

Sir.—In the week that ended on Saturday, the 4th inst., there were 507 deaths reported in this city. In the preceding week there occurred 575 deaths. The decrease was in the zymotic diseases chiefly, to which 176 deaths were charged last week, and 266 in the previous week. There was a corresponding decrease of mortality in children under five years of age.

The mean temperature was 63 degrees Fahr., and the range was from 80 degrees on Monday afternoon, to 45 degrees on Wednesday morning. There was an increase of eight deaths by pneumonia and bronchitis, but no increase by diphtheria and scarlatina. Saturday.

Two months have now elapsed without a death from small-pox, and that this result is to be ascribed to the protective influence of vaccination, and not to the absence of the loathsome contagion from the neighborhood of this city, may be inferred from the fact that in the city of Hoboken—scarcely two miles away from the heart of our city—small-pox continues to rage as

an epidemic, because of the neglect of vaccination in that little city. New Jersey needs a State Board of Health to enforce sanitary regulations. The death rate in New York last week was equal to a yearly mortality of 26.36 in the thousand living. Several of the smaller American cities had, in the previous week, a death rate somewhat larger than this.

London, in the third week of September, London, in the third week of September, had a death rate equal to 19 per 1,000 yearly; the 21 chief cities of Great Britain, counted together, had a rate equal to 23 per 1,000; Paris reported 27 per 1,000; Edinburgh, 18 per 1,000; Bristol, 27; Liverpool, 23; and Portsmouth, 16 per 1,000, Berlin, in the previous week, 43 per 1,000; Vienna, 58, and Rome 26.3 per 1,000 annually.

SIR:—I have the honor to present the following
weekly report upon the condition of the streets
and avenues of this city, compiled from the reports of the Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors,
for the week ending October 4, 1873:

Inspector Judson (1st, 3d and 5th Wards) reports no material change in his streets since last week's report. On one or two days the air has been full of dust and filth from the streets and gutters. The effect of sprinkling the street dirt is to transform it into mud. The Inspector suggests that if the money spent in sprinkling were added to the fund for street cleaning and judiciously expended there would be no dust and no need of sprinkling.

Assistant Inspector Lockwood (2d and 4th Wards) find his streets generally clean with the exception of Peck Slip, where the street gutters are disgustingly filthy with street dirt, stagnant water and garbage.

Inspector Tracy (6th Ward) reports Walker street from Elm to Centre, Pearl street from Park to Chatham, and City Hall Place from Duane to Pearl streets, dirty with street dirt, manure, rub bish and garbage. With these exceptions, and the usual exception of the Five Points, the streets have been very clean.

Assistant Inspector Hughes (8th Ward) reports Assistant inspector Hughes (8th Ward) reports the following streets horse manure and street dirt, viz.: Thompson, Sullivan, Greenwich and Spring streets, between Hudson and West streets. These streets to be kept properly clean should be swept daily. His other streets were fairly cleaned.

Inspector Morris (9th and 15th wards) reports his streets as having been in good condition for

the last week, excepting Wooster street above Bleecker street, which has been filthy. Inspector Bryant (10th and 13th wards) reports

Inspector Bryant (10th and 13th wards) reports Division street as imperfectly swept, and the almost traditional dirt and garbage of Goerck, Mangin and Rivington streets continues. The streets of the 20th ward in which the Inspector has been doing duty, are—those west of 9th avenue, are still in a bad state of repair, the gutters containing an abundance of surface water and elons.

Assistant Inspector Atwater (17th ward) finds his streets very fairly cleaned, with the following exceptions: Eleventh, Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, between Avenues A and B, which were strewn wirh straw and garbage. Portions, also, of Avenue A and First avenue, were offensive also with garbage, street filth and stagnant water, due mainly to the broken character of the street pavement.

Permits have been granted to consignees of 95 vessels for the discharge of cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

The following opinion constitutes a portion of the proceedings of the Law Department for the week ending September 27, 1873:

The "New York Bridge Company" derives its existence and powers from an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed April 16, 1867, with the object of constructing and maintaining a bridge over the East river, between the cities of New York and Brooklyn;" and the recent action of the Board of Apportionment providing for the payment to the company of \$150,000 in addition to former allowances, is sustained by the laws of the State and the ordinances of the city.

The Honorable the Board of Assistant Aldermen :

GENTLEMEN: A copy of the resolution of your Board requesting a reference to the laws and the opinion of this department in relation to the recent appropriation of the sum of \$150,000, by the Board of Apportionment to the New York Bridge Company, was received.

The "New York Bridge Company" derives its existence and powers from an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act to incorporate the New York Bridge Company, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a Bridge over the East River, between the cities of New York and Brooklyn.' This act was passed April 16th, 1867. (Chap. 399, page 593 of the laws of 1867.)

The 12th section of that act is as follows: "The cities of New York and Brooklyn, or either of them, are authorized to subscribe to the capital stock of said company such an amount as two-thirds of their Common Councils, respectively, shall determine, and to issue bonds in payment of such subscriptions, payable in not less than thirty years, or may guarantee the payment of the principal and interest of the Bonds of the Company in such amounts as the Common Council shall respectively determine."

It is clear, therefore, that the city of New York had the right to subscribe for the capital stock of the company in question.

On the 31st of December, 1868, the Common Council of the city of New York, by a twothirds vote, passed an ordinance in relation to this subject, of which the following is an exfrict. viz. :

"SECTION I. The sum of one million five hundred thousand dollars is hereby subscribed on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Com-monalty of the city of New York, to the capital stock of the New York Bridge Company; provided nevertheless that the said charter of said company shall be so amended that the Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen be ex officio directors of said company, and that such city officers shall represent the interests of the corporation in said company."

The second section of said ordinance authorizes the Comptroller to issue bonds to the amount of \$1,500,000 to pay said subscription. See proceedings of the Board of Aldermen and Councilmen, vol. 36, page 344.

The law relating to the New York Bridge Company was amended to conform to the proviso of the ordinance first above cited, by an act of the Legislature of the State of New York entitled "An act to amend an act to incorporate the New York Bridge Company," &c.

By section I of the Act it is provided that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall be represented in the Board of Directors of the New York Bridge Company by the Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen by virtue of their respective offices. This law was passed on the 20th day of February, 1869. (Vol. 1, chapter 26, page 45 of the laws of 1869.)

The proviso in the ordinance above referred

to was thus complied with.

Section 112 as amended by section 20, chapter 757, laws of 1873, of the present charter of the city of New York, provides, among other things, as follows: "The said Board of Apportionment may from time to time, by the affirmative vote of three members, authorize the issue of the whole or any portion of any stock or bonds which are now by law authorized to be issued upon compliance with the provisions of law authorizing them."

The total amount authorized to be issued by the ordinance of the Common Council was \$1,500,000. Of this sum, I am informed by the Comptroller, nine instalments of \$150,000 each have been called for by the company, amounting to \$1,350,000.
