COMMON COUNCIL

APPROVED BY THE MAYOR,
DURING THE WEEK ENDING DEC. 26, 1874.

Resolved, That Third avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, between Harlem river and One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, be graded in accordance with the grade established by the Commissioners appointed by the Legislature for opening and laying out streets, roads, and avenues in the Town of Morrisania; and that such work be done under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, in accordance with section 14 of chapter 329 of the Laws of 1874; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.
