MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The following message was received from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, November 30, 1874.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

It is my painful duty to announce to you the death of the Hon. William F. Havemeyer, the Mayor of this city, at ten minutes past twelve o'clock this P. M.

While engaged in the discharge of his public duties he was suddenly removed from our midst.

It was his proud distinction to have been elected by his fellow-citizens for three different terms to the chair of Chief Magistrate of this city.

No citizen ever filled that chair with a more sincere desire to advance the public welfare. He had no thought nor desire but to carry into effect what appeared to him to promote the best interests of this community.

His last administration of the government was during a transition period, turbulent and embarrassing. His services during this period will long be remembered with gratitude.

A native of this city, his long life has been identified with its material prosperity.

To you I recommend such action as will mark the public appreciation of our departed chief.

Alderman Van Schaick presented the following preamble and resolutions, prefacing their introduction by a feeling allusion to the unexpected

death of the Hon. Wm. F. Havemeyer, late Mayor of this city:

Almighty God, Ruler of all things, has in His wise providence taken from us our Chief Magistrate, William F. Havemeyer, Mayor of this city.

It, therefore, becomes the mournful duty of this Common Council, in joint meeting assembled, to give expression to their sense of the great loss which the city, as well as the family of the deceased, has sustained by this unexpected bereavement.

Born in the City of New York, A. D., 1804, when its population numbered scarcely 67,000, Mr. Havemeyer was elected Mayor in 1845, and again elected in 1848, when the population was less than 500,000.

In 1872, when the City had a population of nearly a million, he was for the third time elected to the Mayoralty, and at the time of his death he was at his post in the active discharge of the duties of his high office.

During the long period of his active life Mr. Havemeyer engaged no small amount of public attention. His advice was repeatedly sought for in moments of public peril, and he was thrice elevated by the preference of his fellow-townsmen to the highest office in their gift.

He has filled other and numerous positions of public and private trust, each of which he has discharged faithfully and well.

He grew with the growth of his native city, and strengthened with its strength, and he has died full of years and of honors.

Resolved, As a token of respect for the memory of Mayor Wm. F. Havemeyer, deceased, this Common Council will attend his funeral in a body, and will wear a badge of mourning for the period of thirty days; that the Mayor's office, the chambers of the Common Council, and the various public offices be appropriately draped in mourning; that the flags on the City Hall and other public buildings be displayed at half-staff, from sunrise till sunset, from this time until after his funeral.

Resolved, That the Joint Committee of five from each branch of the Common Council already appointed, be and they are hereby instructed to make such other arrangements for the obsequies, as in their judgment will best express the sorrow of all classes of citizens by reason of the sad bereavement.

Resolved, That as an additional mark of respect for the memory of the honored deceased, a copy of the foregoing, properly engrossed, be transmitted to his family.

Alderman McCafferty, in seconding the adoption of the resolutions, alluded in the most feeling manner to the public loss occasioned by the death of the Mayor, and paid a fitting tribute of respect to his memory.

Assistant Aldermen Thornell and Clancy, and E. Delafield Smith, Esq., Counsel to the Corporation, and Professor Charles F. Chandler, President of the Department of Health, pronounced appropriate and affecting eulogies on the life and services, and public and private worth of the illustrious deceased.

The question was then taken on the adoption of the preamble and resolution.

Which was unanimously agreed to.

Whereas, This Board have just learned with deep regret of the sudden death this day of his Honor Wm. F. Havemeyer, Mayor of the City of New York, therefore

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to prepare suitable resolutions expressive of our sentiments upon this melancholy dispensation, to report at the next meeting of this Board.

Resolved, That this Board attend in a body at the funeral of his Honor, and that a committee of three be appointed to make suitable arrangements therefor.

Aldermen Fisher, Shipman, and Clancy were appointed the committee specified in the above resolution.

I am requested by the committee to ask of you that you be so kind as to communicate to them, through this office, the time and place fixed for the funeral of the deceased.

Whereas, It is fit and proper that this Board should give expression to its feelings and sentiments on so sad and momentous an occasion, and unite in bearing tribute to the memory and worth of the departed Chief Magistrate of this city; therefore be it

Resolved, That while we bow in humble submission to the will of an All-wise Providence in removing so suddenly from our midst, full of honor and years, W. F. Havemeyer, Mayor of the City of New York, we feel that this city has lost one of its most eminent and virtuous public servants, and the community one of its most self-sacrificing and public-spirited citizens.

Resolved, That this Board deeply sympathize with the bereaved family, relatives, and friends of the deceased in their irreparable loss of an affectionate husband, devoted parent, kind relative, and faithful friend.

Resolved, As a token of respect, that the building and public rooms of the Central Office be appropriately draped in mourning for a period of thirty days, and that the Board of Police attend the funeral of the deceased in a body.

Resolved, That the foregoing preamble and resolutions be entered at length on the minutes of the Board, and a copy thereof, suitably engrossed, forwarded to the family of the deceased.

Mr. Commissioner Disbecker offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That as a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased Chief Magistrate, this Board do now adjourn.

Whereas, The sterling honesty of purpose, keen appreciation of merit, and upright dealings of the late Mayor made him a proper subject for veneration and respect; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board deem the death of Honorable William F. Havemeyer to be a public calamity by which the city has been deprived of an upright official, the community of an honest citizen, and the mercantile world of a model business man.

Resolved, That to the widow and children of the deceased we extend our heart-felt and sincere condolence in this their hour of affliction, and trust that a Divine Providence will speedily assuage their grief, for "in the midst of life we are in death."

Resolved, That as a mark of respect for the memory of the illustrious deceased, this office be closed on the day of the funeral, and that the Commissioners attend the obsequies of the late Mayor in a body.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, properly engrossed, be transmitted to the family of the late Mr. Havemeyer, and published in the city press.

Out of respect for the memory of the deceased, the Board then adjourned.
