

SIR—There were 5,963 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the three months ending December 31, 1877, which is a decrease of 2,219, as compared with the number reported the preceding three months, and 151 more than were reported during the corresponding three months of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the three months ending December 31, 1877, was 5,989, which is 455.2 below the average for the corresponding quarter of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.40 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,069,362.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 198. That on and after the 10th day of May, 1878, no cows or cattle shall be led or driven through or along the streets of the City of New York between Fifty-seventh and Sixty-sixth streets, without a permit in writing from this Department and in strict accordance with the routes, hours, and terms prescribed and designated therein.
