Numerous communications were received and disposed of, applications considered or filed,

Numerous communications were received and disposed of, applications considered or filed, complaints acted on or referred, resolutions passed, orders search, proposals invited, bids opened and acted on, work was ordered and expenditure authorized, appointments were made and resignations received and accepted, permits granted and the usual descriptment trials conducted.

July 46—A communication was received from the Chief of Department calling attention to the increase in the number of dires, and recommending that a communication be addressed to the Board of Fire Underwriters, suggesting that a more conservative policy be adopted by insurance companies in assuming risks.

July 25—Proposals were opened under the usual legal formalities for repairing the fire-hoat. "The New Vorker," for altering and repairing the quarters of Hook and Ladder Company 22, for furnishing forage for the bornughts of theodylva and Oneens, and contracts were awarded to the lowest hidders, respectively, subject to the approval by the Comptroller of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sweties.

July 25—The hearing in the matter of the alleved mismanagement, as claimed by the Manufacturers' Association of Brooklyn, of the fire at Chapman's Dock, Newtown creek, April 14, 1900, by the Deputy Chief of Depurtment in charge, by the Deputy Chief Seventh Division, John H. Perry, and by the Chief of the Twenty second Battation, John H. Dobson, all of the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, took place before the Commissioner this day; and alter the bearing of the testimony of the complainants and the evidence in rebuttal, the accused officials of the Department were exonerated and the charges dismissed.

NOTABLE FIRES.

July 1, 11.58 v. M.—Fire at No. 123 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, a five-story brick hulding, 25 x 80, occupied as a dwelling. Fire originated in cellar and extended to first, second, third, fourth and fifth floors, through durab-watter staff, considerably damaging the hulding. Chief officers pre-ent were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chiefs Parroy and Dunne, Chiefs of Battalion Cashman, Short and Terpuny. The services of five-gines and 3 hook and ladder trucks were required, and the fire was under control in about two hours and fifteen minutes. and 3 hook and lade and fifteen minutes.

7.09 F.M.—Fire at Nos. 528 to 534 East Seventy-sixth street, a six-story brick building, 100 x 200, occupied as Farmer. Feed Company. Fire originated on third floor and extended to first, second, fourth, fith and sixth floors, through stairway, causing a total low of building. Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief Duane, Chiefs of Buttalian McCartney, Welsh, Terpeny, Binns and Cashman. The services of 15 engines, 4 hook and ladder companies and 1 water tower were required, and the fire was under control in about twenty-six hours.

July 2, 7.05 P. M.—Fire at Nos. 311 to 315 East Forty-seventh street, a five-story brick huilding, 63x 100, occupied as a brewery. Fire originated on third floor and extended to fourth and fifth ours and roof, considerably damaging the building. Chief officers present were Cluef of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief Duane, Chiefs of Battolion Welsh, Binns, McCartney and Burns. The services of 11 engines, 4 hook and ladder composites and I water tower were required, and the fire was under control in about six hours and twenty minutes.

July 4, 4.52 A.M.—Fire at On: Handred and Sixty-cighth street, north side Third and Fulton avenues, a tour-story brick huilding, 25 x 75, occupied as a brewery. Fire originated in coopering shop and extended to second, third and fourth thore, through openings in flours, considerably damaging the building; also extended to adjoining building, a three-story brick building, 25 x 60, same occupants, considerably damaging the building. Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department (Acting) Cashman, Chiefs of Battalion Terpeny, Lawlor and Acting Chief Best. The services of 6 engines and 2 brook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about forty malautes.

In the second of one hour and twenty minutes. Upon the arrival of the Department the fire had complete control of the fifth and sixth fixers and roof.

July 27, 8.12 P. M.—Fire at No. 232 East Fortieth street, a five-story brickbuilding, 50 x 60, occupied by cleaning and dyeing establishment. Fire originated on first fluor and extended to

econd, third and fourth floors and root, through elevator shaft, windows and stairway, considerably damaging the building; also extended to No. 234 East Fortieth street, through windows in rear, four-more brick building, 20 x 60, same occupants, slightly damaging the building. Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief Duane, Chiefs of Battalion Roos, Burns, and Acting Chiefs Skelly and Coleman. The services of twelve engines, 4 hook and ladder companies, and one water tower, were required, and the fire was under control in about y hours. This fire had gained great hendway by reason of naphtha and bearine being stored on second, third and fourth floors, for cleaning purposes.

August 25, 2.03 r.u.—Fire at Nos. 46 to 50 Wooster street, a six-story brick (from front) hallding, 75 x 100, occupied by they goods firm. Fire originated on fifth floor and extended to fourth and stath floors through belt openings in floors, considerably damaging the building. Chief officers present were Deputy Chiefs of Department Charles D. Purroy, Chiefs of Battalius Kruger and Martin, and Acting Chiefs Larkin and Langford. The services of 13 engines, 4 hook and ladder companies and 1 water tower were required and the fire was under control in about one hour.

September S, J. 35 A. M.—Fire at Nos. 458 and 460 East One Handred and Forty-fourth street, a five-story brick building, 50x75, occupied as a paper box manufactory. Fire originated in cellar and estended to first, second, third, fourth and fifth floors by means of elevator that, considerably damaging the building. Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Arting Deputy Chief Cashman, Chiefs of Battallon Websh and Short, and Arting Chief Lawler. The services of 9 engines and 3 hook and ladder companies were required and the fire was under control in about five hours and forty minutes.

September 15, 3.42 A. M.—Fire at Nos. 46 and 48 Water street, a five-story brick building, 50 x 75, occupied by coffee packing-house. Fire originated in basement and extended to first, second, third, fourth and fifth floors through openings in floors, considerably damaging the building. Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Chiefs of Battalion Kruger, Kenny, Guerin, and Acting Chief Brogan. The services of 12 engines, 4 hook and ladder companies and 1 water tower were required and the fire was under control in about one hour and lifteen minutes.

September 20, 7.07 A. M.—Fire at Eleventh ayenue, west side, between Twenty-seventh and

September 20, 7.07 A. M.-Fire at Eleventh avenue, west side, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets, a seven-story brick building, 200 x 50, occupied as a storage warehouse, considerably damaging the building. Fire originated on sixth floor and extended to seventh. Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chiefs Duane and Purroy, Chiefs of Battalion Gooderson, Welsh, flins, and Acting Chiefs Skelly and Meagher. The services of 14 engines and 4 book and lailder companies and 2 water towers were required and the fire was under control in about 7 hours.

#### The Most Disastrons Conflagration,

which took place on the 30th of June, destroying docks and stemaships of the North German Lloyd, as Hobsiken, and sacrificing many lives, called for action of our fire-boats for protection of the shipping in our harbor. A report of Captain William C. Braisted of "The New Yorker" gives the following detailed account of the affair:

the shipping in our harbor. A report of Captain William C. Braisted of "The New Yorker" gives the following detailed account of the affair:

"On receipt of the alarm his Station 251 at 4.09 o'clock r.m. on that day I proceeded to the fire, where we arrived when the "Kaiser Wilhelm" was being hauled into the stream. As our services were not required on her we took hold of the steamer "Bremen," which was heading down stream, apparently moving out hom the suction created by the "Kaiser Wilhelm." We opened our streams from the stand-pipes and directed them abourd the "Bremen." Time of working on her was one hour and thirty minutes. Twenty-eight men were rescued from the ship, who were taken from one of the port-holes by the crew of the fire-boat "The New Yorker" under very difficult circumstances, and by direction of Chief Croker, who was at this time on board "The New Yorker," they were landed at Pier 18, North river. At the time when I was directed by the Chief to leave the "Bremen " the fire was completely under control, and one ingbout was getting ready to put a line of hose abourd to cover said vessel. I cannot state how many boats were alongwide, as I was then engaged in locating the different burnings on small craft on river and bay. I was especially directed by Chief Croker to look out for the shipping, and to lose no time on my way to the streamship "Saale," which was being beached on the Jersey Flats, off the Central Railroad ferries, by some tag-boats. The fire-boat "Van Wyck" had been called to the fire, and had a cotton barge in tow burning. When the "Saale" was coming down stream all ablaze in tow of some tag-boats we dropped the barge and helped to beach the "Saale." I immediately proceeded to the "Saale," and with the "Van Wyck" worked un her some two hours. The crew of the "Van Wyck" rescued thirty men from the fire and engine-rooms of the "Saale," On my way to the cotton barge on fire amidaters in 1 picked up an ash scow adult with Henry Phillips on board, and tied it up on Jersey shore. The fire-

In order to accertain if the shipping on the river and bay was in a safe condition, I made another tour and worked on two barges near Governor's Island, and at it o'clock P. M. was ordered by Chief Croker to proceed to Weehawken, N. J., to work on steamships "Main" and "Bremen," While at work on the "Main" we were trying to rescue fifteen men who had been under cover in the shaft alloy and coal bunkers, and were now crying for help. While our standpipes were in full operation a beam fell from aloft and carried away the top wheel of our new Woodshouse pipe, breaking our large copper escape pipe and smokestack, whistles and guy chains to smokestack. No mue was injured. We were at that time keeping that part of the vessel cooled where the men were located, and they were subsequently taken off by one of the small tag-boats. I worked on the "Bremen" and "Main" from 11.30 P. M., June 30, to 5.45 A. M. July 1, and left them in charge of the Merritt Wrecking Boat.

#### NOTABLE FIRES.

frame building, 40 x a5 few, occupied by Fisk, Clark & Flagg as boiler room, considerably damaged. The services of 6 engine companies, 1 fire-beat and 3 hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about one hour. Estimated damage, \$35,000.

September 22, 1900, 5-44 A. M.—Fire at Commercial wharf and Bowne street; six-story frame building 35 x 40 feet, known as grain elevator "B"; extended all through building, which, with contents, was considerably damaged. Extended to the storehouse No. 215 Commercial wharf, four-story grante building and contents considerably damaged. Also to No. 216 Commercial wharf, four-story grante building, 50 x 180, occupied as storehouse; building and contents considerably damaged. The services of 9 engine companies, 2 fire-boats, 1 water-tower and 1 hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about six hours and a half. Estimated damage, \$52,000.
