Report for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1910.

Dear Sir—Herewith I submit the report of the Secretary for the quarter ending June 30, 1910:

Census.

The average daily census of patients in the hospitals, schools for the feeble-minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm, and other institutions of the Department for this quarter has been 9,343, as against 9,106 for the corresponding period of the preceding year.

The average daily census of all the employees in the Department during the quarter was 2,484, the Nurses in the different institutions being included therein, their daily average census being 341 during this period.

Administrative Improvements.

On May 18, 1910, the New Coney Island Hospital was formally opened for the reception of patients for which it has a bed capacity of 100. It is one of the most complete hospitals in Greater New York and cost (including \$129,279.50 paid for the 25½ acres of land) \$474,260.50.

New Hospital District.

A new hospital district has been created on the pier, foot of East 26th street, in charge of the Department's Examining Physician. The running time of the Department steamer "The Lowell" was changed on May 7, 1910, to hourly trips between 9 a. m. and 3.30 p. m. to meet the needs of this new hospital district.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

During this quarter requests were made for the issue of corporate stock to provide means for improvements which are urgently required for the proper administration of the Department.

At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on June 3 amendments were passed rescinding the sum of \$409,269.35 in authorizations previously granted this Department.

Board of Aldermen.

Request made on March 16 for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$340,277.31 to cover anticipated deficiencies for the year 1910 approved in full by this Board on April 5. Upon the recommendation of the Comptroller the Board of Estimate and Apportionment allowed the sum of \$100,000 on May 20, and on July 1 granted another \$100,000.

On May 6, request was made for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$8,236.42 to pay for the employment of additional help for the new Tuberculosis Infirmaries on Blackwell's Island, to be opened with a bed capacity of 350 patients, which was approved by this Board on May 17. Upon the recommendation

of the Comptroller the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved this request in the sum of \$4,262.50 on June 24 for the employment of this additional help from October 1.

On May 24 request was made for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$2,916.66, to pay the salary of the Third Deputy Commissioner (this office having been created by Chapter 330, Laws of 1910, passed by the Legislature May 18, 1910), which was approved at a meeting held on June 7, 1910, being approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 24, 1910.

In General.

During this quarter 3,010 letters were written and sent out by this office (of which 744 were signed by the Commissioner and 75 by the First Deputy Commissioner), covering the business transactions of this Department, with other City Departments, the public, private and charitable societies and institutions, hospitals and the State.

There were eight general and twenty-three special orders issued during this period, and 27 propositions accepted and awarded, for work costing not over \$1,000 in each case. During this quarter the quarterly report for the period ending December 31, 1909, was sent to his Honor, the Mayor, on May 11, and published in the City Record on June 4, 1910.

Over 12,500 people visited this office during this quarter.

Maternity cases show a marked increase each month; so do tubercular cases.

Improvements—The space between the inner gate and the first boat landing on the East 26th St. Pier has been set aside for a hospital district. All attaches of this office wear white uniforms during the hot weather and this, together with other improvements, has added greatly to the efficient, prompt and orderly distribu-tion of patients.

The hourly boat service is a distinct improvement and a blessing to the sick, but it has trebled the work at this office.

Needs—Fire protection, lights, re-ar-rangement of office building, better equipment, permission to use this office occasionally for teaching purposes, an in-terchangeable record system as suggested in the two last quarterly reports. more help and better paid help, paid and expe-rienced doctors on the boats and at the various transfer stations, strict rules for

transfer of patients to this department, an interpreter in Italian, French and Spanish, isolation rooms.

Report of Departmental Dietitian.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Com-missioner:

Dear Sir—Herewith I submit my report for the quarter ending June 30th:

Visits to Dietary Departments.

When visiting the Dietary Departments of the Institutions, I found the same con-ditions prevailing as I have mentioned in former reports, due to incompetent help and not a sufficient number to get the work properly accomplished.

As a number of the Institutions are largely dependent upon unpaid and con-valescent help to do cleaning and scullery work, and at the City Home to do other important duties, the question of getting the work done has been a more serious problem than ever during this quarter ow-ing to the fact that a considerable num-

ber of that class of people leave the insti-tutions when the weather becomes mild.

Dietaries and Food Supplies.

In April the milk supply at the N. Y. City Home, B. I., was increased 100 quarts per day. This increase has been most gratefully received and has proved of great benefit to inmates and patients in the hospitals. The prunes were also ma-terially increased so that the inmates have more satisfactory servings than formerly.

On April 23rd we began receiving some early vegetables from the Staten Island Farm Colony. The variety has increased with the advance of the season. Green peas and lettuce have been particularly fine.

In June we began to receive our fresh vegetables on contract; they have been generally satisfactory. Some rejections have had to be made. These rejections have had a beneficial effect upon the con-tractor.

The Passover season began at sun-down April 23, and ended May 1. It was ob-served as last year by serving suitable food to the orthodox Hebrew inmates and patients at the New York City Home, New York City Hospital, and Metropoli-

tan Hospital, B. I. The food was prepared in the Koshier kitchen of the New York City Hospital for about 130 people. It was distributed from a special wagon.

Teaching of Classes.

At the New York City Training School for Nurses, fifteen lessons of two hours each were given in dietetics to a class of probationers by the Resident Dietitian, Miss Margery H. Greenwood. Respectfully submitted,

Report of Employment Agent.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner:

'Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith the quarterly report of the Employment Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1910:

Total number of personal and referred applications received at this office, 598; number found eligible and placed in hospitals, institutions and asylums under the Department of Public Charities, 123; referred to various hospitals, Institutions and co-operating organizations, 157; advised and directed for possible employment, 179; transferred on re-application, 9; failed to report for duty, 8; unable to furnish citizen papers (less than 3 months in United States, 19; placed on waiting list, 29; number found undesirable, 63;

number reinstated, 5; declined investigation, 6; number of visits to hospitals, homes, institutions, societies and employment agencies, 181.

During the past quarter 22 hospitals and 34 institutions, societies and employment agencies have been visited to further the advancement of the Employment Bureau.

The foregoing statistics show a slight decrease in the number of applications for employment during the second quarter of the current year over the corresponding quarter for 1909.

Several applications received during the month of June were from women who have been engaged for the summer season at one or another of the summer resorts, but who were obliged to resign on account of the arduous work and long hours due to lack of sufficient number of helpers, and although the wages (in some instances) exceeded the salaries paid for similar work in the Department of Public Charities, the work on Blackwells and Randalls Islands was considered less arduous and shorter hours a consideration.

I have had more or less difficulty in securing nurses for Randalls Island and the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm on Blackwells Island as the majority of applicants who are engaged in the line of work decline to accept such position for less than \$25 to \$30 per month, especially graduates from the va-

rious training schools and hospitals. Respectfully submitted,

Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith my report for the second quarter of the current year.

Regular and special requisitions for medical and surgical supplies have been filled for the following institutions, viz.:

City Hospital, B. I., \$5,704.77; Training School for Nurses, B. I., \$70.60; New York City Home for the Aged, B. I., \$1,095.88; Metropolitan Hospital, B. I., \$5,174.19; Randall's Island Hospitals, R. I., \$942.84; King's County Hospital and dependencies, \$5,471.77; Coney Island Hospital, \$276.83; Richmond Farm Colony, \$115.18; Municipal Lodging House, \$117.30; Steamboats, \$2.88; Bureau Dependent Adults, \$4.13; General Drug Department, \$35.35; total, \$19,011.72.

The repairs to surgical instruments and apparatus amounted to \$136.95.

This bureau has continued to supply Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Department of Correction with medicines and surgical instruments, the cost of which amounted to \$18,262.34.

The Manufacturing Bureau has prepared for the several institutions a large variety of pharmaceutical articles, comprising 496 gallons fluid extracts and tinctures; 1,140 gallons liniments; 497 gallons elixirs and syrups; 725 gallons mixtures and solutions; 762 rounds ointments, and numerous other articles.

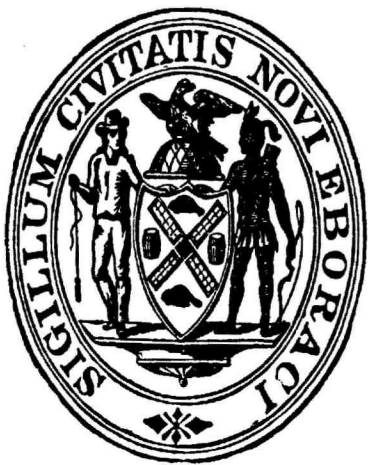

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
