To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Relating to the communication of Mr. T. J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings, boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, complaining of damage done to residence of Mrs. Bowin Dash, caused by blasting at Jerome Park Reservoir, I would report that Mr. Daniel Ulrich, Division Engineer, writes me, relating to the subject, as follows:

"In reply to your letter of the 3d instant in regard to damage done by blasting to the house of Louisa Dash, I would say that I called on Mrs. Dash but did not find her at home.

"The house is located at least a mile from where any blasting is being done, on a side hill and across the valley formed by Tibbitt's brook; the house is a frame structure and has been built for some time, and I do not see wherein the contractor is liable for any damages as the house was not struck by any stone or debris.

"The contractors of the Jerome Park Reservoir for the last year in blasting have been using more holes and consequently smaller charges, and as they use fuses instead of a battery, the shock and concussion is not as great at present as it was in former years."

"That the contractor will comply with the provisions of chapter 415 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, known as 'The Labor Law,' so far as it is constitutional and applicable hereto."

Resolved, That the action of the Secretary in transmitting the following registered letter, to wit:

"NEW YORK, April 3, 1901.

"GENTLEMEN—You obtained at this office on March 29 a copy of the contract for building the Muscoot Dam, and in connection therewith I desire to call your attention to the fact that the second paragraph of Item 'E' of said contract (pages 9 and 10) has been amended by the expunction of said second paragraph of Item 'E' from said contract and the insertion in place thereof the herewith inclosed printed reference to the Labor Law.

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1895, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-paying capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897:

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Because a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor, passed, a majority being present. The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature.
