## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
FRIDAY, July 25, 1884—11 o'clock A. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present.—All the members, viz.:

Franklin Edson, the Mayor; S. Hastings Grant, the Comptroller; Wm. P. Kirk, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Thos. B. Astin, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held July 23, 1884, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The Comptroller, to whom was referred at the last meeting an application of the Fire Department for an amendment of the title of an appropriation for that Department for the current year, respectfully

## REPORTS:

That the Commissioners of the Fire Department ask that the title of the appropriation for "New houses for Engine Companies Nos. 52, 53, 54 and 55, and Hook and Ladder Company No. 15, \$100,000, for 1884," be amended by omitting Engine Company No. 54, and providing for the erection of a new building to be used for Hook and Ladder Company No. 16 as well as Headquarters of the Life Saving Corps, the School of Instruction, and general drill purposes, and as an office for a Duplicate Fire Alarm Signal, upon a plot of ground situated on East Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, between Third and Lexington avenues, and recently appropriated by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the use of the Fire Department.

The erection of a new house in West Forty-seventh street for Engine Co. No. 54, for which the appropriation was made, is not considered by them as important as that of the proposed new building in East Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets. As it is desirable that this building shall be erected as soon as possible, I recommend that the request of the Commissioners of the Fire Department be complied with, and submit a resolution for that purpose.

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of the Fire Department adopted a preamble and resolution June 30, 1884, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend the title of the appropriation for that Department for the current year; and

Whereas, The reasons stated for asking such amendment to be made are deemed good and sufficient,

Resolved, That in compliance with the request of the Board of Commissioners of the Fire Department, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby amends the title of the appropriation for that Department for the current year, as made in the Final Estimate thereof, "For new houses for Engine Companies Nos. 52, 53, 54 and 55, and Hook and Ladder Company No. 15, \$100,000," so as to make the same read as follows: "For new houses for Engine Companies Nos. 53 and 55, Hook and Ladder Company No. 15, and for a building to be used for Hook and Ladder Company No. 16, as well as for Headquarters of the Life Saving Corps, the School of Instruction, and general drill purposes, and as an office for a Duplicate Fire Alarm Telegraph, \$100,000."

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Herewith I present a communication from the Hon. Daniel G. Rollins, Surrogate of the County of New York, requesting that the sum of \$195.95, of the appropriation for the salaries of clerks in his office for the year 1884, may be applied for the payment of a clerk to be appointed to do copying required under Section 9 of chapter 530 of the Laws of 1884.

Section 3 of said act provides that, "The Surrogate may appoint, and at pleasure, remove all clerks, officers, attendants, and employees in his office, or connected with his Court. Subject to the revision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the number and duties of all such clerks, officers, attendants, and employees, with their respective salaries, to be paid by the County, shall be such as the Surrogate shall designate and approve; provided, however, that the aggregate expense thereof shall not exceed the total amount duly appropriated to the said Surrogate's Court and Office for such purposes."

The sum of \$195.95 is stated to be a balance of the appropriation for salaries of clerks in the office of the Surrogate for the year 1884, which will remain unused if not applied as he requests, and I submit a resolution to authorize its use as requested.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the appointment by the Surrogate of the County of New York of a clerk to do copying in his office, required to be done under section 9 of chapter 530 of the Laws of 1884, payment for which service shall not exceed the sum of one hundred and ninety-five dollars and ninety-five cents (\$195.95), from the appropriation for salaries of clerks in his office for the year 1884.

To the Comptroller of the City of New York:

NEW YORK SUPREME COURT, COUNTY OF NEW YORK.

The People of the State of New York at the relation of John A. Stemmler and John A. Stemmler, Plaintiffs,  
against  
Joseph McGuire, Defendant.

The issues in this action having on the 8th day of October, 1873, been brought on for trial at a Circuit, before the Hon. Charles H. Van Brunt and a jury, and the issues having been tried and a verdict for the plaintiffs having been duly rendered on the 15th day of October, 1873, and their costs having been adjusted at one hundred and sixty-eight dollars and eighty-six cents. Now, on motion

of Mr. Nelson J. Waterbury, for the plaintiffs, it is adjudged and determined that the defendant, Joseph McGuire, has intruded into, usurped and unlawfully held and exercised, and still does intrude into, usurp and unlawfully hold and exercise the office of Justice of the District Court in the City of New York, for the Seventh Judicial District, and that he be ousted from the said office; and further, that the plaintiff and relator, John A. Stemmler, was duly elected to said office for the term of six years, from and including the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, at a charter election held in the City of New York on the seventh day of December, 1869, and was entitled to receive a certificate of election thereto from the Board of City Canvassers, and has been from and including the first day of January, eighteen hundred and seventy, and is now rightfully entitled to have, hold and enjoy said office, and to receive the salary which has accrued since the first day of January, 1870, and all salary due and to become due, and appertaining to the said office, together with the prerequisites and emoluments thereof; and on like motion it is further adjudged that the plaintiffs recover of the defendant the sum of one hundred and sixty-eight dollars and eighty-six cents for their costs and disbursements in this action, and that the plaintiffs have execution therefor.

All which we have caused by these presents to be exemplified, and the seal of our said Supreme Court to be hereunto affixed.

## CHAPTER 527.

AN ACT to authorize the comptroller of the city of New York to adjust, settle and pay balances of salaries claimed to be unpaid to certain justices of the district courts of the city of New York.

Passed June 14, 1884; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized to adjust and settle balances of salaries claimed to remain unpaid between the first day of May, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, and the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, to the justices of the district courts of the city of New York holding office between said periods, and to draw his warrant as comptroller out of unexpended balances remaining in the city treasury for the amount of balances of such salaries which he shall find to have accrued and to remain unpaid upon the claimants filing with the said comptroller a release, to the mayor, aldermen and commonality of the city of New York, from such claims, to be approved as to form by the corporation counsel of the city of New York.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Josiah Porter, being duly sworn, says, that at the charter election held on the first Tuesday of December, 1869, this deponent was elected the Justice of the District Court of the City of New York, for the Ninth Judicial District, by the electors of said district, and did qualify in the manner required by law, as appears by the annexed certificate, and exercised and performed the duties required as such Justice from the 1st day of January, 1870, until and including the 31st day of December, 1875. That as such Justice the salary at the time hereinafter mentioned was fixed by law at and after the rate of ten thousand dollars per annum, payable in equal monthly instalments on the first day of each and every month. This deponent further alleges that he has not been paid the salary which became due and payable on the 1st day of June, 1873, for the month of May in the year 1873, and that he has not been paid or received the salary which became due and payable to him, as Justice as aforesaid, since that time, and which was payable to him on the said first day of each and every month during that period, except that about the fifth day of June, 1873, he received the sum of four hundred and sixteen 66-100 dollars on account of salary which became due and payable to him for the month of May, 1873, and that during the month of July, 1873, he received five hundred and forty-one 66-100 dollars on account of salary which became due and payable for the month of June, 1873, and that on the 1st day of each and every month from the 1st day of August, 1873, until the 1st day of January, 1876, this deponent received the sum of six hundred and sixty-six 66-100 dollars on account of salary which became due to this deponent for the months commencing July 1st, 1873, and ending with December, 1875.

This deponent further shows, that by reason of the premises aforesaid and of the facts recited, that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York are justly indebted to this deponent in the sum of five thousand seven hundred and eighty 33-100 dollars, for and on account of the salary due to this deponent, as Justice as aforesaid, to wit: from the 1st day of May, 1873, to the 31st day of December, 1875, with the interest due upon the various unpaid balances from the time the same became due. Deponent further shows, that by act of the Legislature, duly passed on the 14th day of June, 1884, a copy of which is herewith annexed, the Comptroller of the City of New York is authorized to adjust and settle the balances of salary due the deponent as aforesaid. Wherefore this deponent prays that the Comptroller may adjust, settle and pay the amount of said balance of salary due to this deponent according to law.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to report to this Board, as soon as convenient, whether it is practicable to reduce the per capita allowance for the support of committed children; and also whether it is practicable to limit and restrict the constant large increase of the number of committed children to be supported in charitable institutions, with such other information and suggestions which he may consider of importance to lay before this Board upon the subject.
