Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: It will cost about \$250 to sheathe the flooring on the outside and the roof of the pavilion at Fordham Hospital. It is not believed that, even when this sheathing is accomplished, it will be possible in cold weather to keep this ward warm. It will be better to discontinue the use of the ward during the very severe weather of the winter.

The Patrolmen at Bellevue Hospital are working under a three-platoon system and are on duty but eight hours a day. They have sixteen hours off each day. The Police Commissioner states that these men perform no reserve duty and consequently are much better off than the regular men. He states that they are to get their meals before and after going on duty, the same as the men on regular patrol, and that in his opinion they should not be fed at the expense of the institution. It therefore seems best that the Board of Trustees take no action in the premises, particularly as there are several employees at this hospital to whom meals are not supplied.

The new bath tubs will cost \$615 delivered at Bellevue Hospital, the plumbers to put them in place.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The roof and leaders of Bellevue Hospital are in such bad shape that it is almost imperative that repairs should be made. It is recommended that estimates be prepared for this work and an advertisement inserted in the CITY RECORD calling for bids.

A great deal of work is imposed on the employees of the various dining rooms in the hospital. For example, at each meal there are washed in the doctors' mess 999 pieces, in the steward's mess 1,168 pieces, in the employees' mess 2,576 pieces. It is recommended that two or more dish washing machines be purchased so as to facilitate the cleaning of the dishes, make the cleaning more efficient, and lessen the breakage. Each machine would cost on an average \$300, put in place.

It is recommended that specifications be prepared for beds, bedside stands, ward medicine cases, wheel stretchers, bed trays and other articles that are needed in the hospitals of the Department.

Attention is invited to the fact that the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital has not made any recommendation for appointment of a house surgeon and senior in place of Dr. Burns and Dr. Parmenter. These vacancies at present are filled by substitutes.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Superintendent be directed to prepare specifications and an advertisement calling for bids on the work of preparing the roof and leaders of Bellevue Hospital, said advertisement to be not inserted in the CITY RECORD until the additional sum of fifty thousand dollars to meet the deficit in the accounts has been approved by the proper authorities.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the attention of the Harlem Medical Board be called to the fact that no recommendations have as yet been sent in for appointment of a house surgeon and senior in place of Drs. Burns and Parmenter, and that the Board be invited to make nominations to these positions.

Communications.

A communication under date of December 11 was received from Messrs. Horgan & Slattery enclosing an estimate from P. J. Carlin & Co. on the work of removing the plaster cornice and ornamental iron grills at the base of the operating theatre skylight at the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication, under date of December 7, was received from Mr. Joseph Balaboa, concerning his bid on the iron balconies of the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Committee on Buildings for investigation and report.

Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan, the President, reported the passage by the Board of Aldermen of a resolution appropriating fifty thousand dollars in Special Revenue Bonds for the purpose of making up the deficit in the accounts of the Department.

Dr. Brannan reported that the matter of acquiring land and erecting a home for the Nurses of the Bellevue Training School is under consideration, said school to be placed under the joint control of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and a Board of Managers composed of ladies appointed by the Mayor from nominations made by the present Board of Managers, and, as representatives of the City, the Comptroller, the President of the Department of Health and the President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. It is proposed to use the building to train Nurses for Bellevue Hospital and to supply Pupil Nurses to the hospitals of the Department of Health, which at present employs Graduate Nurses at a salary of forty dollars a month. This will save the City from thirty to forty thousand dollars a year, which amount will more than meet the interest on the money necessary to purchase the land and erect the building. The land under consideration is on the south side of East Twenty-sixth street, opposite Bellevue Hospital, and is the property of General George Moore Smith.

The President appointed the following committees to visit the Allied Hospitals during December and January:

Gouverneur Hospital—Messrs. Tierney and Sachs.

Harlem Hospital—Messrs. Stern and Paulding.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

It is recommended that the architect for the new Gouverneur Hospital be requested to have a stationary washstand placed in the nose and throat room of the Out-Patient Department.

Authority is requested to have the necessary repairs made to the X-ray apparatus and to place the electrical department in first-class condition. This can be done at an expense not exceeding \$700.

In consequence of defective provision for warming plates and food cans the food of patients is frequently cold when served. If the present two-burner gas heaters in the diet kitchen are replaced by gas stoves it will be possible to have the plates warmed at the same time that the food is being kept warm. These will cost \$8.50 each, and authority is requested to purchase them for the several diet kitchens in the hospital.

Two of the Attendants' dormitories are without lockers for clothing. Twenty-three are needed and authority is requested to purchase them at a cost not to exceed \$360.

It is recommended that the office of the General Medical Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent and the Supervising Nurses of the allied hospitals be supplied with automatic time stamps, so that all papers and slips may be stamped as soon as received. These can be purchased at \$35 each.

To lessen the noise in the wards it is recommended that strips of cork carpet be laid on the floors of the wards where needed. This may be purchased at \$1.15 a yard.

Authority is requested to purchase an extractor and a tumbler for the laundry and to repair the cement floor.

Authority is requested to purchase from the Prison Department furniture which is needed for Bellevue, Gouverneur and Harlem Hospitals.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That a stationary washstand be placed in the nose and throat room of the Out-Patient Department at Gouverneur Hospital, and that the General Medical Superintendent be given authority, subject to the approval of the additional appropriation of \$50,000 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to have the X-ray apparatus and the cement floor of the laundry repaired and to purchase gas heaters for the various kitchens, lockers for the dormitories, time stamps for the allied hospitals and for two offices in Bellevue Hospital, an extractor and a tumbler for the laundry, the necessary furniture for Bellevue, Gouverneur and Harlem Hospitals and cork carpet for the wards of Bellevue Hospital in which it is needed.

Communications.

A communication under date of December 15 was received from Dr. William F. Fluhrer, Visiting Surgeon to the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital, resigning his position.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, Dr. William F. Fluhrer has long been honorably connected with the hospitals of this Department and with those of the Department of Charities and Correction; and

Whereas, He has rendered the City distinguished service wherever he has been connected; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees learns with sincere regret of his intention to retire from the service, and in accepting his resignation desires to place on record its sense of the value of his services to this community; and be it further

Resolved, That Dr. William F. Fluhrer be and he hereby is appointed Consulting Surgeon to Bellevue Hospital, said appointment to take effect the day he concludes his active service in the Department.

A communication under date of December 19 was received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, together with a complete set of the preliminary plans and elevations,

preliminary specifications and an estimate of the cost of the proposed new Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication, plans, etc., were ordered placed on file.

Mr. Tierney, of the Committee on Buildings, reported the receipt of a communication from Messrs. Horgan & Slattery concerning the amount which, in their opinion, will be necessary for furnishing material and doing the work of erecting balconies at the new Harlem Hospital, and recommended that, in view of the fact that Mr. Joseph Balaban's bid was very considerably less than the architects' estimate, he be permitted to withdraw his bid on condition of paying all expenses in connection with readvertising the work; it was therefore

Resolved, That, inasmuch as the bid of Mr. Joseph Balaban for the work of constructing balconies at the new Harlem Hospital was \$4,250, whereas the next lowest bid was \$5,998, and the architects' estimate that, in their opinion, about \$6,000 will be needed to carry out the work, and whereas, Mr. Joseph Balaban has asked to be allowed to withdraw his bid on the ground that a mistake was made by him in submitting it; therefore be it

Resolved, That his excuse be accepted on condition that he be responsible for all charges connected with readvertising the work.

Dr. Brannan reported the passage by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of a resolution to buy the land adjacent to the Training School for Nurses, and lying between it and the river, for the sum of \$24,400, the same to be used as a site for the Training School Building.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
