Sir—In regard to the Corporation Counsel's request of May 14, 1907, for an increase in the salary of the Attendant to the Assistant in charge of the Brooklyn office from \$1,000 to \$1,350 per annum, referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for examination, and by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, I beg to report as follows:

In his application for said increase the Corporation Counsel states that the Attendant in the main office receives a salary of \$1,600 per annum, and that there seems to be no reason for such a disparity in the salaries of the two positions. He also states that the Attendant in the Brooklyn office does considerable work, which is not included in the particular line of his duty. The Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of the Brooklyn office speaks in the highest terms of the Attendant in that office, and states that he has no hesitation in saying that his services are worth much more than the figures at which it is proposed to fix his salary.

It would seem that the request should be granted, and I would suggest that the

proposed establishment of the new grade be recommended.

Sir—In the matter of a communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Corporation Counsel, under date of April 29, 1907, relative to the establishment of certain additional grades of positions in the Law Department, which communication was presented to said Board on May 3, 1907, referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to submit the following report:

Under date of May 8, 1907, the Corporation Counsel addressed a further communication to the Committee on Salaries of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment amending his original request. From these two communications it appears that the new grades of positions which the Corporation Counsel desires to establish are:

Assistant, at \$7,000 per annum, for four incumbents.
Assistant, at \$5,500 per annum, for four incumbents.
Assistant, at \$5,500 per annum, for four incumbents.
Assistant Chief Clerk, at \$4,500 per annum, for one incumbent.
And also the increasing of the number of incumbents in the position of Assistant at \$4,000 per annum from four incumbents to seven incumbents.

It appears that among said resignations are those of Hon. Arthur C. Butts, former Assistant Corporation Counsel, at \$7,500 per annum, and Hon. Charles N. Harris, former Assistant Corporation Counsel, at \$6,000 per annum, both of whom have been appointed City Magistrates. The Corporation Counsel states that instead of making a few promotions at increases of \$1,000 or \$1,500 in annual salary he prefers to make a larger number of promotions with increases of but \$500 each.

The present number of Assistants (including the Bureau of Street Openings) is

The present number of Assistants (including the Bureau of Street Openings) is seventy-five, and the Corporation Counsel states that the State Civil Service Commission will not permit him to increase the number of said positions, and that therefore it is not his purpose to fill all of the positions he desires to establish by promotion, but that such schedule being more elastic than that at present in force it will enable him to arrange the salaries of his Assistants upon a more equitable basis.

Since the Budget appropriation for the Law Department for 1907 provides ample funds to meet all the changes in salaries contemplated by the Corporation Counsel, and since in his opinion such changes will make the compensation of his Assistants more equitable, it would appear to your Examiner that the desired changes

should be made.

should be made.

In regard to the new grade of Assistant Chief Clerk, at \$4,500 per annum, it appears that Andrew T. Campbell, Chief Clerk of the Law Department, at a salary of \$5,000 per annum, has been in the City's employ for nearly half a century, and that he will celebrate his fiftieth anniversary in such service on June 1, 1907. The present Assistant Chief Clerk, J. H. Greener, has been in the City's employ for about twenty-two years, and it would appear to your Examiner that the important nature of the duties performed by him and the long service he has rendered properly entitle him to the increased compensation contemplated.

Your Examiner would therefore respectfully recommend that the amended re-

Your Examiner would therefore respectfully recommend that the amended request of the Corporation Counsel receive approval at the hands of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the adoption of the resolution hereto attached.

Gentlemen—On May 17, 1907, your Board adopted a resolution creating several intermediate grades of positions in this department, and the matter is now pending before the Board of Aldermen.

The Chairman of the Committee on Salaries and Offices has suggested a different form of resolution, which is attached hereto. The changes affected by this resolution are the same as those provided for by the former one, the only difference consisting of the insertion of a provision that where a vacancy occurs in one grade, additional appointments may be made in the lower grades, provided the number of Assistants and the total amount of salaries be not increased. This seems to be a very

practical remedy for one of the greatest difficulties in connection with our salary schedule. Under the present system if a vacancy occurs it is necessary for me to either fill it by appointment or to make promotions from the lower grades, or to apply for a revision of the salary schedule. Under the plan suggested by the Chairman of the Committee on Salaries I will be saved the necessity of these frequent applications to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, and when vacancies occur will be able to make appointments and promotions among the lower grades, provided I do not increase the number of Assistants or the total amount of their salaries.

I will be very pleased if your Board would, at your earliest convenience, adopt this resolution in place of the one already passed.

Dear Sir—The Bureau of Water Register, Borough of Manhattan, has secured additional quarters in this building by the removal of the Engineer's Bureau to the ninth floor, which change was authorized by the Sinking Fund Commission.

The records kept by the Water Register contain the items and charges of liens against properties in this borough, and if they were destroyed by fire or other causes it would take many years to duplicate them and the City, without underestimating the value of these records would, in my opinion, lose thousands, and perhaps millions of dollars as the exact amount of revenue derived from the sale of water could not be ascertained, and it is to guard against this danger that I believe the records should be secured. The books are at present stored on wooden shelves and in cabinets and are open to these dangers and, while they thus far escaped injury, the possibility of loss is always present. of loss is always present.

of loss is always present.

I believe it is the duty of the City to preserve its records, especially these books, which contain items of the revenue and this can be accomplished by equipping the entire office with a complete system of steel filing desks and cabinets, which are now used generally by large corporations and mercantile houses for the storage of their valuable papers. To equip the Water Register's Bureau with this system of steel cabinets and desks would cost \$17,000.

In addition to this expense it will be necessary to remove several partitions, giving free access from one room to another, and this work is done through the owners of the building, who will not permit any outside contractors to alter the rooms. It necessarily follows that the department is compelled to issue the order for this work direct to the owners. This work will cost \$200. The department will also require \$300 for taking down and removing all the old wooden desks and cabinets, making a total expense of \$17,500.

This money I would respectfully ask that your Board provide for by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, and you will kindly present this communication for the consideration of the Board of Aldermen at its next meeting.

Dear Sir—The department finds it necessary, in order to carry out the recommendations made by a special committee of the New York Fire Insurance Exchange and of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, who have given their special attention to the installation of the high-pressure fire service system in the Borough of Manhattan, to procure 230 hydrants more than contracted for, to be used in this service.

There is being manufactured under contract, by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company, 1,050 four-nozzle hydrants and 40 two-nozzle dock hydrants. The contract for the furnishing of these hydrants was awarded some time before the receipt of the recommendations of the Fire Underwriters to place additional ones along the line

for the furnishing of these hydrants was awarded some time before the receipt of the recommendations of the Fire Underwriters to place additional ones along the line of this improved fire-fighting system. This hydrant of a special design and pattern was selected after a very thorough test, which placed upon the City quite an expense to conduct. The sample hydrants submitted by the several manufacturers were subjected to a very severe test, the City employing the fireboats to pump against said hydrants, in order to determine if they could withstand the pressure called for in the specifications which were drawn with a view of obtaining the best hydrant.

The A. P. Smith hydrant was the one selected. The engineers who conducted the test in the presence of the then Commissioner of this Department and the representatives of the several bidders, certified that the Smith hydrant was the only one

sentatives of the several bidders, certified that the Smith hydrant was the only one

sentatives of the several bidders, certified that the Smith hydrant was the only one that conformed to the requirements of this department, and the contract for same was subsequently awarded. A few of the bidders contested the award of this contract, but the courts sustained the department in the selection of the hydrant made by the A. P. Smith Company.

The bid price for these hydrants was \$100.70 each. It is agreeable to the manufacturers to construct and furnish 230 additional hydrants at an increased cost of \$16.65 each over the contract price. This advance is accounted for by the increase in labor and materials since the letting of the contract in 1905. The total cost of the extra hydrants will be \$26,990.50, and the department desires to obtain same, with the approval of your Board, without the necessity of advertising for competitive bids and proposals, thereby saving considerable time and a large amount of expense which would necessarily follow the employment of the same forces and help which the department was obliged to secure in making the selection of this special hydrant,

The details of this appropriation are set forth in the annexed report of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and President Bermel appeared before the Committee and urged its adoption. The committee has held several hearings upon these resolutions at which, besides committees representing the Bath Attendants, Alderman Leverett has appeared and earnestly urged the adoption of same. This committee has frequently gone on record in advocating an investigation and proper adjustment of the wages of laborers and other per diem men, and it still holds firmly to this position. About two months ago it reported favorably upon a raise of salary for the laborers in the sewer departments, and this Board adopted its recommendations. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, however, upon that matter refused to concur in the Aldermen's recommendation, stating its position to be that it was opposed to the borrowing of money by Special Revenue Bonds for raises of salary which were not provided for by the Budget, and which did not involve any emergency. The committee has, within the past week, consulted with the Comptroller upon this present proposition and he stated that so far as he was concerned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would adhere to the position it took in the other matter, and would continue to do so, as he believes that any of these requests should be laid before the Commissioners of the De-

partments involved, and if the Commissioner favors same he can request action in the estimates which are now being made up for the 1908 Budget. Inasmuch as this is the settled policy of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the committee believes that it would be trifling with the Bath Attendants for this Board to adopt a resolution of this character, and it therefore recommends that these resolutions be placed on file, and copies of same go with this report to the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and

Brooklyn.

Dear Sir—Last year, when preparing my Budget for the year 1907, I did not make any provision for an increased amount for rent nor for the reorganization and equipment of the offices in the Manhattan division, for the reason that there was no space available in the building, and I had been informed that there was not likely to be any. Although the Department was then and still is seriously inconvenienced for lack of room, the employees being so crowded in some divisions of the office as to be within a few inches of each other, I did not deem it advisable to provide additional space in a separate building, for the reason that it would be very difficult to do so and conduct the business of the Department to advantage.

the business of the Department to advantage.

Within a short time an opportunity occurred to take over the lease of a tenant in the building, who occupied part of the floor directly beneath our offices. His lease ran concurrently with that of the Department, and the price per foot for the floor space was so much below that demanded in this neighborhood that I immediately referred the matter to the Sinking Fund Commission and they have since closed with the lessee and the owners of the building. The said space is now available for use, and in order to properly arrange for its use it will be necessary to connect the two floors within the office, to construct considerable partition work and rearrange all the partition work of the old office, besides making changes in the lighting system.

Estimates have been procured from several persons with the idea of getting an approximate figure as to the cost of these changes, and these estimates show that the work will aggregate in cost about five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

As I have already stated, I did not anticipate this need and have made no provision to meet such an expense, and I am therefore obliged to apply, in accordance with the requirements of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, to your Honorable Body for the authority to provide for the payment of the proposed expenses hereinbefore set forth. As the City is now chargeable with the rent of said premises, you will realize the necessity for facilitating this matter, in order that we may get the repairs done and receive the benefit of the additional space at as early a date as possible.

If any such dog is not claimed within three days a notice shall be published in the City Record for one day requiring the owner to appear and remove such dog, and thereafter if not removed any such dog shall be destroyed and disposed of.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER LOOMIS.

Hon. WILLIAM J. BOYHAN, Superintendent of Sewers:

April 12, 1907.

Dear Sir-In compliance with instructions, I hand you herewith a report of the work done and in course of construction under my supervision for the quarter ending March 31, 1907, with a statement of work done by mechanics and laborers:

The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,715,273 linear feet, or 514.25 miles, with 6,207 receiving basins, making the amount completed of new sewer during the quarter, 2,568 linear feet and four receiving basins.

The following sewers have been completed during the quarter:

Sewer in West One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between St. Nicholas avenue and Broadway

Sewer in West Two Hundred and Thirteenth street, between the Harlem river and

The work in this Bureau has been prosecuted as expeditiously as possible during the past season, but it has been attended with many difficulties. The severe weather of the past three months has prevented earth excavation to any great extent and materials taken from trenches and piled on the sides for the purpose of back-filling have been frozen so that they could not be used for the purpose at the time when have been frozen so that they could not be used for the purpose at the time when needed. Nevertheless, there have been six sewer contracts completed, all of which were in the northern part of the City. This section is now in a fair way to have sewers in every street and avenue, where needed, completed within a short time. A glance at the foregoing lists of works advertised for and contemplated will show that there is considerable reconstruction of all sewers to be done in various parts of the City. All the necessary reconstructions in the marginal street on the west side, known as the "Chelsea Improvement," are now ready to be contracted for and it is expected that the work will be finished during the coming season. There is also considerable of the same class of work, which will be put under contract during the present season, along the water front of the East river.

The most serious problem which confronts the Department regarding the existing system are the many changes and alterations which are proposed by the Rapid Transit Commission and other corporations building railroads underneath the public

A careful study of this question is likely to show that the piecemeal construction by these corporations will involve so much confusion that in the end the entire reconstruction of the sewer system in the lower part of the City will be necessary. Such a proposition has been given some consideration, but it does not appear at the present time that any funds will be available for such a purpose, and the only thing that is possible will be such studies of the situation as will lead to adoption some time in the future of a proper plan. in the future of a proper plan.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, New York, May 31, 1907.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In accordance with instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1907:

Criminal Courts Building.

The usual orders for Janitor's and Engineer's supplies, also ice, were issued. The following articles of furniture were supplied for use in the Clerk's office, Court of General Sessions: Ten quartered oak chairs, one quartered oak 8-foot table, one quartered oak revolving chair and one rolltop desk refinished; also one flat top desk, one table, one couch and one costumer refinished. One quartered oak screen, as selected, and twelve morocco and S. A. hair seat cushions were furnished for use in the new Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court. One leather couch, one library table and one Wilton rug 12 feet 9 inches by 18 feet 9 inches, as selected, were furnished to the Coroners' office. One mahogany Davenport in morocco, one mahogany arm chair in morocco, one morocco pillow, one mahogany revolving chair and one nished to the Coroners' office. One mahogany Davenport in morocco, one mahogany arm chair in morocco, one morocco pillow, one mahogany revolving chair and one French plate glass top for desk were furnished for use in Recorder McAvoy's Chambers. One No. 255½ chair, six No. 31 chairs, one No. 55½ wardrobe were furnished from State's Prison for the use of Assistant District Attorney Ely. Orders were issued, as usual, for the care and maintenance of the plumbing, steam and gas fitting systems in the above building. All the labor and material required to clean off, prepare and paint the walls of the Coroners' Court with four coats of oil paint, and painting, graining and varnishing all the woodwork was performed, and the radiators bronzed. About five yards of Wilton velvet carpet with two rubber ends, two rugs, 3 by 6, and two Wilton velvet rugs 36 by 63 were furnished and laid as directed. Pump No. 2 in the engine room of the above building was thoroughly overhauled and repaired, the defective parts removed and new parts furnished and placed in same. The usual yearly order for the maintenance of the electric clocks in the above building was issued. An extra order was issued for removing switch in engine room behind

The usual yearly order for the maintenance of the electric clocks in the above building was issued. An extra order was issued for removing switch in engine room behind switchboard, the wires lengthened and the switchboard re-erected, under the direction of the Supervising Engineer assigned to this work by the Borough President.

The walls and ceilings were cleaned off, prepared and painted and the woodwork varnished in the prison pen and hallways leading from pen to Parts 1 and 2, Court of General Sessions. Four coats of oil paint were applied, also the walls and ceilings in women's detention pen, private stairs and entrance to Clerk's office, General Sessions, private toilet and hall of General Sessions Clerk's office were cleaned off, prepared and painted with four coats of oil paint. The iron bars and railing received a coat of aluminum paint. The masonry work on the interior of one of the boilers in the above building was renewed after all of the defective portion was taken out. The cement flooring over doorway on the Centre street side of building and the stone work around the flooring was thoroughly repaired and left in good order. the flooring was thoroughly repaired and left in good order.

One new Wilton rug, 20 by 15 feet 9 inches, and one 20 feet 9 inches by 12 feet 9 inches, were furnished in the same office, also two oak revolving chairs, six oak arm chairs, four mahogany arm chairs, one leather couch with mahogany frame one three-fold screen one mahogany was desired and the same of the same of

onk revolving chairs, six oak arm chairs, four mahogany arm chairs, one leather couch with mahogany frame, one three-fold screen, one mahogany wardrobe and one mahogany bookcase; also one French plate glass top for desk.

Labor and material were furnished to clean off and varnish all the hard wood in the record rooms of the Clerk's office, Court of General Sessions, and to paint, grain and varnish sashes to imitate the hardwood as directed, and the job completed in a workmanlike manner. The plastering was also repaired and the side walls painted; also the balcony; cases gilded and railing around balcony and radiators bronzed in the Chief Clerk's office of the Court of General Sessions. The old ornamental bar railing in the Chief Clerk's office of the Court of General Sessions was taken down, and new work made to match the old; also special ornamental scroll arch about 2 by 3 feet high installed. One plate glass was furnished to fit on counter. One library table was furnished for use of Judge Rosalsky, and one quartered oak directors' table. The furniture in the above office was also refinished as directed, also in the Court of Special Sessions, and two French plate glass tops for desks furnished. Two rugs as selected were furnished to use in the Chief Clerk's office, Special Sessions.

Labor and material were furnished to fit on counter. One library table was furnished and set on windows as directed. Engineer's supplies as required were furnished and ordered. Labor and material were furnished to remove the 3-inch brass steam coil in hot water boiler and save replaced with new 3-inch extra heavy brass pipe steam coil, properly constructed so as to leave same in good working order. Steam coils were installed on both floors, and air valves placed on same as directed, also all new parts as required.

County Court House.

The necessary janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished, as usual; also supply of mineral water for use of the Judges, toilet paper for the building, and an order issued for the remainder of the year for a supply of twenty-five hand towels daily, except Sundays and holidays, for use of the Supreme Court Judges. Necessary labor, trucks, teams, etc., were supplied to remove all of the desks, partitions, doors, chairs and office furniture of every description from the cellar of the above building to the Rivington street corporation yard for storage; also all accumulations of dirt and rubbish removed from the cellar and the same left broom clean, as directed by the Justice of the Supreme Court supervising the alteration work. Labor and material were also furnished to install one fifty-section three-column steam circular radiator, 38 inches high; one fifteen-section three-column steam radiator, 19 inches high; four six-section three-column steam radiators, 19 inches high, in the Judge's chambers on the first floor and kitchen, all valves and connections for same, and marble radiator tops being furnished. Four jury boxes were constructed in Parts 6, 7, chambers on the first floor and kitchen, all valves and connections for same, and marble radiator tops being furnished. Four jury boxes were constructed in Parts 6, 7, 16 and 17, and railing erected around jury boxes in Parts 6 and 17, as directed. The walls and ceilings of Part III., Special Term, corridors, second floor, three rooms on the first floor, known as Power forms of the parts of t walls and ceilings of Part III., Special Term, corridors, second floor, three rooms on the first floor, known as Room 5, formerly occupied by the Surrogate, were cleaned off, prepared and painted, and the woodwork varnished as directed, and in Part IV., Special Term, the anteroom, hall closet and outside of Parts 3 and 6, Trial Term, anteroom Part 12, and on the mezzanine floor, jury room, hall closet outside Part 3. The ceilings, walls and woodwork in the Judges' dining room, kitchen and pantry were cleaned off, prepared and painted with four coats of paint, color as directed. The radiators bronzed, picture moulding furnished and set around dining room walls as directed, and the job was completed in a first-class and workmanlike manner, and performed at such times as not to interfere with the business of the building. New feeder was installed in Part 1, Clerk's room; seven outlets in Clerk's room, Part 3, Special Term; receptacle on Judge's bench, and feeder changed from old meter board to new switchboard, as directed, in the Supreme Court. One Remington typewriter and desk, as selected, were furnished for use in Justice Hendrick's chambers; one No. 7 Remington typewriter, desk and chair for same, furnished for use in Justice Ford's chambers; one No. 7 Blickensderfer writing machine, with vertical script type, in Justice Goff's chambers; one Underwood typewriter, with desk and chair as selected, for use of Justice Guy, and one Underwood typewriter, with desk and chair as selected, for use in Justice Seabury's chambers. Ten telephone brackets and holders for telephone directories were installed in the new chambers of the Supreme Court Justices. Two gross of huck towels were furnished; three wall clocks, as selected; two screens, six enameled steel cuspidors and seven six-gallon oak coolers and stands furnished. One No. 591-A steel, heavy w and valves removed, and radiators repaired throughout the building. New steam trap was installed in the cellar, and the main steam pipes over boiler replaced, and all steam fittings necessary to place the plant in a serviceable condition were furnished.

The windows were corked up as directed in the Judge's private chambers; 10 oak flat top desks and 10 revolving chairs, together with 4 typewriter chairs and 10 revolving chairs for and 10 revolving chairs, together with 4 typewriter chairs and 10 revolving chairs for use of Judges and Secretaries were furnished and installed.

The new chambers created for the use of the Justices of the Supreme Court on the ground floor of the above building were equipped with all necessary furnishing to equip the same, including carpets, curtains, office furniture, couches, desks, etc. This work was necessary in order to provide chambers for all of the Justices recently elected, and a considerable sum of money was spent in furnishings and equipment in

Orders were issued for the usual supply of mineral water, ice, toilet paper, clean otwels weekly, etc. Labor and material were furnished to do all the plain plastering in the three Governor's rooms; defective lath was renailed and replaced, and all necessary patching in the small rooms was done as directed. Pictures were removed from the Governor's room and placed in temporary storage as directed. All the necessary wiring for thirty-one new fixtures was performed as set forth in the Architects' plans; five additional panci boards put in, all switches in the Governor's rooms changed, and all other wiring done in a first-class manner, and approved by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Labor and material were also furnished to do all the electric wiring and other work to place the fans in above building in perfect working order. Telltale pipes for three tanks on the top floor extending to sink in engine room were installed, also new sink in engine room to receive piping, all valves, piping, etc., furnished as required.

One Remington typewriter as selected, in exchange for an old one, was furnished for use in the City Clerk's office. Wire mesh railing with cash openings, nickel plated sgins, etc., was furnished and erected in the same office as directed. Two dark oak telephone booths were furnished for use in room 9, also one roll top "A" cabinet for Remington typewriter, and about 65 yards of inlaid linoleum were furnished and laid as directed. One No. 255½ chair was supplied for use in the Mayor's office, also one mahogany roll top desk, and one mahogany revolving chair as selected. One No. 6 Remington typewriter was furnished for use in the Bureau of Weights and Measures. Yearly orders were issued for telephone switchboard, trunk lines, etc., in all of the Bureaus, Baths, Public Buildings and other locations under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough President's automobile. Necessary repairs were made to one Remington typewriter in the Borough President's office, also o

Harlem Court House.

Elevator door latch springs were renewed; new check valves furnished and installed in air line of tank, and bottom idlers on the elevator secured as directed. New hot water heater with brass coil was installed, together with all parts for same, and defective heater removed. Labor and material was furnished to do all of the carpentering, etc., required to repair the windows throughout the building, and replace broken panes of glass as directed.

tion. Labor and material were furnished to install panel boards and wiring for the electric light system in the Long Acre square comfort station, the wiring being installed in waterproof conduits. Labor and material were furnished to clean piping, all necessary renewals made and steam plants properly regulated in all of the comfort stations under the care of this bureau.

Chambers Street Court House (City Court)—One No. 6 Remington typewriter as selected was furnished for use of Judge Erlanger, together with rolltop desk for same. One rug, 12 by 10, was furnished for Judge Greene's office; also complete bookcase as selected furnished and installed.

Brownstone Building—The elevators were thoroughly overhauled as directed, and left in good operating condition. The walls and ceilings in the rooms occupied by Justice Hascall were cleaned off and painted, woodwork grained and varnished, and plastering repaired where required and ordered. One new radiator was furnished and installed in Part IV., with all piping and connections required to complete same. Four wardrobes as selected were furnished. Six circular thermometers were installed in the above building as directed. Three dozen No. 85 ash cans were delivered to the storeroom in this building for distribution to the various public buildings in care of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Bureau of Buildings—Four window ventilators were furnished and installed in

Bureau of Buildings—Four window ventilators were furnished and installed in the above Bureau and distributed as directed. One steel filing cabinet made in accordance with blue print was also furnished, and one roll top desk made to order. An electric time clock was furnished and installed, and also small supplies for Bureau automobile. Five dozen roller towels were supplied for use in the Bureau.

Bureau of Highways—One oak cabinet made to order was furnished, also filing case made in accordance with blue print; one high desk and revolving chair for same; one No. 457 chair, two No. 255½ revolving chairs, one No. 55 wardrobe; two dozen No. 453 chairs, and one No. 5 Underwood typewriter were furnished.

Hall of Records Building.

All the trucks, horses, rigging, laborers, etc., required for the removal of the several departments who now occupy the Hall of Records building, from their old quarters were furnished. All of the records, documents, paper, etc., were properly tabulated and filed away. Twenty-two rugs of various dimensions were furnished for the Surrogates' Court and offices. One carpet runner to feet long, 36 inches wide, and officient linelarm to court a room of the surrogate of carpet runner to feet long. and sufficient linoleum to cover a room 15 by 20, and about 100 yards of carpet runner 36 inches wide; also forty-eight cocoa mats were furnished for the Court. Four rugs of different sizes, one mirror, with mahogany frame and shelf made to order; 16 yards of Wilton velvet carpet for runners, four rubber ends for same; one window screen to order; one mahogany flat top desk 55 inches; one mahogany table 3-0, one Wilton rug 16 feet 6 inches by 10 feet 6 inches; one mahogany screen 4-fold; one mahogany revolving chair, one leather couch to order, four mahogany rug chairs two mahogany roll top typewriter desks one glass top for flat top desk arm chairs, two mahogany roll top typewriter desks, one glass top for flat top desk, one fancy brush mat and other small supplies were furnished.

For the Register's office the following articles were furnished: Three dozen enam-

For the Register's office the following articles were furnished: Three dozen enameled cuspidors, three dozen waste paper baskets and other articles of a small nature. Additional telephone service was furnished for the Corporation Counsel's office, connecting the old offices at No. 2 Tyron row; four wardrobes were furnished for use of the engineers in the building. The following plumbing work was performed: The leaks in the main steam flange in the boiler and engine room, also in the pump room were repaired; the main steam valves at Nos. I and 2 boilers were repacked as directed; repairs were made to the fish traps, new strainers installed to same, drip connection and shut-off valves installed on Croton supply in the northeast and south side of basement. Hose nipples for street washer boxes put in faucets, and leaks at valves repaired, also leaks at basin traps put in order and toilet fixtures throughout building regulated, and about 120 basins had the marble work pointed up with white lead and shellac. A 2-inch gas main, with running line with all openings for fixtures lead and shellac. A 2-inch gas main, with running line with all openings for fixtures installed, and each opening fitted with two-light gas pendants. A new sink of approved design was installed in Room 1, in the cellar of above building, with all piping, con-

design was installed in Room 1, in the cellar of above building, with all piping, connections, etc., required. A compression faucet was provided in connection with this work, and four new cesspool drains installed, and the same connected with sump; also the cesspools and drains in the boiler room cleared of obstructions.

Double action eccentric motion shaking grates complete ready for firing were installed under two of the boilers in the above building. The grates were made of heavy pattern material 7¼ feet wide and 6 feet deep, in which all kinds of coal could be used, giving a 40 per cent. air space and perfect combustion. The valve gear on the Corliss engine was repaired and left in good condition. A supply of incandescent lamps was also furnished for use in the building. About 35 feet of wood partition 8 feet high was furnished and erected in Room 5; two panels were furnished and installed in Room 2; the elevator gates repaired throughout the building, and rubber buffers installed where required. The door locks and door frames were thoroughly repaired so the same were left in perfect condition. The governor ropes on elevators repaired so the same were left in perfect condition. The governor ropes on elevators repaired, the automatic cut-offs adjusted, pistons repacked, the operating valves repacked and the lifting cables shortened. A testing set was furnished for use of the Bureau's Electrician. About fifty signs of a selected design were furnished and installed throughout the building. Six rugs were furnished for the record room, also two brush mats; eighteen yards of Wilton velvet carpet for runners were furnished and laid, and one fancy brush mat; two mahogany roll top desks and one plate glass for flat top desk in the Armory Board. Three Wilton velvet rugs 4 feet 6 inches by 7 feet, 4 feet 6 inches by 6 feet, and 16 feet by 9 feet. 39½ yards of inlaid linoleum

were furnished and cemented to floor in Room 5. An additional switch was installed to control two chandeliers in Room 5 in the basement, and alterations made in the wiring in Room 16 and Surrogates' Court. Lights on desks in Rooms 1, 4 and 34 of the Corporation Counsel's office were removed, and all changes made in the directories of panel board so as to correspond with changes made in the wiring of the building. The push button system was wired so as to ring in Room 129; the desk light in Room 4 moved, and all the wiring for telephone in Room 19 put in Electrical cables were installed in the elevators, and telephone wires provided on the interior of the building, and electric lighting of desks of the record room in the basement provided for. One typewriter desk for Room 129, with marble base and electric wiring for same was furnished; wooden base taken off and locks changed in this room to permit the use of a master key. A movable platform was installed under the witness chair in both courtrooms; two desks moved in Room No. 7, the Clerk's desks in both rooms disconnected, and several other desks moved to meet the requirements of the office. Necessary supplies for Janitor and Engineer, such as tools, oils, packing, cleaning supplies, etc., were furnished from time to time, and repairs made to the roofs at stands Nos. 3 to 31 Loew avenue, and Nos. 4 to 24 Loew avenue; Nos. 16 to 20 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 13 to 23 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 17 to 25 Thompson avenue; Nos. 16 to 36 Bloomfield street. The gutters were repaired on the south side of Grace avenue, between Lawton and Thirteenth avenues. Repairs were made to the gutters at stands Nos. 32, 34 and 35 Lawton avenue; Nos. 28, 30 and 32 Hewitt avenue, all of which were damaged by fire. The new work was painted with metallic roof paint. It was necessary, owing to fire which destroyed one of the buildings, to tear out all of the dangerous parts of the building burned, and clean up all the dirt and rubbish caused therefrom.

Jefferson Market, Washington, Gansevoort, Tompkins and Fulton—These markets were maintained and cleaned as usual, and small supplies furnished as required.

County Jail—Janitor's supplies were furnished as required, and about thirty 2-inch new boiler tubes, 7 feet long, that were burned out, were installed. A new gasket put in on hand hole boiler, and the boiler left in complete working order.

Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works—Telephone service was furnished as usual for the use of the Commissioner. About fifty yards of plain linoleum were furnished and laid in rooms 1801 and 1802, also one metal filing case for use of the general office. A supply of ice was delivered to the various bureaus connected with A supply of ice was delivered to the various bureaus connected with

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices—Janitor's and Engineer's supplies for cleaning were furnished and delivered from the store room to the various public buildcleaning were furnished and delivered from the store room to the various public buildings and offices as required. The order for the use of horse, wagon and driver for the Superintendent was renewed each month. The windows on the various public buildings were cleaned as usual under contract. The following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating, ice, brooms, pails, soap, soap powder, waste paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc. Among the many items of repair made to the various courts and offices not hereinbefore mentioned, were plumbing, steam fitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, repairs to safes, repairs to machinery, elevators and office furniture. The work mentioned was done on the monthly orders as required. For the use of the mechanics in the employ of the Bureau supplies of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
