BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Meeting called to order at 3 P. M.

On motion, minutes approved as read.

Appeal 29, F. S. C. 18 of 1904, Chester W. Chapin, appellant. (Referred to Chief Croker at last meeting for further examination and report.)

On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was denied.

Appeal 34, New Building 604 of 1904, premises north side Herkimer street about 75 feet from corner Vesta avenue, Brooklyn; George Haiss Manufacturing Company, appellants. (Referred to Chief Croker at last meeting for report on the location and its surroundings.)

The Chairman presented report of the Chief, dated the 28th inst., which was ordered on file.

Mr. J. F. Swinnerton and Mr. Thomas Krekeler appeared before the Board and filed an additional drawing.

On motion, approved on condition that lumber shall not be stored or piled within fifty feet on all sides of the coal pocket.

Appeal 38, S. F. C. 19 of 1904, Nos. 74 and 76 William street, Manhattan; Clinton & Russell, appellants.

On motion, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report, with recommendation.

Appeal 39, New Building 83 of 1904, south side One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, about 120 feet from corner Prospect avenue, The Bronx; Rev. Otto F. Strack, appellant.

The construction of building as shown by plans to be unlawful.

That the law allows the said three-story school building to be built non-fireproof, if not more than 35 feet in height. To provide higher stories in the said building it is requested for modification of the law, so as to allow the height of the said three-story school building to be increased to 48 feet.

To allow the three-story non-fireproof school building to be erected to a height of 48 feet, instead of 35 feet.

The increase in height of building would result in high stories which will be better lighted and ventilated than the low stories, which would be only about 9 feet in height if the building would have to be constructed within the 35 feet limit.

The appellant intends to put fireproof staircases and iron stair in the building, as is shown by the plans. He also wishes to state that the boilers for heating will not be placed in the building, but will have a separate building for boiler room only.

Rev. Otto F. Strack appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that the staircase within the brick stair-inclosure shall be of iron, and that the treads and platforms of stairs shall be of oak two inches in thickness; and further, that the door openings from the staircase inclosure shall be fitted with kalamained doors.

Appeal 40, Alteration 9 of 1904, No. 715 Madison avenue, Manhattan; Messrs. Hogan & Slattery, architects and appellants.

No. 3. As an additional apartment is being provided, and same not being shown on the plans approved by the Board of Examiners, the building must again be treated as a hotel, and being over 35 feet high, must be made fireproof throughout.

The provisions of the Building Code do not apply in this case.

That this building may be non-fireproof.

That the additional apartment which is to be provided is to be built on the roof, and is for the accommodation of a janitor, and does not bring the building under the definition of a hotel (Building Code, section 10), and is therefore not required to be fireproof throughout (section 105).

On motion, approved.

Appeal 41 of 1904, New Building 88 of 1904, premises northwest corner Barrow and Bleeker streets, Manhattan; George Fred Pelham, architect and appellant.

No. 2. Brick partition wall should be provided in upper stories where span of floor beams exceed 26 feet.

That the proposed construction is equally as good, and that adequate means of fire stop will be provided by means of studs filled in between with brick of partition at "A," separating the front and rear apartments facing on the gable; partition at portion supported on 2-foot 4-inch by 8-inch spruce beams.

To allow the omission of front portion of 12-inch brick fore and aft partition wall, and to substitute 2-foot 8-inch by 18-inch steel beams to act as a girder for the support of floor beams at this portion.

To build and continue the above-described wall would interfere with the arrangement of rooms at front as shown on plans filed with the Bureau of Buildings; proposed girder is over one room only.

Mr. George J. Kaiser appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over.

Appeal 42, New Building 119 of 1904, premises No. 103 Hester street, Manhattan; Messrs. Horenburger & Straub, architects and appellants.

No. 1. Brick partition walls should be built where span exceeds 26 feet between walls.

The mode of construction proposed by the appellant is equally as good and more desirable than the one required by law.

Can the floor beams on spans exceeding 26 feet between walls where checked on the floor plans be supported by steel girders instead of brick walls?

The span between westerly wall and steel girder which is to support floor beams in front of a staircase is only 16 feet and the said steel girder only 10 feet 4 inches long between bearings. The steel girder at easterly end of rear part of building which is to be used as an intermediate support of floor beams, on a span between walls of 35 feet is only 10 feet long, and the end of both of said girders to be laid on brick walls and suitable size bluestone templates.

The erection of brick walls in place of said girders would greatly interfere with the arrangement of the rooms and apartments, as approved by the Tenement House Department.

Fireproof partitions will be erected in place of stud partitions separating apartments and hall, if and where directed by this Board.

Action deferred, pending appearance of appellant.

Appeal 43, Alteration 593 of 1904, premises northeast corner Adams and Plymouth streets, Brooklyn; R. L. Daus, architect and appellant.

Denied, on the ground that building if extended on top as proposed would be over 75 feet high, in violation of section 105 of the Building Code.

It is being claimed by the appellant that the rules and regulations of the President of said borough or the provisions of law or ordinances do not apply.

May the building be raised as proposed?

The building may be considered of semi-fireproof construction, for the reasons that two staircases located at different parts of the building are entirely of fireproof materials, including roofs, and that they are surrounded in their entire height by brick walls in which all openings are protected by fireproof doors.

Further, that though the walls of the building will be when changed somewhat in excess of 75 feet, they are laid up in Portland cement mortar, and are of an exceptionally solid and substantial character.

Further, because a complete sprinkler system will be installed in the building and every door-opening will be protected by the most approved type of fire doors.

It is intended to build the ceiling of the sixth and the roof of the seventh story of slow-burning mill construction, and to fill in between the floor beams of the sixth story with 2-inch plaster boards resting on cleats.

It may be stated also that the building was built previous to the existence of the Building Code, and was planned with a view of being extended a couple of stories in height.

Laid over for one week, by request of appellant.

Appeal 44, Alteration 162 of 1904, premises No. 756 Seventh avenue, Manhattan; Paul Mackusick, appellant.

"No. 10. The arrangement of the upper floor is that of a tenement or bachelor apartment; if converted into a bachelor's apartment, the building should be fireproof. Section 10 of the Code."

The building is not to be used as a hotel, as it will not have a public dining room nor kitchen, required by section 10 of the Code.

To allow the building to be altered without making same fireproof.

That the building will be occupied as a studio building.

On motion, approved.


