JOINT MEETING LOCAL BOARD, PROSPECT HEIGHTS DISTRICT AND FLATBUSH DISTRICT.

Thursday, May 8, 1902.

Meeting in Borough Hall at 3 p. m.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names:

Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough; Alderman Tebbetts, 56th Aldermanic District; Alderman Seebeck, 57th Aldermanic District; Alderman Wentz, 61st Aldermanic District; Alderman Wirth, 62d Aldermanic District; Alderman McInnes, 63d Aldermanic District.

The President submitted the following:

No. 10A.

Petition for grading and paving Prospect avenue from Fort Hamilton avenue to a point near Eleventh avenue.

The following report from the Engineer of the Bureau of Highways:

(Copy.)

Estimate for Grading and Paving No. 38.

City of New York, Borough of Brooklyn,
Office of Commissioner of Public Works,
Bureau of Highways, Chief Engineer's Office,
Municipal Building, April 7, 1902.

Mr. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I return herewith the petition for regulating and grading with granite blocks or asphalt Prospect avenue, from Fort Hamilton avenue to a point near Eleventh avenue, where it winds and turns, and as said avenue is laid down on the map of The City of New York. The items are as follows:

25,000 cubic yards of grading;
4,400 linear feet of curb;

12,240 square yards of pavement;

20,600 square feet of cement sidewalk.

The estimated cost is, for asphalt, \$44,800, and for granite, \$39,600. The assessed valuation is \$70,300. It will be noticed that in both of these estimates the estimated cost is more than one-half of the assessed valuation.

The street is legally opened from Fort Hamilton avenue to the old City line, and proceedings are pending for the remainder of the distance, the title having been vested October 3, 1901.

Sewers have either been built or are under construction at the present time. No sewer basins, however, have been constructed. These basins should be put in before the street is paved. Water and gas mains have been laid between Fort Hamilton avenue and Vanderbilt street.

In considering the improvement of this street, it should be understood that Prospect avenue passes under Seely street, the difference in grade being 15.7 feet. Seely street now is about 10 feet above the proposed grade of Prospect avenue. If these proceedings were carried out it would mean that Seely street, now paved with cobble, would have to be raised about 6 feet, graded to the new grade and repaved. A bridge would also be required over Prospect avenue. The cost of this regrading and repaving and bridge construction is not included in the estimate given herewith. I am uncertain as to what fund the cost of the bridge construction and regrading should be charged. It does not seem, however, that it should be charged to the adjoining property, as Prospect avenue will be a thoroughfare connecting all of the section south and west of the Park with South Brooklyn. This improvement is very necessary and it seems to me that it would be proper for the City at large to pay the extra cost over and above one-half of the assessed valuation.

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Flatbush and Prospect Heights districts, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 8th day of May, 1902, hereby determines to initiate proceedings to regulate, grade and pave Prospect avenue with granite block pavement between Fort Hamilton avenue and a point near Eleventh avenue where it winds and turns, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and to set or reset curb, and pave sidewalks of said street with cement where not already done, and furthermore recommends that the extra cost over and above one-half of the assessed valuation be borne by The City of New York.

Resolved, That this resolution be forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

No. 10B.

Petition for the construction of sewer in Franklin avenue between Montgomery street and Union street.

The following report from the Superintendent of Sewers:

Hon. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I herewith return a communication, which you referred to me, the same being addressed to the Bureau of Sewers by the Secretary of the President of the Borough under date of April 3, 1902; also a petition, in relation to the construction of a sewer in Franklin avenue, between Montgomery and Union streets.

The Chief Engineer of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, reports to me as follows:

"I beg to state that the estimated cost for the above-mentioned improvement is \$7,940, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$175,810.

"In regard to outlet sewers, information of which is requested in above-mentioned communication, I beg to state that one will be required in Montgomery street, between Franklin and Bedford avenues, the estimated cost of which is \$4,600, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$198,955.

"For outlets beyond this point reference is made to my letters of February 7th, 1902, 60th street, from 14th avenue to 19th avenue, etc., etc.; Flatbush avenue, from Foster avenue to Bedford avenue, etc.; and February 8th, 1902, Bedford avenue, from Montgomery street to Flatbush avenue.

"In regard to streets which are legally open, I beg to state that Franklin avenue within above limits is open and paved.

"Montgomery street was declared open, from Franklin avenue to the city line, March 20, 1893.

"From City line (just west of Bedford avenue), to East New York avenue. Commissioners for opening were appointed September 18, 1899 ("City Record," page 7,852 for the year 1900)."

Dear Sir—In response to yours of April 4, regarding the condition of Franklin avenue, between Montgomery and Union streets, and Montgomery street, between Franklin avenue and Bedford avenue, as regards their being opened, I would say that Franklin avenue is opened between the points mentioned.

Montgomery street, from Franklin avenue to the city line, which is a short distance only west of Franklin avenue, was declared open by resolution of the Common Council March 20, 1893.

From the city line extending east to New York avenue proceedings are now pending for the opening of Montgomery street, the final maps having been sent on the 12th of March, 1902.

In the block between Gerard avenue and River avenue the City can dispose of 13,869 square feet, because it owns One Hundred and Sixty-second street, which is laid out at a width of 100 feet, and because the new street lies entirely within the old 100-foot street.

It will be seen, therefore, that the City can dispose of 31,395 square feet lying within the old lines of the 100-foot street, and has to acquire 25,737 square feet for the ramp between Gerard avenue and Walton avenue.

In addition, it is proposed to close the drainage street between Walton avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, which covers an area of 7,414 square feet, to which the City, however, has not taken title as yet.
