NEW YORK, November 30, 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In 1877 the undersigned began his labors upon the revision of the ordinances, which continued without interruption until the submission of the same to the Board of Aldermen, on the 5th day of October, 1880.

On or about the first day of February, 1879, the Committee on Law of the Common Council employed the undersigned as an expert, to examine and unite, if possible, the two codifications of the ordinances, which had been submitted by the respective Commissioners, and produce from them one symmetrical and harmonious code.

Your petitioner was engaged upon such work between four and five months, night as well as day, and completed the united revision to the entire satisfaction of the said Committee and was accepted by it.

It was agreed between the said Committee and petitioner, that the petitioner should accept such compensation for his services as the City might think proper to give him.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Common Council instructs me that the proper method of obtaining such compensation is to apply to your Honorable Board, and your petitioner, therefore, respectfully asks your Honorable Board to award him the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), as suggested by the Committee on Law of the Common Council, for the aforesaid services.

I herewith beg leave to submit a copy of the letter of the Committee on Law respecting the foregoing subject, the original being in the possession of the Finance Committee of the Common Council.

On or about the 1st day of February, 1879, the Committee on Law of the Common Council sent for your petitioner, and informed him that they wished to secure his services as an expert, to examine and unite into one symmetrical and harmonious code, if possible, the two codifications which had been submitted by the two Commissioners to the Common Council, and by it referred to the said committee, with instructions to harmonize them.

Your petitioner agreed to perform the work and to accept such compensation as the City should think proper to give him.

The City never having in any way compensated your petitioner for the aforesaid work, he respectfully asks your Honorable Body to award him a fair and reasonable compensation therefor.

The said Committee on Law, in a communication to your Honorable Board, which will be found in the proceedings of 1880, p. , suggests that he be allowed the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1,500) dollars as a fair compensation for said services.
