

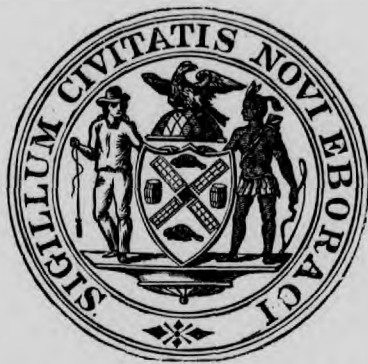

Commissioner McClave offered the following, which was adopted:
Whereas, William Murray has, by reason of long-continued illness, rendering it unwise in him to longer attempt the performance of his duties as the Chief Officer of the Police force, deemed it proper to apply to this Board to be retired and placed upon the Police Pension Roll; and
Whereas, Such application has been granted in accordance with the mandatory provisions of the law relative to the retirement of officers after twenty years of service; and
Whereas, This Board feels it only just and proper to place upon record its appreciation of his high merit as a public officer, and his estimable character as a man; therefore be it
Resolved, That the record of William Murray, from the date of his appointment as Patrolman, May 24, 1866, and in every rank from the lowest to the highest, has been such as to excite the most earnest commendation of the various Commissioners of Police in office since that date. His conduct and obedience to the rules has been such that he has never been subjected to fine or penalty while in the service. Such a record and such a career of successful performance of duty are rare indeed, and they are commended to the force as worthy of emulation.

Resolved, That it is believed by this Board no taint can possibly rest upon the character of William Murray as a man and public officer. Ever affable to all who sought his advice or assistance, firm and conscientious in all his official acts, courageous and determined in what he believed to be right and just, both to the force and the public, he merits and will receive the approval of this Board and of the citizens he has served so ably and well.

Resolved, That this Board regrets the necessity that compels the retirement of so worthy an officer; and hereby directs that this action be inscribed upon its minutes, and a copy to be forwarded to Mr. Murray by the Chief Clerk.

Resolved, That Chief Inspector Thomas Byrnes be and is hereby appointed Superintendent of Police, subject to examination by the Civil Service Examining Board.

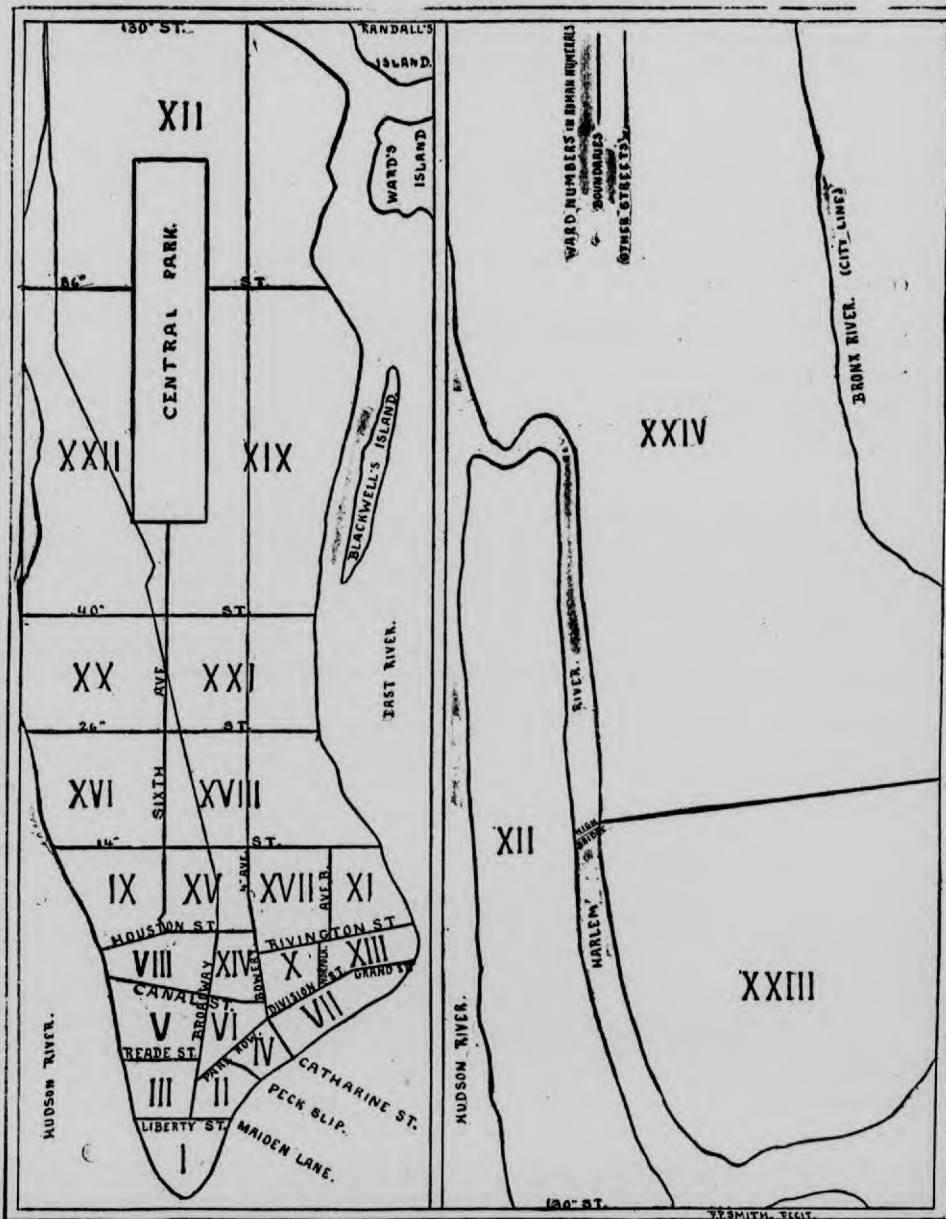

The 983 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.82, against 26.52 for the previous week and 38.00 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show an increase for the week, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 143, 502, 250, 11, 7 and 16, against 130, 430, 213, 13, 0 and 2 for the previous week, a total of 929 against 788. The increase of diphtheria was most marked between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, from river to river, and in the lower portion of the annexed district, with slight variations elsewhere. Measles increased markedly between Division street, Park Row and the East river, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East and West, and in the upper portion of the annexed district, the changes elsewhere being slight. Scarlet fever increased between Canal and West Houston streets, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, west of Avenue B, above Fortieth street, West, and Twenty-sixth street, East, and in the annexed district, varying little or decreasing elsewhere; 8 cases of small-pox were above Fourteenth street and 8 below.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and

the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
