



GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to inform you that the following work has been done during the last week upon the bridge, viz.:

303 main truss pins erected, 132 top connections, and 201 knee braces.

The erection of the six main trusses was completed on the 16th inst. This completes the heavy work of erection, and there yet remains to be put in place a portion of the promenade diagonals, knee braces, and top connections.

The planking has been laid on about two hundred lineal feet of the promenade, including the elevated sections around the towers, and about four hundred lineal feet of the roadway planking has been laid.

The weather during the week has not been favorable for work.

Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
