Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From February 24 to March 2, inclusive, 41 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 8 at Gouverneur Hospital, 10 at Harlem Hospital, and 3 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

Referring to the recommendation of the Executive Committee of Bellevue Hospital in regard to access to histories, it is recommended that the rule be made for all the hospitals, so that no physician who is not actively connected with the hospital shall be allowed access to any history of a patient without the written consent of a member of the Executive Committee, or the attending physician or surgeon in whose service the patient was treated, or the General Medical Superintendent or his representative.

The terms of the lease for the building occupied by the Harlem Hospital provide that sixty days' notice be given to the owner for the termination of the lease, and that thirty days' notice must be given to the owner on the termination of the lease of the building occupied as the Out Patient Department.

In order to meet the arrangement for the outside service at Bellevue Hospital, it is necessary to have several substitutes constantly. It would be possible to have two one-year men reside in the hospital and it is recommended that the Fourth Division be requested to examine and recommend two additional men for one year's service on the house staff, such men to act on the house staff at large and not to be attached to any particular division.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That action on the matter of the physicians having access to the records of patients be deferred until the General Medical Superintendent can communicate with the Executive Committees of the various hospitals of the Department.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be informed, in accordance with the terms of the lease of Harlem Hospital, of the intention of the Trustees to occupy the new Harlem Hospital within sixty days.

On motion, duly seconded, it was
Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be authorized to request the Fourth Division to examine and recommend for appointment two additional men as substitutes on the various divisions of the hospital.

Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan, to whom was referred the letter from Mr. Freedlander, dated February 23, with the report of Mr. S. J. Jones, the Supervising Engineer, reported that the explanation offered by Mr. Freedlander was satisfactory.

Dr. Brannan reported receipt of one bid on horses (March 5) from the Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company, at \$325.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be requested to find out what other City Departments are at present paying for their horses; further

Resolved, That the subject of finding a fitting disposition of the old ambulance horses of the Department be referred to the President for investigation.

Communications.

A notice of a lien was received on March 5 from the J. W. Fiske Iron Works for \$305.50 on labor and materials furnished the H. Becker Iron Works, subcontractors to Messrs. Luke A. Burke & Sons, contractors for the ambulance station and power house of the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this notice was referred to the architect, Mr. J. H. Freedlander.

A communication was received from Dr. T. A. Smith, Acting Secretary of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, transmitting the minutes of the Board for the meeting held on Friday, March 1, 1907.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of appointing pathological externes be referred back to the Executive Committee, with the suggestion that the scheme recommended be combined with the one providing for externes in the outlying service as previously suggested by the Board of Trustees.

The matter of establishing a department of motor therapy in Bellevue Hospital, together with the engagement of an instructor to take charge of the work, was referred to the Conference Committee on Medical Affairs for further discussion. The resignation of Dr. G. R. Satterlee, Physician to Out Patients, Fourth Division (tuberculosis), was accepted, dating from March 1, 1907. The resignation of Dr. James R. Whiting, Assistant Surgeon (genito-urinary) on the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, was accepted, dating from February 15. Action on the nominations of Drs. McCarthy and Bandler was postponed.

A communication dated March 2 was received from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, asking for information on the matter of providing for certain extras on the new Nurses' Home building.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That Messrs. Parish & Schroeder be requested to send a representative to the Board of Trustees at its next meeting, on Thursday, March 14, 1907, in regard to this matter.

A communication, dated March 1, was received from Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, informing the Board that the final inspection of Fordham Hospital would take place on Wednesday, March 6, 1907, at 2 o'clock.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

Three communications, dated February 26, February 28, and March 5, were received from Mrs. William Church Osborn, President of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses, in regard to creating new titles, new grades of salaries, the need of additional Nurses for the new Harlem Hospital, and accommodations for sixteen Nurses, and a schedule of a two years' and a two and a half years' course for Nurses.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the titles, with the exception of that of "Directress of Nurses," be approved; that the matter of additional Nurses, together with the request for an appropriation to provide for their salaries, be referred to the President, with power; and that copies of the schedule of the two courses for Nurses be sent to each member of the Board of Trustees.

A communication, dated March 1, was received from Messrs. Candee, Smith & Howland Company, informing the Board that application to the Dock Department had been made by the company and that when the Dock Department acted upon the request the offices would be moved to the front of the dock.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file, Messrs. Candee, Smith & Howland being informed that the Trustees would insist upon occupying the premises whenever the contractors are ready to begin work.

A communication, dated March 1, was received from Dr. James C. Ayer, applying for a leave of absence from his duties as Assistant Surgeon from April 1 to June 15.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That leave of absence be granted Dr. Ayer from April 1 to June 15.

Unfinished Business.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the rules for the admitting physicians, having received the approval of the Committee on Rules, be and they are hereby adopted by the Board.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the rules for the Out-Patient Department be laid over for consideration at the next meeting.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of appointing an Inspector of Construction for the new Nurses' Training School building be deferred, there being no necessity for such an appointment until the tearing down of the present buildings is completed and the erection of the new building is begun.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That a letter be sent to the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment setting forth the fact that in all the other hospitals constructed by the Board of Trustees the policy has been followed of erecting a power plant in connection with the hospital, and asking the decision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the case of the power plant for the new Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was further

Resolved, That copies of the letters from the architects and engineers urging the erection of a power plant be attached to the request.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the plans for a new dormitory building upon the grounds of Bellevue Hospital be and they are hereby referred to the President for further suggestion and investigation.

New Business.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission be requested to establish the position of Attending Physician to Tuberculosis Clinics in the hospitals of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at a salary of not less than \$50 a month.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be requested to examine the house at No. 113 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, recommended as a temporary home for Nurses at the new Harlem Hospital, and that the President be authorized to write to the Sinking Fund Commission requesting the rental of the house, provided it is found satisfactory by the General Medical Superintendent.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

The Corporation Counsel shall furnish the Police Department with duplicates of all notices sent to the owners of buildings, and it shall be the duty of the Police Department, immediately after the expiration of thirty days from the date of said notice, to report to the Corporation Counsel each instance of non-compliance with the ordinance.


