Hewitt, Mayor—Inclosing opinion received from the Counsel to the Corporation, respecting judgments obtained for arrears of dock rents. The Secretary directed to have the same recorded in the Book of Opinions.

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Opinion respecting the removal of advertising signs on piers and bulkheads. The Secretary directed to have same recorded in the Book of Opinions.

2d. Approving form of contract for removing remains of burned Pier, new 37, North river.

3d. Inclosing bill amounting to \$113.45 for fees on searches in the matter of the sale of bulkhead property by the Old Dominion Steamship Company. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

From Comptroller of the City—Approving of the agreement made by the Board with John Gillies for the use of certain spruce on deck of pier foot of West Thirty-fourth street, North river.

From Department of Street Cleaning—Reporting that certain bulkheads between Canal and West Tenth streets, North river, will be cleaned.

From Police Department—Reporting that the Pier at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, Hudson river, is in a dangerous condition. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

Resolved, That the form of contract and specifications, as prepared and submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief, for dredging the site of Pier, new 37, North river, be and they are hereby approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates for doing said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The following resolution was passed by the Board at its meeting, held July 7, 1887, namely:

Resolved, That there shall be included in the next public sale of wharf property the right to collect and retain all wharfage that may accrue at Pier, old 54, North river, foot of Perry street; also, the easterly half of Pier 51, the westerly half of Pier 52, East river, including Pier 51½ and the bulkhead between; now, be it

Resolved, That the resolution, as described above, be and hereby is rescinded, the same to take effect on and after this date.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 6797, in reference to the application of G. D. Curtis for permission to erect coal pockets, etc., on the bulkhead between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh streets, East river, was

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to G. D. Curtis to erect certain structures on and near the bulkhead on the northerly side of Fifty-sixth street, East river, according to plans submitted, which are hereby approved, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and provided that so much of said structures as may be on land and land under water outside of original high water-mark and owned by the City is to remain only during the pleasure of the Board, and to be removed at any time within thirty days after the date of service of notice to remove has been given by the Board of Docks; and further provided that G. D. Curtis shall pay for the use and occupancy of the land and land under water belonging to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance, and shall, within five days from this date, file with this Department a written assent to the conditions hereinbefore named.

The easterly half of Pier 51 and the westerly half of Pier 52, and the small pier between sometimes called Pier 51½, and the bulkhead situated between Pier 51 and the small pier, and between the small pier and Pier 52.

The Department will, in pursuance of the statute in such cases made and provided, grant permit to shed said piers on the usual terms and conditions, provided the owner or owners of the other halves of said piers join the Department's lessee in an application for the same; such sheds to revert to and become the property of the City on the expiration or sooner termination of the lease. The Department will also, in pursuance of the statute in such cases made and provided, if desired by the lessee, grant permit to build a platform about fifty feet wide in front of the bulkhead between Pier 51 and the small pier situated between Piers 51 and 52, and in front of the bulkhead between the small pier situated between Piers 51 and 52 and Pier 52, upon condition that the lessee shall pay for the same at the rate of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum for the use of the land under water, and shall agree that the said platform shall revert to and become the property of the City on the expiration or sooner termination of the lease.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE.

The premises must be taken in the condition in which they may be at the commencement of the term of the lease, and no claim or demand that the premises or property are not in suitable and tenable condition at the commencement of the term will be allowed by this Department.

All repairs, maintaining or rebuilding required or necessary to be done to or upon the premises, or any part thereof, during the continuance of the term of the lease, shall be done by and at the cost and expense of the lessee or purchaser.

No claim or demand will be considered or allowed by the Department for any loss or deprivation of wharfage or otherwise, resulting from or occasioned by any delay on account or by reason of the premises or any part thereof being occupied for or on account of any repairs, rebuilding or dredging.

The up-set price of the parcels or premises exposed or offered for sale will be announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale.

The Department will do all dredging, whenever it shall deem it necessary or advisable so to do. The term for which leases are sold will commence at the date mentioned in the advertisement, viz., May 1, 1888, and the rents accruing therefor will be payable from that date in each case.

Each purchaser of a lease will be required, at the time of the sale, to pay, in addition to the auctioneer's fees, to the Department of Docks, twenty-five (25) per cent. of the amount of annual rent bid, as security for the execution of the lease, which twenty-five (25) per cent. will be applied to the payment of the rent first accruing under the lease when executed, or will be forfeited to the Department if the purchaser neglects or refuses to execute the lease, with good and sufficient surety or sureties to be approved by the Department, within ten days after being notified that the lease is prepared and ready for execution at the Department of Docks.

The Department expressly reserves the right to resell the lease or premises bid off, by those failing, refusing or neglecting to comply with these terms and conditions, the party so failing, refusing or neglecting to be liable to the Corporation of the City of New York for any deficiency resulting from or occasioned by such resale.

Lessees will be required to pay their rent quarterly in advance, in compliance with the terms and conditions of the lease prepared and adopted by the Department.

In all cases where it is mentioned in the advertisement of sale, the purchaser shall be entitled to the privilege of occupying any shed upon the pier or bulkhead at the commencement of the term or that may thereafter be permitted or licensed by the Department, and to the rights attached to such permission or license, but subject to the condition thereof, such purchaser being engaged in the business of steam transportation and using and employing the same for the purpose of regularly receiving and discharging cargo thereat.

Not less than two sureties, each to be a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, to be approved by the Commissioners of Docks, will be required under each lease to enter into a bond or obligation, jointly and severally with the lessee, in the sum of double the annual rent, for the faithful performance of all the covenants and conditions of the lease, the names and addresses of the sureties to be submitted at the time of sale.

Each purchaser will be required to agree that he will upon ten days' notice so to do, execute a lease with sufficient surety as aforesaid, the printed form of which may be seen and examined upon application to the Secretary at the office of the Department, Pier "A," Battery place.

No person will be received as a lessee or surety who is delinquent on any former lease from this Department or from the Corporation.

No bid will be accepted from any person who is in arrears to this Department or to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise upon any obligation to this Department or to the Corporation of the City of New York.

The auctioneer's fees (\$25) on each lot or parcel must be paid by the purchasers thereof respectively at the time of sale.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SIR—There were 698 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 27, 1887, which is a decrease of 60, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 2 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending August 20, 1887, was 779, which is 73.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,487,950.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 320 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment.
