

The number of deaths varied slightly from the number reported during the preceding week. There was an increase of 8 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 10 from typhoid tever. of 7 from bronchitis, of 8 from croup, and of 7 from violent causes, and a decrease of 28 in the deaths from diarrheed diseases, of 7 from cancer, of 9 from apoplexy, of 26 from diseases of the digestive organs, and of 7 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, from scarlet fever in the Fifth, Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards, and the two deaths from measles were in the Thirteenth and Twenty-first Wards.
