COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held September 10, 1874.

Present—Hon. William F. Havemeyer, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, and George W. Lane, Esq., Chamberlain.

The communication of the Commissioners of Docks, dated March 25, 1874, requesting that one million dollars, Dock Bonds of the City of New York, be issued for the purposes of the Department of Docks, received April 1, 1874, and laid on the table for future consideration, was taken up for action; whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the Act, chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising the moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties, being part of the amount asked for by the Commissioners of Docks in their requisition dated March 25, 1874.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

NEW YORK, September 22, 1874.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—In the week ending on Saturday, the 19th of September, there were 546 deaths reported in the city, against 583 the previous week. The decrease of mortality during the last week occurred in nearly all classes of causes; diphtheria and scarlatina failed to show any decrease, and were charged with 44 deaths. There were 28 fewer deaths of infants under a year old, 3 fewer deaths from diarrhoeal diseases and 18 less from phthisis. The death-rate was equal to 27.30 in the 1,000 yearly; whereas in the previous week it was 29.25 per 1,000.

The mean temperature in the week was 66.2 degrees Fahr, with a range of only 13 degrees and an average humidity equal to 78-100 of total saturation. The mean atmospheric pressure was marked at 30.104 inches upon the barometer, and was above 30 inches every day. The rainfall equalled 7.75 inches depth of water. These meteorological coincidents of the steadily decreasing mortality are worthy of notice. The rate of mortality has continued to decrease since the great rain. The city is free from epidemic diseases, diphtheria excepted, and the Autumn has opened with the best prospects of unusual healthfulness. This is not only true of New York, but of every important port and large city in the United States. The chief cities of Great Britain show a wide variation in rates of mortality at the close of the past Summer; that of London, in the week ending September 5, and in the previous week being only 19 per 1,000, that of Edinburgh, Portsmouth and Bristol only 17 per 1,000, while that of Liverpool, Wolverhampton and Newcastle was 32 per 1,000. The chief German cities, the last week in August, reported rates from 30 to 38 per 1,000 inhabitants, but the city of Vienna only 20 per 1,000 annual rate.
