Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of July, August and September, 1904:

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

I.—To Make the Topographical Surveys, Computations, Maps or Plans and Profiles and Reports in Connection with the Following Three (3) Divisions of Work:

A. The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the Borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street systems and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

B. The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts of the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

C. The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments, in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

II.—To Keep in Custody the Records and Maps of All Matters Pertaining to Work Under the Jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; Also Keeping in Custody All Maps Filed in Relation to the Borough of The Bronx Under the Department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

III.—To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I-A. Preparation of the Design of a Street System, Maps Showing Changes of Adopted Street Systems, etc.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, approved a tentative plan of the street system, east of the Bronx river, which amended previously filed plans and laid out streets over such areas, which had not been taken up.

A resolution was passed as follows:

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board in suitable sections and drawn to a larger scale, three similar copies of the Adopted General Plan of the Street System for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible in a general way, the nature and extent of the proposed changes and amendments, laying out and extending of streets, roads, avenues, squares or places.

Computations for this purpose are in progress and sections 33, 35, 36, 42, 44, 45, 47 and 52 are completed, and sections 39, 40, 43 and 46 are under way.

Draughting of all the above sections is in progress, but none of them has been submitted as yet in complete form to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which had been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

## Triangulation.

Chapter 406 of the Laws of 1903 gave authority to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to complete the triangulation of The City of New York and to obtain the co-operation of the United States and Geodetic Survey.

This work is under the superintendence of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Mr. A. T. Mosman was assigned by the Superintendent of the Coast and Geodetic Survey to take charge of the work.

In accordance with the directions of Mr. A. T. Mosman and in accordance to plans and specifications furnished, the following triangulation towers were erected during this quarter:

1. At Hunter's Island, 82 feet in height.
2. At Classon's Point, 52 feet in height.
3. At Prospect Hill, near the north line of Pelham Bay Park, 68 feet in height.
4. At McLean Heights, north of Woodlawn, a tower is in progress of erection

The reduction of the topographical survey on a map drawn to a scale of 150 feet to the inch was continued.

The card index of street improvements for the President of the Borough and the Chief Engineer is completed, with the exception of giving street lengths.

Sir—In compliance with your instructions, I herewith transmit the report of the work performed by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices during the quarter ending September 30, 1904.

Among the items of work done by the Bureau, I have the honor to submit the following:

The cleaning and keeping in order of the buildings and offices in care of this Bureau, comprising the Municipal Building, the First District Court-house, Westchester; the Second District Court-house, Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street; the Coroner's Office, corner of Tremont and Third avenues; the Branch Office, Bureau of Highways, Bank Building, Tremont avenue; the Department Yard, at One Hundred and Forty-fourth street and College avenue; the stable, Bureau of Highways, at One Hundred and Forty-third street and College avenue; the stable, Bureau of Highways, at One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street and Anthony avenue; the Yard and Office, Bureau of Sewers, Tremont avenue and Mount Hope place; the Office and Stable of the Bureau of Sewers and Highways, at Williamsbridge; the Branch Office of Bureau of Regulating, Grading and Paving on Kingsbridge road; the office of the Board of Health, on Franklin avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, and the Free Floating Bath, located at Port Morris (foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street).

All these buildings and offices are kept clean and necessary repairs made, whenever required or needed, by the employees of this Bureau.

The following is a statement in detail of the work done on the several buildings and offices:

The Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

The work of renovating the exterior of the building has been commenced and is now progressing as rapidly as the nature of the work will permit.

The west front of the building is nearly completed, and from the improved appearance it presents, an idea may be formed of the necessity of the work, and the effect it will have in beautifying the building when finished.

The brick work has been pointed up with cement mortar and the work given three coats white lead and oil paint.

The rough rock faced masonry of the basement story has been dressed down, defective joints removed and repaired and the surface plastered with Portland cement mortar and jointed to represent cutstone ashlar.

The plastering in the offices of the Superintendent of Highways, and Clerks, has been repaired, and also the walls of the first floor toilet rooms; the walls were then painted and the wood work thoroughly cleaned and varnished.

The following is a summary of repairs made throughout the building in the several rooms and offices:

4 file cases were made, stained and varnished.

1 wood and glass partition put up.

3 instrument cases made, stained and varnished.

1 picture frame case made.

3 toilet room doors repaired.

19 lights of window glass put in.

2 safe shelves put up.

4 desks repaired.

52 fibre cases removed and reset.

4 shade fixtures repaired.

3 hose brackets made and put up.

2 iron gates repaired.

10 feet iron railing repaired.

12 feet iron skylight repaired.

2 desk locks repaired and put on.

12 desks removed, repaired and set up.

1 work bench, with drawer, screw and stop, made and set up.

5 glass office doors lettered.

12 metal and wooden signs lettered and put in place.

The Second District Court-house, Third Avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Street.

The tin roof of this building repaired and painted, new flashing put on, and the coping pointed up with Portland cement mortar. The materials used on this work was 163 sheets roofing tin, 5 pounds roofing nails, 24 wall hooks, 25 pounds solder, 2 bags charcoal, 50 pounds metallic paint and 20 gallons boiled linseed oil. Repairs were made to the windows, the sashes eased up where needed, sash cord put in and shades put in order. The two stoves were cleaned, repaired and put up ready for use.

The First District Court-house, Westchester.

The work of repairing the basement and area walls of the building was suspended on August 6, and the men transferred to the Municipal Building to assist in the work being done there, as it was a matter of greater necessity.

The material used up to the time the work was suspended was: 2 barrels of Portland cement, 3 loads of sand and 100 hard brick.

The chimneys were cleaned and repaired and 2 galvanized iron chimney tops put on, 6 feet of 6-inch and 8 feet of 8-inch galvanized iron smoke pipe were furnished, and the stove repaired and made ready for use.

The Coroner's Office, Corner Tremont and Third Avenues.

2 fiber cases were furnished and set up.

2 lights of glass put in telephone booth.

3 arm chairs, the witness chair, 10 hard wood chairs and 2 desks were repaired.

Branch Office, Bureau of Highways, No. 767 Tremont Avenue.  
33 feet of white wood partition, 7 feet 6 inches high, was made, stained and varnished.

14 panels of wood and glass and 1 sash door put up.  
6 instrument racks and 6 rod racks were made and set up. The material used was 160 feet square 1 1/2-inch white wood, 100 square feet 7/8-inch white wood, 300 feet of 1/2-inch beech moulding.

3 document cases, each 2 feet 2 inches by 1 foot 6 inches by 5 feet 9 inches were built and placed in position. The materials used for them was 110 feet of lumber, 200 feet raised moulding, 36 feet of base moulding, 3 locks and keys, 12 ball castors and 7 pair brass hinges.

Yard, Bureau of Lighting, College Avenue and One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street.  
Tar roofs on three of the sheds were repaired, the material used, 415 square feet of tar paper and 5 pounds tinned nails and buttons.

The Roof of the Stable, Bureau of Highways, at One Hundred and Forty-third Street and College Avenue.

Square feet of roof repaired, 1,200, for which 10 pounds of tinned nails and buttons were required.

Stable, Bureau of Highways, One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street and Anthony Avenue.

One new galvanized iron chimney top was put up, the stove repaired and 30 feet of galvanized iron stove-pipe with 2 elbows and taper joints furnished and put up, 11 lights of glass furnished and put in.

Williamsbridge Office and Stable, Highway and Sewer Bureau.

One No. 21 Scorching stove with new guard ring, 40 feet 5-inch black iron stove-pipe with 1 taper joint and 9 square feet of No. 9 zinc were furnished and put up.

Office, Grand Boulevard and Concourse, One Hundred and Eightieth Street and Kingsbridge Road.

Four lights of glass put in and the water-closet on first floor repaired and reset.

The Public Free Bath No. 11.

Repairs made, about 12 feet of the roof repaired, 3 lights of glass put in, 3 pontoon pumps repaired, 2 doors and 2 staircases repaired and 6 galvanized iron door hinges furnished.

The bathing season having closed, the bath has now made ready and will be towed to winter quarters in a few days.

The Sixth District Police Court.

The ceiling in the detention pen in the basement was repaired, about five square yards of new work being required to replace the part that had fallen.

Three stoves were repaired and put up, 26 feet of stove-pipe, 1 elbow and 27 square feet of zinc furnished.

## BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

## LOCAL BOARD—STATEN ISLAND DISTRICT.

Meeting Tuesday, March 21, 1905, 10:30 A. M.

Present—Alderman Collins, Alderman Gillies and Alderman Shea, the Commissioner of Public Works (presiding).

The minutes of the meeting of March 7 were approved.

## Petition 514.

To extend Mersereau avenue and Union avenue, from Richmond terrace to the pier line, in the Third Ward, for the construction of outlet sewers. Second hearing.

Mr. L. W. Freeman, of the Bureau of Sewers, addressed the Board in support of the proposal of the Commissioner of Public Works to open Mersereau avenue to the water-front, and against the opposition of the Burlee Dry Dock Company as advanced by counsel at the first hearing. He referred to old petitions and complaints relating to need of sewers in Mersereau avenue and other streets in the same watershed; to the abandonment, on account of property opposition, of a previous plan to extend Andros avenue for an outlet sewer, and to the extra cost and difficulty which would attend the construction of an outlet sewer directly east or west of the foot of Mersereau avenue; he stated that the estimated cost of grading, etc., for an extension of Mersereau avenue for an outlet sewer was \$16,514, and the estimated cost at the foot of Post lane, the other available point, was \$25,907; he exhibited plans and profiles showing the comparative changes of grade at the two points, and argued that, while the borough officials had no desire to interfere with a local industry, he could not see why the street should not be extended through land thus far unoccupied.

Mr. Charles H. Ingalls, member of the Board of Education for the Forty-fifth District, urged the immediate construction of a sewer in Mersereau avenue, whatever point of outlet might be decided on, as a public school, now in course of erection, would be completed for the fall term, and sewer connection was necessary.

Alderman Gillies and Alderman Collins refused to concur in any action which would result in condemnation of land embraced in water-front, bought by the Burlee Dry Dock Company for a shipbuilding plant, the construction of which was already under way.

The Commissioner of Public Works proposed that a Committee, to consist of himself and Alderman Shea, of the Seventy-third Aldermanic District, in which Mersereau avenue is situated, make a report which should be final and on which the Local Board should act at the next meeting.

Alderman Gillies and Alderman Collins assented to the Committee, but reserved their right to consider the report without prejudice.

The same disposition was made of the proposal to extend Union avenue.

## Petition 516.

To construct sanitary sewers in Holland place and Crescent avenue, in the First Ward. First hearing. Referred to the Commissioner of Public Works to report.

## Petition 517.

To widen John street to 50 feet, to extend John street to Franklin street, to regulate and grade John street as extended, to lay a sanitary sewer in John street and to construct a temporary storm water-sewer in John street, Franklin street and adjacent territory. First hearing.

The Commissioner of Public Works stated that his proposals, as above, were based on existing conditions and on an old petition for the extension of John street to Franklin street; and stated later that the street lines indicated had already been adopted on the map or plan of The City of New York, and that as soon as surveys now in progress were completed, and other street lines in the same watershed placed on the map, he would ask for further street openings and sewers.

Former County Clerk James Wheeler stated that most of the signers of the old petition were now dead or opposed to the limited improvement proposed; that such improvement would be ineffective and to some owners injurious; that John street must be opened, at least to Henderson avenue, and other work done to relieve the present conditions of grades, etc., which he described in detail; that the owners who would be assessed for the limited improvements proposed would be again assessed, as their property would be deemed to be again benefited, when the later improvements were made; and that they preferred to wait and be assessed in full for the larger improvement which they desired; and he cited the costs of successive commissions as unjust to the owners.

Mr. James Campbell, owning property on two streets, indorsed Mr. Wheeler.

The Commissioner of Public Works assured Mr. Wheeler and asked him to take it from him as a statement of fact, that the property involved in the present proposals would not be assessed a second time in street opening proceedings, and that the cost of drainage would be assessed over the whole area spoken of.

Alderman Collins approved the proposal for a sanitary sewer in John street, but, in view of the opposition of the people who would be assessed, moved that the whole matter be referred to the Commissioner of Public Works, to report to the Board when the new street layout should be ready.

Which was carried.

## Petition 519.

To straighten Ennis street before laying sewers in the Elm Park district, in the Third Ward. First hearing. Referred to the Commissioner of Public Works by assent of the petitioners.

## Petition 518.

To extend Castleton avenue westward from its terminus at Columbia street, in the First Ward, to the easterly terminus of Grace Church place, in the Third Ward, and Grace Church place to Richmond avenue, to meet the easterly terminus of Hatfield avenue. First hearing.

The Commissioner of Public Works exhibited a tentative map of the street layout proposed by him as above, and stated that his object was to provide a thoroughfare which might be carried still farther westward by a future extension of Hatfield avenue, and that his proposed street was based on former petitions and requests for the extension of Castleton avenue.

Mr. Sidney F. Rawson, of the law firm of De Groot, Rawson &amp; Stafford, speaking for himself and the people of Port Richmond, many of whom were present, said that the petition on which the present proposal of the Commissioner was based asked definitely for an extension of Castleton avenue to Jewett avenue at Bond street; that thirty years ago he had tried to obtain such an extension, but that, on the west side of the marsh lying between Columbia street and Jewett avenue, the proposed lines left the Town of Castleton and entered the Town of Northfield, and it would have been necessary for the Village of Port Richmond to open a street 30 feet wide and 10 feet long, which it would not do; that this would have been then and would be now one of the greatest, most needed and most popular street extensions or openings that could be made in the Borough of Richmond; and that it would, without going farther, open direct communication between two populated sections and give the people a chance by affording them a needed outlet in all directions.

He was opposed, however, to the Commissioner's plan to cross the marsh to the southward, which the people had not petitioned for and did not wish. He stated that the crossing of Heberton avenue, as proposed, would destroy the residential character of the attractive and handsome neighborhood in which he and others had built houses for themselves, and would injure much property and benefit none; and that the scheme had originated with the Borough officials and was contrary to the interests of the people.

Mr. De Witt Stafford read the people's petition, naming Bond street as the objective point of the extension asked for, and claimed that four-fifths of those who would be assessed for the Commissioner's new street knew nothing of such a scheme.

Mr. Hubbard, of Port Richmond, filed a protest against the Commissioner's plan, and spoke against the idea of a continuous street from the Kill to the Bay.

Mr. John S. Warde, representing the Staten Island Water Supply Company, favored an extension of Castleton avenue but protested against the lines shown on the Commissioner's map; the company would not oppose an extension to Bond street, notwithstanding the consequent trouble and expense of rearranging its supply pipes at Columbia

street, as was distinctly understood at the hearing on the original petition, but would oppose in every way possible the other plan, which would bring the street close to and perhaps through its chief receiving well, which had cost \$20,000, and would have the effect of shutting off water from the residences and manufacturing and business establishments.

Mr. Rawson suggested that this would run up the damages to an enormous sum, which must be paid by property deemed to be benefited but really injured.

Mr. J. T. Rourke, who had been urging the extension of Castleton avenue for twenty years, did not care how far it went, but the Bond street terminus, as petitioned for, was good enough for him.

Mr. E. H. Seehusen, Superintendent of Sewers, spoke as a resident of twenty-five years and a fireman of long experience, and declared that the only interest the people of West New Brighton have is to get across the pond instead of going a long way round, and a block one way or the other after they get across is of no consequence.

Mr. William A. Drinnan, of the Bureau of Buildings, and others were present to oppose the Commissioner's plan and to support the Bond street petition.

The matter was referred to the Commissioner.

To extend Henderson avenue from Broadway to Taylor street, in the First Ward. First hearing. Tentative map exhibited. Endorsed by James Wheeler, W. A. Drinnan and others, and referred to the Commissioner.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission  
No. 61 Elm Street,  
New York City, February 3, 1905.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Friday, February 3, 1905, at 9:30 A. M. There were present—President Baker and Commissioners Appleton and Talley.

A public hearing was held on the request of the Department of Health that the classification of positions in that Department be amended by including in the exempt class the title of "Examiner of Supplies." Dr. Thomas C. Darlington, Commissioner of Health, addressed the Commission in behalf of the proposed amendment. Elliott H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, and Mr. John H. Tregaskis, representing the Association of Civil Employees, appeared in opposition to the same. The hearing then closed.

A public hearing was held on the request of the Commissioner of Licenses that the classification of positions in his Department be amended by including in the exempt class the positions of Secretary, Chief Inspector and Deputy Chief Inspector. There were no appearances in behalf of the proposed amendment. Nelson S. Spencer, Esq., representing the Civil Service Reform Association, Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of that Association, and John H. Tregaskis, Esq., representing the Association of Civil Employees, addressed the Commission in opposition to the amendment. After the foregoing persons had been heard in opposition to the proposed exemptions, the hearing was adjourned until such time as the Commissioner of Licenses might appear and state his reasons for requesting the inclusion of the positions of Secretary, Chief Inspector and Deputy Chief Inspector in the exempt class.

The public hearing on the proposition to include in the exempt class in the Department of Parks the title "Architect, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond," was postponed for the reason that no one appeared in behalf of the same.

Deputy Police Commissioner Linsley, William Howell, Esq., Secretary to the Police Commissioner, and William A. Jones, Sergeant in charge of school for revolver practice, in the Police Department, addressed the Commission in behalf of the application of the Police Commissioner that proficiency and skill in the use of the revolver be considered and points allowed for same in future examinations for promotion in the Police Department.

Final action on the matters discussed in the various hearings was postponed pending further consideration, and the Commission then adjourned for the day.

A letter was presented from the Labor Clerk, recommending that the classification of positions in the Labor Class, Part I., as fixed by the Civil Service Rules, be amended by substituting for the title "Foreman of Laborers" the following:

Foreman of Laborers, Common.

Foreman of Park Laborers, Department of Parks.

Foreman of Dock Laborers, Department of Docks and Ferries.

The Secretary was instructed to arrange a public hearing on the proposed amendment to the rules in accordance with the provisions of Rule III.

A letter was presented from the Mayor, dated January 30, transmitting a copy of a letter and a brief presented to him by Charles T. Terry, Esq., Attorney for David H. Ray, Examiner, who was recently dismissed from the service of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, requesting that the said David H. Ray be reinstated in his position. The letter from the Mayor was referred to Commissioner Talley for a reply.

A letter was presented from the Mayor, dated January 20, returning the resolution of the Municipal Civil Service Commission increasing the number of Chaplains in the Exempt Class in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals from 2 to 3, with his approval. The Secretary stated that the resolution had been forwarded to the State Commission for its approval, the same being necessary before the amendment could become operative. The letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, dated February 8, in answer to the letter of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated February 6, requiring that certain employees of that Department be immediately assigned duties appropriate to their respective titles, it having been alleged that they were not so employed. The letter from the Commissioner of Parks stated that William Lang, Mortimer L. Schuyler, Fred Eisen and James F. Tobin, Park Laborers, and Eugene C. Ross, Wheelwright, the employees complained of, had been relegated to perform duties properly belonging to their titles, and requested that a certification of names be made from which to select a person for appointment to the position of Telephone Operator, in order to obviate the necessity of detailing other employees of the Department to perform such duties. In view of the statements contained in the Commissioner's letter, the Secretary was instructed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the pay-rolls of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx (which certificate had been withheld pending receipt of the Commissioner's letter); also to certify from the eligible list for Telephone Operator.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated January 30, requesting approval of the action of the Commissioner in rescinding the dismissal of Nicholas Brickfield, Stationary Engineman, and reinstating him in the Department as of October 10, 1904, the date of his original appointment. It appearing that Mr. Brickfield was regularly appointed to the position of Stationary Engineman, but through an error failed to receive any notice of his appointment and was subsequently dismissed for failing to report for duty, which was clearly an injustice, on motion, the request of the Department was granted, with the understanding that the employee waive all claim to salary for the time between October 10 and the date upon which he actually began his duties in the Department, his compensation to begin from that date only.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, dated February 6, requesting approval of a leave of absence without pay, from February 1 to July 31, 1905, granted Havens B. Bayles, M. D., Medical Inspector, because of illness. It appearing from the records of this office that Dr. Bayles was granted a leave of absence from December 1 to February 1, and that therefore the further leave asked for would be in excess of the six months allowed by the rules, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Department of Health that the Commission is without power to grant the same at this time and that therefore the request was denied, but without prejudice to the Department's amending its letter by asking approval of a leave of absence until June 1.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, dated December 30, requesting that a leave of absence without pay, to February 28, 1905, granted James T. Gallagher, M. D., because of illness, be approved. It appearing that Dr. Gallagher was granted a leave of absence on August 1, 1904, which expired on February 1, 1905, and that the Civil Service Rules provide that leaves of absence may be extended beyond a period of six months only in "exceptional cases," the Secretary was instructed to inform the Department of Health that the Commission is without power to grant their request.

Resolved, That with the consent of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the limit of compensation fixed by Rule XII, paragraph 6, be suspended.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated February 2, 1905, requesting that the Municipal Civil Service Commission re-submit to the State Commission its resolution of March 30, 1904, amending the classification of positions in the Bridge Department, in the exempt class, by including therein the position of Stenographer to the Commissioner, in view of the fact that the requirement of the State Board that the position be established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen has now been complied with. The accounts of proceedings of the Public Administrator have been judicially settled and allowed by the Surrogate in twenty-five estates, and the estates distributed pursuant to the decree of the Surrogate.

Three hundred and forty-four estates of little value were received from the Coroners' Offices, boroughs of The Bronx and of Manhattan, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Three hundred and eleven estates heretofore received from the Coroners' Offices of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and from the Commissioner of Public Charities, have been paid directly into the City Treasury.

In sixteen cases citations were served on the Public Administrator to attend the probate of a last will and testament, and his appearance noted.

All reports and returns to the Comptroller, Board of Aldermen, and to the Supervisor of the City Record have been rendered.
