The weekly report of inspections of new tenement-houses was received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 15, 1881 :

October 15, 1881: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,896, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 739 tenement-houses, 96 private dwellings, 56 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 37 stables, 29 slaughter-houses, 3 lodging-houses, I stock yard, 16 sunken and vacant lots, 90 yards, courts, and areas, 168 cellars and basements, 255 waste-pipes and drains, 306 privies and water-closets, 48 streets, gutters, and sinks, 3 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 8 cesspools, and 4 other nuisances. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 499. During the past week 131 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. Permits were granted to the consignees of 86 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 125 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 113 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 97 houses, 97 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. I case of contagious disease was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics. The certificates of 610 births, 38 still-births, 246 marriages, and 690 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 15, 1881. This shows an increase of 105 births, 45 marriages, and 80 deaths, and a decrease of 13 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; hut when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 59 births, I still-birth, and 81 deaths, and a decrease of 4 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preced-ing week, the deaths from measles decreased 4; diphtheria, 2; whooping cough, 2; diarrheeal diseases, I4; cancer, I; pneumonia, I; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 2; gastratis, ententis and peritonitis, I; surgical operations, I; drowning, 3. While the deaths from small-pix increased I; scarlatina, 3; croup, II; typhoid fever, 10; malarial fevers, 3; pueperal diseases, I, inanition, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, I2; heart diseases, 8; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; convul-sions, 9; apoplexy, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cirrhosis and hepatitis, I; Bright's disease and nephritis, I9; cyanosis and atelectasis, I; premature and preternatural births, 8; and suicide, 4. The number of deaths from erysipelas, cerebro-spinal fever, alcoholism, rheu-matism and gout was the same in the two successive weeks.



Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 138 were in institutions, 372 in tenement-houses, 172 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 0 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 192 on the second, 130 on the third, 86 on the fourth, 12 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 689 were stated to be residents of New York City and 1 non-resident; 71 were stated to be single, 136 married, 60 widowed, and the condition of 423 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age. The mean temperature for the week ending October 15, 1881, was 56.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.123, the mean humidity was 78, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,314, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.28 inch depth of water, as reported by D. 

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending October 15, 1881, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending October 8, 1881.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR-There were 690 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 15, 1881, which is an increase of 80, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 9 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending October 8, 1881, was 646, which is 139.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.82 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,252,574.
