COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 3 o'clock p. m., on Wednesday, February 25, 1903.

Present—Seth Low, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Elgin R. L. Gould, Chamberlain; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen, and Herbert Parsons, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings held January 7 and 14 and February 4, 1903, was dispensed with.

The Mayor called up for hearing the matter of a proposed lease to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company of the franchise for a ferry between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, as submitted by the Commissioner of Docks, with a report thereon giving all the facts in connection therewith.

Two propositions were under consideration by the Dock Commissioner, one from the H. H. Rogers syndicate, representing the trolley roads on the island, and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, which controls the steam roads.

The report shows the main features of the two propositions contrasted as follows:

STEAM ROAD OFFER.

Rental of the New York terminal, \$21,500; rental of Staten Island terminal, 5 per cent. on cost to the City.

Three ferry routes: St. George, Clifton, Port Richmond.

Improvements, buildings, slips, etc., revert to the City at the expiration of lease. (Valuation, \$450,000.)

Both slips at Whitehall street to be kept available for Staten Island ferry purposes, but one slip to be surrendered for a subsequent ferry to Staten Island if established.

St. George terminal is ready and can be acquired immediately by private agreement at the City's price.

St. George terminal free from grade crossing.

Main terminal free from sewer connection.

Access to St. George terminal for existing and future lines, said terminal being in common trackage district and open to any future independent road.

Fare, 5 cents; no commutation.

Buildings, slips, etc., erected at the expense of company.

St. George terminal five miles from Whitehall street and nearest point to Manhattan.

TROLLEY ROAD OFFER.

Rental New York terminal, \$10,000; rental Staten Island terminals, 3 per cent. on cost to the City (which is less than the interest paid by the City for bonds which would be issued to cover the cost).

Two ferry routes: Arrietta street, West New Brighton.

Improvements, buildings, slips, etc., to be purchased by the City at expiration of lease.

Both slips insisted on for trolley interests involving exclusive franchise to the Island.

Condemnation and legislation required, involving delay.

Arrietta street terminal, grade crossing.

Main terminal over trunk line sewer outlet. (This is a matter of considerable importance at low tide.)

Arrietta street not in common trackage district, and only existing lines to have the right of access.

Fare, 5 cents; monthly commutation, 3 cents.

Buildings, slips, etc., to be erected at the expense of the City.

Arrietta street, 5 1-3 miles from Manhattan.

Mr. Andrew Power spoke in opposition to the lease on the plan proposed, and was opposed to the granting of a lease to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company under any circumstances.

Mr. David Tysen, of the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce, spoke at length in opposition to the lease, and stated that the Chamber of Commerce was unanimously in favor of the Rogers proposition.

Mr. Cornelius J. Kolff also spoke in opposition to the proposed lease, and favored the Rogers proposition.

Mr. Arthur M. Harris spoke in opposition to the proposed lease.

Mr. Edward P. Doyle spoke in favor of the lease as submitted.

Mr. Henry M. Morrison spoke in opposition to the granting of the lease as recommended by the Dock Commissioner, and advocated municipal ownership.

Mr. John S. Davenport spoke in favor of the proposed lease. He declared he did not believe the Rogers syndicate to be sincere; that they wanted the lease to harass the Rapid Transit Company, or to compel that company to buy it from them, and that a line of boats could not be run from Staten Island to this City at a 3 cent fare without loss.

Mr. F. A. Herdon spoke in opposition to the lease.

Mr. J. G. Timolat spoke in favor of the lease as submitted, declaring that the Dock Commissioner, having heard all the arguments pro and con, and with his corps of Engineers to advise him, was best qualified to act in the matter, and that his recommendation should be accepted.

Mr. J. J. Kenny spoke in favor of a St. George terminal, but against the lease proposed.

Mr. E. D. Clark, Mr. George Metcalf, Mr. J. T. Roake, Mr. E. J. Wheeler, Mr. Eckstein and Mr. Bridgeman also spoke in opposition to the proposed lease.

On motion, the hearing was adjourned until 11 o'clock a. m. on Wednesday, March 4, 1903, at which time the counsel on both sides will be heard.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution to amend the resolution approving of the appointment of a Stenographer and Typewriter (see page):

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held February 4, 1903, approving of the appointment by the Secretary of a Stenographer and Typewriter, be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following:

"And Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to recommend to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the amended Greater New York Charter, that the salary for the position of Stenographer and Typewriter for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be fixed at ten hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,050) per annum."

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Armory Board, relative to new armory for the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y.:

NEW YORK, February 16, 1903.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith the plans and specifications for the proposed new armory for the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y., to be erected at Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue.

The architects' estimate of the complete cost of this building is six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000).

At a meeting of the Armory Board held January 21, 1903, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the plans for the proposed new Seventy-first Regiment Armory Building, to be erected at Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue, prepared by Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects, be accepted and adopted; that the sum of six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000) be and hereby is appropriated for the erection thereof, including architects' fees, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same."

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution:

February 20, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Armory Commissioners, by its Secretary, John P. Gustaveson, transmits to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in communications of February 16, 1903,

—"the plans and specifications for the proposed new armory for the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y., to be erected at Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue."

"The architects' estimate of the complete cost of this building is six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000)."

"At a meeting of the Armory Board held January 21, 1903, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the plans for the proposed new Seventy-first Regiment Armory Building, to be erected at Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue, prepared by Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects, be accepted and adopted; that the sum of six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000) be and hereby is appropriated for the erection thereof, including architects' fees, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same."

The specifications are full and minutely describe the work to be done; they call for substantial but not extravagant work. The plans are satisfactory.

The following description, given mostly by the architects, affords a clear idea of the building:

It is to be located on the old site on the east side of Park avenue, between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets, the plot being 197 feet 6 inches on Park avenue and 236 feet 8 inches on Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets.

The old walls are to be removed, and the old materials used as far as they will go. The walls of the first story, so called, but consisting of a basement story and a mezzanine story, and extending to the water table, will be built of the old granite, and above this line will be of selected common brick, trimmed with granite.

The main tower has been carried up to the height shown on the plans, to accommodate the Signal Corps, and it is capped with an ornamental top built of sheets

of copper. This tower being a special feature of this armory, I give the following figures as to its height:

"In the basement, which is slightly below the curb on Thirty-third street, will be located the company locker rooms, Quartermaster's store rooms, gymnasium, company meeting room, rifle range, showers, boiler room, squad drill room, kitchen, pantries, general lavatories and toilets.

"On the story above basement, and under drill room floor, are located company parlors, Line Officers' locker rooms, the library, Quartermaster's issuing room, squad drill room, upper portion of gymnasium and the revolver range.

"The main drill room floor is located above this, and just above the level of high point of curb on Thirty-fourth street. The westerly end of drill room floor contains administration rooms of the regiment and the headquarters of the First Brigade, N. G., N. Y.

"Above this, on first gallery floor, are located the rooms of the Field and Staff Officers and the veterans' memorial room.

"Second gallery floor generally is given up to the First Signal Corps, with the exception of the southwest corner, in which are located the band and field music rooms.

"Above this, including the tower, is given up wholly to the Signal Corps, and in which are located officers' rooms of Signal Corps, drill hall, toilet rooms and showers.

"The building throughout is fireproof in construction. The columns carrying floors are of cast iron and those carrying large main tower and roof trusses are of steel. An approved system of floor arches will be used throughout, with the exception of the drill room floor, which will have brick arches turned between the beams. All partitions will be built of fireproof material and the trim generally of hard wood, neat, plain and as small as possible. All floors will be of comb-grained yellow pine, except through a large portion of the basement, which will be of cement, and all walls and ceilings in administration departments and in the quarters occupied by the officers and men will be plastered, with the exception of the walls and ceilings of the drill room, which will not be plastered.

"The roofs will be covered with an approved composition roof material and guaranteed water tight for two (2) years.

"There will be one electric elevator running into the tower, 3 feet 6 inches by 4 feet 6 inches; the rise to be from drill room floor to top floor of tower, about 105 feet; to be worked by electric motor in basement.

"The building will be heated by steam generated into two 100-horse power horizontal tubular boilers located in the basement, by direct radiation, by radiators placed throughout the building. The basement, mezzanine floor (below drill floor) and rifle range are to be ventilated by fans.

"The best and most modern system of plumbing is provided for. All soil, vent and waste pipes are of cast iron and all supplies will be galvanized wrought iron. The showers will be supplied with hot and cold water.

"The building generally will be lighted by electricity from the Edison service, although sufficient gas outlets will be supplied in case of an emergency."

The architects submit an estimate of \$650,000 for the entire building (exclusive of furniture), architects' fees, inspection, etc., which appears to be a conservative estimate.

In my opinion the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly concur in the action of the Armory Board and authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$650,000, the proceeds to be applied to the erection of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

Whereas, The Board of Armory Commissioners, at meeting held January 21, 1903, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the plans for the proposed new Seventy-first Regiment Armory Building, to be erected at Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue, prepared by Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects, be accepted and adopted; that the sum of six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000) be and hereby is appropriated for the erection thereof, including architects' fees, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same."

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby concur in said resolution, and that the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the payment of the expenses in the erection of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution, relative to an appropriation of \$7,500 for new furniture for the new armory of the First Battery, N. G., N. Y.:

February 5, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Armory Board, at a meeting of January 21, 1903, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) be and is hereby appropriated for the purchase of new furniture for the furnishing of the new Armory of the First Battery, N. G., N. Y., on West Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, and the superintendence and inspection thereof, in accordance with the provisions of section 134 of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same."

I would report that the accompanying list, furnished by the Secretary of the Armory Board, specifies the furniture required for the new Armory of the First Battery, N. G., N. Y. I have gone over an estimate furnished me by the Secretary of the Armory Board, and from the prices allowed the furniture to be furnished will be of a very good quality and similar to furniture supplied by the City for other armories.

The estimate being reasonable for the class of furniture required, I think the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly concur, pursuant to section 134 of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, in the appropriation of \$7,500 for the purchase of new furniture for the furnishing of the new Armory of the First Battery, N. G., N. Y., on West Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Resolved, That for the purpose of providing means for the payment thereof the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to

the amount of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the payment of the expenses aforesaid.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting the assignment of the old North Moore Street School, in the Borough of Manhattan (see page —):

NEW YORK, February 10, 1903.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—In view of the great necessities of the Street Cleaning Department for place for storage and the handling of equipment and the further development of the service in separation of material, it is earnestly requested that the condemned school building known as the North Moore Street School, situated on North Moore and Varick streets, with a small frontage on West Broadway, a portion of which has already been assigned to the Street Cleaning Department as a section station, be set aside for this Department to be used in conjunction with assorting and temporary storing of the material known as light refuse.

The assignment of this building for the purpose herein indicated would render possible the handling of the wastes in the lower part of the City in such a fashion that a considerable income could be derived from it.

The following report of the Commissioner of Public Works was laid before the Board:

Hon. GEORGE CROMWELL, President of the Borough, New Brighton, S. I.:

Dear Sir—In the matter of the petitions from the property owners in Westerleigh for the regulating and grading and paving with vitrified brick pavement on a sand foundation certain streets designated in the petitions, I will report as follows:

The streets named in the petition have been colored on the map presented herewith. There appear to be two errors in the petition: one specifying Dickie avenue, from Watchogue road to Lathrop avenue, which will extend through the Darcey estate (which I do not think was intended); also Demorest avenue, from Watchogue road to Indiana avenue. This is through private property, as shown on the map, from Lathrop avenue to Indiana avenue, whereas Neal Dow avenue, which runs through to Indiana avenue, is only specified from Watchogue road to Lathrop avenue. It would appear that these two streets were transposed in the petition; also the map which was presented with the petition shows the widening of Lathrop avenue, from Clinton B. Fisk avenue to Willard avenue, from a width of 25 feet, as at present, to a width of 50 feet, adjoining the Auditorium.

This is a desirable improvement, and will be necessary before this block can be paved, and I would suggest that a petition for this widening be presented, or a deed of the 25-foot strip to the City be filed with this office.

All the streets mentioned in the petition have been carefully examined on the ground, and the subjects of grades and foundations carefully investigated. The map accompanying this report indicates in different colors the result of this examination, and the recommendations of this office. Those streets colored in brown it is recommended shall be paved on a concrete foundation; those in blue with a foundation of broken stone; those in pink with a foundation of sand.

It is recommended that Jewett avenue, from the Boulevard to New York avenue, be paved with vitrified brick on a concrete foundation, to be paid for from repaving bonds, without assessment on the property benefited, for the reason that this street is already paved with macadam pavement, and, I understand, an assessment was once levied for this work by the former Village of New Brighton. It would appear, therefore, to be proper and desirable that this street should be paid for by the City at large from bond issues.

It is deemed necessary to place a concrete foundation on those streets where the grades are steep; where the present condition of the ground is wet and spongy, and on those streets which will carry the greater quantity of storm water (there being no storm water sewers in this section).

On the College Hill section the brick on sand foundation pavement, as shown in pink, is recommended for the upper levels where the ground is firm. On the section west of Jewett avenue the intention is to carry the storm water from east to west to the Palmer's run on each street. Concrete foundation has been placed on these streets on the steepest grade, and the broken stone foundation under the balance of the streets from east to west, carrying the greatest amount of the storm water.

The section west of Willard avenue and north of Lathrop avenue, being low ground and wet a portion of the year, it was thought best to pave entirely with broken stone foundation; also the full length of Wooley avenue, which receives all the storm water from the district west of Jewett avenue. The balance of the streets and those running north and south it was considered safe to pave on a sand foundation, there being very little water to be carried, and the ground offering a firm foundation in most cases.

As a guide to the petitioners, I will state that the approximate estimate of the different classes of pavement herewith recommended is as follows:

Vitrified brick on 8-inch sand foundation, \$2 per square yard.

Vitrified brick on 6-inch of broken stone and 2-inch sand foundation, \$2.40 per square yard.

Vitrified brick on 4½-inch of Portland cement concrete, with a 1-inch sand cushion, \$2.80 per square yard.

In addition to these it will be necessary to add the cost of the curb as petitioned for in front of those lots where none now exists. This curb will cost in the neighborhood of 80 to 90 cents per linear foot, set.

The map above referred to also shows in green color all of the houses now constructed in the district affected.

As the Charter provides that no improvement shall be authorized by the City where the cost of the same exceeds one-half the assessed valuation (on the last preceding assessment roll) of the property to be benefited and assessed, it would seem very doubtful whether a considerable part of the improvement petitioned for can be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This, however, can more properly come before said Board of Estimate and Apportionment after the proper resolutions have been passed by the Local Board of Staten Island.

It will be noted in the above statement that the estimated cost of paving New York avenue, east of Jewett avenue, with brick on concrete; Maine avenue, east from Jewett avenue, with brick on sand; and Columbus place, from Dickie avenue to Bidwell avenue, with macadam, exceeds in each case one-half of the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited, which makes their improvement on these lines contrary to law.

I have, therefore, given an estimate for New York avenue and Maine avenue with "macadam" as noted, and leave Columbus place out of the list of streets to be improved.

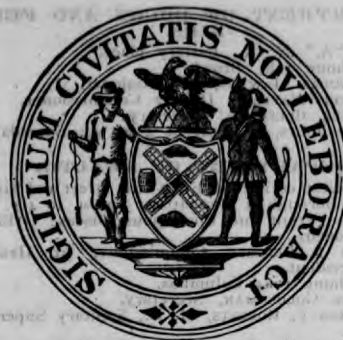

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
