SIR—The Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York respectfully submits the following report for the three months ending December 31, 1875, with the vital statistics of the city for the same period:

THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the exception of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending December 31, 1875, was 637, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 629 permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 859 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; 97 permits to remove and transport manure; 61 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 19 miscellaneous permits were granted under the Sanitary Code. The number of cases of contagious diseases reported during the three months ending December 31, 1875, was: typhus fever, 14; typhoid fever, 231; scarlet fever, 419; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 31; measles, 250; diphtheria, 1,399; and small-pox, 497.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers of the Sanitary Company of Police during the quarter ending December 31, 1875, was as follows: calves (bob), 101 carcasses; calves (case), 15 carcasses; beef, 788 pounds; veal, 758 pounds; poultry, 1,835 pounds; fish, 23,680 pounds; sheep, 40 carcasses; lambs, 9 carcasses; corned beef, 12 pounds; scollops, 34 gallons; cattle, 3 carcasses; bear meat, 75 pounds; and sausage, 200 pounds.

During the three months ending December 31, 1875, six thousand five hundred and twenty (6,520) permits were granted for burials. During the same period three hundred and eighteen (318) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and seventy-five (575) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; six hundred and eighty (680) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; two hundred and ninety-six (296) searches for the records of births, marriages, and deaths were made; and two hundred and thirty-nine (239) transcripts of the records of deaths, twenty-six (26) of marriages, and thirty-nine (39) of births from said records were issued. There were three thousand nine hundred and eighty (3,980) persons registered as married during the quarter, and five thousand nine hundred and eighty-nine (5,989) children were born during the same period. 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ORDERS OF THE BOARD—SECRETARY'S OFFICE.

The orders of this Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending December 31, 1875, the number of orders issued by the Board was 3,486. Of this number 1,340 were issued under the first subdivision of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, by the terms of which the party served is allowed three days in which to demand a hearing by the Board of the testimony which may be presented to show that the order should be modified or revoked. In cases where no hearing has been asked for, and the orders have not been complied with, final orders, in the original or amended form, to the number of 373, have been issued, and the Board has directed the Attorney to commence action for penalties for non-compliance with such orders. All other written orders, in number 2,146, have been issued under the second subdivision of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, and are of a peremptory character, requiring that the nuisance be abated within five days, and if not complied with, directing the Sanitary Superintendent to enforce the same without further notice, unless the Board shall elect to commence a suit for penalty in lieu of the execution of the order by its officers or agents.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending February 12, 1876.

Resolved, That Jacob A. Geissenhainer be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of William H. Geissenhainer, who has failed to qualify.

Whereas, A large amount of taxes on real and personal property in the City of New York remains unpaid; and

Whereas, In these hard and oppressive times, producing so much misery in daily life and stagnation in business circles, it is impossible for many persons in arrears for taxes to pay the same under the present oppressive laws; and

Whereas, Under the present law the penalty for the non-payment of taxes is at the rate of twelve per cent. interest, which is almost ruinous to many of our best and most respectable citizens and taxpayers who are in arrears; and

Whereas, It would be a great benefit and advantage to the City of New York to have said taxes paid within a short time; and

Whereas, It is the duty of the Legislature to relieve the overburdened taxpayers in the present emergency, as far as reasonably can be done; therefore

Resolved, That the Legislature be respectfully requested to enact a law providing that all back taxes may be discharged, and the liens on real estate for said back taxes be canceled on the payment of the same at seven per cent. interest, within one year after the passage of said law; also providing for a discount or rebate of five per cent. if paid within six months after the passage of said act.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent non-residents from holding office in any of the Departments or branches of the government of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person who is not a citizen of the State of New York, and a resident of the City and County of New York, shall be eligible to appointment to any office in any or either of the departments of the city government, either as president or commissioner, chief of bureau, clerk or officer thereof, or employee therein, whether legislative, executive, or judicial; nor shall any person not a resident of this city, who may be so employed or appointed, have any valid claim against the Mayor, Aldermen, or Commonalty of said city, for any salary, wages, or compensation under or by virtue of holding any office in either of such departments or branches of the city government.

Sec. 2. Any person holding any appointment or office, or employed in any of such departments or branches of the city government, except teachers of common schools, who shall, while holding such appointment or office, or so employed, remove from within the limits of this city, shall be deemed thereby to have resigned such appointment, vacated such office, or abandoned such employment, and it shall be the duty of the head of every department or other person authorized to make appointments or give employment, to appoint or employ a resident of this city to the office made vacant, or employment so surrendered, by said removal from this city, as provided in section 1 of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of May, 1876.

Resolved, That the Legislature of this State be and is hereby respectfully requested to restore to the Board of Aldermen the power to confirm or reject all appointments or nominations of the Mayor for officers in the different Departments of the city government, whether for vacancies or full terms (as provided in the original section 25 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873), by repealing section 3 of chapter 300, Laws of 1874.

Also, to inform this House whether the rules and regulations for the government of the New York Police authorize any member thereof to arrest in New York City, without a magistrate's warrant, for offenses committed within the United States, but outside of the State of New York, and especially for offenses committed in foreign countries; and whether in their opinion any additional legislation is needed upon this subject by New York.

of Annual Record of the assessments upon the Real and Personal Estate of the City and County of New York for the year 1876, will be open for inspection and revision, on and after Monday, January 10, 1876, and will remain open until the 30th day of April, 1876, inclusive, for the correction of errors and the equalization of the assessments of the aforesaid real and personal estate.

All persons believing themselves aggrieved must make application to the Commissioners during the period above mentioned, in order to obtain the relief provided by law.
