AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend article XXXV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to the removal of snow and ice," approved May 16, 1882. The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows : Section 1. Section 1 of the above-entitled ordinance, amending section 317 of article XXXV, of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, is hereby amended by adding at the end of said section 317, as then amended, the following : "The provisions of this section shall not apply to streets or avenues in the 12th, 23d and 24th Wards which have not been curbed, guttered or flagged, nor to streets and avenues not opened according to law, and the title thereto vested in the Corporation of the City of New York, shall, within eight hours after the fall of any snow, and within eight hours after the forming of any ice on the sidewalk, or in the gutter in front of any such building or lot, remove, or cause the same to be removed from such sidewalk or gutter, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge, severally and respectively ; but where said snow falls or ice forms between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, this ordinance will be complied with by removing, or causing the same to be removed, before nine o'clock of the morning succeeding its fall or formation. The provisions of this section shall not apply to streets or avenues in the 12th, 23d and 24th Wards which have not been curbed, guttered and flagged, nor to streets and avenues not opened according to law, and the title thereto vested in the Corporation of the City of New York." Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed. Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. 

and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occu-pancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when hey are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any welling apartment. REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS. UNDER CHAPTER 470, LAWS 1880, SECTIONS 350, 151, 152 and 353, and as amended by chapter 550, Law 389, as follows: The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to establishments. The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

Commissioner of Public Works. The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one doilar pry par shall be charged. Marrares will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through Theorem.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows wit:

to wit: BARERES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum. BARERE Shor's shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Com missioner of Public Works; an additional charge o five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS IN private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, hoarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs. BUILING PURPORSE.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work--to be measured as brick-ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards. COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. DINING SALOOSS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Com-missioner of Public Works. FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five de lars per

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows : HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum ; and for each additional horse, two dollars. HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceed-ing thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum ; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

METERS.

METERS. Under the provisions of section 354, Consolidated Act 688, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-foreign mandfactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished tor business consumption, accept private dwellings. It is provided by section 354, Laws of 1880, that "All Kapeness of meters, their connections and setting, water factories and ther lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water supplied, as now provided by law." * — All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. — Water measured by meter, tien cents per one hundred touc fet. — *Rate Without Meters.*

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUCHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC. No wone or tenant will be allowed to supply wafer to another persons taking war from the City must keep their own service-pipe, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall *brevent all weate* of mater. The use of hose to wash coaches, combuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-mitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the strength or street, or to become dangerous in winter the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter the state and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, and and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, from arcs, and any hydrant standing in a didicin to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Where premisses are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-ment may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. Deping fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in use manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.
