

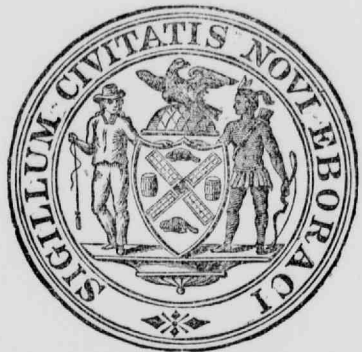

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GAS COMMISSION.

Minutes of the Proceedings of the Officers designated in section 69 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, for lighting the Public Lamps on the Streets, Parks and Public Places of the City of New York.

NOVEMBER 25, 1891.

The officers designated in section 69 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, met in the office of the Mayor, at 2.45 o'clock P. M. of Wednesday, November 25, 1891.

Present :

Hon. John V. H. Arnold, President of the Board of Aldermen, Acting Mayor; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; Thomas F. Gilroy, Commissioner of Public Works.

The minutes of the meeting of October 7, 1891, were read and approved.

The Commissioner of Public Works submitted proofs of proposed forms of contracts for furnishing the gas to and lighting and maintaining the public gas-lamps, and for furnishing, operating and maintaining electric lamps for the year commencing on January 1, 1892, and offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the forms of contracts for furnishing the gas to and lighting and maintaining the public gas lamps, and for furnishing, operating and maintaining electric lamps for the period of one year, commencing on January 1, 1892, as submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works, be and are hereby approved.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Acting Mayor, the Comptroller, and the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Commissioner of Public Works then offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That 12 o'clock M. of Thursday, December 10, 1891, be designated as the time and the office of the Commissioner of Public Works as the place for receiving and opening the proposals.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Acting Mayor, the Comptroller, and the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Secretary was then directed to have a sufficient number of the forms of contract and proposals to be printed, and an advertisement to be published in the CITY RECORD as required by law.

The Secretary presented a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted October 6, 1891, requesting that First avenue, from Fourteenth street to Fifty-ninth street, Avenue A, from Houston street to Twenty-fourth street, and Avenue B, from Tenth street to Twentieth street, be lighted by electric lights ;

Also, a petition from G. B. Disbrow and other residents of Eighty-sixth street, requesting that Eighty-sixth street, from Third avenue to the East river, be lighted by electric lights ;

Also, a communication from Edward May, president of the Mount Morris Electric-light Company, presenting a petition from residents of Eighth avenue, etc., requesting that Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Eleventh street to One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, Eighth avenue, from One Hundred and Eleventh street to One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, the Boulevard, from Sixtieth street to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, One Hundred and Tenth street, from Sixth avenue to the Boulevard and Manhattan street, from Ninth avenue to the North river, be lighted by electric lights.

Which were severally referred to the Commissioner of Public Works.

On motion, the Board then adjourned until 12 o'clock M. of Thursday, December 10, 1891.

THURSDAY, December 10, 1891.

The officers designated in section 69 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 met in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works at 12 o'clock M., of Thursday, December 10, 1891.

All were present, viz. :

Hon. Hugh J. Grant, Mayor ; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller ; Thomas F. Gilroy, Commissioner of Public Works.

The minutes of the meeting of November 25, 1891, were read and approved.

The Secretary presented an affidavit of John J. McGrath, Examiner of the CITY RECORD, that an advertisement inviting proposals for furnishing the illuminating gas to, lighting and maintaining the public gas-lamps, and for furnishing, operating and maintaining electric lamps, had been duly published in the CITY RECORD for ten days consecutively, commencing on the 28th day of November, 1891.

Which was ordered on file.

The Secretary stated that fourteen certified checks had been received from parties submitting proposals.

The estimate-box was then opened and fourteen bids or proposals were found therein and publicly read, as follows :

The Equitable Gas-light Company of New York - For furnishing illuminating gas (of not less than twenty-eight candle power, by photometric test, made according to the London standard, at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture), for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing and painting lamp-posts and lanterns, replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, crossheads, lamp-irons and lanterns thereto, for the period from January 1, 1892, to December 31, 1892, both days inclusive, in the following-described districts, to wit :

DEAR SIR—The Property-owners' Association of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and vicinity held their regular meeting on Saturday evening, December 5, at No. 1146 Stebbins avenue, and passed the following resolution:

Whereas, The Central Gas-light Company has, at the urgent request of the property-owners and residents of the Twenty-third Ward, placed lamps and expended large sums of money in laying gas-mains on Westchester avenue, have completed and lighted the lamps on the said avenue, the same having been completed about ten days, and

Whereas, They will receive very little money from private consumers, they have carried out their contract for the public benefit.

Whereas, The Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railroad Company are now erecting the trolley-wire on Westchester avenue, and as three-fourths of the accidents on trolley railroads have been traced to electric-light wires crossing the same, showing the electric-light wires hold the danger, and as the Mayor has compelled all overhead wires to be taken down, claiming them to be dangerous and as the Commissioner of Public Works has advertised for bids for lighting a portion of this avenue by electric lights, the same to be opened December 10, 1891;

Therefore, be it resolved, That this Association doth hereby protest against the lighting by electric lights of that portion of Westchester avenue, between Third avenue and the Bronx river, on the ground that it is a breach of public confidence on the part of the City with contractors, and that it would be a menace to life and limb and that it would interfere with the working of the trolley-wires.

Resolved, That the Gas Commissioners be and are hereby requested to withhold the lighting by electric lights that portion of Westchester avenue from Third avenue to Robbins avenue, as now advertised.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to communicate to Commissioner of Public Works, T. F. Gilroy, and request that the Property-owners' Association be heard on the day the bids are received, or sooner, if possible.

This is a great drawback to this section, and very detrimental to our property interests, for without gas-light building improvements are kept back.

We, therefore, respectfully request that you cause gas-mains to be laid in the following streets and avenues, and the street lamps to be lighted with gas:

SIRS—In the matter of the several proposals for gas and electric lighting which were received on 10th instant, I submit the following report:

The Equitable Gas Company bid for all the lamps on the lines of its mains at \$12 per annum, and came into competition with the \$13.04½ bid of the Standard Company and the \$17.50 bids of the Consolidated and New York Mutual Gas Companies; and it was the lowest bidder for these lamps.

The Standard Gas Company bid for all the lamps on the lines of its mains at \$13.04½, and came into competition with the Equitable, Consolidated and Mutual Companies.

The Consolidated Gas Company bid for all the lamps on Manhattan Island, at \$17.50; but the Equitable and Standard Companies were lower bidders for the lamps on their respective mains.

The New York Mutual Gas Company bid for 934 lamps at \$17.50, of which number 205 are now lighted by said company. The Equitable, Consolidated and Standard Companies bid for some of these lamps.

The Central Gas Company bid for all the lamps in the Twenty-third Ward at \$27, and it was the only bidder for these lamps.

The Northern Gas Company bid for all the lamps in that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward, formerly Town of West Farms, at \$28, and it was the only bidder for these lamps.

The Yonkers Gas Company bid for all the lamps in that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward, formerly town of Kingsbridge, at \$28, including Woodlawn Heights, which is now lighted by the N. Y. and N. J. Globe Gas-light Company.

The N. Y. and N. J. Globe Gas-light Company bid for furnishing naphtha lamps at Woodlawn Heights, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, at \$22. The Yonkers Company included this section in its bid.

The foregoing covers all gas-lighting.

As to Electric Lighting:

The Brush Electric Illuminating Company bid for 151 lamps at 40 cents per night, and 114 lamps at 45 cents—a total of 265 lamps; and it was the only bidder for these lamps. This company now lights 204 lamps at 40 cents, and 69 lamps at 45 cents.

The United States Company bid for 240 lamps at 40 cents, and 66 lamps at 45 cents—a total of 306 lamps; and it was the only bidder for these lamps. This company now lights 294 lamps at 40 cents.

The East River Company bid for 247 lamps at 40 cents and 16 lamps at 60 cents—a total of 263 lamps; and it was the only bidder for these lamps. This company now lights 138 lamps at 40 cents.

The Mount Morris Company bid for 154 lamps at 40 cents, the same as now lighted by this company, and it was the only bidder for these lamps.

The Harlem Lighting Company bid for 161 lamps at 40 cents, 15 lamps at 45 cents (in East River Park), and 19 lamps at 50 cents (in Mount Morris Park), a total of 195 lamps, and it was the only bidder for these lamps. This company now lights 156 lamps at 40 cents, and the 19 lamps in Mount Morris Park at 50 cents; the 15 in East River Park being new lamps.

The North New York Lighting Company bid for 246 lamps in the Twenty-third Ward at 45 cents, and it was the only bidder for these lamps. This company now lights 166 lamps at 45 cents.

In regard to the section known as Woodlawn Heights, which is now lighted entirely by naphtha, the same was included in the bid of the Yonkers Gas-light Company.

The Gas Commission should decide whether to light this section by gas, or to award it to the company which now lights it by naphtha, the New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company.

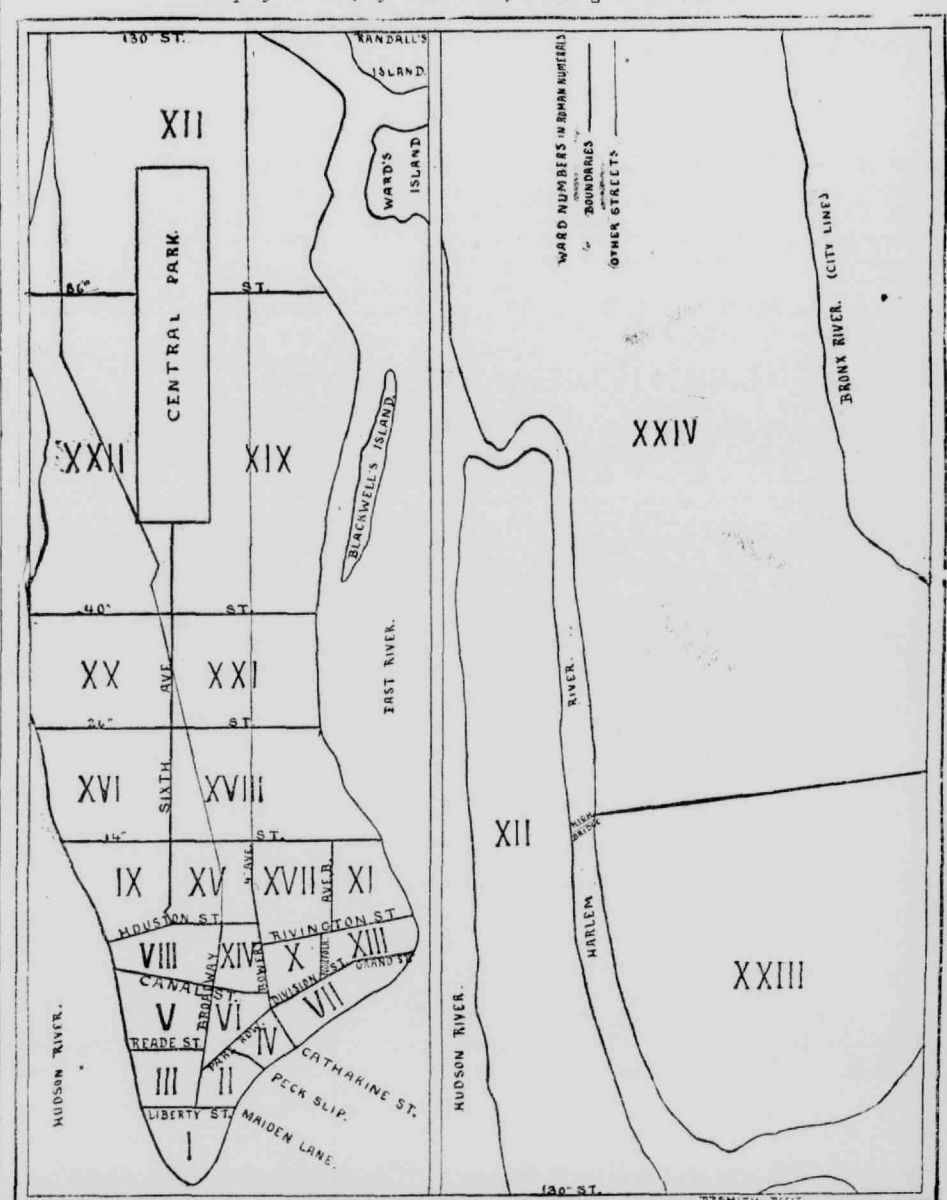

The 908 deaths represent a death-rate of 27.65, against 24.56 for the previous week and 23.56 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 141, 209, 223, 14, 25 and 10, against 121, 176, 212, 7, 76 and 7 for the previous week, a total of 622 against 599, a total increase which would be much greater if the cases of typhus fever were left out of the account. The increase of diphtheria was chiefly between Rivington street and the East river, and above Eighty-sixth street, the disease elsewhere varying little or decreasing. The increase of measles was most marked between Grand and Fourteenth street, east of Norfolk and Clinton streets, and Avenue B, between Twenty-sixth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, and above Eighty-sixth street. Scarlet fever increased between Park Row and the East river, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, between Canal and Fourteenth streets, West, and above Eighty-sixth street, elsewhere varying little.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be

thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
