill the vacancy caused by the absence of Dr. Thornton, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to interview candidates and send acceptable men to the President for interview.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for Dec. 12, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the corrections made in the minutes of the previous meeting of the Executive Committee to read that F. H. Russell, appointed on the house staff as substitute until Jan. 1, 1918, and then after that date to continue the service of Dr. Healey, now absent on military duty, was approved. The following nominations having been considered by the Conference Committees of the respective divisions were approved: First Division, Walter C. Gravelle, as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients. Second Division: Kent W. Jarvis, to a two-year service on the house staff from January 1, 1918; Thyra Hildgarde Josselyn, as Resident Neurologist, from January 1, 1918. Third Division: Promotion of Walter C. Camp, from the position of Assistant Visiting Surgeon to Visiting Surgeon. Fourth Division: H. T. White and H. H. Shiras, internes on the Eye Service, for one year from January 1, 1918; Harry A. Solomon to fill the unexpired term of Theodore B. Reed, whose service terminates January 1, 1919; R. Michaud, to fill the unexpired term of Clarence E. Toshack, whose service terminates January 1, 1919.

The resolution of the Executive Committee to extend every possible aid in the examinations to be held by the National Board of Medical Examiners in the wards of Bellevue on Jan. 15 and 16, was approved.

A letter, dated Dec. 10, was presented from Alexander Nicoll, outlining a plan to provide for the surgical service of Fordham Hospital during his absence on military service in that Dr. Taylor is to assume the responsibility for the conduct of the service, but in view of the fact that Dr. Taylor's work is in instructing army officers in neurological surgery, the actual work will be done by Dr. Harrigan, with such supervision as Dr. Taylor can give to it from time to time. This plan was considered in connection with the action of the Board at its meeting on December 18th, in granting the request of Alexander Nicoll for an indefinite leave of absence on account of military service and a similar request of Dr. A. S. Taylor on the demands made upon him to teach in the neuro-surgical service of the United States Army. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this plan was approved.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for Dec. 18, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report regarding shortening the length of service of internes was considered, but action thereon was deferred. Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Robbins being ap-

pointed a Committee to meet with the Examining Committee of Harlem Hospital.

The creation of two temporary positions for the duration of the war of Provisional Assistant Surgeons in addition to the two positions of Provisional Adjunct Surgeons already created was approved. On the recommendation of the Conference Committee, H. B. Eisberg was appointed Provisional Adjunct Surgeon for the duration of the war.

A communication dated Dec. 20, was presented from the Art Commission, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted on Dec. 10, approving the design of a bridge across Gouverneur Slip, from Gouverneur Hospital to the new building for the Out Patient Department. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter dated Dec. 21, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of two resolutions adopted on Dec. 14 (a) denying request of the Board of Aldermen to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$6,550 to meet anticipated deficits in the appropriations of the department, and (b) approving transfer of \$6,300 from the Bureau of Child Welfare, to meet the deficits of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these resolutions were placed on file.

A letter dated Dec. 21, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a resolution adopted on Dec. 14, suspending the provisions of the standard form of contracts for furnishing and delivering supplies approved by that Board on Dec. 5, 1912. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on Nov. 27, 1917, amending section 1, article 1, chapter 16, of the Code of Ordinances, regarding the employment of non-citizens in City Departments was presented. The resolution, as amended, provides that no person not a citizen or an actual resident in the State of New York, shall be eligible for appointment in any branch of the city government, except in institutions which care for the sick and infirm. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resolution was ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.

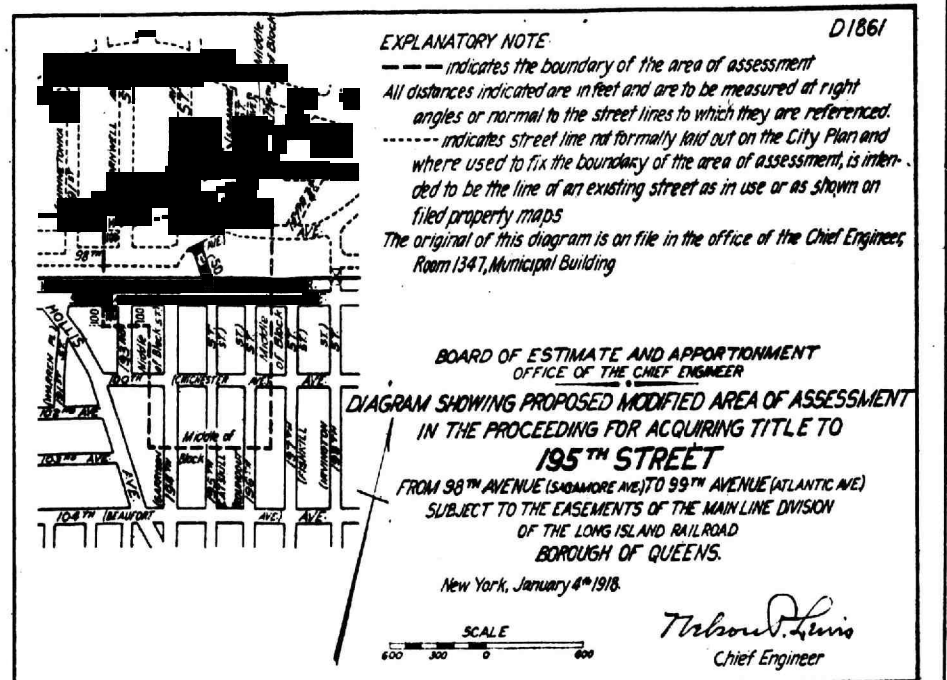

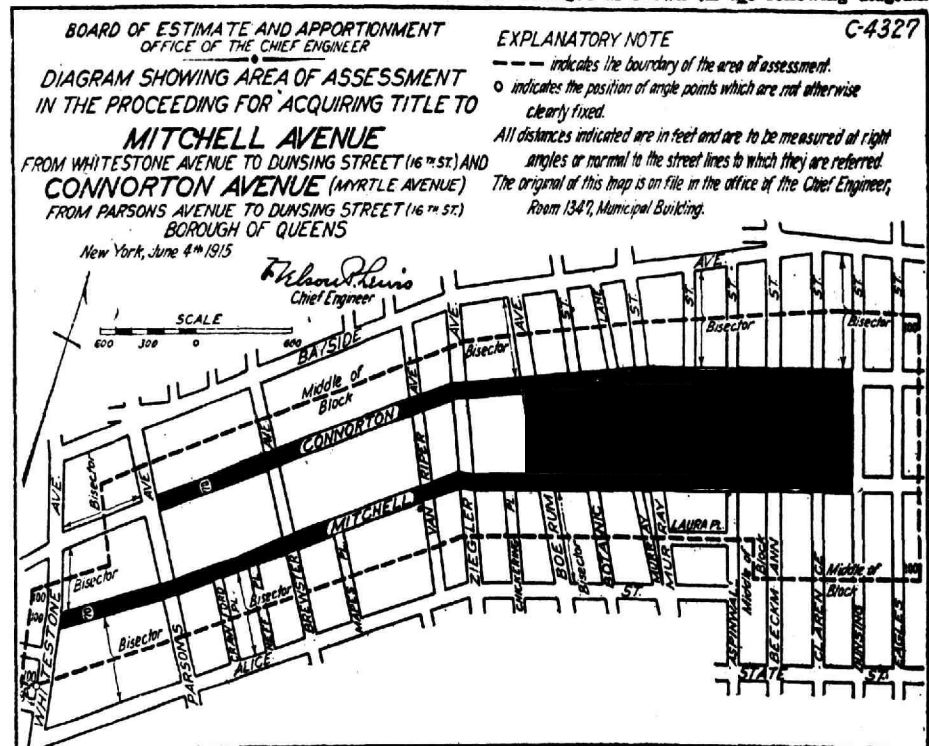

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curbs in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, stinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Comptroller of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work, or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates or evidences of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be in closed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.
