Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, Feb. 15, 1916, at 3.30 P. M.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Sachs, Stern and Farley, Trustees. Ex- cused—Mr. Robbins and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of Feb. 1, 1916, were held as read and approved.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

I beg to report death of Charles Time, helper in the pathological department at Gouverneur Hospital, which occurred this morning, the cause of death being typhoid fever.

A great deal of embarrassment and in- convenience has been experienced by the employees because of delay in receiving their money for the month of January. This delay has been occasioned by our inability to adjust payrolls with the bud- get allowance of the Bureau of Standards. After a conference with the Bureau of Standards, at which Dr. Brannan was present, it was agreed that the payrolls would be passed and that a request be made for revenue bonds, which request has been transmitted to-day.

We are still experiencing great diffi- culty in getting a sufficient number of employees to carry on the work of the hospital. There are still six vacancies in the laundry to-day.

The ice plant is now completed and we are ready to manufacture our own ice at Bellevue for the use of the hospi- tals. Two additional employees are neces- sary to carry on this work, and your authorization to assign them to duty is requested.

The contractor at Neponsit for the partitions is completing his work. The John H. Parker Company is progressing rapidly now with the new out patient de- partment building at Gouverneur. There has been no change in the status of the building matters at Harlem since the last meeting.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to adopt a rule whereby all the employees of the department are to receive anti-typhoid inoculation.

After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request Mr. Sachs to confer with Comptroller Prendergast in regard to the embarrassment and incon- venience caused the employees of this department by reason of the delay in receiving their pay for the month of January.

The appointment of two additional employees necessary in the ice plant of Bellevue Hospital was authorized.

After consideration, on the recom- mendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to award the contract to the lowest bidder, Joseph B. Brady, in the sum of \$956.

The President reported that bids were received at Bellevue Hospital on Feb. 7 for the installation of power plant equip- ment in Bellevue and in its allied hospi- tals, as follows:

No. 1—Bellevue Hospital: Reliance Electric Company, \$5,847; Acme Foundry Company, \$6,996; Hamme & Donnelly, \$7,163; Shevlin Engineering Company, \$7,900; Ernest W. Newman, \$9,500; Johnston Heat Company, \$13,850.

A report relating thereto was presented from John C. Quinn, Combustion Engi- neer, under date of February 14th, and the Building Committee. On the recom- mendation of the Combustion Engineer and the Building Committee contracts were awarded to the lowest bidders as follows: Bellevue, Reliance Engineering Company, \$5,847; Gouverneur, Harlem, Fordham, Shevlin Engineering Company, \$4,385.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the application of the Andrews Building Company for an extension of time on their contract for

the construction of the machine room, coal vault and storage room at Harlem Hospital and presented a letter relating thereto from J. H. Freedlander. On the recommendation of the Building Committee it was moved, seconded and carried, to deny the request of the Andrews Building Company, and it was

Resolved, To call the attention of the contractors to clauses R and K of the contract relating to assessments of \$10 a day for each day the completion of the contract exceeds the time allowed, and abandonment proceedings.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize the change of the coal range in the staff kitchen of pavilions I and K to a gas range, the estimated cost of which is \$575.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had inquired into several matters relating to the radiographic department in pavilions I and K, and recommended that the estimate of E. Rutzler Company in the sum of \$284 for the heating, galvanized iron work and thermostats be accepted and that the contract for the installation of plumbing work be awarded to the lowest bidder, the T. J. Cummins Company, in the sum of \$595. The Committee also recommended that the omissions and additions in the general contract of A. W. King for alterations be accepted, except an item relating to changes in the library bookcases, at an additional cost of \$350, to be rejected in order to keep within the amount allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, these recommendations were approved.

The selection of an architect for the construction of an additional wing to the nurses' residence, at 440 East 26th Street, in connection with Bellevue Hospital, for which a request for funds is pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, was considered. After discussion, on the recommendation of the Chairman of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to appoint McKim, Mead and White as architects for this work.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had inquired into the application of John H. Parker Company, under date of Nov. 11, 1915, for payment of the retained percentage on their contract for the construction of pavilions I and K, and presented letters relating thereto from McKim, Mead and White under date of Jan. 22, January 24 and Feb. 9, 1916. The architects recommended that \$300 be withheld to cover the cost of repairing defective structural glass which cannot be replaced at this time on account of the European War. On the recommendation of the Building Committee it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize the payment of the retained percentage and to withhold \$300 to cover the cost of structural glass.

The President reported that he had reviewed the credentials of Dr. Walter P. Anderton, an applicant recommended by the Executive Committee for appointment as Physician to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician on the Fourth Division, in the place of Dr. Guile, promoted, and recommended his appointment. A communication, dated Feb. 7, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by that Board on Feb. 4, 1916: (1) Approving transfer of funds from code No. 2089 to No. 2092, year 1914; (2) approving transfer of funds within the appropriations for 1915; (3) revising schedules Nos. 2090 and 2091; (4) approving the form of contract for the preparation of complete plans and specifications and for the supervision of the construction of balconies, fire escapes and alterations to the fourth floor and a sewer at Neponsit Beach Hospital for Children. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was ordered placed on file.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to hold the election of officers and appointment of Committees at the adjourned meeting on Feb. 29, 1916.

A motion to adjourn was seconded and carried.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, Feb. 29, 1916, at 3.30 P. M.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President,

in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Sachs, Stern and Farley, Trustees. Excused—Mr. O'Keefe, Mr. Robbins and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of Feb. 15, 1916, were held as read and approved. Doctor O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Dr. Norris, Director of Laboratories, requests the appointment of Dr. Willis P. Baker, who is now Resident Pathologist at \$600 to the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Wallace. Dr. Baker is on the Civil Service list for this position.

I am in receipt of an application from Dr. Samuel Hunt for the position of interne on the obstetrical service of Bellevue Hospitals, for six months' period, beginning July 1st, at which time Dr. Hunt will complete his service on the house staff. He has been recommended by Drs. Flint and Edgar for this position.

Dr. Haubold, Attending Surgeon at Harlem Hospital, is seriously ill at St. Vincent's Hospital suffering from an infection received while operating at the Harlem Hospital. Dr. Keune, Visiting Physician at the Harlem Hospital, died suddenly on Friday evening, the 25th instant.

Part of the employees at all of the hospitals of the department were paid yesterday. A supplementary payroll is now with the City Paymaster for a number of others whose positions were omitted from the Budget, and when these are paid there will still be about 75 who have been left off of all payrolls pending the issuing of special revenue bonds, on which argument was made to the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen yesterday.

Complaint has also been received from the Ambulance Board regarding a call from Harlem Hospital. Investigation of this complaint shows that the ambulance responded promptly to the call but the patient refused to come in. A second call for the same patient was made a short time later.

An inspection was made of the ferryboat "Baltic" which was offered for sale by the Union Ferry Company of Brooklyn to replace the boat "Westfield," and we find that it would not in any way meet our conditions, being a single deck boat, and having insufficient room. The boat has been out of commission for five years, and some of the planks are badly rotted.

D. Davis, who had the painting contract for I and K, has completed all the work of painting the walls, but has not cleaned up thereafter. Lighting fixtures are now being installed in this pavilion by the National Surety Company, and they are making good progress. In the out-patient department at Gouverneur the masons are working on the cellar walls, window frames are being placed in position, and the iron workers are setting and riveting the second and third tier beams. At Harlem Hospital practically no progress is being made. The Andrews Construction Company have apparently abandoned their contract. This delays completion of the plumbing contract with the Kenny Company. At Neponsit Beach Hospital the Marshall Construction Company have completed the laying of the sewer, but have not yet made connections with the main line, owing to the delays in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens. The Architectural Contracting Company is erecting new columns for balconies, and the contractors who are making alterations on the fourth floor have practically completed their work.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The appointments of Dr. Willis P. Baker as Pathologist and Dr. Samuel Hunt as interne on the obstetrical service for six months from July 1, 1916, were approved.

In connection with the General Medical Superintendent's report consideration was given to the delayed payrolls in the department, and Mr. Sachs reported that he had been in conference with the Comptroller to obtain early action on the revision of schedules and approval of payrolls by the Board of Estimate. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, That in the future when there are delays in obtaining action on revision of schedules and payrolls of the department to address official communications to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment bringing such matters specifically to their attention.

The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to communicate with the Ambulance Board in regard to the findings in the investigation of the complaint relating to delayed ambulance calls.

In connection with the General Medical Superintendent's report in regard to the efforts to obtain a boat to replace the

"Westfield" a letter was read from Dr. N. Gilbert Seymour under date of Feb. 29. After discussion, it was resolved to request the committee to make inquiries with a view of determining on the desirability of using and the possibility of obtaining a barge if no ferryboat can be secured, and to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to negotiate with the St. Johns Guild with a view of obtaining the boat formerly used by that association at a floating hospital, and it was further

Resolved, To make inquiries of Dock Commissioner Smith in regard to the details necessary between the Dock Department and the Trustees for the occupancy of the pier to be erected at the foot of Corlears Street, mentioned in the communication from the Local Needs Association under date of Nov. 27, and accepted by the President on behalf of the Trustees under date of Dec. 15, 1915.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. Stern presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchasing Committee on Feb. 25 for coffee. On the recommendation of the Central Purchasing Committee contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchasing Committee on Feb. 28 for stock vegetables, meats and poultry. On the recommendation of the Central Purchasing Committee contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders with the exception of lines 19 and 20 for fresh kosher meats which are not needed at present.

The President reported that it has come to his attention that at Gouverneur Hospital during the past few days more patients were prepared for operations than were operated upon at that time. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to notify the Medical Board of each hospital of the department that the Trustees view this as an uncalled for hardship upon the patients, and to request these Boards to issue instructions to the surgeons under their jurisdiction to direct the preparation of only as many cases as they are ready to operate upon at any one time, and also that if, for any reason, the surgeon is not able to proceed with the number of operations previously determined upon, arrangements should be made to have the operations completed or undertaken by such of his associates or assistants as may be qualified under the regulations of the department.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter dated Feb. 18, was presented from the Department of Public Charities, stating that the old morgue cannot be removed at the present time as that department has no other place available where the functions for which the old morgue is now being used can be carried on. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to Mr. Sachs with a request to take this matter up with the Mayor.

A communication dated Feb. 29, was presented from J. H. Freedlander, calling attention to clause K of the contract of the Andrews Building Company and stating that this contract has been unreasonably delayed. A letter was also presented from the Andrews Building Company under date of Feb. 28. The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had inquired into this matter and recommended in view of the difficulty with the contractor in obtaining early completion of the contract that it be declared abandoned and the surety company called upon to complete the work, and should they refuse to do so, to proceed in the manner prescribed by law, and clause K of the contract and charge the expense thereof to the Andrews Building Company, and its surety. After consideration and discussion, the report and recommendations were approved and action taken accordingly.

A letter was presented from the Marshall Contracting Company under date of Feb. 21, requesting an extension of time on their contract at Neponsit Beach Hospital, on account of delays in obtaining permission to connect with the sewer of the Neponsit Realty Company. On the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to extend the time to complete the contract until ten days beyond the date that they receive permission to connect the pipes with those of the Neponsit Realty Company at Rockaway.

A request for an extension of time was presented from the National Surety Company, the surety who is completing the contract of the International Gas and Electric Fixture Company for the installation of lighting fixtures in pavilions I and K of the new Bellevue Hospital. On the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architects, an extension of thirty days' time was allowed on this contract, on account of the difficulty the contractor has experienced in ob-

taining supplies due to the European situation.

A letter was presented from Frank A. Nebeling requesting an extension of 15 days' time to complete his contract for the installation of the electric wiring at Harlem Hospital, on account of delays in obtaining supplies due to freight congestion. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, this request was approved.

A communication dated Feb. 18 was presented from the Department of Health, requesting the transfer of \$1,253 from the appropriation for 1916 under code No. 2090, installations for economy in fuel. Contracts for this work in the department have been let, and as there is no further need for these funds, which were granted for this specific purpose, the request was approved.

Three letters were presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of Feb. 14, 21 and 23, 1916, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by that Board on Feb. 11 and 18, 1916. (1) amending resolution authorizing the issue of \$75,000 corporate stock for the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital to include equipment, (2) authorizing the appropriation of \$25,000 to provide means to construct balconies on pavilions I, K, L and M, (3) transferring \$1,253 from Bellevue to the Department of Health, funds for fuel installation machinery and amending schedules affected thereby. These communications were ordered placed on file.

NEW BUSINESS.

In accordance with the rules adopted on May 8, 1906, the election of a president and secretary was declared in order. On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, Dr. John W. Brannan was re-elected President, and Mr. James K. Paulding re-elected Secretary.

Standing Committees for the year 1916 were appointed by the President, as follows: Rules: Mr. Robbins, Mr. Kingsbury and Mr. Paulding; Supplies: Mr. Paulding, Mr. Kingsbury and Mr. Robbins; Officers and Employees: Mr. Sachs, Mr. Paulding and Mr. Robbins; Psychopathic and Alcoholic Wards: Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Stern; Finance: Mr. O'Keeffe, Mr. Sachs and Mr. Kingsbury; Buildings and Grounds: Mr. Farley, Mr. Sachs and Mr. Robbins; Medical Affairs: Mr. Paulding and Mr. Robbins; Advisory Committee on Nursing: Mr. Sachs and Mr. O'Keeffe; Library: Mr. Stern and Mr. Farley; Convalescent Relief: Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Paulding; Welfare of Employees: Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Paulding; Conference: Bellevue, Mr. Paulding and Mr. Stern; Gouverneur, Mr. Paulding and Mr. Stern; Harlem, Mr. Robbins and Mr. O'Keeffe; Fordham, Mr. Robbins and Mr. O'Keeffe. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, In re-electing Doctor John Winters Brannan as President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, that a permanent record be made upon the minutes of the Board of his fellow members' appreciation of the value of his counsels and of his unselfish devotion as shown by the very large amount of time he has given to the work of the hospitals, whose best interests and welfare have been the single aim of his consistent endeavors.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Dr. Flexner met with the Trustees on the organization of the medical and surgical services of Bellevue Hospital. A discussion was held on the recommendations of the Executive Committee in regard to the assignments of the special services, mentioned in the minutes of that Board for Feb. 9, and a communication from Dr. Samuel W. Lambert under date of Jan. 26, requesting a conference with the Committees designated by the Trustees before further assignments are made. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to meet in conference with the Deans of the several universities with a view of learning what they are prepared to offer the hospital in the way of an organized plan for the administration of such special services as the Trustees are prepared to assign to them. In regard to the communication from Columbia University under date of Dec. 16, 1915, it was resolved to request the First Division to submit to the Trustees the plan of organization they propose to introduce with a view of enabling the Board to come to a conclusion.

With a view of utilizing the hospital material to the fullest extent for teaching purposes, it was moved, seconded and carried, to suggest to the Fourth (the non-collegiate) division for consideration, the possibility of transforming itself into a division for post graduate instruction, whether in connection with other institutions now in existence or upon an independent basis.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

Section 20. Location. Standpipes (fire lines) shall be supplied with water from gravity tanks (unless otherwise described under "Pumps").

The bottom of gravity tanks shall be at least 20 feet above the hose outlet of the top story. Standpipes shall connect at the bottom of the tank, and extend up 4 inches from bottom.

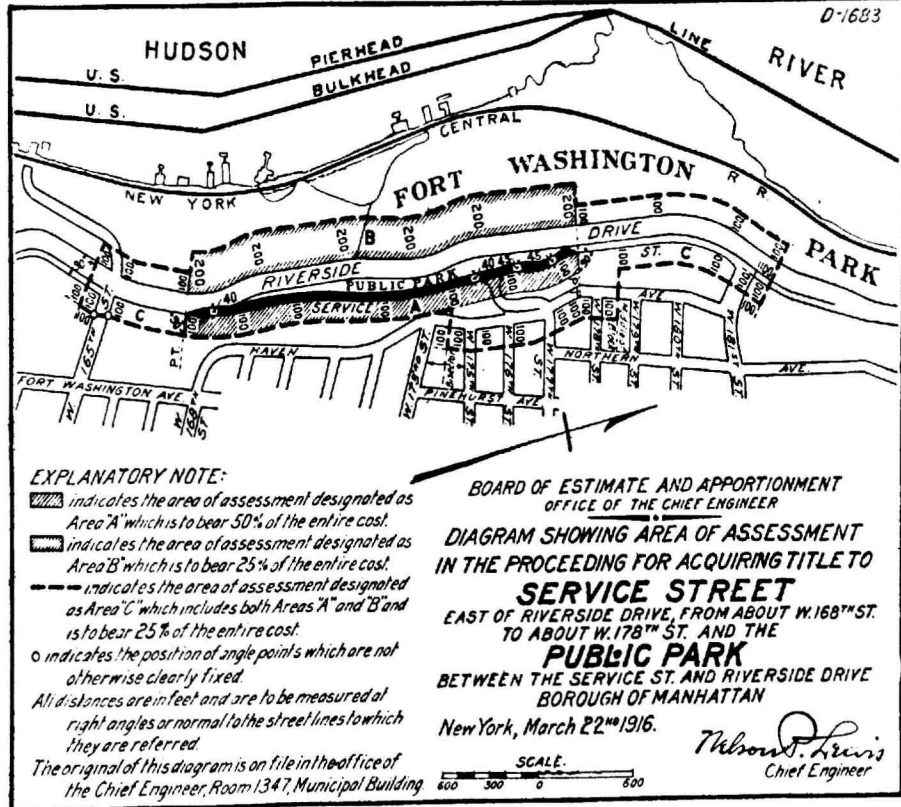

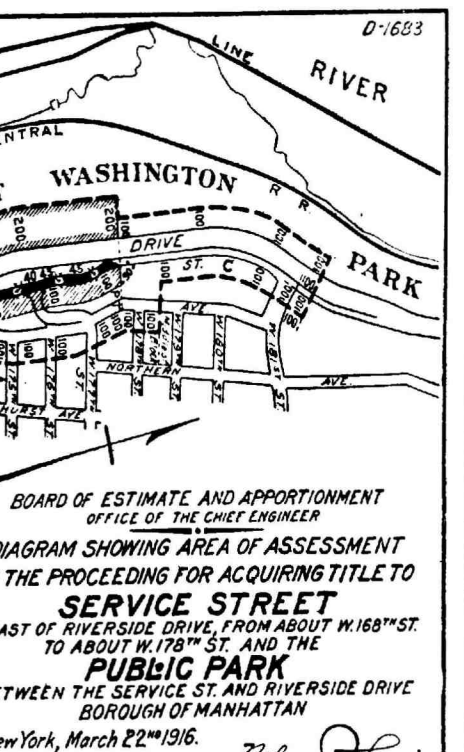

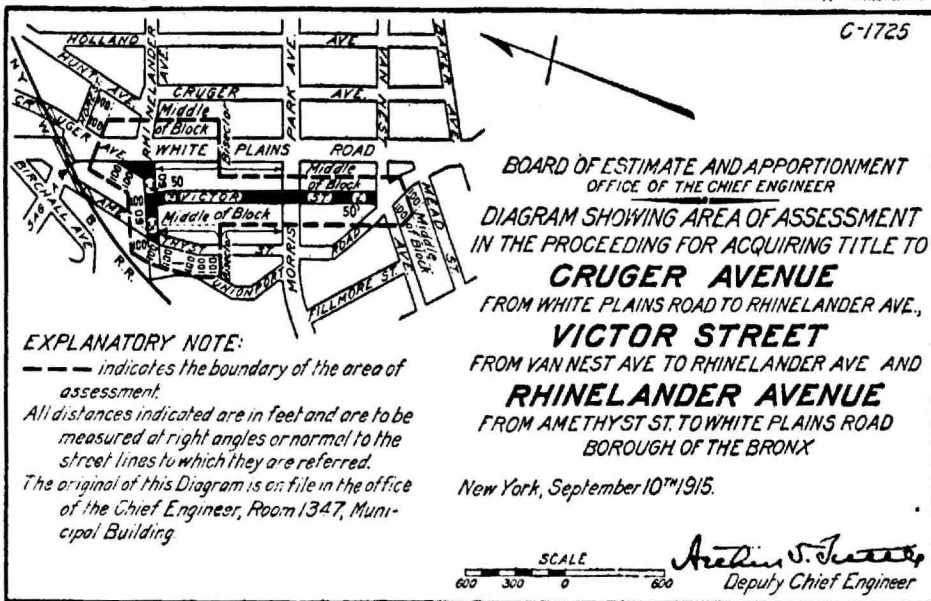
