Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, February 1, 1918.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Dowling, President, Borough of Manhattan; Edward Riegelmann, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Henry Bruckner, President, Borough of The Bronx; Maurice E. Connolly, President, Borough of Queens; and Calvin D. Van Name, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. John F. Hylan, presided.

Approval of Minutes (Cal. No. 1).

The Minutes of meeting held January 18, 1918, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD, January 26, 1918.

PUBLIC HEARINGS.

On Franchises.

Rapid Transit Railway—Modification of Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue Route (Cal. No. 2).

Consideration of the communication from the Public Service Commission for the First District, transmitting, for approval, resolutions adopted by said Commission, modifying and amending the route and general plan of construction of the Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue Route, Borough of The Bronx, so as to provide for a subsurface passageway connecting the Hunts Point Road station of the Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue Route with the Hunts Point Road station of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company.

(This communication was presented to the Board at the meeting of December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 183), when, by resolution duly adopted, December 28, 1917, was fixed as the date for consideration and the matter was referred to the Committee on Transit and the Comptroller.)

(At the meeting of December 28, 1917 (Cal. No. 2), the consideration was continued until January 18, 1918, and on that day (Cal. No. 4) was continued until this day and the matter referred to the Committee on Franchises.)

An affidavit of publication of the notice of continued consideration was received from the CITY RECORD.

No one appeared in opposition to or in favor of the proposed route.

The consideration was continued until February 15, 1918.

Committee on Salaries and Grades.

The Mayoralty—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 3).

(On January 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 27-L), this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 11, 1918, from the Secretary to His Honor, the Mayor, requesting modification of schedule effective of February 1, 1918; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

January 19, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 11, 1918, the Secretary to His Honor, the Mayor, requested modification of the salary schedule for The Mayoralty for 1918. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 27 (L), Calendar of January 15, 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—In No. 61 it is proposed to reduce the rate for the position of Secretary to the Mayor from \$6,500 to \$5,000, scheduling \$1,500 in Balance Unassigned. This change to be effective as of February 1, 1918.

"Result of Investigation—The request is made in order that the schedule line amount may agree with the salary of the incumbent.

President, Board of Aldermen—Establishment of Additional Grades of Positions (Cal. No. 4).

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 123-A), the request of the President of the Board of Aldermen for the modification of salary schedule was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 21, 1918, from the President, Board of Aldermen, requesting modification of schedule for 1918; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

January 29, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 21, 1918, the President of the Board of Aldermen requested the establishment, pursuant to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of three positions. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 123a, Calendar of January 25, 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—To establish positions of Examiner at \$3,000, Secretary

to the President at \$1,620 and Legislative Clerk at \$2,400 per annum for one incumbent each.

"Result of Investigation—It is proposed to change the title of the Secretary to the President at \$3,000 to Examiner at \$3,000 per annum, Stenographer at \$1,620 to Secretary to the President at \$1,620 per annum and Legislative Secretary at \$2,400 to Legislative Clerk at \$2,400 per annum. These changes are requested in order that the titles of the positions may conform more closely to the work to be performed.

"Respectfully, EDWARD FEENEY, Acting Assistant Director."

Recommendation—In view of the above report, the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends the adoption of the attached resolution requesting the Board of Aldermen to establish the positions.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment (Bureau of Contract Supervision)—Authority to Fill Vacancy (Cal. No. 5).

(On January 18, 1918 (Cal. No. 76-C), the request herein was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 14, 1918, from the Director, Bureau of Contract Supervision, requesting authority to fill a vacancy in the position of Chemist at \$1,620 per annum by promotion of John A. Powders, now employed as Fuel Engineering Chemist at \$1,500 per annum; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending denial thereof:

January 23, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 14, 1918, the Director of the Bureau of Contract Supervision requested authority, as provided in paragraph second (c) of the terms and conditions of the 1918 budget, to fill a vacancy. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 76 (c), Calendar of January 18, 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Vacancy—In Code 24, Engineering Chemist at \$1,620, by promotion of John A. Powders, now employed as Fuel Engineering Chemist, at \$1,500 per annum.

"The work to be performed is the analysis of ferrous and non-ferrous alloys and metals, steel, iron, paint, pigments, chemicals, etc. Mr. Powders is also at times assigned to other classes of analytical work performed at the Laboratory with the exception of drug work.

"Result of Investigation—Mr. Powders was appointed in the City service on February 1, 1908, at \$900, as Laboratory Assistant in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. On January 1, 1911, he was appointed as Chemist, \$1,200, and increased on January 1, 1915, to \$1,350. On December 31, 1915, the position was abolished. On May 1, 1916, he was reappointed in the Central Testing Laboratory of the Bureau of Contract Supervision at \$1,350 and on November 16, 1917, he was increased to \$1,500. For similar grade of work performed in the City Service the rate of compensation provided in the budget for 1918 is from \$1,500 to \$2,100.

Recommendation in view of the above facts, the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends the adoption of the attached resolution, denying the request.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond—15.

Law Department—Establishment of Additional Grade of Position (Cal. No. 6).

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 84), the request herein was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 22, 1918, from the Corporation Counsel, requesting establishment of the grade of position of Secretary to the Corporation Counsel at \$4,000 per annum for one incumbent; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

January 29, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 22, 1918, the CORPORATION COUNSEL requested authority, as provided in paragraph second (c) of the terms and conditions of the 1918 Budget, to fill a vacancy and establish a rate of salary therefor under the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 84, Calendar of January 25, 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Vacancy—Secretary to the Corporation Counsel at a salary of \$4,680.

"Result of Investigation—Mr. Stuart F. Crawford has resigned his position as Secretary to the Corporation Counsel, the place carrying with it a salary of \$4,680. The Corporation Counsel states that he wishes to fill it at the rate of \$4,000 per annum, and requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of this salary, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, in order that payment may be authorized at the decreased rate. The Corporation Counsel has selected as the new incumbent of the position of Mr. Joseph H. Johnston, who has been in charge of the correspondence of the entire Law Department for many years. Mr. Johnston has been employed in the department as a Civil Service employee in the competitive class since 1902. The position of Secretary is in the exempt class and is a necessary one.

"The duties of the position of Secretary to the Corporation Counsel comprehend the making of investigations and confidential reports of matters pertaining to the Law Department, acting as an executive assistant, assigning the office correspondence, arranging for interviews with the Corporation Counsel and interviewing generally the public who may have matters to submit to the Corporation Counsel. A salary of \$4,000 per annum is not in excess of the compensation provided for similar positions in the 1918 Budget. No increase in appropriation for the Law Department is involved by reason of the request.

"Respectfully, EDWARD FEENEY, Acting Assistant Director."

Action by Committee—In view of the report of the Bureau of Personal Service, the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends the adoption of the attached resolution recommending to the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, the establishment of the grade of position of Secretary to the Corporation Counsel at \$4,000 per annum for one incumbent.

Department of Taxes and Assessments—Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 7).

(On January 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 27-0), the request herein was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 14, 1918, from the Secretary, Department of Taxes and Assessments, requesting modification of schedules; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

January 19, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 14, 1918, the Department of Taxes and Assessments requested modification of salary schedules Nos. 150 and 151 for the year 1918. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 27 (o), Calendar of January 15, 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action (1)—In No. 150 it is proposed to add a position of Secretary to the President, at \$1,700 per annum, and to reduce a position of Assistant Tax Commissioner from \$5,000 to \$2,500 per annum, placing \$800 in balance unassigned.

"Result of Investigation (1)—To provide funds for the Salary of Secretary to the President, which position is requested by the department, so that the President may be relieved of routine work and aided in his general duties by a confidential employee, to whom such matters will be referred. The position is established.

"Proposed Action (2)—In No. 151 it is proposed to reduce a position of Deputy Tax Commissioner from \$3,250 to \$2,400 per annum, and to substitute a position of Clerk at \$1,440 per annum, for two positions of Clerk at \$840 and \$600 per annum, placing \$850 in balance unassigned.

"Result of Investigation (2)—Mr. Van Tine, Deputy Tax Commissioner, at \$2,400 per annum, was, upon order of the Supreme Court, reinstated on November 9, 1917. The Budget for 1918 had already been approved, and it is necessary to add this position in the 1918 schedule. The funds are provided by dropping a position of Deputy Tax Commissioner at \$3,250 per annum, as it has become vacant by the death of the incumbent. The modification in the positions of Clerk is requested to meet payroll conditions which developed after the adoption of the 1918 Budget. This schedule was modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the meeting of December 7, 1917. On April 1, 1917, a Clerk at \$1,350 was dropped on account of illness. The position was filled on July 1, 1917, by appointment of a Clerk at \$840 per annum. It later developed that the employee's illness was not incurable and he was discharged as cured. He was reinstated on October 1, 1917, and the schedule was modified at meeting of December 7, 1917. No provision was made for this Clerk in the Budget of 1918, and it is probable he would have been advanced to \$1,440 per annum had he been in the employ of the department when the budget was prepared.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 8, 1918, the President of the Borough of The Bronx requested modification of three schedules in his office. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 27-B, Calendar of January 15, 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action (1)—In Code 437 to change line 'Foreman at \$1,200' to 'Assistant Foreman at \$1,140,' and to change line 'Custodian at \$1,080' to 'Attendant at \$1,020.' In Code 462 to change line 'Assistant Engineer at \$2,040' to 'Structural Steel Draftsman' at same rate.

"Result of Investigation—These changes are requested in order that these three employees may be paid their present salaries under their present titles, as they are not eligible without Civil Service examinations to the positions provided in the Budget.

"Proposed Action (2)—In Code 469 to change line 'Foreman at \$4 per day' to read 'Foreman at \$5 per day (303 days), Foreman at \$4 per day (902½ days), Assistant Foreman at \$3.50 per day (250 days).'

"Result of Investigation—The foreman requested at \$5 per day received this rate in 1917, but was provided for in the budget at \$1,500 at the request of the Department. The President wishes to continue this employee on a per diem basis. The \$1,500 per annum position is vacant. The Assistant Foreman is to be provided for at his old rate, as he is not eligible to position of Foreman until he qualifies through Civil Service examination.

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 11, 1918, from the Curator, College of the City of New York, requesting permission to fill a vacancy in the position of Clerk at \$1,200 in said College, caused by the absence of a Clerk on war service; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

January 25, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 11, 1918, the Curator of the College of the City of New York requested authority, as provided in paragraph second (c) of the terms and conditions of the budget, to appoint a substitute. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 28 (g), Calendar of January 15. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Vacancy—Clerk, at \$1,200 per annum in Code 1027, caused by the absence of John F. Higgins on war service, to be filled by transfer from Department of Docks and Ferries of Miss Mary E. Kelly, Clerk, as a substitute. Her present salary is \$900.

"The duties of the position are to act as secretary to the Director of the Department of Hygiene, disposing of correspondence, medical reports and memoranda, taking notes of and transcribing results of medical examinations of students and filing correspondence and medical reports.

"Result of Investigation—The position is necessary. A temporary stenographer is now employed doing this work, but she will be dropped when this transfer is made. There are between twenty and forty medical examinations made daily and a large amount of correspondence to be handled. Mr. Higgins' Federal compensation is in excess of that which he received from the City. Miss Kelly has been in the service twelve years and received her last increase of \$300 in 1907. The Director of the department states that it is very urgent that this position be filled, as there is a large amount of work to be done in connection with the medical examination of new students who enter City College and Townsend Harris School at the beginning of the new term on February 1, 1918. In other City departments the compensation for similar work ranges from \$60 to \$1,200.

The Secretary presented communications dated January 3, 1918, from the Commissioner of Public Charities, requesting establishment of additional positions; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

January 19, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 3, 1918, the COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC CHARITIES requested the establishment of additional positions in the power plant at Randall's Island. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 92 (3), Calendar of January 11. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—To allow the following additional force:

Engineers, 2 at \$5 per day, 180 days..... \$1,800 00

Firemen, 4 at \$3.50 per day, 180 days..... 2,520 00

"Result of Investigation—It is intended to continue the operation of the old power plant, pending the installation of a conduit or tunnel connecting all buildings on the Island with the main power plant. It is estimated that this work cannot be completed in less than six months, as the question has not yet been definitely settled as to whether a conduit or a tunnel is to be constructed.

"To continue the operation of the old plant for six months would require 540 days each for Engineers and Firemen. There is also required a Fireman for 365 days for the operation of the ice plant. Provision must also be made for vacation relief for the regular force of 3 Engineers and 7 Firemen. The total

additional time required, as shown in the following tabulation, is 217 days for Engineers, instead of 360 days requested, and 739 days for Firemen, instead of 720 days requested:

"Any additional funds granted should be provided by transfer from Code 3048, City Fund for Accruals of Salaries and Wages, and would require the modification of Code 1940, Wages Temporary Employees, Randall's Island, by increasing the allowance therein for Engineers and Firemen.

"For the economic operation of the power plants of this institution, the present antiquated and wasteful gas manufacturing plant should be abandoned and replaced by a gas main connection, via the new Hell Gate Bridge, from the large gas plant in Astoria, directly opposite Randall's Island. This plant requires the services of 3 Firemen at \$3.50 a day, 365 days a year. The cost of the gas furnished is over three dollars per thousand feet for gas of very poor quality.

In view of the above facts the Committee on Salaries and Grades hereby recommends the adoption of the attached resolutions providing 217 days additional time for Engineer and 739 days additional time for Fireman in Code 1940, Department of Public Charities, Wages Temporary Employees, Randall's Island, and the transfer thereto of a sufficient amount of money from Code 3048, City Fund for Accruals of Salaries and Wages.

"Result of Investigation—(2) The title of Locomobile Engineman has existed since 1912, when the appropriations were first segregated, at which time there were 3 positions in the Department of Docks and Ferries. The request is for position of Auto-truck Driver, employed in the Division of Purchase and Storage of Supplies. By error, this position was placed in the 1918 budget as Locomobile Engineman, the same as in Code No. 2800, the Driver of the Commissioner's car. The request involves a change in title so as to conform to the Civil Service classification."

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Rescission of Resolution Authorizing Comptroller to Approve Modifications of Certain Standard Specifications (Cal. No. 13).

(On May 18, 1917 (Cal. No. 47), the Board adopted a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to approve modifications of such standard specifications, heretofore adopted by the Board, as may be impracticable to use for economical reasons or because of market conditions.)

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:
Gentlemen—On May 18, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution authorizing the Comptroller to approve modifications of standard specifications. A copy of this resolution follows:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held December 28, 1917, there was referred back to the Comptroller a report from Albert E. Hadlock, then Deputy and Acting Comptroller, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting the approval of the transfer of funds within the appropriations to The City of New York for the year 1917, as follows:

The transfer of these funds was requested in order to enable the payment of bills due to appraisers appointed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to make certain appraisals in connection with exchanges of real property between

The City of New York and private individuals, in accordance with section 205A of the Greater New York Charter.

On January 28, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205A of the Greater New York Charter, appointed Charles Griffith Moses, William H. DeBost and Henry Archibald, three discreet and disinterested appraisers, residing in the Borough of Manhattan, to appraise the value of certain water front property on the East River, between East 29th and East 30th Streets, Borough of Manhattan, more particularly described in said resolution, which it was proposed to acquire as a site for such additions to Bellevue Hospital as may be required in the future, such as the construction of a separate building for the psychopathic and alcoholic service, and for a separate power plant for manufacturing electricity for Bellevue Hospital.

It was proposed to give in exchange for this land, certain parcels of land now owned by the City. This exchange has not as yet been consummated. The appraisers have made their report as to the value of the property to be appraised by them and have submitted their bills, each in the sum of \$100 for services rendered.

On July 25, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund appointed Jesse C. Schenck, David Porter and Thomas Hovenden, three discreet and disinterested appraisers, to appraise the value of lands owned by the City of New York, located near Malbone Street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and designated as Parcel A and Parcel B on a certain map, and to appraise the value of lands at the same location designated as Parcel C and Parcel D on a certain map, which it was proposed to exchange.

In accordance therewith, the appraisals were made, which showed the value of the parcels owned by the City to be greater than the value of the parcels which it was proposed to receive in exchange therefor. The exchange could not therefore be made, so a new proposition was submitted and the same appraisers were appointed on October 25, 1917, to appraise the value of premises designated in the resolution as Parcel A, Parcel B, and Parcel C on a certain map, being property owned by the City, and Parcel D, Parcel E and Parcel F on a certain map, being the property which it was proposed to exchange therefor. In accordance therewith, the new appraisals were made, which showed the value of the property owned by the City to be less than the value of the properties to be received in exchange therefor, and an exchange was authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 6, 1917.

On December 20, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized the payment to Jesse C. Schenck, Thomas Hovenden and David Porter of the sum of \$200 each for services rendered by them as set forth above, and on the same date, they adopted a similar resolution authorizing the payment of \$100 each to Charles Griffith Moses, William L. DeBost and William H. Archibald for the services rendered by them.

Department of Education—Amendment of Resolution Authorizing Appropriation for Teachers' Retirement Board and Schedule Therefor (Cal. No. 17).

(On June 15, 1917 (Cal. No. 93), the Board adopted a resolution appropriating \$13,970.50 to provide for salaries and expenses of the Teachers' Retirement Board for 1917.)

(On June 29, 1917 (Cal. No. 91), the Board adopted a resolution appropriating \$6,150 additional, for the purchase of supplies, etc.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 3, 1918, from the Actuary, Teachers' Retirement System, requesting an authorization of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$6,150, for the payment of bills for printing and stationery purchased; and the following report of the Comptroller relative thereto:

January 28, 1918.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under date of January 3, 1918, the actuary of the Teachers Retirement System applied for an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$6,150, the proceeds whereof to be used to meet bills incurred during 1917 for printing and stationery. Upon investigation the following facts have been ascertained:

At a meeting held June 15, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in amount not exceeding \$13,970.50 to provide for the expenses of the Teachers Retirement Board for the year 1917, as provided by subdivision F, chapter 303, of the Laws of 1917. This law reads as follows:

"1. The expense fund shall consist of such amounts as shall be appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on estimates submitted by the retirement board, to defray the expenses of administration of this act, exclusive of the payment of pensions, of annuities, of retirement allowances, and of other benefits provided for in this act."

Included in the sum so appropriated was an allowance of \$5,465.50 for supplies, equipment, etc., which amount did not contain an allowance to cover printing and stationery. This class of supplies it was intended to obtain in the usual way from the Board of City Record. The Corporation Counsel, however, advised the latter board that "printing and stationery for the Teachers' Retirement Board was not a charge against the City Record appropriations." Upon receipt of this information application was made by the Teachers' Retirement Board to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an additional allowance of \$6,150, and at a meeting held June 29, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 303 of the Laws of 1917, paragraph one, subdivision F, hereby appropriates an amount not exceeding sixty-one hundred and fifty dollars (\$6,150), in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, to provide funds for the expense fund of the Teachers' Retirement Board, for the purchase of supplies for said Board, and hereby approves of the following schedules to govern the expenditures of all funds authorized, exclusive of Personal Service:

The resolution above referred to did not authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds for the \$6,150 authorized, while the resolution adopted June 15, 1917, did specifically direct the manner in which the funds therein appropriated were to be obtained. This was done by inserting in the resolution adopted June 15, 1917, the words "and for the purpose of providing means therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York. * *"

Inasmuch as the resolution adopted June 29, 1917, did not authorize the issue of special revenue bonds under the provisions of subdivision 7, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, no such bonds were issued. It was assumed by the Teachers' Retirement Board, however, that funds were provided for the payment of bills for printing and stationery, and orders for such supplies were issued. While the letter of the Actuary of the Teachers' Retirement Board of January 3, 1918, requests an issue of special revenue bonds for an amount not to exceed \$6,150, examination discloses that \$2,500 will be ample to meet the outstanding obligations which it is desired to liquidate. For this reason it is thought best to limit the issue of the bonds requested to the latter sum.

In order to provide funds for the payment of these bills in the regular manner and in order that the records of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may be complete, the adoption of the attached resolution amending the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 29, 1917, is hereby recommended.

Department of Public Charities—Amendment of Resolution Authorizing Issue of Special Revenue Bonds (Cal. No. 19).

(On January 18, 1918 (Cal. No. 73), the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted December 28th, 1917, amending its resolution of July 17th, 1917, by extending the time for incurring obligations under the authorization of special revenue bonds from December 31, 1917, to June 30th, 1918, was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted December 28, 1917, by the Board of Aldermen in this matter and the following report of the Comptroller recommending approval thereof:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—On July 17, 1917, there was adopted by the Board of Aldermen a resolution requesting this board to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$30,000, with which to provide new equipment, and relocate present equipment in the new laundry building of the Kings County Hospital. To this resolution there was attached the usual restriction that all obligations should be incurred before December 31, 1917.

From information received from Mr. John J. Herrick, Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Charities, it appears that, owing to the extraordinary conditions of the labor and material markets last summer, it was deemed advisable to prepare specifications only for so much of the necessary equipment as would not exceed the appropriation. This was done, and, after considerable delay, the Bureau of Contract Supervision passed upon the plans and specifications, and contracts were awarded on December 26, 1917, for the total sum of \$24,958.68, all being for additional equipment.

When the new equipment is completed and installed, it will be necessary to purchase additional small equipment, and also to remove and relocate some of the present laundry plant. For these purposes, it is desired to utilize the remainder of the allowance, amounting to \$5,041.32.

In order to make such action possible, the Board of Aldermen was requested to modify the previous resolution by changing the words of the restriction "December 31, 1917," to read "June 30, 1918," which change would authorize the Department of Public Charities to let additional contracts until the latter date.

On December 28, 1917, the Board of Aldermen adopted such a resolution. On January 15, 1918, it was returned by His Honor the Mayor without his approval or disapproval, and, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, took effect as if he had approved it. In view of the circumstances above set forth, it is recommended that the attached resolution, modifying the one passed by your Board on August 14, 1917, be approved. Respectfully submitted,

Bureau of Contract Supervision.

President, Borough of Manhattan—Approval of Contract for Engineering Services (Cal. No. 25).

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 85), the request herein was referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 16, 1918, from the President, Borough of Manhattan, requesting approval of a contract with Hildreth & Company, Consulting and Inspecting Engineers, to inspect the manufacture of structural steel work for the Park Avenue Viaduct from 40th Street to Grand Central Station; and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision:

January 29, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 25, 1918, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication from the President, Borough of Manhattan, dated January 16, 1918, requesting the approval of the Board to a proposed contract with Hildreth & Co. for the inspection of the steel work for the Park Avenue Viaduct, which is now being built from 40th street to Grand Central Station in Park avenue, Manhattan.

The proposed contract covers both mill and shop inspection of the steel work for this structure, and, in view of the extraordinary size and weight of the shapes and plates entering into the construction, such inspection is more than usually vital and necessary. The price which the Borough President proposed to pay, namely, 80 cents per ton, is a very moderate price for work of this size and character. The estimated cost of the inspection contract is not to exceed \$1,000.

On August 14, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by appropriate resolution, authorized additional funds for this structure. There was included in the estimate of the funds required, \$15,500 for inspection and engineering work. A balance exceeding \$14,000 now remains in allowance for inspectors and engineers to which this contract is to be charged.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution which will grant the request. Respectfully,

Hon. Stephen Nugent, Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities, appeared in support of the request.

At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held January 11, 1918, the matter was referred to me for report.

I have now under consideration the preparation of a request to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for funds to modernize the alarm system in Brooklyn. The improvement of the system in the Borough of Manhattan is practically completed and the Department will seek funds at an early date to extend the underground system in Brooklyn and The Bronx. Atlantic Avenue, from the Brooklyn Borough Line to Van Wyck Avenue, Excluding All Land Within the Right-of-Way of the Long Island Railroad and All Land Actually Occupied by Railroad Buildings—Amending Proceedings for Acquiring Title by Eliminating Therefrom the Section East of Maure Avenue, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 84).

The Secretary presented a report, dated October 30, 1917, of the Chief Engineer on the petition of R. W. Coney Island Drainage Canal, Borough of Brooklyn—Acquiring Title (Cal. No. 85).

The Public Service Commission for the First District, therefore, pursuant to the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act, being chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, and pursuant to the provisions of the Public Service Commissions Law, being chapter 48 of the Consolidated Laws, as amended, hereby makes requisition upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York for the authorization of corporate stock of The City of New York to be issued and sold by the Comptroller to the amount of three hundred and forty-eight thousand forty-four dollars and twenty cents (\$348,044.20), to provide for the interest paid on corporate stock issued by The City of New York for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad under Contract No. 2.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On August 14, 1912, the Public Service Commission for the First District made requisition for \$348,044.20 to provide for the interest paid up to November 1, 1908, on corporate stock issued by The City of New York for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad under contract dated July 21, 1902, made by The City of New York, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, with the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, and known as contract No. 2. In relation thereto the following is submitted:

An examination shows that the interest payments made by The City of New York during the construction and prior to the complete operation of the Rapid Transit Railway under contract No. 2 on corporate stock issued for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad were in accordance with the statement of the Public Service Commission, and that the total amount so paid was \$348,044.20. No authorization of corporate stock to cover such expenditures has been heretofore made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It appears that these interest payments made during 1903-1908 were charged against a general account established for the purposes of contract No. 2, to which account all of the authorizations by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under contract No. 2, including the authorization of \$2,000,000 of July 21, 1902, for construction purposes, \$1,000,000 for real estate, and the \$1,620,000 authorized on June 9, 1905, for extra work and four-tracking, were credited, and against which all vouchers were charged, including the vouchers for interest on rapid transit corporate stock during construction, and which vouchers and payments, as previously stated, finally aggregated a sum total of \$348,044.20, the funds for which were all obtained by the issuance of corporate stock under authorizations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for construction and real estate, but there had been no authorization made for interest payments.

It appears that this matter was taken up with the Public Service Commission in 1913, when it was hoped that there might ultimately be a sufficient rescindment of authorizations made for construction purposes under contract No. 2 to enable this specific authorization to be made without infringing upon the City's general debt-incurring power, but the cancellation of liens and the consequent release of vouchers for extra work under contract No. 2, aggregating \$237,746.20, and the adjustment, under conditions highly favorable to the City, of other claims under said contract, which have been reduced to an aggregate of \$240,000 from several hundred thousand dollars in excess thereof, make it now necessary that an authorization covering these interest costs, which have long since been paid, be made at this meeting.

Authority for the authorization is found in subdivision 1 of section 37, chapter 4, Laws of 1891, as amended, known as the Rapid Transit Act, which provides as follows:

1. For the purpose of providing the necessary means for such construction, or equipment, or both, as the case may be, or acquiring by purchase, at the public expense, of any such road or roads, or of galleries, ways, subways and tunnels for subsurface structures, and the necessary means to pay for lands, property, rights, terms, privileges and easements, whether of owners, abutting owners or others, which shall be acquired by the city for the purposes of the construction or the operation of such road or roads as hereinafter provided, and of meeting the interest on the bonds in this section hereinafter provided for accruing thereon prior to the completion and readiness for operation of the portion of such road or roads, and the said galleries, ways, subways and tunnels for subsurface structures, for the purchase, construction, or equipment of which such bonds shall have been respectively issued, the board of estimate and apportionment, or other local authority in said city, in which such road or roads are to be constructed, having power to make appropriations of moneys to be raised by taxation, therein, from time to time, and as the same shall be necessary, and upon the requisition of said public service commission, shall direct the comptroller or other chief financial officer of said city, and it shall thereupon become his duty to issue the bonds of said city at such a rate of interest as the board of commissioners of the sinking fund of said city, if there be such a board, or if there be no such board, then as other local authority directing the issue of such bonds, may prescribe. Said bonds shall provide for the payment of the principal and interest in gold coin of the United States of America. They shall not be sold for less than the par value thereof, and the proceeds of the same shall be paid out and expended, for the purposes for which the same are issued, upon vouchers certified by said public service commission. Said bonds shall be free from all taxation for city and county purposes and shall be payable at maturity out of a sinking fund to be established and created out of the annual rentals or revenues of said road, including galleries, ways, subways, or tunnels for subsurface structures, as hereinbefore provided. But this provision that the said bonds shall be payable out of such sinking fund shall not diminish or affect the obligation of said city as a debtor upon said bonds, or any other right or remedy of any holder or owner of any such bonds, to collect the principal or interest thereof."

In view of the foregoing, I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the appropriation. Respectfully,

Agreement made this day of 1917, between The City of New York (hereinafter referred to as the "City"), acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission"), party of the first part, and the Degnon Contracting Company, a corporation organized and existing under the Laws of the State of New Jersey (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor"), party of the second part;

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 6th day of August, 1914, the City, acting by the Commission, entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction of that part of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad known as Section No. 5 of Routes Nos. 4 and 36; and

Whereas, On or about the 19th day of January, 1916, the City, acting by the Commission, entered into an agreement with the Contractor modifying said contract in order to provide for a change in the route of said portion of said rapid transit railroad in order to permit of the construction of two (2) tracks in Sixtieth Street and to change said contract from a unit price contract to a lump sum price contract, the Contractor agreeing in said modifying agreement to construct the said portion of said rapid transit railroad for the sum of two million three hundred and nineteen thousand, five hundred and eleven dollars (\$2,319,511), which contract as so modified including any other modifications heretofore made is hereinafter referred to as the "Contract" and which portion of said rapid transit railroad as so modified is hereinafter referred to as the "Railroad"; and

Whereas, The Commission is of the opinion that in order to provide for proper protection of the Railroad against flooding it is necessary to install an additional intersecting sump as hereinafter more specifically indicated east of the easterly end of the Lexington Avenue Station of the Railroad; and

Whereas, The Contractor is willing to provide and install said additional sump for the consideration hereinafter expressed; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City has consented to this agreement;

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the mutual stipulations and agreements hereinabove contained, the parties hereto do hereby agree that the Contract be and the same hereby is modified as follows:

First—The Contractor in addition to all its obligations under the Contract for the Construction of the Railroad shall provide all labor and materials and perform the necessary work for the installation of the thirty-thousand (30,000) gallon sump near the east end of the Lexington Avenue Station of the Railroad of the character and design and in the location as shown on the plan or drawing hereto annexed and made a part hereof, which plan or drawing is entitled "State of New York Public Service Commission for the First District Engineering Department, Routes Nos. 4 and 36, Section No. 5 Revised—Two tracks in 60th Street, Sub-section No. 12 proposed 30,000 gallon sump near east end of Lexington Avenue Station," dated July 5, 1917, signed by D. L. Turner, Chief Engineer, and is numbered File No. 2305, Drg. No. 199. The said work of installing such sump shall be performed in accordance with said plan or drawing and such additional plans or drawings as may be issued by the Chief Engineer or Acting Chief Engineer for the time being of the Commission (hereinafter referred to as the "Engineer"), and in accordance with the Contract and the specifications thereof and subject to the direction and approval of the Engineer as provided in the Contract.

Second—The Contractor shall receive, in addition to the lump sum price of two million, three hundred and nineteen thousand, five hundred and eleven dollars (\$2,319,511) for constructing the Railroad, the additional sum of twelve thousand, five hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$12,575), said sum to be paid to and accepted by the Contractor in full satisfaction for any and all claims of whatsoever character arising from the performance of the work of installing said sump herein provided for and shall be paid to the Contractor in the manner and at the time provided for in the Contract for the making of payments to the Contractor.

Except as herein expressly modified the Contract and all the provisions thereof shall remain in all respects unchanged and in full force and effect as though this agreement had not been made.

No member of this Commission shall be liable personally under or by reason of this agreement or any of its articles or provisions.

This agreement shall bind the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.

Provided, However, that this agreement shall not take effect unless and until it shall be consented to in writing in the form subjoined by the American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On November 28, 1917, the Public Service Commission for the First District formally transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval a proposed agreement, modifying the contract entered into between the City of New York, acting by the Commission, and the Degnon Contracting Company, for the construction of Section No. 5, Routes Nos. 4 and 36, Broadway, 59th Street from Seventh Avenue to Second Avenue, a part of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue

Rapid Transit Railroad. The Commission also requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$12,575.00 to provide funds to meet the City's obligations under the proposed agreement.

The contract with the Degnon Contracting Company was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 30, 1914, at an estimated cost of \$2,819,511. The Director of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, in his report to me aent the proposed agreement, says in part as follows:

"The Degnon contract above referred to covers the construction of twin tunnels in 60th Street from Fifth Avenue eastward to a junction with the tunnels under the East River and Blackwells Island. The contract for the river tunnels provides for the construction of a sump pit at the lowest point under the river to catch the drainage of the tunnels, from which pit the drainage will be pumped by equipment to be installed by the operating company.

"The modification proposes the construction of a large additional sump pit between the tracks, just east of the east end of the Lexington Avenue station in 60th Street, and below the lowest point of the street above. It is believed that in case of a break in the water main, or an inrush of water from street flooding from any cause, the inflow will be intercepted by the proposed sump pit and will not flow down the tunnel to the sump pit under the river. In such event the cost of pumping, if there are not two pits, will be considerably below the cost involved if all the water that goes into the tunnel must be pumped from the one below the river.

"The estimated cost, \$12,500, is reached by the consideration of the following items:

"As compared with ordinary prices, those used in this estimate are high. The justification for the high price of excavation is stated to be due to the fact that the excavation for the twin tunnels has progressed beyond the location of the sump, and in order to excavate for the sump it will be necessary to support the rock above by timbering. It will also be impossible to take advantage of the simultaneous excavation of the rock for the tunnels and for the sump. The high price of the concrete is due to the extraordinary amount of centering and bracing required for an inconsiderable volume. The reinforcement is specified in order to reduce the amount of structural steel, and the doors are to provide closed entrances to the pump chamber to be constructed above the sump pit.

"The construction of this sump pit as proposed would provide an economical and effectual remedy in the contingency of a broken water main causing a flow of water to enter the subway and tunnel, and will, in such contingency, considerably reduce the cost of pumping. It might also under such emergency, by reason of its large capacity, prevent interruption of train service.

"In view of all the circumstances I believe that the Board may properly consent to the proposed agreement."

In view of the foregoing, I herewith submit a resolution approving the proposed agreement with the Degnon Contracting Company, and authorizing the issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$12,575.00 to provide the necessary funds to meet the City's obligations thereunder. Yours truly,

Agreement made this day of 1917, between The City of New York (hereinafter referred to as the "City"), acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission"), party of the first part, and PATRICK M'GOVERN & CHARLES L. PERRIN, co-partners doing business under the firm name and style of PATRICK M'GOVERN & CO. (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractors"), party of the second part.

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 3rd day of August, 1916, the City, acting by the Commission, entered into a contract with the Contractors for the construction of that part of Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad known as Route No. 61, which begins at a point in East 60th Street, in the Borough of Manhattan, at or near the easterly curb line of Second Avenue, extending thence easterly under East 60th Street, the west channel of the East River, Blackwells Island, the east channel of the East River, water-front property at or near the foot of North Jane Street in the Borough of Queens, private property, North Jane Street and the Queensboro Bridge right of way, and ending at a point between William and Crescent Streets (which contract as heretofore duly modified is hereinafter referred to as the "Contract") and which portion of said rapid transit railroad is hereinafter referred to as the "Railroad"; and

Whereas, In carrying out the work of installing additional ducts as provided for in the agreement dated May 22, 1917, between the parties hereto modifying the Contract for said work, it is now found necessary to make certain changes in the field in the checkered plates already fabricated for the duct manholes at Vernon Avenue; and

Whereas, The City authorities desire that the structure of the Railroad between Hancock Street and the Boulevard in the Borough of Queens be so modified as to allow the Boulevard at some future time to be carried over the Railroad instead of being cut off as shown upon original plans for the Railroad; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City has consented to this agreement:

Now, Therefore, In consideration of the mutual stipulations and agreements hereinabove contained the parties hereto do hereby agree that the Contract be and the same hereby is modified as follows:

First: The Contractors in addition to all their obligations under the Contract for the construction of the Railroad shall provide all labor and materials and perform the necessary work for the construction of the thirty thousand (30,000) gallon sump near the low point under west channel of the East River and certain incidental changes in the drainage details of the character and design and in the approximate location as shown on the plan or drawing hereto annexed and made a part hereof which plan or drawing is entitled "State of New York Public Service Commission for the First District Engineering Department Route No. 61, 60th Street River Tunnels Proposed 30,000 Gallon Sump near Low Point Under West Channel" dated July 5, 1917, signed by D. L. Turner, Chief Engineer, and numbered File No. 40, Drg. No. 73 in substitution for the sump shown on the original Contract plans. The said work of constructing such enlarged sump shall be performed in accordance with said plan or drawing and such additional plans or drawings as may be issued by the Chief Engineer or Acting Chief Engineer for the time being of the Commission (hereinafter referred to as the "Engineer"), and in accordance with the Contract and specifications thereof and subject to the direction of the Engineer as provided in the Contract.

Second: The Contractors shall receive in addition to the lump sum price of four million one hundred ninety-four thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven dollars (\$4,194,797) and such other sums herein provided for constructing the Railroad the additional sum of four thousand five hundred and one dollars and seventy-six cents (\$4,501.76) said sum to be paid to and accepted by the Contractors in full satisfaction for any and all claims of whatsoever character arising from the performance of the work of constructing the said enlarged sump hereinbefore provided for and shall be paid to the Contractors in the manner and at the time provided for in the Contract for the making of payments to the Contractor.

Sixth: The Contractors shall receive in addition to the lump sum price of four million one hundred ninety-four thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven dollars (\$4,194,797) and such other sums herein provided for constructing the Railroad, the additional sum of sixty dollars (\$60.00), said sum to be paid to and accepted by the Contractors in full satisfaction for any and all claims of whatsoever character arising from the performance of the work involved in making all the necessary changes in such checkered plates hereinbefore provided for and shall be paid to the Contractors in the manner and at the time provided for in the Contract for the making of payments to the Contractors.

Seventh: The Contractors shall also in addition to all their obligations under the Contract as herein modified for the construction of the Railroad construct between Hancock Street and the Boulevard, Borough of Queens, Station 366+39.9 and Station 369+46.0 of the Railroad, instead of the open cut approach leading to the masonry viaduct and elevated structure as indicated upon the original contract plans, a subway structure of rectangular cross-section as shown upon the plan or drawing hereto annexed and made a part hereof and entitled "State of New York Public Service Commission for the First District Engineering Department Route No. 61 60th St. River Tunnels, Sta. 366+39.9 to Sta. 369+46.0, Sub-Station No. 4, Structural Plans Roofing over of Structure Between Hancock St. & Boulevard" dated July 12, 1917, signed by D. L. Turner, Chief Engineer, and numbered File No. 40, Drg. No. 72.

Eighth: The Contractors shall also construct between stations 369+46 and station 371+08 of the Railroad a parapet wall as indicated upon the plan or drawing hereto attached and made a part hereof and entitled "State of New York Public Service Commission for the First District Engineering Department Route No. 61 60th St. River Tunnels Parapet Wall for Open Cut and Viaduct Section Between Boulevard and Marion St." dated August 24, 1917, signed D. L. Turner, Chief Engineer, and numbered File No. 40, Drg. No. 77, in substitution for said portion of said parapet wall as shown upon the original Contract Drawings. The said work of constructing said roof between said stations and said parapet wall shall conform with said plans or drawings hereinbefore referred to and such additional plans or drawings as may be issued by the Engineer and in accordance with the Contract and specifications thereof and subject to the direction and approval of the Engineer as provided in the Contract.

Ninth: The Contractors shall receive in addition to the lump sum price of four million one hundred ninety-four thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven dollars (\$4,194,797) and such other sums herein provided for constructing the Railroad, the additional sum of eleven thousand six hundred and thirty dollars (\$11,630), said sum to be paid to and accepted by the Contractor in full satisfaction for any and all claims of whatsoever character arising from the performance of the work of constructing said roof and parapet wall hereinbefore provided for and shall be paid to the Contractors in the manner and at the time provided for in the Contract for the making of payment to the Contractors.

Except as herein expressly modified the Contract and all the provisions thereof shall remain in all respects unchanged and in full force and effect as though this agreement had not been made.

No member of the Commission shall be liable personally under or by reason of this agreement or any of its articles or provisions.

This agreement shall bind the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.

Provided, However, That this agreement shall not take effect unless and until it shall be consented to in writing in the form subjoined by the American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company, and Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland.

In witness whereof the Commission has caused its official seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by the Secretary and these presents to be signed by the Chairman and the Contractors have hereunto set their hands and seals all the day and year first above written.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 19, 1917, the Public Service Commission for the First District formally transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval a proposed agreement modifying the contract between the City of New York, acting by said Commission, and Patrick McGovern & Company, for the construction of the Blackwells Island tunnel (Route No. 61 of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad), approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 28, 1916, at an estimated cost of \$4,194,797.

The Director of the Bureau of Contract Supervision in a report to me aent the proposed agreement states, in part, as follows:

"The contract with Patrick McGovern & Company covers the construction of twin tunnels from a point in East 60th Street near Second Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, eastward and under the East River and Blackwells Island to a point on the Queensboro Bridge right-of-way between William and Crescent Streets, Borough of Queens. This contract was entered into on the 3rd day of August, 1916, at an estimated cost of \$4,194,797.

"The agreement submitted provides for changes in construction for three items of work and for one item of construction which was not included in the original contract:

"(A) The construction of a 30,000 gallon sump pit at a point between the tunnels just west of the west side of Blackwells Island at an additional estimated cost of \$4,501.76.

"The original contract provided for the construction of a small sump at this location but further consideration of the possible inflow of a considerable quantity of water and the consequent flooding of the tunnels and stoppage of train service before the pumps provided for the purpose are able to control the flow, led to the opinion that a larger sump pit would be a proper precaution. The estimated cost

is based upon the additional work required for the larger sump pit over the cost of that originally specified.

"(B) The lining of a cross passage between the tunnels at an estimated cost of \$1,000.

"The original contract did not provide for a cross passage between the tunnels, but the contractor, in order to facilitate construction made such an opening. It is now believed that it would be advisable to finish this passageway so as to make it available as emergency exit in case of fire or accident in the tunnels after the line is operating. The estimated cost is based upon the difference between what it would cost the contractor to line the portions of the two tunnels which will be eliminated because of the connecting passage, and the cost of the entire work of concreting and lining the passageway for an emergency exit,

"(C) Changes in cover plates.

"The payment to the contractor of \$60 is requested for changes in the cover plates of the duct manholes at Vernon Avenue, due to the installation of additional ducts under an agreement dated May 22, 1917.

"(D) The construction of a subway of rectangular cross section at an additional cost of \$11,630 instead of an open cut approach for a distance of about 300 feet between Hancock Street and the Boulevard, Borough of Queens.

"The original contract provided for an open cut at this point, but at the request of the Commissioner of Public Works of Queens the road, as modified, has been constructed in order to provide for the carrying of the Boulevard over the railroad and the grade of the Boulevard is to be changed accordingly.

"The total additional cost of the four items above mentioned is \$17,131.76 which is the amount to be paid the contractor under the agreement submitted. The largest item, costing \$11,630, is for the closed section of the railroad near the Boulevard which has already been completed.

"The detailed estimates for the additional work represent a considerable increase over the prices fixed in the original contract, but they appear reasonable in view of the existing market conditions as to material and labor."

In view of the foregoing, I recommend for adoption the following resolution, approving the agreement with Patrick McGovern & Company and authorizing the necessary funds required therefor. Respectfully

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 28, 1916, consented to the award of a contract, on the requisition of the Public Service Commission for the First District, between the City of New York, acting by said Commission, and Patrick McGovern & Company, for the construction of Route No. 61, a portion of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad, known as the Blackwells Island tunnel, at an estimated cost of four million one hundred and ninety-four thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven dollars (\$4,194,797); and

Whereas, The said Public Service Commission, under date of December 19, 1917, transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval a proposed agreement modifying said contract with Patrick McGovern & Company, said proposed agreement providing for the installation of a 30,000 gallon sump; the lining of a cross passage between tunnels; making changes in checkered plates of duct manholes, and making changes in masonry viaduct and parapet wall of a portion of the said railroad in the Borough of Queens; and

Whereas, The said Public Service Commission in its requisition adopted on December 19, 1917, requests the Board to authorize the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of the City of New York in the sum of seventeen thousand one hundred and thirty-one dollars and seventy-six cents (\$17,131.76), for the purpose of providing funds to meet the requirements of the said proposed agreement; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and consents to the proposed agreement, modifying the contract with Patrick McGovern & Company, and the Comptroller is authorized and requested to issue corporate stock of the City of New York to the amount of seventeen thousand one hundred and thirty-one dollars and seventy-six cents (\$17,131.76), at such rate of interest as the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall prescribe, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes of the proposed agreement modifying the contract with Patrick McGovern & Company, as set forth in this resolution and described in the requisition of the Public Service Commission to this Board dated December 19, 1917; said issue of corporate stock to be a sub-authorization of and charged against the appropriation of sixty million dollars (\$60,000,000) authorized by this Board on March 18, 1913, and the supplemental or additional appropriations thereto, for the purpose of carrying out the terms and provisions of contract No. 4.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens—15.

Negative—The President of the Borough of Richmond—1.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds for Expenses of Commission and Compensation of Employees for Year Ending December 31, 1918, and Establishment of Schedule Therefor (Cal. No. 91).

(On December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 82), the Board authorized an issue of \$227,933.17 special revenue bonds for salaries and expenses of the Public Service Commission for the year 1918 on account of the requisition of said Commission for an appropriation of \$2,250,068, which requisition is printed in the minutes of said date.)

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 72), a requisition from the Commission, dated January 16, 1918, and report thereon by the Comptroller, were presented and the matter was laid over until this meeting, under Rule 19.)

The Secretary presented the following requisition from the Public Service Commission for the First District, and report of the Comptroller relative thereto:

State of New York, Public Service Commission for the First District, 120 Broadway, New York, January 16, 1918

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, New York City:

Gentlemen—Under date of October 3, 1917, this Commission forwarded to your Board, with a communication explaining the need therefor, a requisition for the appropriation of two million, two hundred and forty-six thousand, five hundred and eight dollars to cover our rapid transit administrative expenses for the year 1918. Of this amount, there was appropriated by your Board and included in the tax levy, forty-eight thousand, nine hundred and seventy dollars (\$48,970) for personal service in the Bureau of Audit and Control. There was further appropriated by your Board, on the 21st ultimo, two hundred and twenty-seven thousand, nine hundred and thirty-three and seventeen hundredths dollars (\$227,933.17) to cover our needs for the current month.

The Commission now requests that a further appropriation be made at this time to cover its administrative expenses for at least the balance of the first third of this year, the reasons for such requisition and the purposes for which such money is to be used being fully set forth in the communication and requisition above referred to. Such provision has been made only for our expenses for the current month. It is requested that this matter be given attention within the immediate future.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On October 3, 1917, the Public Service Commission requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for \$2,250,068 for the expenses of the Commission and the compensation of its employees, chargeable to the City of New York, for the year ending December 31, 1918.

On December 21, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution granting the request of the Public Service Commission to the extent of \$227,933.17 to cover the requirements of the Commission for the month of January, 1918.

Shortly after the 1st of January, 1918, the Commission urged that further consideration should be given without undue delay to that part of their request covering the requirements of the Commission for the first four months of 1918. As the law now stands, there is a certain amount of discretion vested in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as to the reasonableness of the requirements of the Public Service Commission. The requisition of the Commission has therefore been under investi-

gation for the purpose of determining to what extent, if any, modifications therein might be proper. Annexed hereto is a report of James W. Reed, one of the Engineers of this Board, addressed to me under date of January 24, 1918, the recommendations of which I have approved. In accordance therewith two resolutions are submitted, the effect of which is to grant the requests of the Commission, modified as outlined in the report of Mr. Reed to the extent of \$616,137.83 to cover the requirements of the Commission for the purposes of its requisition for the first four months of the year 1918. Hon. CHARLES L. CRAIG, Comptroller:

Sir—Referring to the two communications from the Public Service Commission addressed to you on January 8 and January 17, 1918, in the matter of an appropriation to cover the Rapid Transit Administration Expenses of the Commission for the next three months, and directed me to prepare a report to you with such recommendations as my study of the work and activities of the Commission would seem to warrant.

Section 14 of the Public Service Commission Law provides that "The Board of Estimate and Apportionment * * * shall, from time to time, on requisition duly made by the Public Service Commission of the First District, appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to enable it to do the duties in this act and to provide for the expenses and compensation of the employees of the Commission, and such appropriation shall be made forthwith upon presentation of a requisition from the Commission which shall state the purpose for which such moneys are required by it."

The preceding quotation from the law was amended by chapter 572, Laws of 1916, to give the Board of Estimate and Apportionment discretionary authority over the Public Service Commission's expenditures after July 1, 1917. At the same time the regulatory expenses of the Commission became a State charge.

In accordance with the amended law as given above, studies were begun in the Spring of 1917, looking to the preparation of a detailed budget for the Public Service Commission covering the administration or non-regulatory expenses of the Commission during 1918. The results of the studies during the Summer of 1917 are embodied in the schedules and allowance for the Public Service Commission, as printed in the budget for 1918.

The total budget allowance for the Commission was \$2,246,808, of which \$48,970 for personal service in the Bureau of Audit and Control was put in the tax levy; the balance, \$2,197,838, or such sum as might ultimately be determined, was to be provided from the sale of special revenue bonds which were later to be funded and charged to construction.

On October 3, 1917, the Public Service Commission requested of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an appropriation of \$2,250,068 to cover the expenses of the Commission during 1918, and the Board, acting upon this request on December 21, 1917, authorized an appropriation of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$227,932.17 to provide for the expenses of the Commission for the month of January only.

Anticipating the request of the Commission for additional funds, I have made a study of the payrolls of the Commission, changes in personnel since the 1918 budget was prepared and balances available from former appropriations.

I attach hereto an itemized schedule of the allowance which I suggest should be made at this time for the expenses of the Commission during February, March and April, and to which the Public Service Commission has agreed as being probably sufficient to meet all their needs during those months.

At the time the budget was prepared it was thought advisable and economical to provide for the expenses of the Commission during 1918, in three installments, each allowance covering a four months' period. The total allowance, as itemized in the attached resolution, represents the amount which with that already provided for January, 1918, was tentatively agreed upon when the budget was under consideration for the first four months of 1918.

I am entirely satisfied with each schedule as presented, with the exception of that for Code No. 2881 R, Fees and Commissions, \$8,055.

At the time that the budget was prepared I took exception to any allowance for expert engineering fees, and I still believe the Commission has upon its permanent staff men qualified by education and experience to do all the work of the Commission without the employment of outside experts.

If you should agree with me upon this item, I suggest that the code above mentioned be reduced to \$3,000 to cover an allowance for practically one month, and that the Commission be notified that you would recommend no further appropriation for expert engineering services during the coming year.

No allowance has been made in the attached schedules for salaries of men engaged in military service. The report of the Commission of January 11, 1918, shows 189 men on such service, and the liabilities of the Commission for the salaries of these men are about \$8,500 monthly, although that amount is likely to be considerably exceeded as the result of the next draft. In order to provide funds for the payment of the salaries of men on military service I suggest that the resolution authorizing the appropriation for the expenses of the Commission during October, November and December of 1917 be modified so as to permit of the use of the available balance now remaining in that fund for the payment of the salaries of men on military service so far as the allowances are sufficient.

I attach hereto a resolution modifying the resolution of October, as above outlined.

Gentlemen—On December 26, 1917, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Brooklyn, dated December 22, 1917, requesting approval of the expenditure of \$2,097.76 for equipment for the Laboratory Building of the Brooklyn Botanic Garden. The proposed equipment is of standard type and the costs of the several items have been checked by the Bureau of Contract Supervision and are deemed reasonable. Half of the cost is to be paid from the fund "S-566" created by the donation of \$100,000 made by Mr. Alfred T. White, for the improvement of the Botanic Garden.

This being original equipment for a new building, the cost is properly chargeable to the stated accounts in which there are sufficient unencumbered balances.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Transfer of Appropriation and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 100).

(On January 4, 1918 (Cal. No. 10), the Board authorized an appropriation of \$19,554 from Brooklyn Water Revenues for 1918 to continue the operation of pumping stations.)

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 123-B), the request for modification of schedule in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated February 1, 1918, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, urging favorable action on the request, dated January 15, 1918, for approval of a schedule in connection with the appropriation made by the Board on January 4, 1918, and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

January 31, 1918.

To the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

Gentlemen—On January 15, 1918, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested modification of Codes Nos. 2185—W and 2199—W for 1918. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, Item No. 123-B of the Calendar of January 25, 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—(1) To transfer the existing cash balance in Code 2185—W to Code No. 2199—W, thereby closing out the account.

"(2) In Code No. 2199—W to increase the time allowance for Enginemen, Oilers, Stokers, Watchman, Coal Passers and Laborers by an amount made possible by the cash transfer from Code No. 2185—W and by the appropriation made on January 4, 1918, from water revenues of \$19,554.

"Result of Investigation—On January 4, 1918, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing an appropriation of \$19,554 from water revenues to provide for a force to operate 13 pumping stations in Brooklyn for two months pending an investigation of the necessity for an emergency force in case of an interruption of the Catskill Water Supply. At the time the Board did not modify the proper schedules so as to make the money available for payroll purposes. The present request is to accomplish this purpose. It is also proposed to close out a schedule provided at the time of the preparation of the 1918 budget for a regular skeleton force for the Brooklyn pumping station by transferring the available cash balance to the schedule for temporary employees. The requested change will give greater elasticity in the use of the funds provided at the time of the preparation of the 1918 budget in connection with the additional appropriation.

"There will exist a shortage of \$34 in the account for schedule 2199—W should the proposed changes be made because the computations, on which the appropriation from the water revenues amounting to \$19,554, passed on January 4, were based on a rate of \$2.75 per day for Laborer. This amount will be requested immediately by the department in a separate communication."

Action by Committee—In view of the above facts the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M. on Thursday, January 31, 1918.

Present—John F. Hylan, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Edward F. Barrett, Deputy and Acting Chamberlain; Alfred E. Smith, President, Board of Aldermen; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller brought up for consideration the question of approving the

minutes of the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held December 27, 1917. This matter was discussed at meeting held January 17, 1918, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the printed proof of the minutes to each member of the Board, which was done.

The President of the Board of Aldermen stated that he knew of no reason why, when there was a change of administration, the newly elected Commissioners should approve minutes of a meeting they knew nothing about.

It was the sense of the Board that there was no obligation on the part of the present members to approve these minutes, and they were therefore not approved.

The minutes of the meetings held January 8 and 17, 1918, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD January 29, 1918.

Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 403 Butler St., Brooklyn.

This matter was on the calendar of the last meeting and referred back to the Comptroller. It was put on this calendar in anticipation that it would be ready for the meeting. The information desired by the Comptroller not being received in time, action thereon was laid over.

Police Department—Renewal of Lease for, of the Store and Basement at 36 E. 9th St., Manhattan.

The Comptroller presented a report recommending a renewal of the lease to the City of the store and basement at No. 36 E. 9th st., Manhattan, occupied by the Traffic Division for a period of one year from February 1, 1918, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions at an annual rental of \$1,350, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, furnish steam heat and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish light and janitor service.

Laid over.

President, Borough of Queens—Renewal of Lease for, of a Vacant Plot of Land on Vanderbilt Ave., North of Archer St., Queens.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

January 24, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Queens in a communication to your Board under date of January 15, 1918, requests the renewal of the lease of the vacant plot of land 100 feet square on the westerly side of Vanderbilt Avenue, 100 feet north of Archer Street, Jamaica, Borough of Queens, occupied as a storage yard for the Bureau of Highways, for a period of two years from February 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$24.

The Comptroller in a communication to your Board under date of October 30, 1917, recommended the payment of rent, without the necessity of entering into a lease therefrom from November 1, 1917, to February 1, 1918, at a rental at the rate of \$24 per annum, the same as, now asked, and said report was approved and payment authorized at a meeting of your Board held November 8, 1917.

These premises are assessed at \$3,200, which is the fair market value of the plot; and the rental of \$24 a year represents 7 per cent. on this value, which, while somewhat high, is explained by the fact that the premises are located within 150 feet of the railroad siding and another location further away would be offset by the longer haul of material—the premises in question are also conveniently located directly across the street from the main yard of the department.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just and the same as previously paid, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the execution of a lease of all that vacant plot of land in the Borough of Queens, City and State of New York, bound and described as follows:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held January 17, 1918, there was referred to the Comptroller a request from the Chief Medical Examiner for assignment to him of office space on the third floor of the Bergen Building, southeast corner of Tremont and Arthur Avenues, Borough of The Bronx, formerly occupied by the Court of Special Sessions.

On December 20, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assigned to the Court of Special Sessions space on the seventh floor of the Bergen Building, leased for and occupied by the Coroner, and the question of the use, after January 1, 1918, of the space on the third floor of the Bergen Building, given up by the Court of Special Sessions, was referred to the Comptroller to determine the best use to which it can be put during the unexpired term of the lease.

The space occupied by the Court of Special Sessions on the third floor contains 1,000 square feet. The lease thereof was authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on June 23, 1915, and will expire on October 21, 1925. The rental paid is \$750 per annum.

Dock Department—Turning Over by, of Certain Property Formerly a Part of the Dreamland Park Site, Coney Island.

Park Department, Brooklyn—Assignment to, of the Above Mentioned Property.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, January 8, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held October 6, 1915, a resolution was adopted assigning to this Department, for the purpose of constructing a steamboat pier thereon, certain property formerly a part of the Dreamland Park site, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn.

At a meeting held October 20, 1915, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to execute a lease of a pier to be built on said property to the Coney Island Carnival Company.

At a meeting held March 8, 1916, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund rescinded the resolution of October 20, 1915, at the request of the Commissioner of Docks, the Coney Island Carnival Company having stated to the Department that it was not in a position to enter into a lease of the proposed pier on the terms offered by the City.

The project of constructing a substantial pier on the property was abandoned, but the old pier was repaired and a permit for fishing purposes only was granted to Samuel W. Gumpertz.

The pier has been partly carried away, and as it was in a dangerous condition and constituted a menace to life, the permit to Mr. Gumpertz was revoked on November 14, 1917, to take effect at once.

As this pier is absolutely worthless for commercial or excursion purposes, and dangerous to life and a menace to navigation in its present condition, it should be removed at once. An appropriation appears to have been made some time ago for its removal by the Department of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn, which Department has control of the adjacent upland, and the premises are therefore turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in accordance with the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, for re-transfer to the Department of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn. In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

January 24, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On October 6, 1915, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assigned to the Department of Docks and Ferries, for the purpose of constructing a steamboat pier thereon, property formerly a part of the Dreamland Park site, Coney Island, Brooklyn, more particularly described in said resolution.

On October 20, 1915, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approved of and consented to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of lease to the Coney Island Carnival Company of a pier to be built in front of Dreamland Park on the ocean side of Coney Island, Brooklyn, together with the small shed thereon, in accordance with the plans and specifications, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1916, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years. This resolution was rescinded by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on March 8, 1916.

I am in receipt of a communication from the Commissioner of Docks to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in which he states that the project of constructing a substantial pier on the property was abandoned, but the old pier was repaired and a permit for fishing purposes only was granted to Samuel W. Gumpertz. The pier has been partly carried away, and as it was in a dangerous condition and constituted a menace to life, the permit to Mr. Gumpertz was revoked on November 14, 1917.

The Commissioner of Docks further states that as this pier is absolutely worthless for commercial or excursion purposes, and dangerous to life and a menace to navigation in its present condition, it should be removed at once, and he turns over the premises to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for re-transfer to the Department of Parks in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn requests the transfer to the jurisdiction of the Park Department of this property. He states that this property has been seriously damaged during recent storms and is now in a dangerous condition.

On January 16, 1918, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to appropriate \$6,368.88 to be applied to the cost of removing this pier, and it is necessary that the pier be turned back to the jurisdiction of the Park Department before arrangements can be effected for its removal.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assign to the Park Department the following described property, formerly a part of the Dreamland Park site, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, viz.:

Proposed Assignment of Space at 49 Fulton St. to the Department of Street Cleaning and to the Board of Elections.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

January 26, 1918.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On January 26, 1918, there was received at the office of the Secretary to the Sinking Fund Commission a communication dated January 22, 1918, from

the Commissioner of Accounts, with respect to the premises at No. 86 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, now occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning under a lease which will expire May 1, 1918. In this communication the Commissioner recommends and suggests the adoption of a resolution that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assign the first floor and 400 square feet of the rear part of the basement of No. 49 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, to the Department of Street Cleaning, effective May 1, 1918, and that the Commissioners assign the second, third and fourth floors and 865 square feet of the basement to the Board of Elections, to become effective December 1, 1918.

When the budget for 1918 was being made up the then Commissioner of Accounts recommended to the subcommittee on Tax Budget, which had under consideration the revision of the real estate rent schedule, as proposed by the Department of Finance, that the change covered in the communication of the Commissioner of Accounts of January 22, 1918, be made. The recommendation of the subcommittee, as contained in the budget, was as follows:

"Move Section Station, now at 86 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, lease expires May 1, 1918, to city owned building at 49-51 Fulton Street, Brooklyn. Letter from Dep. Com. Mauro accepting this space. Rest of building to be occupied Dec. 1, 1918, by Board of Elections."

As a result of this recommendation the item covering the proposed renewal of the lease for the Street Cleaning Department was stricken from the budget, and there is no appropriation made therefor in the 1918 budget as finally adopted.

Your attention is called to the fact that the rent for the premises now occupied by the Board of Elections is paid from the appropriation made directly to that Board; and, furthermore, that the adoption at this time of the resolution recommended by the Commissioner of Accounts, that space at 49 Fulton Street be assigned to the Board of Elections, effective December 1, 1918, practically might operate so that that space could not be used for other purposes after May 1st.

It is entirely possible, as a closer understanding is had of the requirements of the various city departments, that this space may be more suitably assigned to some municipal activity from and after May 1, 1918.

Kirsch, Inc., and the Astoria Veneer Mills and Dock Company, of the City's interest in portions of Riker Ave. between 7th and Steinway Aves., Queens, in consideration of the sum of \$101 in each case, plus the additional charge of \$12.50 for the preparation of the necessary papers and under the usual terms and conditions.

In an opinion dated November 22, 1917, the former Corporation Counsel advised that there is no reason why the City cannot convey its interest in the road which lies within the old, but outside the new lines of Riker Avenue ceded to it by a deed from Steinway & Sons dated May 29, 1906, and recorded in Liber 1493, page 422 of Conveyances in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens, and that releases of the City's interest in and to Riker Avenue may be made to the Companies in question provided they continue to be the owners of property abutting the land to be conveyed.

Which was referred to the present Corporation Counsel for a new opinion.

St. Agnes Roman Catholic Church—Petition of, for the Cancellation of Certain Assessments.
