

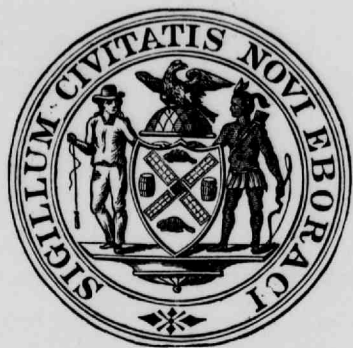

NEW YORK, July 15, 1879.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

From Sanitary Superintendent: On the operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on application for permits; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on operations of Disinfecting Corps; on certain street pavements, etc.; special report on One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues.

From the Attorney and Counsel: Weekly report.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That permission be granted to John Dunbar to lay one steam pipe, not exceeding 1 1/2 inches, in drain, and one shaft of same dimensions, through the rear part of premises 128 Worth street, N. Y., provided such pipes shall be properly protected, and laid without damage to the premises, and provided the said John Dunbar shall give proper security for the immediate removal of such pipe and shafting upon notice from this department, or any of the city authorities, and for restoring the premises to their original condition; all such work to be done under the supervision, and subject to the approval of the Sanitary Superintendent.

Resolved, That the salary of Dr. John Bowen, Resident Physician of the Riverside Hospital, be and is hereby fixed at the rate of \$1,000 per annum from and after July 1, 1879.

Resolved, That the application of Henry M. Bailly, for relief from order on No. 192 Eldridge street, be denied, and the order enforced.

Resolved, That the application for relief from order on No. 381 Canal street, be denied, and the order enforced.

Resolved, That the plan for light and ventilation of the proposed tenement house at No. 105 Christopher street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, so modified that twelve feet be taken from the front of the two-story building in the rear, in order to make the yard 31 feet by 25 feet, the height of said rear building not to be increased, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan for light and ventilation of the proposed tenement house at south side of Eighty-fourth street, seventy-four feet east of First avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, so modified as to include an air-shaft of at least fifteen square feet area on the easterly, to light and ventilate bed-rooms, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan for light and ventilation of proposed tenement house, No. 815 Seventh avenue, submitted to this Board by W. Wheeler Smith, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, the said tenement house to occupy not more than sixty-five centum of the lot of 25 x 100, and to be so constructed as to leave a strip of land five feet wide along the north side thereof for light and ventilation, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan for light and ventilation of proposed tenement house, Nos. 399 and 401 Third avenue, submitted to the Board this day by R. Hutchinson, under Laws 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws 1879, chapter 504, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan for light and ventilation of the following proposed tenement houses, to wit:

Twelve at the south side of Eighty-sixth street, 194 feet east of First avenue;
One at the north side of Seventy-seventh street, 230 feet west of Second avenue;
One at the north side of Eighty-third street, 23 feet west of Second avenue;
—submitted to this Board by Charles Baxter, under Laws 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws 1879, chapter 504, as modified to include recesses of 15 square feet area, on which every bedroom shall open, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan for light and ventilation of two proposed tenement houses at the west side of First avenue, 100 feet south of Seventy-ninth street, submitted to this Board by C. Baxter, under Laws 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws 1879, chapter 504, and so modified as to include air shafts of 15 square feet area on each side of the halls, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan for light and ventilation of proposed tenement house, No. 421 Third avenue, submitted to this Board by Francis Miller, executor, under Laws 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws 1879, chapter 504, modified by making the air shaft 3 feet 5 inches by 4 feet 6 inches, and so as to include windows in the partitions between front and bedrooms, and also so as not to require hall to be run to rear on second floor, as proposed in plan, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan for the light and ventilation of proposed tenement house, No. 504 West Forty-third street, submitted to this Board by Messrs. Christof, Brenner & Bros., under Laws 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws 1879, chapter 504, be and is hereby approved.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 12, 1879.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,870, as follows, viz.: 896 tenement houses, 157 private dwellings, 165 other dwellings, 17 manufacturing and workshops, 26 stores and warehouses, 61 stables, 1 market, 16 slaughter-houses, 1 oil works, 6 fat rendering establishments, 6 manure dumps, 1 fertilizing works, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 1 lodging-house, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 3 bone houses, 48 yards, courts and areas, 80 cellars and basements, 93 waste pipes and drains, 272 privies and water-closets, 56 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 6 piggeries, and 27 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 818.

During the past week 279 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 108 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

183 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 52 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 45 houses, 45 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 900 privies, 28 yards, 58 cellars, 11 garbage boxes, 10 hydrant sinks, and four and one-half miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 489 births, 49 still-births, 170 marriages, and 710 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 12, 1879. This shows an increase of 155 births, 4 still-births, and 19 marriages, and a decrease of 42 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 9 births, and 20 marriages, and a decrease of 3 still-births, and 31 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from whooping-cough, decreased 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 8; diarrhoeal diseases, 11; alcoholism, 5; cancer, 7; heart diseases, 8; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 4; premature and pretermatural births, 4; surgical operations, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from small-pox, increased 7; measles, 4; diphtheria, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 3; aneurism, 1; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; suicide, 1. The deaths from scarlatina, croup, erysipelas, phthisis pulmonalis, direct effect of solar heat, and cyanosis and atelectasis, were the same as those reported for the preceding week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 325 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 388 under two years; 432 under five years, and 33 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 23 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 60.85 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 106 were in institutions, 392 in tenement houses, 190 in houses containing 3 families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 146 on the first, 189 on the second, 129 on the third, 91 on the fourth, 27 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 707 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-resident. 63 were stated to be single, 107 married, 51 widowed, and the condition of 530 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows: City deaths, 710; still-births, 49; bodies in transit, 28. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 78 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 489 births, 170 marriages, 49 still-births, 710 deaths, 28 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 31 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 12, 1879, was 73.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.797, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 983, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.57 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 711 deaths and still-births, or 93.68 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 18; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 271; City, (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 97; Greenwood (undenominational), 38; Lutheran, (undenominational), 125; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 60; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 15; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 7; St. Raymond's Roman Catholic, 5; Washington (undenominational), 14.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending July 5, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 10; Second, 2; Third, 6; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 23; Eighth, 25; Ninth, 26; Tenth, 41; Eleventh, 40; Twelfth, 74; Thirteenth, 29; Fourteenth, 16; Fifteenth, 12; Sixteenth, 31; Seventeenth, 56; Eighteenth, 42; Nineteenth, 126; Twentieth, 46; Twenty-first, 44; Twenty-second, 53; Twenty-third, 17; Twenty-fourth, 7.

The actual mortality for the week ending July 5, 1879, was 751; this is 80 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 74.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 35.57 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,097,720.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 17.77; Brooklyn, 21.09; Baltimore, 34.67; Boston, 17.10; Cincinnati, 29.18; New Orleans, 31.2; Cleveland, 12.5; Richmond, 23.40; Charleston, 35.58; Dayton, 32.32; Lowell, 17.60; Worcester, 9.93; Cambridge, 12.17; Fall River, 20.43; Lawrence, 16.38; Lynn, 19.94; Springfield, 9.93. The actual mortality for the week ending July 5, 1879, was 751, which is 74.4 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 35.57 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,097,720.

Report of Work Performed by Special Corps.

SANITARY BUREAU, July 15, 1879.

To W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent:

SIR—I have the honor to report that during the past week the special corps of Assistant Inspectors visited 5,020 houses, 25,634 families, treated 766 cases of sickness, gave 664 prescriptions, and distributed 233 tickets for the floating hospital of St. John's Guild. Among the cases of sickness found, 27 were of a contagious nature, and were duly reported to the Bureau. In their rounds they found 367 unvaccinated children which are referred to the Inspector of Vaccination, and 30 nuisances of various kinds, all of which have been referred to the regular Sanitary Inspectors.

The greater portion of sickness was found in the 6th, 7th, 10th, 11th, 13th, and 17th, and the eastern portion of the 18th Wards; the sickness, however, being for the most part of a somewhat mild character, consisting of mild summer complaint, catarrhal affections, irritation from teething, etc. But few cases of cholera infantum have been found.

The nuisances discovered are of the ordinary kind, such as leaking privies, filthy cellars, etc., to which their attention has been called while making their visits. Many of the Inspectors report the condition of tenement houses as being much better than they expected to find them, while in some neighborhoods it is said that sanitary supervision can accomplish but little until the present buildings are removed and replaced by structures more in accordance with the requirements of public health. Nos. 24, 46, 52, and 54 Mulberry street are especially mentioned as requiring this treatment.

Complaint is also made of the custom fruit vendors have of leaving boxes of decayed fruit on the sidewalk until it suits their convenience to remove them. For the purpose of facilitating this work the city as far as One Hundred and Tenth street on the east, and Seventy-third street on the west side, is divided into fifty districts, to each one of which a man is assigned, whose duty it is to visit from house to house among the poor with a view to relieving cases of sickness not otherwise provided with medical attendance. In these visits they give such advice as is needed, and distribute circulars printed in the English and German languages, and containing plain directions for mothers in the general sanitary care of children, to these circulars which have been distributed for the past three summers we are doubtless indebted, to a considerable extent, for the gradual improvement in the sanitary condition of our tenement population.
